

REASONS FOR THE PROVISIONAL ESTIMATE, 1894.

Resolved, That the Provisional Estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment,

⁸ tocks of the City of New York, exclusive of interest on bonds and stocks in the Sinking Fund, made payable therefrom, by chapter 178 of the Laws of 1880, and including interest on bonds of the towns of Morrisania and West Farms issued prior to their annexation to the city, and also interest on the estimated amount of revenue bonds to be issued in 1804, amounting in all to \$5,080,217.45, and included in the Provisional Estimate to be raised by tax in 1894.

THE REDEMPTION OF THE CITY DEBT.

The sum of \$19,426.91 is included in the Provisional Estimate for the redemption of revenue bonds made payable in 1894, by special acts of the Legislature ; and also the sum of \$17,000 for the redemption of the debt of the towns of Morrisania and West Farms, which become due in 1894, and also the sum of \$1,312,310.66, pursuant to article 8, section 11 of the State Constitution, as amended in 1884, requiring installments to be raised by tax annually for the redemption at maturity of bonds issued after December 31 of that year, for the supply of water. Stocks amounting to the sum of \$1,494,000 become due in 1894, for which no appropriation is included in the Provisional Estimate, as the amount has been provided for by installments, and will be paid from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, pursuant to the provisions of section 192 of the Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by section 178 of the Laws of 1889.

THE STATE TAXES.

The State Taxes for 1894, as certified by the State Comptroller, amounted to \$4.708,080.01, which is more by \$1,166,123.91 than the amount allowed in 1803; and to which would have to be added \$12,465.68, for compensation and expenses of the Shore Inspector, as provided by law. The total State Tax, as certified by the State Comptroller, consists of the following items:

The amount charged for State Care of Insane, viz.: \$608,279.07 has not been allowed in the Provisional Estimate, upon the ground that chapter 126 of the Laws of 1890 do not justify the imposition of said tax. The amount allowed, therefore, in the Provisional Estimate for 1894, is \$4,099,800.94, to which has been added \$12,465.68, for compensation and expenses of the Shore Inspector Inspector.

RENTS.

The sum of \$141,480 is appropriated for rents of premises leased to the City for various departments, public offices, court rooms, etc., other than armories and drill rooms. For rents of armories and drill rooms for the National Guard, not provided with quarters

belonging to the City, the sum of \$27,350 is allowed.

JUDGMENTS.

For the payment of judgments against the City that have been or may be obtained, and not otherwise provided for, the sum of \$125,000 is included in the Provisional Estimate of 1894, and is deemed to be required and necessary for this purpose.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS.

As provided by chapter 57, Laws of 1879, the sum of \$7.500 is appropriated for the Seventh Regiment New Armory Fund, and \$6,000 for the necessary expenses of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and of real estate belonging to the City.

LAW DEPARTMENT.

The sum of \$200,700 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, being \$1,300 less than was allowed in the Final Estimate for 1893. The amount asked for was allowed in the Provisional Estimate for 1894, and there has been added thereto the sum of \$5,000 for payment of salary of an Attorney to the Department of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, as fixed by chapter 331 of the Laws of 1893.

THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS.

The sum of \$3,094,880 is appropriated for all objects and purposes, being \$522,852 less than the Departmental Estimate and \$80,860 more than the Final Estimate for 1893.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

The sum of \$1,134,455 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all objects and purposes, which is less than the Departmental Estimate by \$286,880 and \$38,000 more than the Final Estimate for 1893.

THE DEPARTMENT OF STREET IMPROVEMENTS, TWENTY-THIRD AND TWENTY-FOURTH WARDS.

The sum of \$329,360 is appropriated for all the purposes and objects of this Department, being \$21,112 less than the Final Estimate for 1893 and \$333,605 less than the Departmental Estimate for 1894.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES AND CORRECTION.

The sum of \$2,273,175 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all purposes and objects, being \$417,077 less than the Departmental Estimate for 1894 and \$49,750 more than the Final Estimate for 1893.

THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

The sum of \$423,580 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all the purposes and objects of this Department. Reductions amount to \$62,668, being made in the various items of the Departmental Estimate, leaving the amount allowed \$46,668 less than the Final Estimate for 1893.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

The sum of \$5,126,647.64 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all the purposes and objects, being \$823,950 less than the Departmental Estimate for 1894 and \$183,238.40 less than the Final Estimate for 1893.

DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING.

The sum of \$2,361,410 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for the purposes and objects, being \$777,521.21 less than the Departmental Estimate for 1894 and \$161,410 more than the Final Estimate for 1893.

The amount appropriated is twenty-eight thousand dollars (\$28,000), being the same amount as asked for in the Departmental Estimate for 1894, and as allowed in the Final Estimate for 1893, for the expenses of the Mayor's Office in 1894, which includes the salary of the Mayor, as fixed by law at ten thousand dollars per annum. For the Mayor's Marshal's Office, the sum of thirteen thousand seven hundred dollars (\$13,700) was asked for in the Departmental Estimate for 1894, and that amount has been allowed as necessary and reasonable in the Provisional Estimate, being a decrease of one hundred and fifty dollars from the Final Estimate of 1893.

THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

The sum of \$301,700 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate for 1894, as required for the several objects and purposes therein, and is allowed as reasonable and necessary, including the salary of the Comptroller, fixed by law at \$10,000 per annum, and the compensation of the Chamberlain, also provided for by law, at \$25,000, including the sum of \$40,000 for cleaning markets. The total is the same as that allowed in the Final Estimate for 1893.

INTEREST ON THE CITY DEBT.

In accordance with the statements submitted by the Comptroller with the Departmental The sum of \$125,000 is appropriated for the expenses of this institution, being the amount of the Departmental Estimates, the amount appropriated for interest becoming due and payable in 1894 on bonds and

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The sum of \$2,235,017 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all objects and purposes, being \$535,241 less than the Departmental Estimates for 1894 and \$11,883.50 more than the Final Estimate for 1893.

THE DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS.

The sum of \$203,100 is appropriated for all objects and purposes, being \$6,670 less than the Departmental Estimate for 1894, and \$11,150 less than the Final Estimate for 1893.

THE DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS.

The sum of \$128,220 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for the expenses of this Depart-ment, being the same amount as asked for in the Departmental Estimate for 1894, and as appro-priated in the Final Estimate for 1893.

• The sum of \$4,624,654.97 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all objects and purposes, excepting the purchase of School sites and the erection of School Buildings, which are provided for by the issue of bonds. 
