THE BOARD OF POLICE.

The Board of Police met on the 9th day of July, 1895. Present—Commissioners Roosevelt, Andrews, Grant and Parker.

ELECTION MINUTES.

Whereas, In pursuance of the provisions of the Constitution of the State of New York, the Board of Aldermen met on the 11th day of June, 1895, and apportioned the City and County of New York into Assembly Districts, as follows:

Assembly District Number One shall consist of that portion of the Tenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the Hudson or North river and Canal street, running thence along Canal street to Hudson street, to Dominick street, to Varick street, to Broome street, to Sullivan street, to Spring street, to Broadway, to Fulton street, to William street, to Wall street, to Broadway, to Whitehall street, to the East river and East Hudson or North river, to the place of beginning, and also Governor's and Bedloe's Islands; also Ellis Island. Citizen population, 39,740.

Assembly District Number Two shall consist of that portion of the Tenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the East river and Whitehall street, running thence along Whitehall street to Broadway, to Wall street, to William street, to Fulton street, to Broadway, to Canal street, to the Bowery, to Division street, to Market street, to Monroe street, to Catharine street, to the East river, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 39,785.

Assembly District Number Three shall consist of all that part of the Thirteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the North or Hudson river and Canal street, to Hudson street, to Dominick street, to Varick street, to Broome street, to Sullivan street, to West Houston street, to Varick street, to Carmine street, to Sixth avenue, to West Eleventh street, to Greenwich avenue, to Perry street, to Waverley place, to Charles street, to West street, to place of beginning. Population, 38,544.

Assembly District Number Four shall consist of that portion of the Tenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the East river and Catharine street, and running thence along Catharine street, to Monroe street, to Market street, to Division street, to Grand street, to Jackson street, to the East river, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 40,427.

Assembly District Number Five shall consist of all that portion of the Thirteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at Sullivan street and Spring street, and along Spring street to Broadway, to East Fourth street, to Third avenue, to Fourteenth street, to Sixth avenue, to West Fifteenth street, to Seventh avenue, to West Nineteenth street, to Eighth avenue, along Eighth avenue to Greenwich avenue, to West Eleventh street, to Sixth avenue, to Carmine street, to Varick street, to West Houston street, to Sullivan street, to Spring street, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 38,419.

Assembly District Number Six shall consist of that portion of the Eleventh Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at Canal street and Broadway, and running thence along Broadway to East Fourth street, to the Bowery, to Third avenue, to St. Mark's place or Eighth street, to Second avenue, to Second street, to First avenue, to Houston street, to Eldridge street, to Stanton street, to Chrystie street, to Division street, to the Bowery, to Canal street, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 39,410.

Assembly District Number Seven shall consist of that portion of the Thirteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the North or Hudson river, along Charles street to Waverley place, to Perry street, to Greenwich avenue, to Eighth avenue, to West Twentieth street, along West Twentieth street to Hudson or North river, to the place of beginning. Population, 38,497.

Assembly District Number Eight shall consist of that portion of the Eleventh Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at Division and Chrystie streets, and running thence along Chrystie street to Stanton street, to Eldridge street, to Houston street, to Ludlow street, to Broome street, to Norfolk street, to Division street, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 38,781.

Assembly District Number Nine shall consist of that portion of the Sixteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the Hudson or North river and West Twentieth street, and running thence along West Twentieth street to Eighth avenue, to West Nineteenth street, to Seventh avenue, to West Thirtieth street, to the Hudson or North river, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 39,495.

Assembly District Number Ten shall consist of that portion of the Eleventh Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at Second street and Second avenue, and running thence along Second avenue to St. Mark's place or Eighth street, to Avenue A, to Seventh street, to Avenue B, to Clinton street, to Rivington street, to Norfolk street, to Broome street, to Ludlow street, to Houston street, to First avenue, to Second street, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 39,108.

Assembly District Number Eleven shall consist of that portion of the Sixteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at Seventh avenue and West Thirtieth street, and running thence along Seventh avenue to West Thirty-seventh street, to Eighth avenue, to West Thirty-eighth street, to Tenth avenue, to West Thirty-sixth street, to Hudson or North river, to West Thirtieth street, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 39,868.

Assembly District Number Twelve shall consist of that portion of the Twelfth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the East river and Jackson street, and running thence along Jackson street to Grand street, to Division street, to Norfolk street, to Rivington street, to Cannon street, to Stanton street, to the East river, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 41,871.

Assembly District Number Thirteen shall consist of that portion of the Sixteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the Hudson or North river and West Thirty-sixth street, and running thence along West Thirty-sixth street to Tenth avenue, to West Thirty-eighth street, to Eighth avenue, to West Thirty-seventh street, to Seventh avenue, to West Fortieth street, to Eighth avenue, to West Forty-third street, to Tenth avenue, to West Forty-sixth street, to the Hudson or North river, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 39,554.

Assembly District Number Fourteen shall consist of that portion of the Twelfth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the East river and East Eleventh street, and running thence along East Eleventh street to Avenue C, to Seventh street, to Avenue A, to St. Mark's place or Eighth street, to Third avenue, to Fourteenth street, to the East river, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 40,697.

Assembly District Number Fifteen shall consist of that portion of the Seventeenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the Hudson or North river and West Forty-sixth street, and running thence along West Forty-sixth street to Tenth avenue, to West Forty-third street, to Eighth avenue, to West Fifty-third street, to Ninth avenue, to West Fiftieth street, to Tenth avenue, to West Forty-ninth street, to the Hudson or North river, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 39,217.

Assembly District Number Sixteen shall consist of that portion of the Twelfth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the East river and Stanton street, and running thence along Stanton street to Cannon street, to Rivington street, to Clinton street, to Avenue B, to Seventh street, to Avenue C, to East Eleventh street, to the East river, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 41,264.

Assembly District Number Seventeen shall consist of that portion of the Seventeenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the Hudson or North river and West Forty-ninth street, and running thence along West Forty-ninth street, to Tenth avenue, to West Fiftieth street, to Ninth avenue, to West Fifty-third street, to Eighth avenue, to West Sixty-first street, to Ninth or Columbus avenue, to West Sixtieth street, to the Hudson or North river, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 39,086.

Assembly District Number Eighteen shall consist of that portion of the Fourteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the East river and East Fourteenth street, and running thence along East Fourteenth street to Irving place, to East Nineteenth street, to Third avenue, to East Twenty-third street, to Second avenue, to East Twenty-fifth street, to First avenue, to East Twenty-sixth street, to the East river, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 40,051.

Assembly District Number Nineteen shall consist of that portion of the Seventeenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the Hudson or North river and West Sixtieth street, and running thence along West Sixtieth street, to Ninth or Columbus avenue, to West Sixty-first street, to Eighth avenue, to West Eighty-first street, to Ninth or Columbus avenue, to West Eighty-sixth street, to Tenth or Amsterdam avenue, to West Eighty-ninth street, to the Hudson or North river, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 39,120.

Assembly District Number Twenty shall consist of that portion of the Fourteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the East river and East Twenty-sixth street, and running thence along East Twenty-sixth street to First avenue, to East Twenty-fifth street, to Second avenue, to East Twenty-third street, to Lexington avenue, to East Thirty-ninth street, to Third avenue, to East Thirty-seventh street, to Second avenue, to East Thirty-eighth street, to the East river, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 40,292.

Assembly District Number Twenty-one shall consist of that portion of the Nineteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the Hudson or North river and West Eighty-ninth street, and running thence along West Eighty-ninth street to Tenth or Amsterdam avenue, to West Eighty-sixth street, to Ninth or Columbus avenue, to West Eighty-first street, to Eighth avenue, to Ninety-seventh street and the Transverse road across Central Park at Ninety-seventh street, to Fifth avenue, to West One Hundred and Tenth street, to Seventh avenue, to West One Hundred and Twentieth street, to Western Boulevard, to West One Hundred and Nineteenth street, to the Hudson or North river, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 39,721.

Assembly District Number Twenty-two shall consist of that portion of the Fourteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the East river and East Thirty-eighth street, and running thence along East Thirty-eighth street to Second avenue, to East Thirty-seventh street, to Third avenue, to East Thirty-ninth street, to Lexington avenue, to East Fifty-third street, to Third avenue, to East Fifty-second street, to the East river, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 39,514.

Assembly District Number Twenty-three shall consist of that portion of the Nineteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the Hudson or North river and West One Hundred and Nineteenth street, and running thence along the Hudson or North river and Spuyten Duyvil creek around the northern end of Manhattan Island; thence southerly along the Harlem river to the north end of Fifth avenue; thence along Fifth avenue to West One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, to Eighth avenue, to West One Hundred and Twentieth street, to Western Boulevard, to West One Hundred and Nineteenth street, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 39,114.

Assembly District Number Twenty-four shall consist of that portion of the Eighteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the East river and East Fifty-second street, and running thence along East Fifty-second street, to Third avenue, to East Fifty-third street, to Lexington avenue, to East Sixty-fourth street, to Third avenue, to East Sixty-fifth street, to the East river, to the place of beginning, and also Blackwell's Island. Citizen population, 39,463.

Assembly District Number Twenty-five shall consist of that portion of the Fifteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at West Fifteenth street and Seventh avenue, and running thence along Seventh avenue to West Thirty-sixth street, to Lexington avenue, to East Twenty-third street, to Third avenue, to East Nineteenth street, to Irving place, to East Fourteenth street, to West Fourteenth street, to Sixth avenue, to West Fifteenth street, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 39,932.

Assembly District Number Twenty-six shall consist of that portion of the Eighteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the East river and East Sixty-fifth street, and running thence along East Sixty-fifth street, to Third avenue, to East Sixty-fourth street, to Lexington avenue, to East Seventy-fifth street, to Third avenue, to East Seventy-sixth street, to the East river, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 39,383.

Assembly District Number Twenty-seven shall consist of that portion of the Fifteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at West Thirty-sixth street and Seventh avenue, and running thence along Seventh avenue to West Fortieth street, to Eighth avenue, to West Fifty-third street, to Fifth avenue, to East Fifty-fourth street, to Lexington avenue, to East Thirty-sixth street, to West Thirty-sixth street, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 40,258.

Assembly District Number Twenty-eight shall consist of that portion of the Eighteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the East river and East Seventy-sixth street, and running thence along East Seventy-sixth street to Third avenue, to East Seventy-fifth street, to Lexington avenue, to East Eighty-fourth street, to Second avenue, to East Eighty-third street, to the East river, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 39,727.

Assembly District Number Twenty-nine shall consist of that portion of the Fifteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at East Fifty-fourth street and Lexington avenue, and running thence along Lexington avenue to East Ninety-sixth street, to Fifth avenue, to East Ninety-seventh street and the Transverse road across Central Park, at Ninety-seventh street, to Eighth avenue, to West Fifty-third street, to Fifth avenue, to East Fifty-fourth street, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 39,738.

Assembly District Number Thirty shall consist of that portion of the Twentieth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the East river and East Eighty-third street, and running thence along East Eighty-third street to Second avenue, to East Eighty-fourth street, to Lexington avenue, to East Ninety-second street, to Third avenue, to East Ninety-fourth street, to the East river, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 39,499.

Assembly District Number Thirty-one shall consist of that portion of the Nineteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at West One Hundred and Tenth street and Seventh avenue, and running thence along Seventh avenue to West One Hundred and Twentieth street, to Eighth avenue, to West One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, to Fifth avenue, to East One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, to Fourth or Park avenue, to East One Hundred and Tenth street, to West One Hundred and Tenth street, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 39,142.

Assembly District Number Thirty-two shall consist of that portion of the Twentieth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the East river and East Ninety-fourth street, and running thence along East Ninety-fourth street to Third avenue, to East Ninety-second street, to Lexington avenue, to East Ninety-sixth street, to Fifth avenue, to East One Hundred and Tenth street, to Madison avenue, to East One Hundred and Eighth street, to the Harlem river, to the place of beginning, and also Ward's Island. Citizen population, 39,384.

Assembly District Number Thirty-three shall consist of that portion of the Twentieth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the Harlem river and East One Hundred and Eighth street, and running thence along East One Hundred and Eighth street, to Madison avenue, to East One Hundred and Tenth street, to Fourth or Park avenue, to East One Hundred and Nineteenth street, to the Harlem river, to the place of beginning, and also Randall's Island. Citizen population, 38,751.

Assembly District Number Thirty-four shall consist of that portion of the Twenty-first Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the Harlem river and East One Hundred and Nineteenth street, and running thence along East One Hundred and Nineteenth street, to Fourth or Park avenue, to East One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, to Fifth avenue, to the Harlem river, to the place of beginning, together with that portion of the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York within and bounded by a line beginning at the Harlem river and East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, and running thence along East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, to Railroad avenue, to East One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, to Third avenue, to East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, to Bungay street, to the East river or Long Island Sound, to Bronx Kills, to Harlem river, to the place of beginning, and also North Brother's Island. Citizen population, 51,322.

Assembly District Number Thirty-five shall consist of all that part of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of the City and County of New York lying within the Twenty-first Senate District, not hereinbefore bounded and described. Citizen population, 50,642.

Whereas, The Board of Police is required under the provisions of section 1, chapter 169, Laws of 1890, to alter or divide the existing election districts, whenever necessary, in such manner that each election district shall contain as near as practicable not more than 250 voters; therefore, be it Resolved, That the election districts in the several assembly districts of the City and County of New York (as hereinafter described and bounded) be divided, bounded, and numbered as follows:

First Assembly District.

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Broadway, Whitehall street, Hudson or North River, Battery place, Greenwich street, and Governor's, Ellis and Bedloe's Islands.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Morris street, Greenwich street, Battery place and Washington street.

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Morris street, Washington street, Battery place and Hudson or North river.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Greenwich street, Morris street and Hudson or North river.

The Fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Albany street, Washington street, Carlisle street, Greenwich street, Rector street and Hudson or North river.

The Sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Greenwich street, Carlisle street, Washington street, Albany street and Hudson or North river.

The Seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Dey street, Broadway, Rector street and Greenwich street.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Fulton Street, William street, Wall street and Broadway.

The Ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Vesey street, Greenwich street, Liberty street and Hudson or North river.

The Tenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Park place, Broadway, Dey street, Greenwich street, Vesey street and Hudson or North river.

The Eleventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Reade street, Broadway, Park place and Hudson or North river.

The Twelfth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Broadway, Reade street, Hudson street, North Moore street and West Broadway.

The Thirteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Franklin street, Hudson street, Reade street and Hudson or North river.

The Fourteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Beach street, Hudson street, Franklin street and Hudson or North river.

The Fifteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Lighthouse street, Hudson street, Beach street, Hudson or North river, Hubert street and Greenwich street.

The Sixteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Lighthouse street, Varick street, North Moore street and Hudson street.

The Seventeenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, West Broadway, North Moore street and Varick street.

The Eighteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Vestry street, Varick street, Lighthouse street, Greenwich street, Hubert street and Hudson or North river.

The Nineteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Greenwich street, Watts street, Washington street, Vestry street and Hudson or North river.

The Twentieth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Hudson street, Vestry street, Washington street, Watts street and Greenwich street.

The Twenty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Watts street, Varick street, Vestry street and Hudson street.

The Twenty-second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Broome street, Varick street, Watts street and Hudson street.

The Twenty-third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Dominick street, Varick street, Broome street and Hudson street.

The Twenty-fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Broome street, Sullivan street, Grand street and Varick street.

The Twenty-fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Grand street, Thompson street, Canal street and Varick street.

The Twenty-sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Broome street, South Fifth avenue, Grand street and Sullivan street.

The Twenty-seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Spring street, South Fifth avenue, Broome street and Sullivan street.

The Twenty-eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Spring street, Broadway, Canal street, Thompson street, Grand street and South Fifth avenue.

Second Assembly District.

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Coenties slip, East river, Whitehall street, Bridge street and Pearl street.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Cedar street, Pearl street, Bridge street, Whitehall street, Broadway, Wall street and William street.

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Fulton street, Front street, Burling slip, East river, Coenties slip, Pearl street, Cedar street and William street.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Spruce street, Gold street, Ferry street, Peck slip, East river, Burling slip, Front street, Fulton street and Park Row.

The Fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Chambers street, Rose street, Frankfort street, Gold street, Spruce street, Park Row and Broadway.

The Sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rose street, New Bowery, Pearl street, Ferry street, Gold street and Frankfort street.

The Seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Roosevelt street, East river, Peck slip, Ferry street, Pearl street and Cherry street.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Roosevelt street, Cherry street, Pearl street and Oak street.

The Ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Catharine street, East river, Roosevelt street, Water street, James street and Cherry street.

The Tenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within James street, Water street, Roosevelt street, Oak street, New Chambers street and Batavia street.

The Eleventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Oliver street, Cherry street, James street, Batavia street, New Chambers street and Oak street.

The Twelfth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Catharine street, Cherry street, Oliver street and Oak street.

The Thirteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within the west side of Market street, from Madison street to Monroe street, and the north side of Monroe street, from Market street to Catharine street.

The Fourteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within the south side of Madison street, from Market street to Catharine street, and the east side of Catharine street, from Madison street to Monroe street.

The Fifteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within the west side of Market street, from Henry street to Madison street, and the north side of Madison street, from Market street to Catharine street.

The Sixteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within the south side of Henry street, from Catharine street to Market street, and the east side of Catharine street, from Henry street to Madison street.

The Seventeenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Market street, Henry street, Catharine street and East Broadway.

The Eighteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Market street, East Broadway, Catharine street and Division street.

The Nineteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Chatham square, Division street, Catharine street, Henry street, Oliver street, Madison street, James street and New Bowery.

The Twentieth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Henry street, Catharine street, Oak street and Oliver street.

The Twenty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Madison street, Oliver street, Oak street and James street.

The Twenty-second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within New Bowery, James street and Oak street.

The Twenty-third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Park Row, New Bowery and Roosevelt street.

The Twenty-fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within south side of Park Row, from Pearl to Roosevelt street, and the west side of Roosevelt street, from Park Row to Madison street.

The Twenty-fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Park Row, Madison street, Chambers street and east and west sides of Pearl street, from Park Row to Madison street.

The Twenty-sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Pearl street, Park Row, Chambers street and City Hall place.

The Twenty-seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Worth street, Centre street, Pearl street, City Hall place, Chambers street and Broadway.

The Twenty-eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Worth street, Baxter street, Park Row, Pearl street and Centre street.

The Twenty-ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Worth street, Park Row and Baxter street.

The Thirtieth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Pell street, Doyers street, Chatham square, Worth street, Mulberry street, Park street and Mott street.

The Thirty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Bayard street, Mott street, Park street, Mulberry street, Worth street and Baxter street.

The Thirty-second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Bowery, Doyers street, Pell street, Mott street, Bayard street and Elizabeth street.

The Thirty-third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Elizabeth street, Bayard street, and Mulberry street.

The Thirty-fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Mulberry street, Bayard street and Baxter street.
