

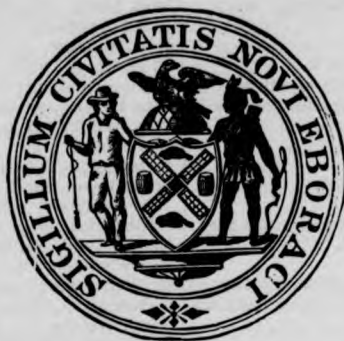
THE CITY RECORD.

The Committee on Rules and Discipline submitted the following resolutions, and, on their recommendation, the same were adopted:

Resolved, That the following rule be and is hereby adopted, and that the same be known as Rule 343.

RULE 343. Patrolmen on duty at a fire, keeping back a crowd of idlers, or keeping the streets clear for the passage of a procession, or while on any other duty that requires a certain space to be kept clear, shall face towards those they are pressing or keeping back, and remain so faced until relieved from said duty.

Resolved, That each Inspector shall be allowed two Sergeants and one Roundsman to aid in office and inspection duty, who shall be nominated by the Inspectors and approved by the Board.

Resolved, That the Superintendent shall announce to the Captains of Precincts that the time allowed for absence from the Station-house for meals, shall be one hour; at the expiration of which time the roll shall be called, and all absentees reported.
