This penalty shall be imposed upon and recovered from the owner and occupants, severally and respectively, of such manufactory or building, or from any corporation having mains for the conveyance of steam or hot water in the streets, avenues or public places.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 230 of article XXIV. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, as amended by ordinance approved June 11, 1890.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows :

Section 1. Section 230 of article XXIV. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 is hereby again amended by adding thereto, at the end thereof, the following : "Nor shall any person throw, cast or distribute in any of the public streets, avenues or places in said city any hand-bills, circulars, cards, or any other advertising matter whatever, under a penalty of not less than one, nor more than five dollars for each and every offense," so that said section, when so again amended, shall read as follows :

Sec. 230. No person or persons shall throw, cast or lay any ashes, offal, vegetables, garbage, dross, cinders, shells, straw, paper, shavings, dirt, filth, or rubbish of any kind whatever in any street, lane, alley or public place in the City of New York, nor shall any person throw, cast or distribute in any of the public streets, avenues or places in said city, any hand-bills, circulars, cards, or any other advertising matter whatever, under a penalty of not less than one, nor more than five dollars for each and every offense."

Sec. 2. All ordinances or resolutions, or parts of ordinances or resolutions, inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

SIR—In the matter of the resolution of the Board of Education, at its meeting of the 21st instant, relative to the proposed purchase of property on West Forty-sixth street, I have the honor to report, as follows:

Explanatory of the resolution the following report was submitted to the Board by the Committee on Sites and New Schools, viz.:

"To the Board of Education:

"The Committee on Sites and New Schools respectfully report, that upon examination of the title to the premises Nos. 114, 116, 118, 120, 122 and 124 West Forty-sixth street, in the Twenty-second Ward, authorized to be purchased by resolutions adopted June 18 and November 19, 1890 (Journal, pages 654, 655, 702, 703, 1152, 1154), and approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment September 17 and December 12, 1890 (Journal, pages 938, 940, 1244, 1246), it appears that the westerly wall of the building on the premises No. 124 West Forty-sixth street is a party-wall, and that the building and rear wall of the premises Nos. 119 and 121 West Forty-fifth street encroach upon the rear of the premises Nos. 118 and 120 West Forty-sixth street about two feet six inches for a distance of about thirty-eight feet four inches, in relation to which there is an agreement between the respective owners providing for the maintenance of the said wall as a party-wall so long as it shall stand, and that in case of the erection of a new building by either party and the destruction of such wall a new party-wall is to be erected on the true line at the joint expense of the respective owners, until which time the owner of the premises on Forty-fifth street is to be a tenant of the owner of the premises in West Forty-sixth street as to the strip of land so taken and occupied by reason of such encroachment, and such agreement to run with the land, etc., as will more fully appear by reference to the agreement recorded in the Register's Office September 30, 1889, in Liber 2250 of Conveyances, page 284. As the title to the premises so authorized to be purchased cannot be obtained unless taken subject to such agreement, the Committee submit for adoption the following resolution:

Then follows the resolution which is before you. The points of the agreement referred to are as follows:

1st. That the said dividing-wall between the said buildings "of the respective parties shall and will, so long as the same shall stand and remain in its present position and condition, be and continue to be a party-wall, and be kept and maintained as such, and the rights, interests and privileges common to party-walls shall be equally enjoyed, and the burdens and responsibilities commonly incident thereto, equally borne by the respective parties hereto, their legal representatives and assigns."

2d. That in no event shall any title by adverse possession arise or be created.

3d. That so long as the said party-wall shall remain and be maintained in its present condition, the said party of the second part (the owners on Forty-fifth street) shall have sole and exclusive use and occupancy of the strip of land, as the tenant of the party of the first part (the owners on Forty-sixth street).

4th. That in case it shall become necessary, by reason of contemplated erection of a new building or buildings upon the premises of either of the parties, to tear down or demolish the said dividing or party wall, the party contemplating such erection shall and will prior to the demolition of said wall erect or cause to be erected upon the true dividing line, between said lands, a new wall which shall be built in accordance with the requirements of the law, and shall extend along said line and stand one-half upon the land of the party of the first part and one-half upon the land of the party of the second part, and which said wall shall be so erected and maintained as a party-wall, at the joint cost and expense of the parties hereto.

5th. That the covenants and agreements shall run with the land and shall inure to the benefit of and bind the legal representatives, successors and assigns of the respective parties.

At the time of the purchase he agreed with one of the trustees that he would hold the property at a fair and reasonable price for the city, for a reasonable time. Two years having elapsed without any action having been taken, the property in the vicinity meantime advancing, so that from the time the trustees agreed to purchase the property the market value had increased so that he could sell to private parties for what he asked the city to pay him.

He authorized me to say that he is willing now to take the property back and pay all expense.
