#### Report for the Quarter ending September 30, 1885.

Hon. WILLIAM R. GRACE, Mayor, City of New York:

SIR—Pursuant to section 40, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York hereby respectfully submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force for the three months ending September 30, 1885:

#### REPORT.

On the 30th day of September, 1885, the number of members of the force, of all grades, including Surgeons, was 2,915. This number does not include probationary employees.

#### SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disability, and injuries, for the quarter, and the details thereof, are shown in schedule annexed, marked "A," from which it will be seen that the time lost was 4,959½ days. Sick time paid 2,558¾ " " unpaid 2,400¾ "

Amount paid for sick time lost was \$8,411 69 " preceding quarter was 10,140 40

NOTE.—The discrepancy existing between the number arrested for particular offenses on felony report and on general report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the general report is made up from daily returns from the station-houses, and the felony report from quarterly returns.

An offense charged in the station-house, at the time the arrest is made, is liable to be and frequently is changed to a greater or less offense, on evidence elicited before the magistrate.

There seems to be a considerable loss of head at the Croton Dam, which can be met by an increase of section of gate openings, or by a branch main or pipe from the dam or reservoir without a wheel, and is due probably to inadequate section at the gates and screens at the Croton Dam.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—I am informed that the present Sheriff, Mr. Davidson, has, as required by law, sent to your Honorable Board his Departmental Estimate for the year 1886, in which is included an item of \$60,000 for procuring statistics of criminal convictions; making returns and filing the same with the Secretary of State; conveying prisoners from the City Prison to the Penitentiary, to the House of Refuge, and to the Courts of Oyer and Terminer and General Sessions and back to prisons from said courts; summoning jurors and attendance at drawing of jurors according to law; attendance of Sheriff and deputies upon courts and at the execution of criminals, and all other expenses connected therewith prior to execution, and conveyance of convicts to lunatic asylums; serving notice of special and general elections on Supervisors and Board of Supervisors; and a further item of \$15,000 for the support of prisoners in the County Jail.

The first of these items is ten thousand dollars, and the second three thousand dollars in excess of the amounts appropriated for similar services last year.

By chapter 207 of the Session Laws of 1884, it is made the duty of your Honorable Board to readjust and fix the rates at which such services performed by the Sheriff for the benefit of the County, pursuant to statute, are to be paid.

An examination of the evidence taken before the Roosevelt Investigating Committee two winters ago, and a perusal of its report to the Legislature, show that the rates now paid for such services, as fixed by the Board of Aldermen nearly ten years ago, are largely in excess of what would be a fair and reasonable compensation for such services.

Believing, as I do, that the present estimate submitted by Mr. Davidson should be reduced in amount, I shall, if elected, deem it my duty to call upon your Honorable Board to reduce and limit the estimate as to provide what the statute contemplates, viz.: a reasonable compensation for the services rendered, and thus to prevent a continuance of the excessive charges which have heretofore prevailed.

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 10 to 3 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption, if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.

## ROUTE.

The track or route of the said Aqueduct in tunnel from a point on the easterly bank of the Harlem river to a point in Convent avenue, near One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, in the City of New York, as shown upon said maps, is as follows:

Beginning upon the centre line of the survey of said Aqueduct route, as shown on said maps, at a point upon the westerly line of the lands now owned or occupied by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company upon the easterly bank of the Harlem river, about one-fourth of a mile northeasterly of the High Bridge, and distant upon said westerly line of said railroad lands 79.31 feet from the prolongation of the northerly line of a road or street from Sedgwick avenue to Commerce avenue; and running thence (1) along said centre line upon a course of north 56° 30' west across and under the Harlem river, and thence to a point in Tenth avenue 330 feet northerly of the north line of One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street and near the centre of said avenue, a distance of about 1,320 feet; thence (2) still upon said centre line, upon a course of south 38° 19' west along and parallel with Tenth avenue and 46 feet 7½ inches westerly of the easterly line of said avenue, a distance of about 7,103 feet to a point in said avenue 114.56 feet northerly of the northerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-second street; thence (3) still along said centre line, upon a curve bending to the eastward, with a radius of 350 feet, to a point upon lot Ward No. 7, of Block No. 1078, and thence reversing upon a curve bending to the westward, with a radius of 350 feet, a distance of 80.78 feet to a point in One Hundred and Fiftieth street distant 14.68 feet southerly from the northerly line of said street, and 390.87 feet easterly of the easterly line of Tenth avenue; thence (4) still along said centre line upon a course of south 38° 19' west to and through Convent avenue, parallel with and near its centre to a point in said avenue near its intersection with the northerly line of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, a distance of 3,906 feet; the whole length upon said centre line of said aqueduct, as above described, being 13,160 feet, and its width throughout said distance being 25 feet on each side of said centre line, save and except in its passage across the Harlem river, and where a greater width is shown upon the said map at the several sites of the working shafts for the construction of the tunnel of the said aqueduct, and which sites are colored on said map in pink.

The enumeration of the numbers of the parcels to be taken in fee is as follows: Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 44 and 70.
