

## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a special meeting of the Board of Docks, held September 5, 1879. Present—Commissioners Dimock and Vanderpoel.

On motion, Commissioner Dimock took the chair,

A communication was received from the Comptroller, inclosing a certified copy filed with him of bill of costs of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the matter of the application of the Department of Docks, for and in behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, relative to acquiring right and title to and possession of Pier, old 44. North river, in the City of New York, as confirmed by the Supreme Court on August 27, 1879, amounting to the

the City of New York, as confirmed by the Supreme Court on August 27, 1879, amounting to the sum of \$3,530; and, being read,
On motion, it was
Resolved, That the Chief Clerk be directed to prepare for audit the amounts severally contained in the said bill of costs, and that the same be transmitted to the Finance Department for payment with the next audit of the Department.

A communication was received from the Counsel to the Corporation, advising that in the matter of the application of the Department to acquire title to Pier, old 44, North river, the corporation is now, and has been, since August 27, 1879, the date of the entry of the order of the Supreme Court, confirming the report of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, appointed therefor, seized in fee of the said pier, and that under the law there is no reason why the Department should not take possession at once, and immediately begin the execution of the plans for the permanent improvement of the water-front at that point, and inclosing a certified copy of the said report of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, which states that Wm. Inman. of Upton Manor, Birkenhead, England, is possessed of the only right, title, and interest to the said pier, other than that of the corporation, and that the value of his right, title, and interest is the sum of \$200,000; and, being read,

On motion, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to the authority vested in them by subdivision 11 of section 6, chapter 574, Laws of 1871, be and are hereby respectfully requested to direct the Comptroller of the City of New York to prepare and issue "Dock Bonds of the City of New York," for the amount of (\$203,530) two hundred and three thousand five hundred and thirty dollars, for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks.
Resolved, That the Chief Clerk be and hereby is directed to prepare a claim, in the name of said William Inman, for the sum of \$200,000, and that it be transmitted to the Finance Department for payment with the next audit of the Department.
Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to proceed with the con-

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to proceed with the construction of sufficient concrete base blocks for the bulkhead or river-wall between the Clarkson street section and the Spring street section of the same, and also that he be and hereby is directed street section and the Spring street section of the same, and also that he be and hereby is directed to proceed with the construction of about 305 feet of said bulkhead or river-wall, extending from the northerly end of said wall now built between Piers, new 35 and old 44, to the southerly end of said wall, now built between Piers, old 44 and new 37, upon the same plan as that of the Clarkson street section of the bulkhead or river-wall, and of a pier to be known as Pier, new 36, North river, and that all the work hereby ordered be performed otherwise than by contract, as required by subdivision 5 of section 6 of chapter 574, Laws of 1871, and that it be done by the force of the Department by day's work, except so much of the labor as is now, or may hereafter, be contracted for, and that all the material and dredging necessary therefor, not heretofore contracted for or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify John G. Dale, agent, that the Counsel to the Corporation having advised this Department that the title to Pier, old 44, North river, is vested in the city, this Department will collect wharfage from all vessels using the premises from and after

this date.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify John M. Smith, Superintendent of Docks, to collect wharfage from all vessels using Pier, old 44, North river, from and after this date, the title of said premises being vested in the city.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to address a communication to Phelps. Dodge & Co., notifying them that the title to Pier, old 44. North river, has been acquired by the city, and that the structures thereon, and adjacent thereto, will have to be removed, and that the tin and other merchandise now upon said pier and adjoining platform, claimed to be owned by them, must be removed forthwith, in order that this Department can proceed with the work of improving the water-front under the new plans adopted.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to transmit to the Counsel to the Corporation a tracing of the water-front referred to, and advising that, so far as ascertained, no water grants have been issued by the city to any portion of the land under water in question, now sought to be improved, nor has the plan adopted by this Department for the improvement of the water-front in that vicinity ever been approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and requesting said Counsel
