#### Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, July 2, 1918, at 2:30 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. O'Keeffe, Sachs, Farley, Wright and Stern, Trustees. Excused—Mr. Paulding, Trustee, and Mr. Coler, Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities, ex-officio.

#### COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Dr. Brannan presented a tabulation of bids received at the office of the Central Purchase Committee on Monday, July 1, for canned goods and groceries. After consideration, on the recommendation of the Committee on Supplies, contracts were awarded to the low formal bidders on all lines with the exception of line 127, as this item should not have been advertised, as the specifications prohibit the purchase of evaporated apples during the summer months. As no bids were received on sugar, readvertisement was authorized.

Reference was made to the resignation of Charles Norris as Director of Laboratories, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to inform Dr. Norris that the Trustees reluctantly accepted his resignation, severing cordial relations of over thirteen years, during which time he did

splendid work in developing the organization of the laboratories of the hospitals of the department, and the Board accepts his resignation with sincere regret.

Reference was made to a bill for \$1,706.53, presented by the Department of Docks and Ferries, under date of June 17, for providing a berth for the "Camp Huddleston." As the Trustees have no funds specifically allowed for this purpose and as the general appropriations are over-encumbered to the extent of \$238,000, for which a request is now pending for an issue of special revenue bonds, it was moved, seconded and carried to inform the Dock Commissioner of this situation, and that the Trustees also understand that his department was to provide the funds for the work and that the Trustees are ready to endorse his request and support his application before the Board of Aldermen for an issue of special revenue bonds to meet the cost of the work.

Reference was made to the death on June 24, 1918, of Willis M. Polk, Consulting Gynaecologist to the Second Division of Bellevue Hospital, whereupon the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The Trustees have learned with profound sorrow of the death of William M. Polk, a graduate of the house staff of Bellevue Hospital in the year 1870, Visiting Gynaecologist from 1874 to 1915, and Consulting Gynaecologist since June 22, 1915, who brought to these positions an unfailing sympathy and fidelity, in addition to signal ability in the discharge of his duties.

Therefore, Be it Resolved, That the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals spread upon its minutes an expression of appreciation which shall serve as a record of his service to Bellevue, the city and the nation; and further be it

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be sent to his widow and family, together with the earnest sympathy of the Trustees.

#### COMMUNICATIONS.

ton from the Eye Clinic of the Out Patient Department was noted, but no action could be taken thereon as there is no record in the office of the Board of Trustees that S. A. Agatson was ever appointed by the Trustees. The attention of the Medical Board was called to the fact that the Trustees insist upon a strict compliance with the rules requiring nominations by the Medical Board and appointments by the Trustees before permitting affiliations in any branch of the medical and surgical administration of the hospitals of the department.

Two letters, dated June 20 and 21, were presented from the Granite City Soap Co., Newburgh, N. Y., asking for permission to assign to the Columbus Trust Co. an invoice dated June 13, order B-678, requisition No. 448, amounting to \$673.89, and invoice of Jan. 28, 1918, order No. 59, amounting to \$1,141.36, respectively. After consideration, this request was approved without guarantee as to the amount, and expressly subject to any claim, set-off or equity which The City of New York now has, or may have, against the moneys or any part thereof covered by said assignment; and subject to the rights, if any, of lienors who may have duly filed liens with or affecting the interests of The City of New York in the said contracts.

The Chute-Thornton & Bagley Corporation presented a request for final payment on their contract for the construction of steam line from Gouverneur Hospital to the new building for the Out Patient Department. On motion, duly seconded and carried, on the recommendation of the Building Committee, the work under the contract was accepted and final payment authorized.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was moved, seconded and carried.
