To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—A resolution was introduced in the Board of Aldermen, on the 24th October last, "to pave Ninety-sixth street, between Eighth avenue and Hudson river," and the same was referred to the "Committee on Street Pavements." The estate of the late Wm. B. Astor owns property on Ninety-sixth street, between Tenth avenue and the Boulevard and Boulevard and Hudson river; and the executors of said estate respectfully protest against the passage of said resolution, and to said pavement, for the reasons—

- 1st. Said street is not yet regulated and graded.
- 2d. There are no improvements on the property on line of said street to justify it.
- 3d. The sub-improvements (street, say, sewers, water-pipes, gas-pipes, etc., are not yet in the street.

And, lastly, the further expenditure of money in the great upper section where this improvement is proposed, now comparatively unused, is inexpedient and unjust, while property-owners, generally, are so heavily taxed, and while the lower part of the city, really in use, now needs so much to be expended upon it to make it presentable, habitable, and healthful.

In a meeting held Tuesday evening, November 21, 1876, at 140 E. Fourth street, the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, The general depression in business, the fall in prices of all the necessities of life, the depreciation in values of all kinds, and especially the reduction of salaries in all the branches of industry; and

Whereas, The alarming accumulation of the city debt and the great cost of our municipal government make it extremely necessary to save in all directions. In the year 1873 the expenses of the City of London, with its 3,883,092 inhabitants, were (raised in our currency) \$40,121,410.80, or \$10.03 per capita. The total amount raised in this city from its one million of inhabitants from taxes and other sources in 1875, for all purposes, was \$36,367,744.75, or \$36.36 per capita; therefore be it

Resolved, That we as taxpayers respectfully protest against the action of the Board of Aldermen in increasing the appropriations in the Budget for 1877, over those of the Board of Apportionment, and instead we recommend a reduction of twenty per cent. from the present salaries in all the different departments, thus bringing the city's clerks' hire nearer to the current rate. We understand that this reduction has been made this year in the Comptroller's Department, and not one clerk has resigned on account thereof.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen :

GENTLEMEN—I am in receipt of a resolution adopted by your Honorable Board on the 9th inst., directing me to have the sidewalks flagged, and curb and gutter stones set on the south side of Little Twelfth street, from Washington street to Tenth avenue, in front of land owned by the Corporation of the City of New York.

The land referred to in your resolution is leased by the City to the Blecker Street and Fulton Ferry Railroad Co., and by the terms of the lease the company is required to pay all taxes and assessments on the land, except the assessment for continuing Washington to Twelfth street.

Under the terms of your resolution the expense of the proposed improvement would have to be paid by the City from an appropriation, and the lessees would thus be freed from one of the obligations of their lease, or the compensation which they agreed to pay for the use of the land.

To avoid this I would respectfully recommend that your resolution be so amended as to make the expense of the improvement a subject for assessment, and payable from the assessment fund, the same as all other improvements in curbing, guttering, and flagging carried on by this Department, and to this end I beg to submit an amended resolution, accompanied by the necessary ordinance.

November 20, 1876.

To the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York :

The Department of Public Parks invites the consideration of your Board to the following representations concerning the departmental estimates of this Department for the year 1877, and also concerning the award which has been made in the provisional estimate of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, now under consideration by your Board.

The following table shows the amounts called for in the departmental estimate of this Department, the amounts awarded by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and the amount of reduction made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

The appropriation of \$175,000 is intended to cover the following items in the estimate :

Maintenance of parks.....	\$250,000 00
Two museums.....	30,000 00

The \$175,000 being decreased by \$30,000 for the museums, it will be seen from a comparison with the amount expended in previous years how inadequate the remaining sum of \$145,000 will be, viz. :

Expended 1873.....	\$298,527 00
1874.....	318,864 00
1875.....	250,483 00

The maintenance of the parks is the primary object of all our expenditures.

The expenditure for park-keepers has been kept down by very close economy this year, and will not exceed \$90,000. We can do it with the \$90,000 given us by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The estimate of \$20,000 for pavement of City Hall Park would complete an undertaking that has been well begun, and which has long been desirable. The amount appropriated, \$5,000, will do about one-quarter of the unfinished work.

The sea-wall and walks at the Battery require the expenditure of at least the sum asked for. Any one who has looked at this sea-wall can judge of the importance of this work.

In respect to the Harlem river bridges, the estimate was made up as follows :

The maintenance and ordinary repairs will be.....	\$20,000 00
If the draw on Third avenue bridge is put in first-rate order, there will be needed.....	13,300 00
If the shore spans of the Central Bridge are rebuilt, there will be needed.....	23,000 00

Total..... \$56,300 00

With the reduced appropriation, viz., \$25,000, this Department will be obliged to postpone the construction of the shore spans of the Central Bridge, and to expend the money upon the maintenance of the bridges, and, as far as it will go, on the repairs to the Third avenue bridge.

No appropriation has been made for surveying, laying out, and monumenting Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and north end of the Island, as provided for in chapter 604, Laws of 1874. This omission will suspend all operations for establishing lines and grades in the annexed district, and prevent the carrying out of important improvements which are necessary, and which have been repeatedly and urgently asked for by the citizens of that district.

In the past year the engineering force engaged on this work has been employed on the new maps. Their report will be presented before the close of the present year. There is no work in the Department more important than this, and it is at that stage that it can be completed during the year 1877, if the work is not stopped by failure of appropriation.

The tax maps are inserted under the provisions of the Law of 1876, chapter 411. They are for the benefit of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, for the purposes of taxation.

The estimate calls for \$29,000 for the Bronx river bridges. No appropriation has been made. An appropriation was made in the previous year, but for want of the concurrence of the authorities of Westchester County, which pays half the expense of the construction of these bridges, this Department has not been able to do any work upon them. The work may be done in the coming year.

The estimate for salaries has been cut down \$15,000, or twenty-five per cent. In the current year the amount allowed was forty per cent. less than the estimates, and as low as they can be reduced without impairing the efficiency of the service.

The Department of Parks, therefore, request your Board to rectify the Provisional Estimate, as follows :

1. That the appropriation for the maintenance and government of parks and places, including the amount for the two Museums, shall be increased from \$175,000 to \$315,000.
2. That an appropriation for the repair of the sea-wall at the Battery shall be fixed at \$7,500.
3. That the appropriation for the care, repair, and improvement of the Harlem river bridges shall be increased from \$25,000 to \$56,300.
4. That an appropriation for the surveying, laying out, and monumenting the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and the north end of the Island, shall be fixed at \$39,000.
5. That an appropriation for the making of tax maps, for the use of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, shall be fixed at \$6,600.
6. That an appropriation for the repair and rebuilding of the Bronx river bridges shall be fixed at \$29,000.

7. That the appropriation for salaries of officers and clerks of this Department shall be increased from \$45,000 to \$60,000.

8. That the appropriation for the maintenance of roads, etc., in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, shall be increased from \$40,000 to \$79,000.
