

Hon. E. DELAFIELD SMITH, the Counsel to the Corporation, has made the following retainer and assignment of Attorney and Counsel to the Board of Police, in pursuance of section 36, article 6 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1875, and in further pursuance of law.

LAW DEPARTMENT—OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION, NEW YORK, May 4, 1875. Mr. CHARLES FRASER MACLEAN:

DEAR SIR-Referring to our recent interviews with regard to the legal assistance required by the Police Department, you will please regard this letter as a retainer and an assignment of yourself to that Department as Attorney and Counsel, commencing on the 1st instant, and to continue until further notice.

This action is demanded by the exigencies of the public service; but the Commissioners and yourself will of course be at liberty to consult, me and to receive my personal assistance in any matter where it shall be thought necessary or advisable to confer with me.

Versed in the learning of the law, it is fortunate that a gentleman of your scholarly attainments has promised to accept this retainer. Your name has been commended to my consideration by eminent members of the bar, and particularly by one most distinguished. My action has been deferred, and is now taken with hesitation, in view of the delicacy of my position. This you can well understand. It is known that you possess the special confidence of another jurist now occupying the highest position in the gift of the people of the state. Upon this subject I have had with him no communication direct or indirect. Whatever he may in future do with regard to the judicial question relating to myself now pending before him, there is certainly nothing in the consideration with which he has already treated me, to render it at all natural that I should disregard peculiar qualifications for the reason that their possessor has been the recipient of his confidence.
