

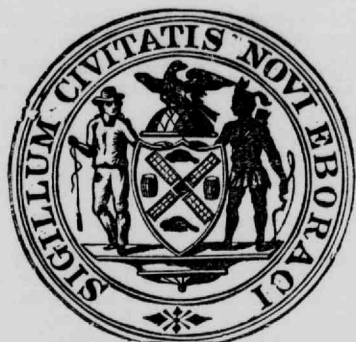

Secretary directed to notify the lessees of the said premises, respectively, to make the necessary repairs thereto, within ten days, under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, or this Department will have the same done at their cost and expense.

5th. Reporting the amount of repairs required to the west side of Pier 50, East river. Secretary directed to notify the owner thereof to repair the same within ten days, under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, or this Department will do the work and charge the cost thereof to him or them.

6th. Reporting amount of work done during the week ending August 26th instant.  
7th. Report on Secretary's order No. 2618, as to repairs required to the gangways leading to the public baths at Pier 51, East river, and at Thirty-seventh street, East river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to make the necessary repairs thereto.

8th. Report on Secretary's order No. 2612, as to repairs required to be made to Pier 8, East river. Secretary directed to notify the lessee to make the necessary repairs thereto, within ten days, under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, or this Department will have the same done and charge the cost to them.

Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to make requisition for the necessary dredges, scows, labor, etc., to have the same dredged to a depth of 15 feet at mean low water.

10th. Report on Secretary's order No. 2600, that he had superintended the repairs made to Pier, new 35, North river.

11th. Report on Secretary's order No. 2597, that the work of erecting a temporary ice bridge on Pier 43, East river, had been superintended by him.

Secretary also to request Mr. Twombly to confer with Mr. Cruikshank as soon as possible, so as to have the matter definitely settled.

15th. Report on Secretary's order No. 2620, as to quantity of dredging required in the easterly half of the slip between Piers 20 and 21, East river, to give ten feet depth of water. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to make requisition for the necessary dredges, scows, labor, etc., to dredge the same to a depth of ten feet at mean low water.

16th. Report on Secretary's order No. 2619, as to filling in on premises between Fifty-second street and Fifty-fourth street, North river.

17th. Report on Secretary's order No. 2628, as to the use of the 100-ton derrick "City of New York" by the firm of C. H. Delamater & Co., and reporting the schedule prices as charge by them for like service. Treasurer requested to make out bill for \$300 for the same, and to collect from Delamater & Co.

18th. Reporting and submitting specifications and form of contract for paving newly made ground between Piers, new 34 and new 41, North river, divided in two sections in accordance with the resolution adopted August 23, 1882. Approved, and Secretary directed to have the same advertised pursuant to the resolution.

From James Fitzpatrick, Corporation Wharfinger :

Hon. ALLAN CAMPBELL, Comptroller City of New York:

SIR—By direction of the Board governing this Department, I have to acknowledge receipt of your communication of 24th inst., relating to the penalty imposed by this Department upon Mahony Brothers for non-completion of work within the time stipulated therefor under their contract, for building a pier at North Brother Island, dated January 23, 1882, and requesting to be informed if certain statements made by Mr. R. J. Morrison, attorney for said contractors, in two communications addressed to you by him, and transmitted to this office in your communication of the 8th inst., are correct, and asking for all information possessed by the Department that may enable you to arrive at a proper understanding of the merits of the claim for a remission of the penalty.

Respectfully referring to communication from this Department, dated 11th inst., returning two communications from Mr. Morrison, I have now to state the following, to wit:

- 1st. That the estimates for the contract referred to above were opened December 8, 1881.
- 2d. That the estimate of Mahony Brothers was received on Dec. 12, 1881, from your Department, with the approval of the sureties thereto, under date of Dec. 10, 1881.
- 3d. That the award of the contract to Mahony Brothers under said estimate was made by the Board on January 18, 1882, the thirty-nine days' delay after the approval of the sureties being occasioned by the unwillingness of the members of the Board to incur further liability until the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund had determined the question relating to the funds for the Department, which were under consideration during that period.
- 4th. That the contract was executed by Mahony Brothers, and dated Jan. 23, 1882.
- 5th. That the date stipulated in the contract for the commencement of the work was five days after date of its execution, and that for the completion of the work thereunder was March 1, 1882, or eighty-three days after the opening of the estimate.
- 6th. That the work under the contract was actually commenced on Jan. 31, 1882, or eight days after its date of execution, and was fully completed on June 3, 1882, or one hundred and thirty-one days after said date of execution, being forty-eight days' time longer than provided in said contract, and ninety-four days after the date of completion as stipulated therein.
- 7th. That the \$50 per day penalty for the ninety-four days was imposed by the Department and deducted in the sum of \$4,700 from the final payment on the contract audited June 28, 1882.
- 8th. That the Board certified to the Comptroller by resolution, adopted June 28, 1881, that of the period of ninety-four days for which penalty had been imposed, thirty-nine days was for the delay by the Department in making the award, and that the Corporation did not sustain any loss or damage whatsoever consequent upon the delay to fully complete the work upon the date fixed in the contract therefor.

The communication from the Produce Bank, in reference to the completion of the repairs to Pier, old 22, North river, was,

On motion, taken from the table, and with the report from the Engineer-in-Chief, on Secretary's order No. 2505, that the repairs had been made in a satisfactory manner, which was received and read, was ordered on file, and the action of the Secretary in notifying the Produce Bank that the Engineer-in-Chief had reported the repairs as being made satisfactory, was approved.

The President, to whom was referred the communication from the Engineer-in-Chief, suspending Robert Roulston, watchman, for being found asleep, reported thereon in favor of giving another trial to the man.

On motion, the report was received and placed on file—the recommendation not being adopted, the watchman was,

On motion, discharged from service in the Department.

The Report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's order No. 2588, in reference to the removal of the canal-boat, and the cargo or material therein contained, sunk in the slip between Piers, new 37 and new 38, North river, was,

On motion, taken from the table, and with the estimates received for the removal of the same, ordered on file, and,

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to make requisitions for the necessary labor and plan to remove the same under the estimate made by Charles M. Pratt, his bid for doing said work for the sum of \$470 being the lowest received therefor—the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

The following preamble and resolution, offered by Commissioner Voorhis, was adopted by the affirmative votes of the President and Commissioner Voorhis; Commissioner Vanderpoel not voting:

Whereas, It was reported in one or more of the public newspapers of this city that at a meeting of the Board of Commissioners governing the Department of Docks, held on the 23d inst., the Treasurer of the Board, Commissioner Vanderpoel, stated that "We (referring to the Commissioners of the Department of Docks) do a good many things that might send us to jail if they were known, and we were held strictly to the letter of the law."

Whereas, Such statements or allegations of misconduct, if true, are designed to bring discredit on the Department, and disgrace on the parties guilty of such alleged unlawful conduct, and should act as a disqualification for the further assumption and discharge of the responsibilities and duties of the position held by the official or officials guilty of the acts or things alleged; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Treasurer of this Board, Commissioner Vanderpoel, be and hereby is requested, and, as far as the power of this Board extends, is directed to report and make known at once to the proper authorities, to wit, his Honor the Mayor of the City, the Grand Jury of the County, and the District Attorney, any and all information or knowledge in his possession relating to any unlawful acts or things, either of omission or commission, on the part of the Commissioners of this Department, or of either of them, in connection with their official duties or responsibilities, to the end that such action may be taken in reference thereto by the said aforesaid named authorities as may be deemed necessary and proper for the interests of the city.

The President offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board is hereby directed to give his reason in writing for absenting himself from his duty from 12th to the 28th of August, without first making his application in writing and receiving the consent of the Board, or any individual member thereof.

Commissioner Voorhis offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary be and hereby is directed to communicate with the Secretary of the Treasury of the United States in relation to a reported recent revision by Congress of the Laws for the measurement and determination of the tonnage of vessels propelled by steam, and to respectfully request that a copy of the law, as revised, be furnished for the uses and purposes of this Department.

The following preamble and resolutions, offered by Commissioner Voorhis, were unanimously adopted:

Whereas, The time will soon arrive when, in the opinion of this Board, it will become necessary to excavate the solid filling lying westerly of the line established for the permanent bulkhead wall to be erected between the foot of Dey street and the foot of Vesey street, in order that there may exist no obstruction to the free flow and ebb of the tides upon the completion of the permanent improvement of that section of the North river water front, under the established plan therefor, as adopted by this Department and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Comptroller of the City be and hereby is respectfully requested to notify the lessees and occupants of the property known as the West Washington Market to vacate their respective premises on or about the 1st day of January, 1883, or as soon thereafter as arrangements are perfected by this Department for the prosecution of the work of improvement of that section of the water front of the city under the plan of 1871.

Resolved, That the occupants of Pier, old 20, North river, under the lease made to Francis McDonald, deceased, be and hereby are notified, in conformity with the terms thereof, that this Department, on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, will determine and annul the said lease on January 1, 1883, or as soon thereafter as arrangements can be completed for the rebuilding of said pier upon the plan adopted for the permanent improvement of that section of the water front; such notice hereby given being in lieu of the three months' notice stipulated for in the said lease.

Resolved, That the Treasurer be and hereby is directed, authorized and empowered to ascertain, at the earliest practicable date, the lowest terms upon which this Department can agree with the alleged owner or owners of Piers 19 and 24, North river, and of the northerly half of Pier, old 22, North river, sometimes called 23, for the purchase thereof by this Department, on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, as authorized by subdivision 4 of section 6, chapter 574, Laws of 1871; any such agreement, if made, being subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to prepare plans and specifications for the construction, either by contract or by the force of the Department, as may hereafter be determined on, of a bulkhead wall upon the plan of the wall now in the course of erection at the Twenty-third street section on the North river, extending northerly from a point at about the northerly side of Pier 19, North river, to a point at about the southerly side of Pier 24, North river, and for the construction of two or more new wooden piers, extending westerly from said proposed wall, in conformity with the plan adopted therefor, subject to such alteration to the width and location of said piers as may be necessary consequent upon a change in the said plan north of these premises, made under the provisions of chapter 738, Laws of 1872.

Commissioner Vanderpoel, the Treasurer of the Board, presented his report of his receipts for the week ending August 30 instant, which was received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, and the Secretary directed to enter the same in full on the minutes, as follows:

## COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

*Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held September 6, 1882.*

Present—Hon. William R. Grace, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Hon. Allan Campbell, Comptroller, and John McClave, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The reading of the minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with.

The Comptroller reported that the balance, August 19, 1882, to the credit of "The Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt," was eight hundred and twenty-five thousand six hundred and sixteen \$1-100 dollars (\$825,616.81), and that the liabilities for interest payable therefrom during the balance of the current year will not exceed one hundred and ninety-six thousand five hundred and seventy-five 44-100 dollars (\$196,575.44); and recommended that the sum of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) be transferred to "The Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt," as provided by law; and submitted the following resolution for that purpose, viz.:

Resolved, That a warrant be drawn in favor of the Chamberlain on account of "The Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt," for the sum of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000), transferring the amount to "The Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt," as provided by section 2 of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878.

On motion, the resolution was adopted:

The Comptroller submitted the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Comptroller, in accordance with subdivision 11 of section 6 of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, be and he hereby is authorized and directed to prepare and issue, from time to time, as he may deem necessary to meet the requirements of the Department of Docks, "Dock Bonds of the City of New York," amounting to two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000), for the purpose of raising moneys necessary to carry out the provisions of said act relating to said Department, its powers and duties, the said amount being the balance of the requisition of the Dock Department dated December 21, 1881, for seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$750,000).

The Comptroller submitted bill of Williams Brothers, for posting bills for leasing ferries and upper part of Centre Market; also bill of Martin B. Brown for printing said bills. Whereupon the following resolution, submitted by the Comptroller, was, on motion, adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That a warrant, payable from the appropriation, "Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, Expenses of," for the year 1882, be drawn in favor of Messrs. Williams Brothers, for the sum of six dollars and seventy-five cents (\$6.75), to pay for posting bills for leasing of City property and ferries; and a warrant, payable from the same appropriation, be drawn in favor of Martin B. Brown, for the sum of thirteen dollars \$13.00 for printing said bills.

The Comptroller submitted the following preamble, and resolution, viz.:

Whereas, The public interests require a ferry to be established between a point at or near the foot of Canal street, North river, and Fort Lee, Bergen County, State of New Jersey, with landings at intermediate docks or piers in the City of New York, to wit: At Twenty-second and Thirty-fourth streets, North river; and also another ferry between a point at or near the foot of Thirty-fourth street, North river, and Jersey City, Hudson County, State of New Jersey.

Resolved, That the Common Council of the City of New York be and is hereby respectfully requested to pass ordinances or resolutions establishing the said ferries, and that the Secretary be directed to transmit this resolution and preamble to the Board of Aldermen;

Which, on motion, were adopted.

The Comptroller presented the petition of William H. Harbeck and Eliza D. Harbeck for release of quit-rents reserved on grants of lands between high and low water marks on the Brooklyn shore of the East river, with his report thereon, as follows, viz.:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT—COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,  
August 24, 1882.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Herewith I present a petition of William H. Harbeck and Eliza D. Harbeck for proper instruments of release of quit-rents, reserved on certain pieces, parcels or lots of land, between high and low water mark, on the Brooklyn shore of the East river.

It appears that the said quit rents have been commuted, and the amount of the commutation has been paid into the City Treasury to the credit of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, on two separate grants, on January 22, 1835, as shown on the books of the Finance Department, as per statement herewith.

No record, however, is found of releases of said quit-rents having been executed and delivered by the Corporation of the City of New York.

It has sometimes happened that such releases have not been executed and delivered upon the payment of commutation of quit-rents on the water-lot grants, through the neglect of the parties in interest to apply for them at the time, and in such cases releases have been authorized when the petition of the owners of the property has been made subsequently upon the proper evidence that the quit rents reserved by the grants have been duly commuted.

I therefore submit a resolution to grant the said petition, and to authorize the Counsel to the Corporation to prepare instruments of release of the quit-rents reserved upon the water lots therein referred to and described.

and approved by him; and that the Comptroller be directed to deliver the same when so executed and recorded in his office, to said petitioners or their attorney.

The report was accepted, and, on motion, the resolution was adopted.

The application of Hugh O'Reilly and others for ferry from foot of Bridge street, Brooklyn, to a point near James slip, New York, was received, and, on motion, referred to the Comptroller.

A communication from Thomas P. Ball, in relation to converting a portion of Coenties slip into a public park, was received, and, on motion, referred to the Comptroller.

The petition of Joseph H. Godwin and John H. Morris, for a grant of land lying in Sherman's Creek, in the Twelfth Ward of the City of New York, was received, and, on motion, referred to the Comptroller.

A communication from the Department of Public Charities and Correction, "recommending that a clause be inserted in the new lease to the ferry companies for the conveyance of Fire Department apparatus, etc., to the several islands, in case of fire," was received, and, on motion, referred to the Comptroller.

A communication from the Department of Docks in relation to the permanent improvement of the water-front north of Grand street, East river, and north of Sixty-first street, North river, was received, and, on motion, referred to the Comptroller.

*Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending September 2, 1882.*

Resolved, That East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, from the westerly curb-line of Third avenue to the easterly curb-line of Railroad avenue, east, be regulated and graded, that the sidewalks be flagged a space four feet wide where not heretofore flagged, and that the curb and gutter stones be set where not heretofore set within said limits, under the direction of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.

### NOTICE.

RULES AND REGULATIONS ESTABLISHED for the government and proper care of piers, bulkheads, slips, and other wharf property, under the provisions of subdivision 7 of section 6 of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, by the Board of the Department of Docks, and published, to take effect on and after

MAY 1, 1882.

The said subdivision 7, among other things, provides as follows:

"The violation of or disobedience to any rule, regulation, or order of said Board shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, on complaint of said Board."

And every person guilty of a violation of or disobedience to any of the following rules or regulations, in addition to the penalties thereby fixed and imposed, to be recovered in civil actions, is liable to be prosecuted for a misdemeanor and to be punished by such fine and imprisonment, or by both.

No. 1.—No piles shall be driven, nor shall any platform be erected, nor shall any filling-in of any kind be made on any part of the water-front of the city, without a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars, for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee, or occupant of any pier or bulkhead, or of any water-front property or right, who shall cause or permit any such work to be done upon his premises before such permit therefor has been obtained, and under the further penalty of fifty dollars for each and every day which shall elapse before any piles so driven, or platform so erected, or material so filled-in, without such permit being first obtained, shall be removed, after the expiration of the time which may be allowed for such removal, by a notice served upon such owner, lessee, or occupant, by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district, to be also recovered from such owner, lessee, or occupant.

No. 2.—No shed, building, office, tally-house, or other structure shall be erected, nor shall any derrick, hoisting-mast, coal-hopper, sign, or advertising device, or other erection or obstruction of any kind be placed or maintained upon any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, nor upon any reclaimed land, without a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board; and if the owner, lessee, or occupant of any such premises, or the owner, lessee, or agent, of any such structure, erections, or obstructions, shall fail to comply with a notice served by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district to remove any such structure, erection, or obstruction, after the expiration of the time allowed by such notice for the removal, such owner, lessee, occupant or agent, shall forfeit and pay a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for each and every day, which shall elapse before any such structure, erection or obstruction, shall be removed, after the expiration of the time for the removal thereof specified in said notice.

No. 3.—No cargo shall be discharged from any vessel upon any bulkhead or wharf structure, at which such vessel is being unladen, after service by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district, upon the owner, consignee, master, or other officer, or stevedore, of such vessel, of a notice that such bulkhead or structure will be endangered by the placing of additional cargo thereon, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars for every such offense, and a further penalty equal in amount to the damages of every description which shall be caused by the further discharging of cargo upon such bulkhead or wharf structure, after the service of the said notice, both of such penalties to be recovered from such owner, consignee, master or other officer or stevedore, severally and respectively.

No. 4.—All goods, merchandise, and materials of every kind, landed or placed on any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, or upon reclaimed land, must be removed therefrom without unnecessary delay, and within twenty-four hours after the Corporation Wharfinger for the district shall have served upon the owner, shipper, or consignee, of such cargo, a notice to remove the same, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day for each and every day, during which any part of said cargo shall remain upon such pier, bulkhead, structure, or land, after the expiration of the said twenty-four hours, to be re-

covered from such owner, shipper, or consignee, severally and respectively.

No. 5.—All goods, merchandise and materials of every kind encumbering any pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure, or reclaimed land, after the time designated for the removal thereof shall have expired, will be liable to be removed by the Board to any warehouse or yard, at the sole risk and expense of the owner of any such property, and all expense incurred for such removal and storage or otherwise, shall be and become a lien thereon, and such goods, merchandise and materials will not be delivered to the owner until the expense of such removal and storage has been paid.

No. 6.—No person shall construct or maintain any engine-house, tally-house, or other small structure, under a permit of the Board, on any unshedded pier, or other wharf structure, unless the same be placed on wheels so as to admit of easy removal thereupon when required, and to prevent the accumulation of dirt or refuse thereunder, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for each and every day which may elapse before the discontinuance of such offense.

No. 7.—No vessel of any kind shall be loaded or discharged by horse power, nor shall stones or similar cargo be discharged from any vessel, upon any pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure, unless proper planking be provided to protect the surface of such pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure from injury consequent upon the travel of the horse, or the throwing of the stones or similar cargo thereupon, under a penalty of five dollars a day for each horse so employed, and of twenty-five dollars for each offense of discharging such stones or like cargo, upon such pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, to be recovered from the owner, consignee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered for using horses, or discharging stones or similar cargo, upon wharf property belonging to the Corporation, under lease, it shall be paid to the lessee thereof, but if such penalty be recovered for using horses, or discharging stones or similar cargo, upon wharf property not owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

No. 8.—No sand shall be discharged from any vessel unless canvas or similar material be extended from the vessel's side to the bulkhead or wharf structure at which such vessel is being unladen, to prevent the falling of the sand into the water, and if the surface of any such wharf structure is not sufficiently tight to prevent the sand dumped therefrom from going through into the water, then no sand shall be discharged therefrom from any vessel, unless canvas or similar material be first laid thereon to receive the sand, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, consignee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered on account of sand discharged upon wharf property belonging to the Corporation, under lease, it shall be paid to the lessee thereof, but if such penalty be recovered on account of sand discharged upon wharf property not owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

No. 9.—The owners, lessees and occupants of every pier, wharf and bulkhead in the City of New York shall keep the same in good repair, and the slips adjacent thereto properly dredged; and whenever, in the judgment of the Board, it shall be necessary so to do, written notices, signed by the President or Secretary of said Board, shall be served upon the owners, lessees or occupants, or collector of wharfage of any such pier, wharf or bulkhead, or the slip adjoining the same, on or in which repairs or dredging are required by said Board, specifying the nature and extent of the repairs or dredging so required, and the time within which such repairs must be made, or such dredging done; and in case the owners, lessees or occupants so notified, fail to comply with the terms and requirements of such notice, they shall forfeit and pay a penalty of fifty dollars per day for every day which shall elapse before they comply with such notice.

No. 10.—No ashes, refuse, offal, fruit, vegetables or any other substances, shall be thrown into the waters surrounding or adjacent to any pier or bulkhead, or any other part of the water-front of the city, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee, or occupant, severally and respectively, of any pier, bulkhead, wharf structure or other property, from which any such substance shall be thrown, or from the person actually throwing the same; or if any such substance be thrown from any vessel lying in waters within the jurisdiction of the Department, whether berthed or not, then such penalty to be recovered from the owner, consignee, or master of such vessel, severally and respectively.

No. 11.—No snow or ice shall be dumped into the waters adjacent to the water-front of the city, except from the piers, bulkheads and other places designated from time to time, by the Board, for such dumping, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee or occupant of any pier, bulkhead or other wharf property, from which any such snow and ice shall be dumped, or from the person actually dumping the same, severally and respectively.

No. 12.—All lumber, brick, or other material in bulk discharged on any bulkhead not shedded, shall be at once removed, or, if not so removed, shall be placed at least twenty feet from the edge of the bulkhead, pending removal, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day, for each and every day such lumber, brick or other material shall remain on the bulkhead, to be recovered from the owner or consignee of such lumber, brick or other material, or from the person placing, or causing the same to be placed, on such bulkhead, severally and respectively.

No. 13.—The charges for wharfage and dockage of all vessels admitted to any of the piers or bulkheads constructed under the new plans adopted by the Department, shall be at the same rates as are now, or shall hereafter be, fixed and established by laws of this State, until otherwise ordered by the Board.

No. 14.—The term "Board," when used in the foregoing rules and regulations, shall be taken to mean "The Board of the Department of Docks of the City of New York," and the term "Corporation," when so used, shall be taken to mean "The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York."
