## PUBLIC NOTICE.

### OFFICE OF CITY CLERK.

Public notice is hereby given to the heads of all Departments in The City of New York that the ordinance amending the ordinance relative to the hours of closing of all public offices in said City, which was adopted by the Board of Aldermen on June 26, 1906, was duly approved by his Honor, the Acting Mayor, on July 3, 1906, and is therefore now in full force and effect.

The ordinance is as follows:

AN ORDINANCE fixing the office hours of all public offices in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 1 of an ordinance adopted by the Board of Aldermen, April 22, 1902, and approved by the Mayor April 29, 1902, is hereby amended by adding thereto the words following: "Provided, however, that during the months of July and August all public offices in The City of New York, except as otherwise provided, shall be closed at 3 o'clock p. m., except on Saturdays, when such offices shall be closed at 12 o'clock noon, and further provided that the heads of all Departments may, when public business requires it, keep the said offices open after 3 o'clock."

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

### WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU

During the Quarter Ending March 31, 1906.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health; with the execution of the orders of the Board;

with the care of contagious diseases; with the inspection of foods and offensive trades; with the inspection of mercantile establishments and issuance of employment certificates; with the pathological, bacteriological and chemical research and investigations, and with the inspection of scholars attending the public, parochial and private schools:

The number of inspections and reinspections made was 525,218, classified as follows:

By the Division of Inspection.....	340,972
By the Division of Contagious Diseases.....	162,038
By the Division of Communicable Diseases.....	21,877
By the Division of Laboratories.....	331

The number of complaints forwarded for Board's orders was 6,446, classified as follows:

By the Division of Inspection.....	5,932

The number of complaints received from citizens was 8,451, all of which were referred to the Inspectors and the Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent, during the same period, under instructions and authority of the Board, granted 683 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, and 3,248 miscellaneous permits, under the Sanitary Code.

## Orders Issued by the Board of Health.

Orders of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued under the supervision of the Assistant Chief Clerks in the various boroughs, upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. These orders call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code and Health Laws in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repairs, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within three days from the receipt of the order. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the order have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under sections 1172 and 1222, chapter 466, Laws of 1901.

## Searches and Transcripts of Births, Marriages and Deaths.

Certified copies of the records of Vital Statistics as may be found to be on file in the Bureau of Records are furnished to applicants authorized to receive same, namely, interested parties, next of kin, legal representatives, etc., upon payment of the fee in such cases prescribed by the Board of Health. Written orders are signed by the Assistant Chief Clerk in the various boroughs and issued to the Assistant Registrar of Records, authorizing the search and issuance of a transcript of the record, which, in accordance with the regulations of the Board, is authenticated by affixing the seal of the Department of Health, and attested by the signature of the Assistant Chief Clerk of the borough. When search is made and the record is not found to be on file, an official certificate is issued to that effect.

## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

### ACTIONS OF THE COMMISSIONER OF DOCKS, MAY 3, 1906.

The following communications were received, action being taken thereon as noted, to wit:

#### From the Mayor—

1 (67531). Requesting an expression of opinion in relation to Senate Bill No. 923, providing for the construction and maintenance of an exterior street, wharf or place along a portion of the East river in The City of New York, and Assembly Bill No. 1152, providing for the setting aside of pier at the foot of East Forty-ninth street, East river, for recreation purposes. Notified that the Department, under the Greater New York Charter, has authority to build the exterior street, that chapter 286 of the Laws of 1889 is unnecessary and that the property owners in the vicinity desire it repealed; that the Department disapproves the bill calling for recreation pier at the foot of East Forty-ninth street, East river, as, under the provisions of the Charter, there is authority for the construction of recreation piers wherever necessary.

2 (67419). Transmitting communication from John F. Wynne relative to the overcrowding of the ferryboats plying between Jersey City and New York City. Copy of a communication received from the Erie Railroad Company denying the overcrowding of the ferryboats was sent to Mr. Wynne.

#### From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund—

1 (67489). Transmitting certified copies of resolutions adopted April 18, 1906, as follows: (a) Authorizing lease to the Oak Point Land and Dock Company of lands under water belonging to the City in the Borough of The Bronx, between Tiffany and Cabot streets, southerly of the Eastern Boulevard; (b) authorizing sale of steel freight shed on Pier (old) 20, East river, at the foot of Burling slip, Borough of Manhattan. Filed.

2 (67488). Transmitting certified copies of resolutions adopted April 26, 1906, as follows: (a) Authorizing lease to Jacob Ruppert of bulkhead at the foot of Second avenue, Harlem river, Borough of Manhattan; (b) approving of the carrying by the Commissioner of Docks of marine, fire, accident and collision insurance on the ferryboats and other floating property of The City of New York; and (c) resolving that the foregoing action in (b) is not to be construed as altering the general policy of the City in the past of carrying its own insurance, etc. Filed.

#### From the Comptroller—

Stating that a claim has been filed in his office by James Shewan & Sons for the sum of \$48,756.55, alleged to be due under Contract No. 943, for repairs to the municipal ferryboats and requesting information in relation thereto. Information furnished, with statement that the amount in question should be \$40,314.24, which amount the Department has refused to audit, it being beyond the sum called for in the contract.

2 (67476). Stating that a voucher has been filed in favor of Joseph D. Duffy for the sum of \$450 for furnishing labor and material necessary for the installation of plumbing and fixtures in the toilet rooms of the temporary waiting room at the Whitehall ferry terminal and asking whether the work constituted a finished job or if any additional work of the same character was required to complete it. Notified that the work was an emergency requirement, that it was a completed job and that no additional plumbing work is to be done at the terminal except under contract.

No person shall post, paste, print, nail, maintain or display upon any billboard, fence, building, frame or structure, and in any manner expose to public view, as an advertisement of any show, play or performance, any indecent print, or any picture or cut, tending to represent the doing of a criminal act, or representing indecently the limbs or any part of the human body, or the position of persons in relation to each other, tending to deprave the morals of individuals, or shocking to the sense of decency, or tending to incite the mind to acts of immorality or crime, or to familiarize and accustom the minds of young persons with the same.

Sec 2. Any person offending against any of the foregoing provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$100, or imprisonment not exceeding ten days; each day such violation shall be wilfully maintained or continued shall be deemed to constitute a separate offense and render the offender liable to additional arrest and prosecution.

Sec 3. The ordinance entitled "An ordinance to promote public morality in The City of New York," adopted October 17, 1905, and approved October 24, 1905, is hereby repealed.

Sec 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.
