Sir—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt, by reference from the President, of the resolutions of the Board of Aldermen of New York City, approved by the Mayor on January 30 last, reading as follows:

"Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York joins with the State Legislature, in its action of yesterday by resolution of the Assembly, shortly to be concurred in by the Senate, in the expression of sympathy tendered to the Jewish race on the shocking and appalling atrocities on the peaceful and law-abiding people of their faith in Russia; be it further

"Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Theodore Roosevelt, President of the United States, and the Honorable Elihu Root, Secretary of State, for such act thereon as they may deem meet in the premises."

In reply I have the honor to say that at this juncture any action by this Government looking to the relief of the Jews in Russia would be perhaps, and I fear, probably inopportune and unavailing. With the hoped-for establishment of a more liberal form of government and the restoration of administrative control over the scenes of the occurrences which are so greatly to be deplored, this Government may look for a practicable response to its repeated solicitations of freer treatment of American Hebrews, and may be in a position to exert efficient good influence toward the more liberal treatment of all Jews in Russia and their better protection from the consequences of deep-lying racial antagonisms. The problem is one which strongly attracts the sympathetic attention of this Government.

Whereas, Such failure on the part of the corporations named to properly heat the cars of the several railroads named constitutes a constant menace to public health, a defiance of existing laws and ordinances and a disregard of public comfort; and

Whereas, There have been introduced in the Honorable Board of Aldermen an ordinance requiring the heating of cars on the lines named to 60 degrees during the cold weather, and a resolution calling upon the Mayor, the State Railroad Commission, the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners and the Department of Health, to enforce the existing laws; now therefore be it

### COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communications from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

No. 254.

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity,

Hon. PATRICK F. McGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—In submitting the Department estimate for the moneys required to conduct the business of this Department for the year 1906, my predecessor stated that through the courtesy of Columbia University it had been arranged with Professor George F. Sever, Consulting Electrical Engineer of this Department, to allow the electrical machines and appliances belonging to the university to be used by the City for the purpose of testing electrical meters in cases of complaints by private consumers of excessive charges for electric current.

The sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500) was appropriated by this Department to pay for the services of an Inspector, the university contributing fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500) in addition, thus making the salary of said Inspector three thousand dollars (\$3,000) per annum, the appointment to be made by Columbia University.

The proposed agreement provides for the rendering by the university to the City, for the period of one year, of the services of its electrical testing laboratory for the purpose of testing electrical meters for all private consumers who may complain to the City, and of testing such other apparatus for the use and control of electricity as may be selected by this Department, and for the furnishing of reports and certification of the electrical testing laboratory on such tests, to this Department.

The matter was referred to the Corporation Counsel for the preparation of the proper form of agreement to be entered into, and I am now in receipt of same, with an opinion reading as follows:

"I return herewith an agreement drawn in triplicate for the work required. If, as a matter of fact, no electrical laboratory except that of Columbia University exists in the City, then you are empowered to enter into a contract with the university without advertising for bids or obtaining the approval of the Board of Aldermen, as provided in section 419 of the Charter. If, on the other hand, other laboratories exist and competition is possible, then, in order to dispense with competitive bidding, it is necessary to obtain the approval of the Board of Aldermen."

In connection with this matter I have to advise you that it is impossible to tell in advance what services will be required of the Inspector at the laboratory, or how many tests will be made during the year, and without these facts it will be impossible to draw up a proper contract to be bid for.

I would therefore ask that your Honorable Board consent to this agreement with Columbia University without advertising for competitive bids. I enclose herewith form of resolution for adoption by your Board.

Resolved, That in accordance with the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity is hereby authorized and empowered to enter into an agreement, without advertising for competitive bids or proposals, with Columbia University, for the testing of electrical meters on the premises of private consumers where complaint is received that the amount charged for electric current is excessive.

Hon. PATRICK F. MCGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Dear Sir—I am presenting herewith an application for permission to expend \$50,000 in monthly or quarterly orders for the repairing of pumping engines, boilers and other machinery at the pumping stations connected with this Department.

In the thirty odd stations there are engines and boilers requiring constant inspection and frequent overhauling, in order that the city shall at all times maintain a steady and sufficient pressure of water at the high points in the several boroughs. A breakdown of any of the engines would seriously inconvenience the public and perhaps result in great loss of life and property, if the Fire Department was unable to obtain a sufficient supply of water.

On May 23, 1905, the Board of Aldermen by resolution authorized the expenditure of \$35,000 for the same purpose, and the Department was enabled to maintain a steady and sufficient pressure of water in the distributing water pipes.

In asking for this permission I desire to inform you that it is impossible to estimate beforehand the amount of repairs necessary to be made to the engines, as the extent of damage can only be determined after the engines have been dismantled and the defective parts examined.

You can understand that to prepare the requisite papers in contract form, submit same for approval to the Corporation Counsel, have them printed, examined and checked by the Engineer, returned for final printing, recertified by the Corporation Counsel and advertised, would require about thirty days. In addition, a sufficient time is always given to the successful bidder to allow for the purchase of the material to be used in the work, and before repairs could possibly be commenced, no matter how urgent, about forty days would elapse from the time of the preparation of the papers.

I would respectfully ask that this matter be presented to the Honorable Board of Aldermen, and that early consideration be given to this application.

I append hereto a form of resolution for adoption by your Board.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Clerk of the City Court:

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen, City Hall:

Gentlemen—Since the Board of Estimate and Apportionment granted the appropriation for the City Court for the current year a resolution has been adopted by that body and your Board, and signed by the Mayor, increasing the salaries of the Attendants of the City Court from \$1,200 to \$1,500 per annum. In order to meet this additional expenditure it will be necessary for your Honorable Board to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to provide for the payment of this additional expense, which amounts to \$3,872.54, by the issuance of Revenue Bonds, in accordance with section 188 of the Charter.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and hereby is requested, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of three thousand eight hundred and seventy-two dollars and fifty-four cents (\$3,872.54), the proceeds whereof shall be applied to meet the increase in the salaries of the Attendants of the City Court of The City of New York for the year 1906, as authorized by resolution approved January 30, 1906.

Sir—Inclosed herewith you will find a copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Health at its meeting held February 7, 1906, requesting the Board of Aldermen to adopt a resolution, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter of The City of New York, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by concurrent vote of all the members of said Board, to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$10,000 for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses required to be incurred in reindexing and consolidating the records of vital statistics on file in the Bureau of Records of this Department and for the payment of all the necessary attendant expenses.

A similar resolution requesting the appropriation of \$15,000 was adopted by the Board of Health February 1, 1905, and forwarded to the Board of Aldermen. Of this amount the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriated but \$5,000, and to

complete the work in hand it is necessary that the balance (\$10,000) be placed at the disposal of the Board of Health. You are therefore respectfully requested to submit the matter to the Board for consideration at its next meeting.

Gentlemen—The Police Commissioner this day, on reading and filing report of Third Deputy Commissioner James F. Mack, in the matter of repairs, alterations, painting and improving the condition of several precinct station houses, and the urgent necessity for such work as may be required and the probable cost thereof,

Ordered, That the Board of Aldermen be and is hereby respectfully requested to authorize the issue of Special Revenue Bonds in the sum of \$125,000 to enable the Police Commissioner to execute the work of general repairs, alterations and painting of the several station houses referred to in such report, upon bids to be obtained at public letting, in accordance with the ordinances.

Ordered, That whenever the Board of Aldermen shall have authorized the issue of Special Revenue Bonds in such amount for such purpose, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to concur therein.

Ordered, That a copy of the communication of the Third Deputy Commissioner be respectfully forwarded to the Board of Aldermen and to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with these proceedings.

The Honorable the Police Commissioner, City of New York:

Sir—I have looked into the matter of repairs, alterations, painting and improving the condition of several precinct station houses, and from reports which I have before me, I respectfully submit the following:

The precinct station houses mentioned below are in need of general repairs, alterations, painting, etc., at an average cost of \$1,800 per station: First, Second, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth, Tenth, Twelfth, Thirteenth, Fifteenth, Sixteenth, Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-first, Twenty-sixth, Twenty-eighth, Twenty-ninth, Thirtieth, Thirty-first, Thirty-second, Thirty-fourth, Thirty-seventh, Forty-third, Forty-fourth, Forty-fifth, Forty-sixth, Forty-seventh, Forty-eighth, Forty-ninth, Fiftieth, Fifty-first, Fifty-second, Fifty-third, Fifty-fourth, Fifty-fifth, Fifty-sixth, Fifty-seventh, Fifty-eighth, Fifty-ninth, Sixtieth, Sixty-first, Sixty-second, Sixty-third, Sixty-fourth, Sixty-fifth, Sixty-sixth, Sixty-seventh, Seventy-fourth, Seventy-sixth, and minor repairs, etc., to several other stations, the total cost of which will reach \$100,000. The present appropriation can be used to meet emergency repairs and minor improvements, but is entirely inadequate for any progressive work.

New plumbing should be provided and installed to replace old and unsanitary work, and general repairs should be made to the masonry throughout where required.

Several stations, now lighted by gas, should be equipped for electric light, which would prevent newly painted buildings from becoming discolored by gas, and the saving thereby would eventually pay for cost of electric installation, giving greater convenience and safety.

To meet the urgent requirements of this year for such purposes, the sum of \$125,000 should be appropriated, and I respectfully recommend that the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to issue Special Revenue Bonds for that amount at the earliest possible date, in order that the work may be performed in seasonable weather.

Many of the stations in Manhattan and The Bronx, and all of the stations in Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond herein mentioned, have not been painted or materially repaired since the consolidation of the City in 1898, and the buildings are in a very deplorable condition, growing rapidly worse from necessary neglect, owing to the utterly inadequate appropriations of past years.

In the Budget request of 1906, prepared in October last, the sum of \$175,000 was asked for general repairs, alterations, painting and improving the condition of the several precinct station houses, of which only the sum of \$44,000, exactly the sum granted for the previous year, was allowed. No consideration was given to the elaborate explanations as to the necessity for such appropriation at that time.

Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Gentlemen—On July 7, 1903, there was passed an ordinance "governing connections of sewers, certain uses of the public streets and the making of openings in pavements and the restoration thereof in the Borough of Richmond," of which article 13, entitled "Fees, restoration of pavements," prescribed the fees allowable to collect for the restoration of pavement.

At the time of preparing the ordinance, the price of \$2.50 per square yard "for restoring granite or other blocks or brick on concrete foundation" was sufficient to meet the charges made by the different paving companies, but prices have advanced somewhat since the passage of the ordinance and the paving companies object to making small repairs even during the maintenance period of the contract for as low a sum of money per square yard as they charged for the main contract itself; consequently, we have been advised to leave out of our recent contracts for pavements all reference to the charges for restoration of plumbers' openings, etc., the responsibility of the paving companies being then for general or specific repairs due to defects or wear; consequently, we would ask that the ordinance be amended by the substitution of \$3 for the aforesaid \$2.50. This will enable the City to collect from the party making the opening a sufficient sum to cover the work which, in most cases, must necessarily be done by the paving company.

Honorable Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Gentlemen—I find that in order to safeguard the City's interest it is necessary to have proper pipe testing machines in this office, and that these machines should be purchased immediately, and that they cannot be conveniently purchased through the customary system of public letting.

I therefore request your Honorable Board to adopt a resolution authorizing the President of the Borough to make a contract, without public advertising, for the purchase of two pipe testing machines to be used in the Bureau of Sewers in this office, and to expend \$2,800 for that purpose.

I forward to you herewith copy of a communication relative to this matter, addressed on January 30, 1906, to the Commissioner of Public Works by the Superintendent of Sewers.

Hon. DESMOND DUNNE, Commissioner, Public Works:

Dear Sir—I hand you herewith two blue prints which were submitted to our Chief Engineer by the Riehle Brothers Testing Machine Company of Philadelphia, setting forth pipe sewer testers, one to be used for a crushing test, the other for a hydrostatic test. The cost of the first mentioned machine complete, which includes its delivery from Philadelphia to the Borough of Brooklyn, is \$1,549. The cost of the hydrostatic tester is \$1,250.

I earnestly request that every endeavor be made to procure these testing machines in order that pipe sewers may be systematically and regularly tested. If these machines are procured and installed in a small temporary building, I would suggest one of the portable style, on account of its economical procurement, to be situated in the park adjoining this building until such time as a new municipal building is completed. It will place this Bureau in a position to test any manufacturers' pipe, and tend towards the cessation of disputes as to whose pipe is best to use in sewer construction. I am informed that three applications have been made for the installation of these machines during the previous administration, but same were not procured.

This is a matter of utmost importance, and I would suggest that the Board of Aldermen be asked to permit the purchase of these machines without entering into contract for same, as Messrs. Riehle Brothers are manufacturers of the best testing machines placed upon the market.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I beg to request that your Honorable Board will, pursuant to section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000), the proceeds to be applied to meet the deficiency between the sum actually required for the maintenance of the parks, parkways, playgrounds, etc., in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, and the amount allowed for that purpose in the Budget for the current year.

While this sum is considerably less than the deficit as shown in detail by the departmental estimate for the year 1906 (which was based on actual requirements of labor and materials calculated from existing conditions and rate of expenditure), I have in mind the fact that the demands upon this source of revenue and the finances of the City, make necessary the best economy and distribution of the funds at your disposal under this section of the Charter.

Among the various and numerous items over which it will be necessary to distribute this amount to meet the needs of park maintenance work, I have included the item of renovating the Central Park, or such portion thereof as may be reasonable to undertake during the coming season, by means of the application of top soil or mould with manure and new planting. In the opinion of the experts who have made a careful study of this subject, the treatment proposed is very necessary to preserve and maintain the park at its present and past standard.

This work is deemed to be more properly construed as maintenance, rather than work of the character ordinarily provided for by the issue of Corporate Stock.

With the sum herein asked for, and with a careful regulation of expenses and the elimination of such items of intended work as it may be possible to dispense with, or otherwise adjust for the present year, I am of opinion that a fairly creditable degree of maintenance may be attained.

On March 21, 1905, a communication was sent to the Board of Aldermen in which their attention was called to the amount of the appropriation for Maintenance and Construction for the year 1905, with the statement that the amount allowed was insufficient, and requesting that an additional appropriation be made by the issue of Revenue Bonds for the use of this Department for the year 1905. In pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Aldermen, by resolution adopted on April 11 of that year, requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$200,000.

On a careful and complete examination by a representative of the Comptroller's office, the sum of \$70,000 was appropriated, under date of June 16, 1905, this amount being deemed sufficient for the six months ending December 31. This \$70,000, added to the amount appropriated on account of Maintenance and Construction, 1905 (\$246,450), shows a total of \$316,450 appropriated for Maintenance, Labor and Supplies for the year 1905. As \$70,000 was allowed for six months (and even this was found insufficient), the amount necessary for the year 1906, on this basis, would be \$140,000.

With each recurring year the area of park territory devoted to public purposes has very largely increased; lands have been opened and developed, lawns have been made, and new paths and roads have been constructed. During the past year at least ten miles of roads and paths have been completed, necessitating the planting of trees and shrubs, the grading and seeding of grounds, so that the public who make use of these roads and paths could have proper use of the park grounds adjoining same.

While the area of park territory has been increased by only a few hundred acres, the area opened for public use, as referred to above, has been more than doubled in the past six years. Our parks are used not only by the residents of our own borough, but by the people of the whole city.

The nine-hole golf course in Pelham Bay Park has been extended to eighteen holes, and a new eighteen-hole golf course at Van Cortlandt Park is nearing completion.

Eight new comfort stations or toilet houses have either been constructed or are in course of construction, and as many more are necessary for the comfort of the great number of residents and non-residents who daily visit the parks under the jurisdiction of this Department.

At least three hundred new bath houses, which it will be necessary to maintain, have been erected during the past season, and the beaches adjacent to them must be kept clean and free from obstructions, and, where possible, increased to meet the demand for facilities for salt water bathing.

A new green house has been erected, in addition to the one situated at Bronx Park, which necessarily means increased cost of maintenance.

The athletic field opened last year in Macomb's Dam Park, which is crowded to congestion on fine days, requires constant care to keep it in perfect condition and prevent the possibility of accidents. The same also applies to the fine athletic field which has been in use for several years in Pelham Bay Park.

When new roads are completed the cost of sprinkling them is an important item. This work must be given close attention to prevent the dust from becoming a source of annoyance to the public, and to keep the surface from blowing away and thus necessitating resurfacing, which is necessarily expensive.

The development of park territory throughout the Borough of The Bronx has greatly increased the demand for and the sale of property, and I firmly believe has been an important factor in the real estate boom of our borough, and it has added materially to the increased valuation of real estate.

Notwithstanding this large increase of developed territory, no increase has been made in the appropriation for its care. When due consideration and thought are given to the fact that the total area of parks in the Borough of The Bronx is at least 3,864½ acres, and of parkways 211½ acres, making a total of 4,076 acres, it will be readily understood that it is absolutely necessary that an additional appropriation be made by the issue of Revenue Bonds for the use of this Department for the current year, and I would respectfully request an authorization of \$200,000, as granted by your Honorable Board last year, for the purpose here stated and hereinbefore mentioned:

Maintenance and Construction, \$200,000.

Hereafter it shall be unlawful to drive any vehicle over the easterly side road or bridle road of the Ocean parkway, between Prospect Park and the Coney Island Concourse, except as it may be necessary to cart or convey supplies to the residences along said easterly side road, or in case of buildings being erected fronting on said side road, when it shall be lawful to cart building materials thereon. In all cases, however, vehicles must enter said side road from the street nearest to said residence or house in course of construction, and must leave the same at the next following intersecting street.

Sec. 2. Any person who violates the provisions of this ordinance shall be liable to a penalty of \$5 for each and every offense.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the municipal and public corporations consolidated into The City of New York, inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

Report of Committee on Public Buildings and Markets.

No. 107.

The Committee on Public Buildings and Markets, to whom was referred on January 23, 1906 (Minutes, page 417), the annexed ordinance to authorize the construction of a municipal public building in the Borough of Manhattan, respectfully

## REPORT:

That a public hearing was held thereon at which appeared a number of the heads of the City departments, in the opinion of all of whom the construction of such a building is a much needed requirement. The general consensus of thought was that such a building should be sufficiently large to house all of the City departments now occupying space for which rentals are being paid to private parties or corporations, the sum total of which rentals, it is estimated, would more than pay the interest on the bonds necessary to be issued in the event of such an undertaking and also provide for the necessary maintenance.

The present scattered location of the various City departments is in itself a serious inconvenience to the public. With the constant growth of our population and the increasing City business, the selection of a central point for such a building and the adoption of a more systematic arrangement of the different offices is necessary to facilitate the work of the City's employees, many of whom are to-day housed in ill-ventilated and unsanitary rooms.

For these reasons the Committee view the proposition as a very necessary public improvement and recommend that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE authorizing the construction of a municipal public building in the Borough of Manhattan.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

P. Lewis accompanying resolution, the construction of this bridge over the Harlem river, connecting Manhattan Island and The Bronx, is now requested, as the monument selected by the Hudson Memorial Committee by the City in 1904, with which to commemorate on September 12, 1909, the 300th anniversary of the discovery of the Hudson river by Henry Hudson. Your Committee feels that in celebrations of this character, that where possible, any monument erected should take the form of some useful, permanent and necessary improvement of benefit to the City, and that this is accomplished in this instance, as the erection of said bridge will be a great step in the construction and continuation of Riverside drive north along the Hudson river and on the hill crest, through The Bronx to the City line, a work which in any event would certainly have to be undertaken by the City within the next few years. It is believed that the linking of that section to the City parkway system will so popularize that neighborhood that the City will be greatly repaid by consequent values.

Your Committee therefore recommends the adoption of the said ordinance.

The Commissioner explained that the Department relied upon getting this money and would be badly crippled if it could not. This appropriation was favorably passed upon by the last Board, but was too late for service, and the Department asks that it be repassed now. Your Committee believes this appropriation to be necessary and recommends the adoption of the annexed resolution.

Sir—I respectfully recommend that the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to authorize the issuance of Special Revenue Bonds in the sum of \$40,000, of which \$30,000 be applied to the appropriation of this year, entitled Supplies for Police, and \$10,000 to the appropriation for this year, entitled Police Stations, Alterations, Fitting Up, etc.

In the annual Budget for the year 1905, prepared in September, 1904, an appropriation of \$534,484 was asked for Supplies for Police, of which only the sum of \$424,000 was granted.

At the same time an appropriation of \$140,000 was asked for Police Station House Alterations, Fitting Up, etc., of which only \$44,000 was granted, which amount has since been supplemented by the issuance of Corporate Stock for the sum of \$82,000 for permanent betterment. The latter appropriation is being expended under contracts awarded and in preparation and cannot be diverted, while the original appropriation (\$44,000) is practically exhausted and no funds are available to meet the ordinary emergency repairs of the Department now known and anticipated.

After the Budget for 1905 had been passed upon and the appropriation fixed, contracts were awarded in the closing days of 1904 for the purchase of fifty-five (55) additional horses, and in January, 1905, contract was awarded for the purchase of seventy-five (75) additional horses (of which fifty-five (55) have been placed in the service), no provision or appropriation being made for the equipment and maintenance of these 110 horses, which has cost approximately \$27,100. The Budget appropriation, which did not contemplate these demands, and being reduced \$110,484 below the appropriation asked, has proven entirely inadequate to meet even the most urgent demands of the service.

It is estimated that there will be a saving of \$35,681 on the contracts of this year, the strictest economy having prevailed, as will be shown by the following schedule of comparative open order expenditures for the year 1904 as against those of 1905 to date:

Gentlemen—Because of the immense increase in the volume of business handled by the Bureau of Buildings in my office, I am constrained to request your Board to

All this greatly increased business was carried on with practically the same working force employed in 1903. In that year there were 101 employees of the Bureau and at present there are 104. In addition to the natural increase in the volume of business, I would call your attention to the fact that additional labor has been thrown on this Bureau by the recent amendments to the Excise Laws which amendments become operative about May 1, 1906.

The Station Keepers are very important factors in the Department. They are the janitors of stations, custodians of all Department property and work daily more than an hour in excess of Sweepers. We had to sign documents to waive the additional extra pay for Sunday work or give up our positions as Station Keepers, and therefore appeal to you to bring this matter to the attention of the Board.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Council, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
