MORE CROTON WATER.

TRINITY BUILDING, No. 111 BROADWAY, ROOM 73, NEW YORK, May 1, 1885.

Hon. ROLLIN M. SQUIRE, Commissioner of Public Works, No. 31 Chambers street, New York City:

DEAR SIR—The present daily supply of Croton water in the old or present Aqueduct is said to average 95,000,000 gallons exclusive of the Bronx river supply of 10,000,000 gallons, making a total of 105,000,000 gallons.

The daily delivery of water through the Croton Aqueduct can be increased at least fifty (50)

per cent. in the old aqueduct, making a delivery of 152,500,000 gallons, by the use of the necessary boilers, engines, machinery, connections and propeller or other water-wheels contained in the Aqueduct and buildings erected at necessary intervals or stations immediately over and along the line of

My method will consist of drawing the water by suction to the point of delivery by means of the machinery above referred to, thus avoiding the pressure system of forcing it, which would weaken or destroy the Aqueduct in embankments where they might be comparatively weak or

the machinery above referred to, thus avoiding the pressure system of forcing it, which would weaken or destroy the Aqueduct in embankments where they might be comparatively weak or leaky.

The first set of engines at the Central Park Reservoir would be run, say two hours, when the second set would be commenced, and so on to the last or upper set. This process would set the whole column of water in consecutive motion, and would increase the flow or column of water from two and one-half miles (the present flow) to four miles per hour, thus making the delivery more rapid and the volume of water fifty per cent. greater in quantity. This would be done at sixty revolutions per minute of the propeller, which could be increased to a higher rate of speed if necessary.

To avoid the danger of breakage and consequent loss of time for repairs at any given point, it is proposed to use ten to twenty sets of engines, boilers and machinery varying according to the size and capacity selected and used at each station as required by the necessities of that particular case.

The larger number would equalize the flow and deliver more water with less friction. A greater number of engines in proportion would be used south of the High Bridge than north of it, owing to the varying grades. To these variations will be added the changes in construction from aqueduct to iron pipes and back again to the aqueduct plan, which in some places requires more water space than it now has, where the iron pipes are of less area than the aqueduct, in delivering the maximum quantity allowed elsewhere.

The buildings, machinery, engines, boilers, connections and propellers could all be completed, requiring the stoppage of a single day only or less, and running subject to the temporary adjustment of speed which would soon be regulated by the use of the telephone system between stations.

The highest quality and most efficient engines and machinery could be completed and connected ready for use after details are agreed upon as follows:

The upper end of the section should be in cut, and the lower end in embankment.

If stations are three miles apart you can draw down two feet and raise two feet and you will get about fifty per cent increase of discharge. Average section as now, about same strain as now.

The water-way at each station can be enlarged a reasonable distance and insert in the centre a place for protection of the machinery therein, which would connect with the propeller shaft while in a horizontal position, thus protecting it from the water. This is only another form of use.

My method seems specially adapted to the delivery of water under high pressure from

The Bronx River.

As iron pipes are used throughout the entire length, adding very largely to the strength, which would permit the necessary pressure to double its present carrying capacity from that now supplied, and it is to be regretted that the Byram river supply and increased quantity of water deliverable is not completed, that the greatest results attainable could be immediately secured while drawing from

a plentiful supply of water.

This proposed increase of water supply would afford great relief especially while the New Aqueduct is being completed, which may extend over a period of many years, the requirements of greater durability and thoroughness being more important than a speedy completion and execution of such a great work, being in part novel and necessarily indefinite as to the time required to complete it. It may not be amiss to suggest a word on the subject of

An increased supply and head of water would add considerably to the income of the City, and ought to be sufficient to liquidate the whole cost of these proposed improvements and additions, and also the small amount of outstanding debt against the Croton Water Fund and Construction Account from the original outlay to the present time, or time when the debt shall have become extinct.

When that time arrives it may be wise to consider the question of supplying the people with an abundance of pure water without cost, except in their general taxation upon property, and will then be similar to the police, Educational, Street-cleaning and other necessary benefits derived by the

This method of increasing the water supply is not a theoretical or fancy plan, but one that has received the approval of many of our best and most highly gifted hydraulic engineers, who assert that the increase of fifty (50) per cent. is easily accomplished without danger to the Aqueduct.

On the contrary, the principle of suction will strengthen instead of weaken the arch of the Aqueduct.

One word further upon the subject of

Any other method of accelerating the speed of water may be adopted for low elevation of water if preferred, viz., the baling wheel, centrifugal pump, rotary pump or regular reciprocating pump,

There seems to be a considerable loss of head at the Croton Dam, which can be met by an increase of section of gate openings, or by a branch main or pipe from the dam or reservoir without a wheel, and is due probably to inadequate section at the gates and screens at the Croton Dam.
