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## BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

MINUTES OF MEETING OF BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK,  
HELD IN ROOM 16, CITY HALL, FRIDAY, JANUARY 12, 1906.

The Board met in pursuance of a call by the Chair.

Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company.

In the matter of the protest of Messrs. Beardsley & Hemmens, counsel for the Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company, against the grant of certain pipe and tunnel privileges to the firm of John Wanamaker and to the Tremont Mills, upon the grounds that said grants were infringements upon the rights of the aforementioned company, and which protest was presented to the Board at the meeting of November 10, 1905, and upon motion, duly adopted, the Secretary was directed to communicate with the said counsel and request that they submit in writing any facts which they might possess tending to support their contention in the matter, and upon receipt thereof to forward same to the Corporation Counsel for opinion.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—I am in receipt of a communication from your Secretary, J. W. Stevenson, dated November 29, 1905, and reading as follows:

"The firm of John Wanamaker, in a communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated September 20, 1905, requested permission to construct and maintain a tunnel under and across East Ninth street, Borough of Manhattan, to connect the property controlled by said firm on either side of said street; the proposed tunnel to take the place of an existing tunnel maintained under resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen January 22, 1901. Detailed information is contained in the communication, which is printed in full in the CITY RECORD of October 3, 1905, on page 8322.

"In a petition to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated October 12, 1905, the Tremont Mills, a domestic corporation, the owner and occupant of premises the southwest corner of Ittner place and Park avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, requested permission to lay a wire across Ittner place for the purpose of supplying itself with light and power in the building on the northwest corner of the aforesaid streets, said building being leased by the petitioner for a term of ten years, and to maintain a conduit which was installed, I am informed, upon a permit issued by the President of the Borough of The Bronx. The petition appears in the CITY RECORD of October 31, 1905, page 9115.

"The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by resolution duly adopted October 27, 1905, granted the privileges requested to the firm of John Wanamaker and to the Tremont Mills. The CITY RECORD of October 31, 1905, contains the complete resolutions adopted in both instances. The resolutions granting the privileges requested by both applicants were approved by the Mayor November 3, 1905.

"Under date of November 1, 1905, a communication was received from Messrs. Beardsley & Hemmens, counsel for the Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company, in which they stated:

"As we consider that this resolution (Tremont Mills) is an infringement of the right of the Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company we respectfully request that we be allowed to be heard on the question as to whether or not the resolution should be signed by the Mayor. We should also like to be heard on the question of the signing of the resolution granting similar authority to John Wanamaker \* \* \* We should therefore be pleased if you would kindly arrange so that a hearing may be had and that we may appear before the Mayor in regard to these resolutions."

"On November 2, 1905, I notified Messrs. Beardsley & Hemmens that the resolutions had already been sent to the Mayor for approval, but as they were revocable at the pleasure of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the rights of the company represented by them could be amply protected, should it be subsequently decided that such rights had been infringed upon. I also informed the counsel that their communication would be presented to the Board at the meeting of Friday, November 10.

"A copy of the letter of Messrs. Beardsley & Hemmens, together with a copy of my reply thereto was transmitted to your office on November 2, 1905.

"At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held November 10, 1905, upon motion, duly adopted, I was directed to communicate with Messrs. Beardsley & Hemmens and request that they submit in writing to the Board any facts which they might possess tending to support their contention in the matter for transmission to the Corporation Counsel for opinion thereon.

"I inclose herewith communication from said attorneys, dated November 23, 1905. Attached thereto is a memorandum setting forth the grounds upon which the claim for the alleged infringement is based, and I would request that you advise the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of its powers and duties in the premises, and if the resolutions granting consents to John Wanamaker and the Tremont Mills are in effect special franchises, within the contemplation of the law, or simply permits, together with the mode of procedure to govern the actions of the Board, and any provisions which you may deem fit and proper to be incorporated in the resolutions granting similar consents to future applicants."

Replying to same, I beg to state that on June 15, 1905, the Comptroller wrote me on this subject as follows:

"Will you kindly advise me if an application to construct a tunnel or lay pipe lines under the surface of the street and avenues that are to be used solely for private purposes should be considered by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as a franchise, and as such take the same procedure as required for a regular franchise, or if a resolution by the Board granting the privilege, stating the terms and conditions and fixing the compensation will be sufficient.

"For your information I would note that these tunnel and pipe-line privileges are not given for a fixed period, but are revocable at the pleasure of the Board."

To this communication I replied:

"I think it would be unwise to attempt to lay down an absolute rule without exceptions as to what are and what are not franchises.

"Speaking generally, however, I think that any right to use the streets, etc., of a city by any private corporation or person for purposes which would draw any portion of such streets, highways, etc., from the public use should be construed to be a franchise.

"There are, however, cases which while technically embraced within the meaning of the word franchise are of such a trivial or temporary character as to make it unwise to attempt to apply to them the complicated provisions of the Charter in relation to granting franchises.

"Whether or not an application to build a private tunnel or pipe line through public property is a franchise or a permit must depend very largely upon the considerations I have mentioned.

"In deciding this question you must also bear in mind that there is considerable danger in such a case that a private corporation or person will acquire a tunnel or pipe-line right from the City upon the theory that it is merely a temporary permit, knowing perfectly well that the probability is that it or he will never be disturbed in the enjoyment of this permit, so that it or he has acquired a franchise without paying for it.

"Subject to all these limitations there may exist cases which take them out of the general rule, and it is for the public authorities to determine on which side of the line the application lies.



"As a general principle, however, in all doubtful cases the application should be treated as a request for a franchise rather than for a permit."

In my opinion the resolutions granting consents to John Wanamaker and the Tremont Mills are simply revocable permits in the granting of which the same mode of procedure is to be adopted and similar agreements to be made as I recently approved in the matter of applications by Columbia University and the Pratt Institute for permits, regarding which I fully advised the Comptroller in an opinion rendered July 14, 1905.

*United Dressed Beef Company.*

In the matter of petition of the United Dressed Beef Company requesting permission to construct a concrete conduit under and along Forty-fourth street, east and west of First avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for the purpose of carrying therein pipes for power, heating, refrigerating and flushing, which was presented to the Board at the meeting of December 5, 1905, and at the request of the company laid over.

The Secretary presented the following amended application:

NEW YORK, November 3, 1905.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—The United Dressed Beef Company, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of New York, with its principal office at the southeast corner of First avenue and Forty-fourth street, the owner of certain land at the southeast corner of First avenue and Forty-fourth street, and of certain land on the south side of Forty-fourth street, commencing 100 feet west of the west building line of First avenue, and continuing west for 125 feet, as shown on the accompanying plan, respectfully requests permission to construct a concrete conduit under Forty-fourth street, beginning at the east building line of First avenue, and running parallel to and 15 feet north of the south building line of Forty-fourth street to a point 100 feet west of the west building line of First avenue, as shown on accompanying plan. Conduit will follow grade of Forty-fourth street, and for the greater part of the length will be approximately 5 feet below the pavement.

The said conduit to be used by the United Dressed Beef Company for their exclusive use in carrying a steam pipe and electric conduits from their power house on the southeast corner of Forty-fourth street and First avenue to their new building on the south side of Forty-fourth street, 100 feet west of First avenue, which is used as a stable; conduit construction and arrangement of pipes therein to be as shown in accompanying plan.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The United Dressed Beef Company under date of November 3, 1905, through its president, Isaac Blumenthal, makes application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for permission to construct and maintain a concrete conduit under East Forty-fourth street, beginning at the east building line of First avenue, and running parallel to and 15 feet north of the south building line of East Forty-fourth

The proposed conduit is 209 feet in length, 16 inches in width and 12½ inches in height, and is designed to connect the power house owned by the company situated on the southeast corner of East Forty-fourth street and First avenue, with its new building situated on the south side of East Forty-fourth street, 100 feet west of First avenue.

The purpose of the conduit, as set forth in the application, is to carry, for the exclusive use of the company, one steam pipe 3½ inches in diameter, and four conduits for electric wires 2 inches in diameter. The conduit is shown on a plan accompanying the application, entitled:

"Plan showing proposed concrete conduit in East Forty-fourth street, connecting the buildings of the United Dressed Beef Company, to accompany the petition to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Dated November 3, 1905,"—and signed by the United Dressed Beef Company, owner, by Isaac Blumenthal, President.

Copies of the application were sent to the President of the Borough of Manhattan and to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, with a request that they make an examination and report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment whether there are any objections to the granting of the privilege asked, or in the event of the consent being given, whether, in their opinion, any special conditions should be imposed. The replies received are herewith attached.

On July 29, 1903, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a schedule for determining the compensation to be paid for nine line privileges, for a diameter of 16 inches or less. In this case the area of the proposed conduit is slightly less than that of a pipe 16 inches in diameter, and the annual charge computed upon the adopted schedule would amount to \$400.

I see no objection to granting the privilege, and would therefore recommend that the consent be given for a term not exceeding ten years, and that the charge be fixed at \$400 per annum. It is also recommended that the amount of the security deposit, which is customarily required for like privileges, be fixed at \$750, the same to be deposited with the Comptroller as security for the faithful performance of the terms of the consent.

A form of resolution is attached herewith, which it is believed will properly protect the interests of the City. A paragraph is inserted requiring the construction to be made solely upon the terms and conditions to be approved by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The company shall also submit working plans of construction and method of the same, and to show in detail the mode of protection of all subsurface structures now in East Forty-fourth street. It is believed that this covers the suggestions made in the communications herewith attached from those officials.

For your information I might add that the power house above mentioned at the southeast corner of East Forty-fourth street and First avenue, is now connected with the property of Swift & Co., at the northeast corner of East Forty-fourth street and First avenue, by a tunnel under and across East Forty-fourth street. This tunnel was constructed under authority of a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen October 6, 1903, and approved by the Mayor October 27, 1903.

The following was offered:

Resolved, That the consent of the Corporation of The City of New York be and the same is hereby given to the United Dressed Beef Company, a corporation, the owner of certain property situated on the southerly side of East Forty-fourth street and east and west of First avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, to lay a conduit 16 inches in width and 12½ inches in height, under and along the roadway of East Forty-fourth street, for the sole purpose of conducting steam and electricity for said petitioners' exclusive use, from premises at the southeasterly corner of East Forty-fourth street and First avenue, to premises on the southerly side of East Forty-fourth street 100 feet west of First avenue, as shown and indicated on a plan entitled:

"Plan showing proposed concrete conduit in East Forty-fourth street connecting the buildings of the United Dressed Beef Company, to accompany petition to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated November 3, 1905,"—and signed by Isaac Blumenthal, President, and P. R. Moses, Consulting Engineer. The consent hereby given is subject to the following terms and conditions:

1. Said consent shall be for a term not exceeding ten years from the date of approval thereof by the Mayor of The City of New York, and shall be revocable at the pleasure of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority.
2. The United Dressed Beef Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay into the treasury of The City of New York the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400) per annum for the privilege hereby granted, and such sum for restoring the pavements as may be required by the President of the Borough of Manhattan. The compensation hereby reserved shall commence from the date of approval hereof by the Mayor, and such compensation shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax and shall be in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of The City of New York, or by any law of the State of New York.

3. Upon the revocation or termination by limitation of this consent, the United Dressed Beef Company, its successors or assigns, shall, at its own cost, cause all that portion of East Forty-fourth street and of First avenue, affected by this consent, to be restored to its proper and original condition.

4. The conduit shall be constructed solely upon the terms and conditions hereafter to be approved by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The said United Dressed Beef Company shall submit such working plans of construction as may be required by said officials, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said conduit and the mode of protection of all subsurface structures now in East Forty-fourth street.

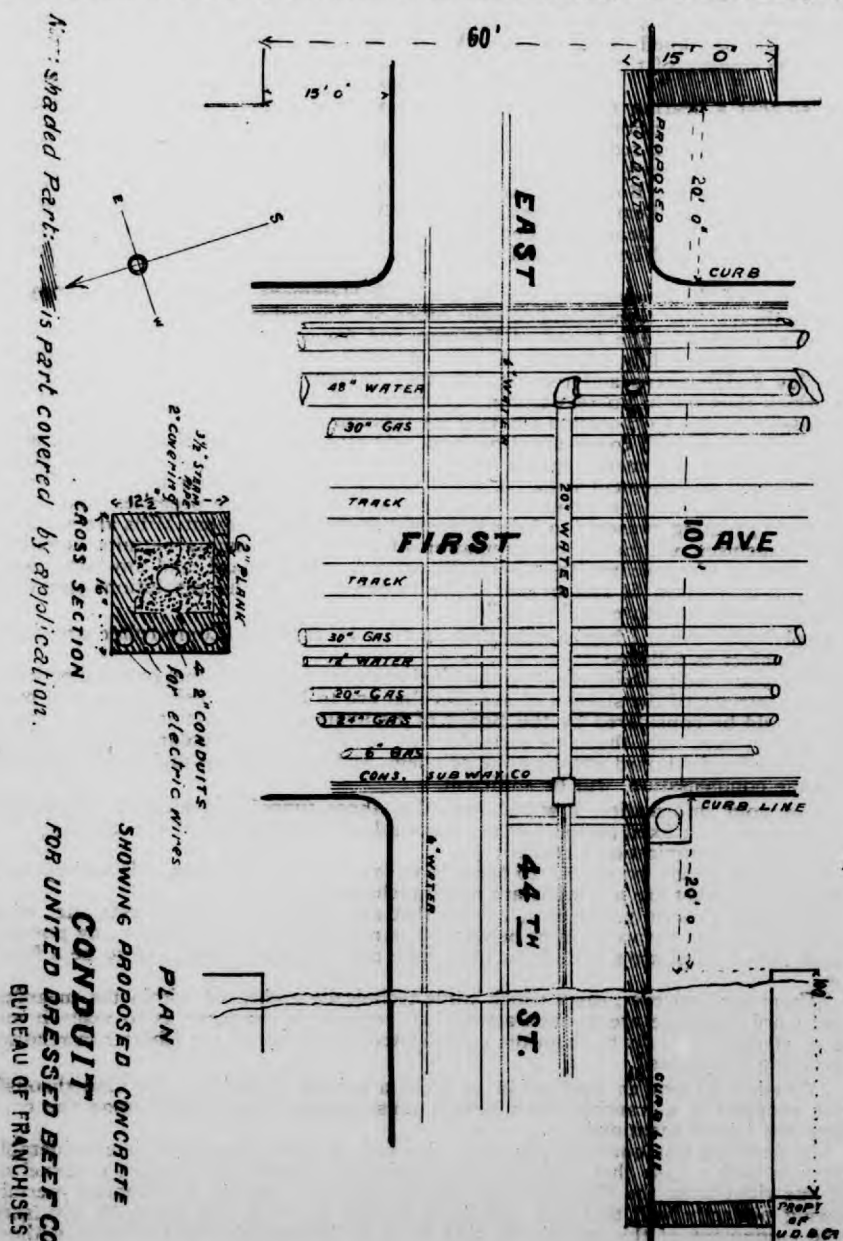
5. The said United Dressed Beef Company shall be liable for all damages to persons or property including the street and subsurface structures therein, by reason of the construction or operation or maintenance of said conduit, and it is a condition of this consent that The City of New York assumes no liability to either persons or property on account of this consent.

6. The conduit shall be constructed, maintained and operated and all pipes installed therein subject to the supervision and control of the proper authorities of The City of New York, who shall at all times be permitted to examine and inspect the same.

7. This consent is granted on the further and express condition that all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may be hereafter adopted, shall be strictly complied with.

8. The United Dressed Beef Company, its successors or assigns, shall commence the construction of said conduit under this consent and complete the same within ninety (90) days from the approval of this consent by the Mayor, otherwise this consent shall be forfeited forthwith, and without any proceedings either by law or otherwise, for that purpose; provided, however, that such time may be extended by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a period not exceeding sixty (60) days.

9. The United Dressed Beef Company shall deposit the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750) with the Comptroller of The City of New York, which

sum shall be security for the performance of all the terms and conditions of this consent. In case of default in the performance by said petitioner of any of the terms and conditions referred to herein, The City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and materials to be furnished for the performance thereof, after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from said fund, without legal proceedings. In case of any draft so made upon the security fund, the said petitioner shall, upon thirty days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750), and in default thereof, the consent hereby granted may be canceled and annulled.

10. This consent shall not become operative until said petitioner shall execute, under seal, an instrument in writing wherein he shall agree to abide by and perform all the terms and conditions of this consent, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York within thirty (30) days after the approval of this consent by the Mayor.

11. The said United Dressed Beef Company, its successors or assigns, shall give notice in writing to the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment when work shall be actually begun under this consent, and also when the said conduit shall be completed.

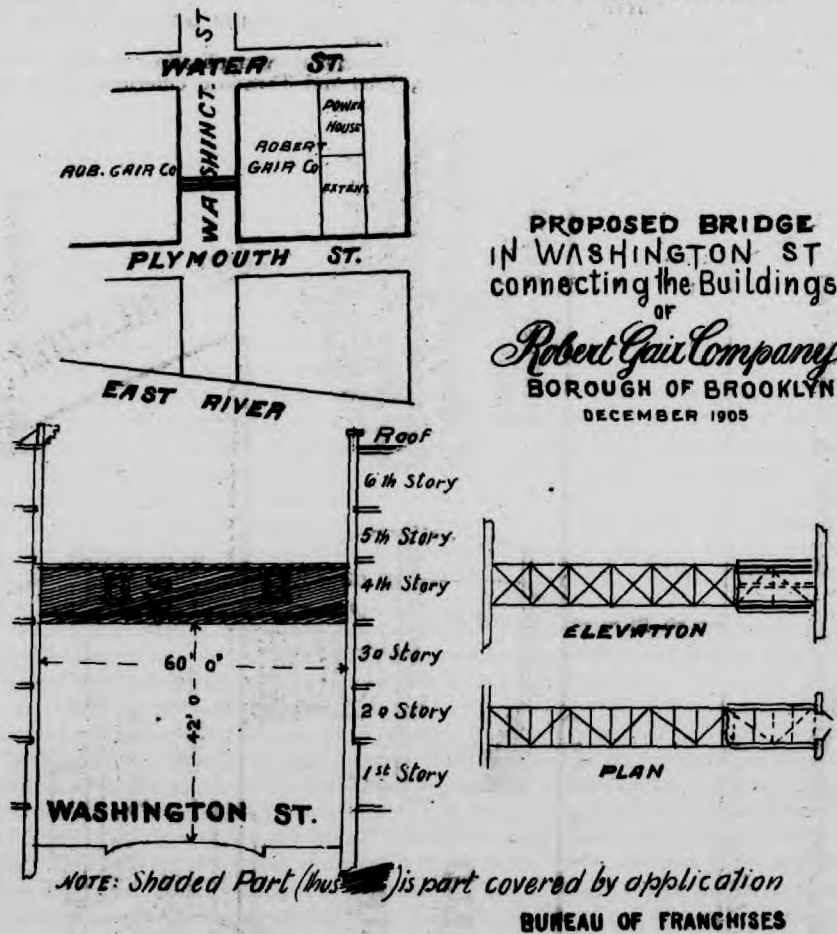
DEAR SIR—We desire to secure permission to construct and maintain a steel bridge across the foot of Washington street connecting two of our factories, said bridge to be formed of two steel trusses 60 feet long, 8 feet high and 8 feet wide, covered with corrugated iron, suspended at an elevation of 42 feet above the curb, for the purpose of carrying stock partly in process of manufacture from one building where the first operation is performed to the second building where the work is completed. This is to avoid the loss and delays which occur in the winter time when the streets are in bad condition and it is difficult to convey goods across on hand trucks.

Accompanying this application, which is drawn up in duplicate, we are sending a tracing and five black prints showing the location and detail of the proposed structure.

We respectfully petition your Board to grant us this privilege and fix the compensation at such an amount as may be determined an equivalent thereof.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The Robert Gair Company of Brooklyn under date of December 1, 1905, through its vice-president, George W. Gair, has made application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for permission to construct and maintain a bridge across Washington street, Borough of Brooklyn, between Plymouth and Water streets, in order to connect two of its factories on either side of Washington street.

The proposed bridge is to be a single span of 60 feet in length, that being the width of Washington street; 8 feet 6 inches in height, 8 feet in width, and placed at an elevation of 42 feet above the curb, all to be inclosed with corrugated iron. The proposed bridge is shown on a plan accompanying the application, entitled:

"Plan of proposed bridge across Washington street, between Plymouth and Water streets, connecting two buildings of the Robert Gair Company; to accompany the application of the Robert Gair Company, dated December 1, 1905, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the right to construct and maintain the same."

—and signed George W. Gair, vice-president.

The petition states that the bridge is desired only for the purpose of carrying, by hand trucks, stock in process of manufacture from one building where the first operation is performed to the other building where the work is completed, in order to avoid the loss and delay incident to crossing the street in bad weather.

The Robert Gair Company also submits a letter, herewith attached, addressed to it by Messrs. Robertson and Hardie, the owners and occupants of the only property on Washington street not owned and occupied by the Robert Gair Company, stating that they have no objections to the proposed bridge.

Copies of the application and the plan were sent to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and Fire Commissioner, with the request that they have the project examined and report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment whether there are any objections to the granting of the privilege asked, or in the event of the consent being given, whether in their opinion any special conditions should be imposed. The replies received are herewith attached, the Fire Commissioner suggesting that fireproof doors be placed at each end of the bridge. No objections were made to the grant.

Undoubtedly such a bridge would be more or less unsightly, but being in the manufacturing district and at an elevation of 42 feet above the surface, I believe it would be less objectionable than a similar structure in the thickly populated district. There seems to be no other objection to such a bridge, and I would therefore recommend that the privilege be granted for a term not exceeding ten years, but as is usual with pipe and tunnel privileges, revocable at the pleasure of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment upon six months' notice in writing to the company.

There is no precedent for fixing the annual charge in a case of this character, but it would seem that such a charge should not be less than that heretofore imposed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for tunnel privileges under streets. Representatives of the Robert Gair Company have stated that they are willing to pay \$150 a year for the privilege. This seems to be a fair and satisfactory sum for this particular case, and I would recommend that the annual charge be fixed at \$150 per annum for the first five years and \$175 per annum for the last five years.

In the event of the consent being granted, the construction should be completed within a reasonable time, say, six months from the date of the approval of the resolution. The bridge should be used only as a passageway for the conveying of materials and for no other purpose whatsoever, and no materials should be allowed to remain thereon.

As is customary in the case of consents for tunnel privileges, a security deposit should be required to insure the performance of the terms and conditions of the consent. It is recommended that this amount be \$750.

The proposed resolution attached hereto embodies the usual conditions employed in consents for tunnel privileges, which are applicable to this case, as well as the special conditions mentioned above. The condition covering the suggestion of the Fire Commissioner in relation to fireproof doors at each end of the bridge is also inserted. It is believed that this form of consent will properly protect the City.

The following was offered:

Resolved, That the consent of the Corporation of The City of New York be and the same is hereby given to the Robert Gair Company, the owner of certain buildings on the easterly and westerly sides of Washington street, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, between Water street and Plymouth street, to construct, maintain and use a single span bridge across Washington street, connecting their buildings as shown in red on the plan entitled:

"Plan of the proposed bridge across Washington street, between Plymouth and Water streets, connecting two buildings of the Robert Gair Company. To accompany the application of the Robert Gair Company, dated December 1, 1905, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for right to construct and maintain the same,"

—and signed Robert Gair Company, George W. Gair, Vice-President—a copy of which is annexed hereto and made a part hereof upon the following terms and conditions:

1. Said consent shall be for a term not exceeding ten years from the granting of said consent; provided, however, that the same may be canceled and annulled upon six months' notice in writing to the Robert Gair Company, its successors or assigns, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, and thereupon all the rights of the said Robert Gair Company, its successors or assigns, over and upon the aforesaid portion of Washington street, by virtue of this consent, shall cease and determine.

2. The Robert Gair Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay into the treasury of The City of New York the following sums of money:

During the first five years, an annual sum of \$150.

During the second five years, an annual sum of \$175.

The payment of such sums shall commence from the date of the approval of this resolution by the Mayor. Such sums shall be paid into the treasury of The City of New York on November 1 of each year, provided, however, that the first payment shall be only that proportion of \$150 as the time between the approval of this consent and November 1 following shall bear to the whole year. The compensation hereby reserved shall commence from the date of approval hereof by the Mayor, and such compensation shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but shall be in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of The City of New York or by any law of the State of New York.

3. Upon the removal of the Robert Gair Company from either one or both of the buildings connected by the proposed bridge or upon the revocation or termination by limitation of this consent, the said Robert Gair Company, its successors or assigns, shall, at its cost, cause the bridge and all its appurtenances to be removed from the line of the street if required so to do by The City of New York, or its duly authorized representatives. If the bridge to be constructed by the Robert Gair Company under this permit shall not be required to be removed, it is agreed that the said bridge shall become the property of The City of New York.

4. The consent hereby given shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by acts of the Robert Gair Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

5. The bridge shall be separated from the buildings by fireproof doors of design and material satisfactory to the Fire Commissioner, and shall otherwise be constructed in the latest improved manner, solely upon the terms and conditions hereafter to be approved by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn. The said Robert Gair Company shall submit such working plans of construction as may be required by said officials, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said bridge.

6. Said bridge shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of the proper authorities of The City of New York, and said bridge shall be open at all times to the inspection of all the authorities who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of The City of New York.



7. Said bridge shall be for the exclusive use of the Robert Gair Company as a passageway for the conveying of materials between the aforementioned buildings and for no other purpose whatsoever and no material of any kind, character or description shall be allowed to remain standing thereon.

8. The grant of this privilege is given subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of the abutting property or any other person or persons may have in and to the streets where the bridge is to be constructed, and the said Robert Gair Company shall be liable for all damages to persons or property, including the street, by reason of the construction or operation or maintenance of said bridge, and it is a condition of this consent that The City of New York assumes no liability to either persons or property on account of this consent.

9. This consent is granted on the further and express condition that all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may hereafter be adopted, shall be strictly complied with.

10. Said Robert Gair Company, its successors or assigns, shall commence the construction of said bridge under this consent and complete the same within six months from the day of the approval of this consent by the Mayor; otherwise this consent shall be forfeited forthwith and without any proceeding, either at law or otherwise, for that purpose; provided, however, that such time may be extended by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a period not exceeding three months.

11. This consent is upon the express conditions that the said Robert Gair Company, within thirty days after its approval by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750) either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance of the terms and conditions of this consent, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the consent. In case of default in the payment of the annual charge, The City of New York shall collect the same with interest, from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the Robert Gair Company.

In case of any drafts so made upon the security fund, the Robert Gair Company shall, upon thirty days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750), and in default thereof the consent hereby given may be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York acting on behalf of said City. No action or proceedings or rights under the provisions of this section shall effect any other legal rights, remedies, or cause of action belonging to The City of New York.

12. The Robert Gair Company shall notify the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment upon the commencement of the work, and shall also inform said Secretary when it has completed all the work authorized by this consent.

13. This consent shall not become operative until said Robert Gair Company shall duly execute an instrument in writing wherein said Robert Gair Company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this consent fixed and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York within thirty days after the approval of this consent by the Mayor.

And said Robert Gair Company shall promise, covenant and agree in said instrument to hold The City of New York harmless for all damages to persons or property which may result from the construction, use, maintenance or operation of the bridge hereby authorized.

*Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:*

The petition of the Atlantic Hotel Supply Company respectfully shows:

1. That the said Atlantic Hotel Supply Company is a copartnership doing business under said name, and which said company is composed of Frank J. Stoltz, Thomas J. Connors and Everett Wilson; that said name has been duly registered pursuant to the statute in that case made and provided. That said copartnership is engaged in the business of selling meat at wholesale and retail at No. 676 Hudson street, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York.

2. That said Atlantic Hotel Supply Company respectfully petitions your Honorable Board to grant a license to lay two (2) pipes, each of not more than six (6) inches in diameter, in the said Borough of Manhattan, extending from a point at or near the southerly side of Fourteenth street, about forty-three (43) feet and six (6) inches westerly of the westerly side of Ninth avenue, and thence extending in an easterly direction to the said premises, No. 676 Hudson street, as appears by the map or plan submitted herewith; the said pipes to be placed in a trench not more than three (3) feet wide, and located four (4) feet beneath the surface of the said streets and avenue; that the distance to be covered by said pipes will be about three hundred and fifty (350) feet, as appears by the said maps.

3. That said pipes are to be used to convey cold air to said No. 676 Hudson street for refrigerating purposes, and are to be connected with pipes of the Manhattan Refrigerating Company, which has a line of similar pipes at said place of beginning. That the refrigeration thus procured will be applied to the preservation of the large stock of meat or beef that will be continuously kept by your petitioners on said premises.

4. That your petitioners have taken a lease of said premises, No. 676 Hudson street, for a term of five (5) years, and will expend in fitting the same up, for the purposes of said business, about twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), and the said premises, when improved, will contain every facility for the carrying on of said meat business in a manner that will be in conformity with the highest sanitary standards. The said premises are in close proximity to Gansevoort Market, which is the largest beef market in the United States, and the undertaking of your petitioners will meet the constantly increasing demands from hotels and other places of like character and give them greater opportunities to purchase meat. That the refrigeration to be obtained by the proposed pipe line is necessary to enable your petitioners to carry on their said business on said premises.

5. That if the petition should be granted your petitioners will furnish such indemnity or security as the City may require to insure the faithful compliance with the conditions that it may see fit to impose upon your petitioners in relation to the license applied for.

6. That said proposed pipe line will not interfere with any fixtures or appurtenances forming part of the water mains, sewers, conduits, subways or sub-pavement fixtures of any kind, nor with any other subsurface structures existing by virtue of any

franchises heretofore granted, all of which appears by the said map herewith submitted.

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned, owners of the premises known as Nos. 503 to 513 Fulton street and No. 242 Duffield street, Borough of Brooklyn, as well as the owners of the premises known as No. 237 Duffield street, in said borough, respectfully request permission to construct, maintain and use a tunnel under and diagonally across Duffield street from No. 237 to No. 242 aforesaid. This tunnel is to be used for carrying steam pipes from the plant to be installed in the premises No. 237 to the large business building, which has a frontage on Duffield street as well as on Fulton street, and is made necessary by reason of the fact that the large vault under the sidewalk in Fulton street, which contains four immense boilers, is shortly to be removed under orders of the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners, to permit of the construction of a four-track subway, station, etc., at that point. After careful investigation by engineers, it was found necessary for the undersigned to purchase the premises No. 237 Duffield street and there install the power plant, boilers, etc., the premises themselves affording no available space for this purpose. The proposed tunnel is indicated on the accompanying diagram and is to occupy a space of eight feet and eight inches in height by seven feet and eight inches in width.

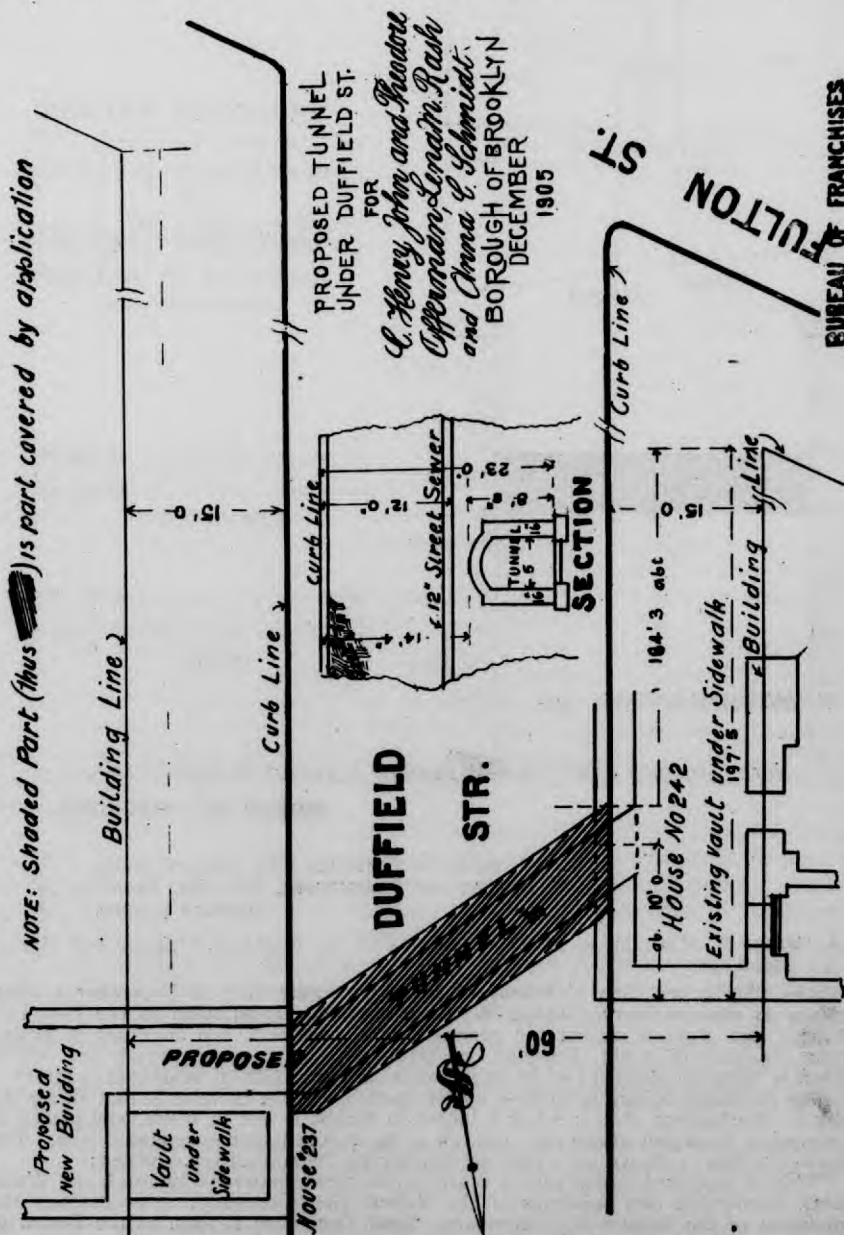

*Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:*

SIR—C. Henry Offerman and others, under date of December 14, 1905, have made application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the right to construct, maintain and use a tunnel under Duffield street, between Fulton and Willoughby streets, Borough of Brooklyn. The proposed tunnel is to be 8 feet in width, 8 feet 8 inches in height, and to be placed 14 feet below the surface of the street. The tunnel is desired for the purpose of carrying steam pipes from the plant to be installed in the premises located on the east side of Duffield street to a large business building fronting on Fulton street and the west side of Duffield street.

The proposed tunnel is shown on a plan accompanying application, entitled "Diagram to accompany application of C. Henry, John and Theodore Offerman, Lena M.



Rasch and Anna C. Schmidt, dated December 4, 1905, for a right to construct, maintain and use a tunnel under Duffield street, in the Borough of Brooklyn," and signed by Hamilton & Beckett, attorneys.

The petition recites that the tunnel has been made necessary by reason of the fact that the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners has ordered four boilers,



used by the petitioners and located in a vault under Fulton street, removed, in order to permit the construction of the underground rapid transit railroad in that street, and it is therefore necessary to establish a plant elsewhere.

Copies of the application and plan were sent to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, with the request that they have the application examined and report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment whether there are any objections to the granting of the privilege asked, or in the event of the consent being given, whether, in their opinion, any special conditions should be imposed. The replies received are herewith attached, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn suggesting that the petitioners should agree to properly support and safeguard all sewer construction and to replace the pavement, in accordance with the specifications of the contract under which the present asphalt pavement was laid. The Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity suggests that if at any time in the future any subsurface construction requires any alteration in the tunnel, the petitioners should bear the expense thereof.

In a previous report I recommended that the minimum sum to be required by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for such a privilege be fixed at \$100 per annum, such sum to be increased by 5 per cent. at the expiration of each five years during the term of the consent, and I would propose that such minimum sum be exacted in this case.

I see no objection to granting the consent, and would therefore recommend that it be given for a period not exceeding 25 years, but as has been customary in such cases, revocable at the pleasure of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment upon six months' notice in writing to the applicant, and with the annual charge to be fixed as follows:

- For the first five years of the consent, \$100 per annum.
- For the second five years of the consent, \$105 per annum.
- For the third five years of the consent, \$110 per annum.
- For the fourth five years of the consent, \$116 per annum.
- For the fifth five years of the consent, \$122 per annum.

It is recommended that the amount of the security deposit which is customarily required for like privileges be fixed at \$750, the same to be deposited with the Comptroller as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the consent.

The proposed resolution attached hereto embodies the usual conditions employed in consents for tunnel privileges, and contains a clause which stipulates that the construction shall be done solely upon the terms and conditions hereafter to be approved by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and that the petitioners shall submit to those officials working plans giving in detail the method of construction, etc. This provision gives those officials an opportunity to make the conditions above referred to suggested by them, and it is believed that the form of consent will properly protect the City.

Henry, John and Theodore Offerman, Lena M. Rasch and Anna C. Schmidt, dated December 14, 1905, for right to construct, maintain and use a tunnel under Duffield street, in the Borough of Brooklyn," by Hamilton & Beckett, attorneys, a copy of which is annexed herewith and which is made a part thereof upon the following terms and conditions:

1. Said consent shall be for a term not exceeding twenty-five years from the granting of said consent, provided, however, that the same may be canceled and annulled upon six months' notice in writing to the said applicants, their successors or assigns, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, and thereupon all the rights of the said applicants, their successors or assigns, in and upon the aforesaid portion of Duffield street shall cease and determine.

2. The said applicants, their successors or assigns, shall pay into the Treasury of The City of New York the following sums of money:

- During the first five years the annual sum of \$100.
- During the second five years the annual sum of \$105.
- During the third five years the annual sum of \$110.
- During the fourth five years the annual sum of \$116.
- During the fifth five years the annual sum of \$122.

Such sums shall be paid into the Treasury of The City of New York on November 1 of each year, provided, however, that the first payment shall be only that proportion of \$100 as the time between the approval of this consent and November 1 following shall bear to the whole year. The compensation hereby reserved shall commence from the date of approval hereof by the Mayor, and such compensation shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but shall be in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of The City of New York or by any law of the State of New York.

This consent at the end of the said twenty-five years, unless sooner revoked, shall expire by limitation, and said tunnel shall thereupon become the property of The City of New York without any proceedings either by law or otherwise.

3. Upon the revocation or determination by limitation of this consent, said applicants, their successors or assigns, shall, at their own cost, cause all that portion west of Duffield street affected by this consent to be restored to its proper and original condition if required to do so by The City of New York, or its duly authorized representative, and in default of performance of this condition by said applicants, their successors or assigns, the proper authorities may cause such tunnel to be removed from beneath the street aforesaid, and the street to be restored in the manner above described, at the expense of the said applicants, their successors or assigns, and such expense shall be recoverable by The City of New York by action at law or otherwise from the applicants.

If the tunnel to be constructed by the said applicants under this consent shall not be required to be removed, it is agreed that the said applicants, their successors or assigns, shall allow The City of New York to use said tunnel if the City so desires for any purpose whatsoever.

4. The consent hereby given shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest, or property therein pass to or vest in any other persons or corporation whatsoever either by the acts of said applicants, their successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

5. The tunnel constructed under this consent shall be maintained and operated solely for the purpose of conducting water, steam and electricity from the power plant of said applicants to their buildings on the opposite side of the street and for their exclusive use.

6. The tunnel shall be constructed in the latest improved manner, solely upon the terms and conditions hereafter to be approved by the President of the Borough

of Brooklyn and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The said applicants shall submit such working plans of construction as may be required by said officials, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said tunnel and the mode of protection of all subsurface constructions now in Duffield street.

7. Said tunnel and all pipes and conduits laid therein shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of the proper authorities of The City of New York, and said tunnel shall be open at all times to the inspection of all the authorities who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of The City of New York, and such sum for restoring the pavement as may be required by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn shall be paid by the said applicants.

8. Said applicants, their successors or assigns, shall allow a right of way through any part of the tunnel constructed under the permission hereby granted to be used by The City of New York for any and all subsurface constructions now or hereafter placed by it in that portion of Duffield street occupied by said tunnel, and agrees to reimburse the City for any expense other than the ordinary which it may incur in any subsurface construction, including the laying of pipes, conduits, sewers or like structures, in any street or avenue, by reason of the presence of the tunnel to be constructed under this consent.

9. Said applicants shall be liable for all damages to persons or property, including the street and sewers therein, by reason of the construction, maintenance or operation of said tunnel, and it is a condition of this consent that The City of New York assumes no liability to either person or property on account of this consent.

10. This consent is granted on the further and express condition that all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be hereafter adopted shall be strictly complied with.

11. Said applicants, their successors or assigns, shall commence the construction of said tunnel under this consent and complete the same within ninety days from the approval of this consent by the Mayor, otherwise this consent shall be forfeited forthwith and without any proceedings, either at law or otherwise, for that purpose; provided, however, that such time may be extended by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a period not exceeding sixty days.

12. This consent is upon the express condition that the said applicants, within thirty days after its approval by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750), either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance of the terms and conditions of this consent, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the consent and the repairs of the street pavement. In case of default in the performance by said applicants of such terms and conditions The City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges shall collect the same with interest from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said applicants.

In case of any drafts so made upon the security fund, the said applicants shall, upon thirty days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750); and in default thereof the consent hereby given may be canceled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City. No action or proceedings or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

This consent shall not become operative unless the said applicants shall, within thirty days after its approval by the Mayor, duly execute under their hand and seal an instrument in writing, wherein said applicants, their successors or assigns, shall promise, covenant and agree on their part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this consent fixed and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York within thirty days after the approval of this consent by the Mayor.

The said applicants shall promise, covenant and agree in said instrument to hold The City of New York harmless from all damages to persons or property which may result from the construction, use, maintenance or operation of the tunnel hereby authorized.

## PROPOSED TERMS AND CONDITIONS.

For a grant of a franchise or right and privilege to lay, erect, construct and maintain suitable wires and other conductors with the necessary poles, pipes, conduits and appliances in, over and across the streets, avenues and highways within the territory comprised by The City of New York, as now constituted, with the sole object and purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating a telephone system within the said territory, and such right, privilege and franchise shall be bound by the following conditions:

First—The term of such franchise shall be a period of twenty-five years from the date of the signing of the contract, with a privilege of renewal upon similar terms.

It shall be provided that if the City determines to take this plant at the expiration of this franchise, the Atlantic Telephone Company shall be paid its fair value, to be determined by the Comptroller and by the Company, and the two to select a third appraiser.

Second—The grantee shall pay to The City of New York annually during the first five years seventy-seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$77,500); annually during the second five years one hundred and sixteen thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$116,250); annually during the third five years one hundred and fifty-five thousand dollars (\$155,000); annually during the fourth five years one hundred and ninety-three thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$193,750); annually during the fifth five years two hundred and thirty-two thousand five hundred dollars (\$232,500); and will deposit with the City, upon the acceptance of the grant, or upon the signing of the contract, the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) in cash as an evidence of its good faith.

Third—The said annual charge or payments, as above specified, shall continue throughout the whole term of the franchise granted, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any telephone company providing for payments for similar rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sub-lease of the rights or franchises granted, or any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose, unless the said assignment, lease or sub-lease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of the grant, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions as to payments, any statute or any condition herein contained to the contrary notwithstanding. It is agreed that any and all payments to be made by the terms of the contract to The City of New York by the company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but that such payments shall be in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of The City of New York, or by any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—The company shall install, free of charge to The City of New York, so many telephones in each public office, as may be required by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, not to exceed one thousand (1,000), which the company shall maintain at its own cost and expense, and shall furnish free service throughout the term of the grant from such telephones to any point within the limits of The City of New York.

Fifth—The rights and franchises granted shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner either by the act of the grantee, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statute relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, to any person or corporation whatsoever, nor shall the company, its successors or assigns, in any manner consolidate or pool its stock, business or interest or enter into any agreement for a division of business, interest or territory, or to prevent competition or a reduction in rates, or acquire, own or make use of or in any manner exercise control over any of the rights, privileges, franchises or stock, or use, own, control or operate any of the property, works, plants or appliances of any such person or corporation without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—The company shall construct, maintain and operate its telephone system subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of the City, and in strict compliance with all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may be adopted affecting telephone companies operating in The City of New York.

Seventh—The telephone system shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of automatic or manual telephone construction and operation with most modern and improved appliances.

Eighth—The company shall furnish a service which shall be first-class in all respects and continuous for twenty-four hours in each day, except for interruption from unavoidable causes.

The company shall not require or receive any deposit or advance payment in excess of what is reasonably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts so paid the company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Unpaid bills, unless due from an owner, shall never be charged against property, and no person not himself in arrears shall be denied service because any previous occupant of the same premises is in arrears to the company for service.

Ninth—Within sixty days after the execution of the grant, the grantee shall execute contracts covering the same period as the grant, with other telephone companies, such contracts to provide for long distance service between New York and all cities within a radius of one thousand miles, having a population of four thousand or over, and shall file certified copies thereof in the office of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The grantee shall herewith agree that the charges to the public in any portion of The City of New York for the long distance service provided for in said contracts shall not at any time exceed seventy-five (75) per cent. of the present schedule of the New York Telephone Company.

Tenth—The wires of the grantee shall be employed for no other purposes than those explicitly set forth herein, except by consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and the grantee binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes or to illegal places.

Eleventh—The rates for telephone service throughout The City of New York shall never be in excess of the following rates, to wit:

Twelfth—During the life of the franchise the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, shall have absolute power to regulate maximum rates, provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Thirteenth—The president and treasurer of the company shall, on or before November 1 in each year, make a verified statement to the Comptroller, giving a full and accurate account of the actual cost of the construction of the plant of the company, the investments, gross receipts and disbursements of said company, together with such other information as may be demanded by the Comptroller of The City of New York, which statement shall be for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and shall be made in form satisfactory to the Comptroller, and the books of the company shall be open for inspection and examination by said Comptroller, or his duly appointed agents, for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of such statements.

In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions of the grant, the same may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to said grantee, or at the option of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that all property constructed and in use by virtue of the grant, shall thereupon become the property of The City of New York, without proceedings at law or in equity.

Fourteenth—In the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx all cables and wires of the company shall be placed in ducts, which shall be leased from the Empire City Subway Company, or its successors; and in any other part of The City of New York, if the company shall at any time during the term of the contract, construct subways for electrical conductors, it shall agree to sell them and so much of their equipment as The City of New York desires, to the City upon demand duly made in writing by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, upon payment of their cost less depreciation up to the time of purchase, and The City of New York shall agree to lease to the company such space as it may require in subways, either constructed by the City or the company, in an amount equal to that sold to the City. If The City of New York constructs subways for electrical conductors, it shall agree to lease to the company such space as it may require for its business in such subways, and the company shall agree to place underground any or all of its wires and conductors within one year after being required so to do by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

In the event that the City shall not provide the means and opportunity for the company to string its wires in the subways of The City of New York, Borough of Manhattan, then the company shall not forfeit the cash sum deposited to guarantee the company proceeding under the rights granted in the franchise.

If the grantee construct subways or electrical conductors in the boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens or Richmond, it shall be required to provide one duct in every trench opened for the exclusive use of the Police, fire and ambulance service of The City of New York, free of charge, either for construction or service in connection therewith.

The grantee shall agree to install signal telephone instruments for the use of the Police Department in the Borough of Manhattan of a similar type to those now in use, without charge therefor, and it shall be required to install annually thereafter at the direction of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment so many instruments and at such places as said Board may designate. The grantee shall agree that no charge shall be made to The City of New York either for such instruments, their installation or for service in connection therewith.

Fifteenth—The company shall furnish weekly to the Police Commissioner of The City of New York a report showing the number and location of all instruments installed by lease or sale from the company, and also all connections made or authorized by it, together with the name of the person contracting for such instrument or connection. The company shall further agree to allow the Police Commissioner of The City of New York and such members of the Police Department as he shall designate for that purpose to examine any instrument that has been installed or any connections which have been made by the company, and shall immediately remove any instrument upon notice so to do from the Police Commissioner of The City of New York.

The City of New York shall agree that all inspections to be made under the provisions of this paragraph shall be made only by the Police Officers above designated.

All contracts made by the company with subscribers shall contain provisions in accordance with the above and shall provide that such subscribers shall allow inspections of instruments and connections to be made at any time by said Police Officials.

Sixteenth—The company shall file in the office of the Comptroller on the first Monday in January and July in each year a map, plan or diagram upon which shall be plainly marked and designated the streets and public places upon which are now laid or proposed to be laid the several conduits and ducts necessary to lay the cables and wires to be used by said company, together with a statement showing the number of ducts in each street. Within sixty days thereafter the company shall file a supplementary statement, if required by the Comptroller, which shall contain such further information as he may require as to the physical and financial standing of the company.



Seventeenth—The company shall be liable for all damages to persons or property, including the street pavement and the subsurface structures in the streets, by reason of the construction or operation of the system authorized by the grant, and it is a condition of the grant that The City of New York assumes no liability to persons or property on account of the grant.

Eighteenth—It shall be a condition in said grant that the grantee shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken by reason of said grant.

Nineteenth—The grantee shall commence construction within six months from the date of the signing of the contract, and within five years thereafter shall have erected and completely equipped in the boroughs of the City as follows:

Twentieth—This grant is upon the express condition that the said company, within thirty days after the execution of this contract and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by said company of the terms and conditions of the contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the franchise granted, in default of which payment of the annual charge, the Comptroller, acting in behalf of the City, shall collect same, with interest, from such fund after five days' notice in writing to the president of said company.

In case of failure of the said company to comply with the terms of this contract relating to the filing of annual statements and the commencement and increase of construction, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or other municipal officials, made pursuant to the terms of the contract, or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force, in such case and in any of these events the said company shall pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a penalty of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for each violation; and in case of any violation of the provisions relating to the use of wires the said company shall pay to the Comptroller of said city, for each violation, a penalty of not less than one hundred dollars (\$100) and not more than five hundred dollars (\$500), to be fixed by the said Comptroller.

Twenty-first—The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties provided in the grant shall be as follows:

The Comptroller of The City of New York, on complaint made, shall, in writing, notify said company through its president, to appear before him on a certain day, not less than five days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If said company fail to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appear, in the judgment of the Comptroller, to be in fault, said Comptroller shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to him to be just, and without legal procedure, withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund, the said company shall, upon ten days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sufficient sum to restore said security fund to the original amount of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), and in default thereof the contract may be revoked at the option of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of the grant shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

In case of failure of the company to make the weekly statement required by section 15 on or before Wednesday of each week for the week ending on the preceding Saturday, the company shall be liable to a penalty of two hundred dollars (\$200), and in case it shall appear that the instruments of the company have been used in connection with an illegal act, with or without the knowledge of the company or its agents, the company shall be liable to a penalty of five hundred dollars (\$500).

Twenty-second—The grant shall not become operative until the grantee shall duly execute, under its corporate seal, an instrument in writing, wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree, on its part and behalf, to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements fixed and contained in the grant, and shall file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York within thirty days after the approval of the grant by the Mayor.

Which was referred to the Bureau of Franchises.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the District Attorney, New York County, relative to the transfer of \$9,000 from the account Supplies and Contingencies, including Arrearages, to the account Salaries, for the year 1906:

DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S OFFICE, COUNTY OF NEW YORK,  
January 2, 1906.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, New York City:

GENTLEMEN—I hereby request that the sum of \$9,000 be transferred, from the appropriation for Supplies and Contingencies, 1906, including Arrearages (\$50,000), District Attorney's office, New York County, to the appropriation for Salaries for 1906, District Attorney's office, New York County, Assistants, Deputy Assistants, Clerks, Stenographers, County Detectives, Messengers and other employees, including Stenographer to the Grand Jury (\$232,500), for the reason that the latter appropriation is insufficient for the proper conduct of the public business of this Department.

It is proposed to expend the said sum of \$9,000 to increase the force of this Department and provide for a few increases of salary of Clerks who have been in the employ of this Department for many years, and who by reason of their long experience have been very valuable to the office. I wish also to respectfully call your attention to the fact that the said increases have already been approved by your Honorable Board at a recent meeting of same.

During the past four years of my administration the professional and administrative staff of this Department has been and now is totally inadequate to keep up with the large volume of work devolving on this Department, and necessitates an extraordinary amount of night work, which said staff have been and are now performing, in addition to working on Sunday and legal holidays, thus being laboriously employed early and late without any regard to the regular hours prescribed for the opening and closing of public offices.

Owing to the lack of stenographic force many of my professional staff, in the preparation of their cases for trial, such as taking statements, affidavits, etc., of witnesses, are compelled to take the same in long hand.

Time and time again I have called the attention of your Honorable Board to this condition of affairs, but my requests were overlooked. Recently I have been compelled to abolish several positions in order that the money appropriated for said positions could be utilized to advantage in increasing the force and the general efficiency of this Department.

It is submitted therefore that this Department may be properly equipped in order to transact its business on the same plane as any private law offices, and it is absolutely essential that this request be granted.

In order that your Board may see at a glance the reasonableness of my request for the small increase of force to the General Administration account, I beg to sub-

mit the following comparative statement showing the appropriations granted for Salaries for General Administration of this Department during the year 1900 and the year 1905, and the number of persons on the pay-rolls for the months of July, 1900, and 1905, chargeable to that account:

It will be observed that there were 128 persons employed in the year 1900, and that our present limited force consists of only 110 persons. The recent official census shows that there is a population of 2,371,099 in the County of New York, which is an increase of 320,499 since the year 1900. Even with this enormous increase in the population of this County and the constantly increasing business of this Department, the amount allowed for Salaries for 1906 for General Administration, \$232,500, plus the \$9,000 requested herein is \$2,910 less than the amount allowed for the year 1900.

In order that your Board may have an idea as to the large volume of business which now devolves upon this Department I beg to state that formerly an average of 4,500 complaints were received annually, excepting the year 1900, which was unusually large, during which year 4,840 complaints were received. During the year 1905, 8,480 complaints were received, showing an increase of over 75 per cent over the year 1900. These figures indicate roughly the increase of the work in the office.

Wherever the designation General Administration appears herein it refers to this Department as it existed prior to the addition of the Bureau of Special Sessions Informations, and is still maintained separate and distinct from said Bureau. Without any initiative on my part this Bureau was created by an Act of the Legislature, chapter 563 of the Laws of 1904, and employs ten persons, whose salaries aggregate \$17,700 per annum, and this office is put to considerable additional expense in furnishing supplies, defraying expenses of County Detectives and other general expenses incurred by said Bureau. The additional appropriation of \$17,760 granted in 1905 was only sufficient to pay the salaries of the persons appointed in said Bureau; therefore it cannot be maintained that there was any increase in the appropriation for the general business of this office.

As an offset to the \$50,000 annually allowed for contingent expenses, it is proper to add that during the year 1905 I have collected on forfeited recognizances and paid over to the City Chamberlain the sum of \$49,750. The amounts collected on forfeited recognizances under my administration of this Department during the years 1902, 1903 and 1904, amounted to \$14,408.58, \$53,644.41 and \$62,013.04 respectively, these latter amounts being vastly in excess of any sums that have ever been collected under any prior administration.

In view of the foregoing conditions I respectfully request that your Honorable Board grant the desired transfer at your earliest convenience.

The Secretary presented the following resolution of the Board of Aldermen and report of the Principal Assistant Engineer, Department of Finance relative to the issue of \$10,000 Special Revenue Bonds for the purpose of providing means to purchase two automobiles for the use of the President, Borough of Manhattan and the offices of the Commissioner of Public Works:

Resolved, That, pursuant to subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds in the amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for the purchase of two (2) automobiles for the use of the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the offices of the Commissioner of Public Works, respectively.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, December 19, 1905, three-fourths of all the members elected voting in favor thereof, having been first advertised as required by law. Approved by the Mayor, December 27, 1905.

I would report that I see no objection to the President of the Borough of Manhattan purchasing the automobiles, but I do not think they can be purchased, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, but can only be obtained by the issue of Special Revenue Bonds, and think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to subdivision 8 of section 188, of the amended Greater New York Charter, to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$10,000, for the purpose of purchasing two (2) automobiles, as requested by the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

Whereas, It is believed to be to the best interests of the vast east side, in that thereby the streets and thoroughfares may be rid of the many pushcarts there employed, to have The City of New York erect a public market in which said pushcarts can be housed; and

Whereas, The establishment of such a market, to which should be confined the many pushcarts which are being operated in the locality referred to, would aid materially in keeping the streets clean and wipe out a condition which is a menace to health, and thus make living there much pleasanter to the many who cannot afford better quarters; and

Whereas, The acquisition of the necessary land, the erection thereon of a two or three story open structure, the top of which could also be used as a roof garden or playground for children, would afford market facilities for at least, if not more, than two thousand pushcarts, relieving the present congested condition of the streets, it is believed could be arranged so as to bring sufficient revenues to the City as would provide for maintenance and pay the interest on the bonds necessary to establish it; and

Whereas, It is further believed that the erection of such a structure would prove most beneficial if confined within the area south of Houston street and east of the Bowery; therefore

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and hereby is requested and earnestly urged to take under advisement the plan outlined in the preamble hereof, with the hope that therefrom may be evolved an idea as to the solution of the problem which the growing evil of the pushcart is foisting upon the municipality.

Resolved, further, If the same be deemed necessary, that his Honor the Mayor be and he is hereby requested to appoint a commission to inquire into and report within reasonable time on the feasibility of the plan hereinbefore suggested.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, December 12, 1905, a majority of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

SIR—In the matter of the communication of the Commissioner of Jurors of Queens County, under date of November 25, 1905, addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in relation to the action of the Board created by chapter 441 of the Laws of 1899, fixing the salaries of the Commissioner, Assistant Commissioner and Clerk to the Commissioner of Jurors of Queens County, I beg to report as follows:

Chapter 441 of the Laws of 1899, entitled "An Act to create a Commissioner of Jurors in the several counties of this State," creates the office of the Commissioner of Jurors for the County of Queens. Subdivision 1, section 2 of this Act provides that such Commissioner and his successor shall be appointed as follows:

"If only one justice of the Supreme Court resides in such county, he and the county judge and the county clerk shall make the appointment."

The annual salary of such Commissioner is provided under section 4 of said act, as follows:

"A commissioner of jurors shall be entitled to receive an annual salary, payable monthly by the county treasurer. \* \* \* In counties having a population of more than 150,000 and not more than 300,000, not exceeding \$3,000 to be fixed by the resolution creating the office. \* \* \*"

Section 6 of said Act provides for the appointment and compensation of Assistant and Clerk, as follows:

"The commissioner of jurors may appoint one assistant commissioner of jurors, whose compensation shall be fixed by the board appointing the commissioner, and one clerk, whose compensation shall be fixed in the same manner; such compensation shall be paid by the county in equal monthly instalments \* \* \*"

The Departmental estimate for 1906, submitted by the Commissioner of Jurors of Queens County, requested appropriation on salary account, as follows:

Commissioner .....	\$3,000 00
One Deputy Commissioner .....	2,000 00
One Clerk .....	1,500 00
One Stenographer .....	600 00
Total .....	\$7,100 00

The amount allowed by the Board of Estimate in the budget as adopted for 1906 provided the compensation for the office of Commissioner of Jurors, as follows:

Salary of Commissioner .....	\$3,000 00
Salary of Deputy and Clerk .....	2,700 00
Total .....	\$5,700 00

The Commissioner of Jurors submits a certified copy of the resolution adopted by the appointing board under date of November 21, 1905, fixing the salaries of the Commissioner, Assistant Commissioner and Clerk, as follows:

Commissioner .....	\$3,000 00
Assistant Commissioner .....	2,000 00
Clerk .....	1,500 00
Total .....	\$6,500 00

It will be noted that this action was taken subsequent to the adoption of the Budget of 1906, and that salaries so fixed for Assistant Commissioner and Clerk will exceed the appropriation by about \$800.

The compensation named as salary of the Commissioner of Jurors is that fixed by the law, namely, chapter 441 of the Laws of 1899, for counties having a population of more than 150,000. The Commissioner submits with the said communication letter of the Secretary of the State of New York, under date of November 2, 1905, which states the population of Queens County as 198,241. The Secretary of State, however, calls attention to the fact that the compilation has not as yet been submitted to the

Legislature, but said compilation is now in process and will undoubtedly be presented on or before January 15. He states that before the work is completed, the figures given out are subject to change. It, however, may be assumed that corrections in the compilation will not bring the number of the census below that of 150,000 named in the statute.

In the matter of the compensation fixed by the said Board as the salary for the Assistant Commissioner and one Clerk, it appears in accord with the provisions of the law quoted above, and the compensation named is reasonable in comparison with salaries paid in the office of the Commissioners of Jurors in New York County and in Kings County.

In view of the action taken by the appointing Board, as named under the statute creating the office of the Commissioner of Jurors for Queens County, and as such action seems to be in conformity with the law, I would recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve the adoption of a resolution fixing the salaries of the Commissioner of Jurors, the Assistant Commissioner of Jurors, and Clerk of the Commissioner of Jurors of Queens County, at the amounts named by the appointing Board, a form of resolution for said purpose being attached hereto.

J. T. MAHONEY, Esq., Auditor of Accounts:

SIR—On July 30, 1905, there was filed in this Department, through Thomas C. O'Sullivan, attorney, sixty-four claims of James Brennan, and sixty-three other employees of the Department of Street Cleaning for compensation alleged to be due them for services rendered to the Department of Street Cleaning in excess of the number of hours constituting a day's labor. These claims were filed in accordance with the provisions of chapter 748 of the Laws of 1905, which law was passed at a session of the Legislature of 1905 and authorized and empowered, notwithstanding any existing statute to the contrary, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York to examine and inquire into and to audit and allow the claims of the various persons named therein, said claims being for extra compensation for overtime services rendered as Drivers in the Department of Street Cleaning of The City of New York. Moreover, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in its discretion may direct the Comptroller of The City of New York to pay the amounts which it may have audited and allowed out of any unexpended balance of any appropriation made to any of the departments of The City of New York for any purpose for the year 1904, or the Board may provide for the amount which it may have audited and allowed by the issue and sale of the Corporate Stock of The City of New York.

All of the names of the individuals whose claims are considered in this report are set forth in the bill. By sections 1 and 2 of chapter 385 of the Laws of 1870, known as the "Labor Act," it was provided that eight hours should constitute a legal day's work, and was expressly applicable to mechanics, workmen and laborers in the employment of State or municipal corporations. This law was in force during the period from May 2, 1892, to April 26, 1894, the period covered by the claims in question, and was even re-enacted in the amended Labor Law of 1897 (section 3, chapter 415 of the Laws of 1897). On May 2, 1892, a bill was passed by the Legislature and became a law (chapter 415 of the Laws of 1892), in section 1 of which it was provided that whenever the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning shall deem it necessary, he may require any driver to work overtime, in which event the driver shall be entitled to receive extra compensation at the rate of 25 cents per hour of such overtime. Under this Act of 1892, various suits were brought and judgment rendered in favor of the plaintiffs against The City of New York in the action of Patrick J. McNulty, assignee of several hundred employees of the Department of Street Cleaning (see 168, New York, 117).

I am informed by T. C. O'Sullivan, Esq., attorney for the claimants mentioned in chapter 748 of the Laws of 1905, that following the precedent created by the decision in the McNulty case, he filed several hundred claims in the year 1898 on which actions were about to be commenced against the City for the recovery of various amounts alleged to be due certain parties for overtime services, when, in December, 1898, a fire occurred at No. 258 Broadway, in which building he stated his offices were located; that the fire completely destroyed the building and its contents, including all the papers in these proposed actions against the City; that the claimants having, in many cases, left the Department and the addresses being unknown to him, it was practically impossible to get the cases again in shape for prosecution, as even the names of the claimants had been lost; that, after considerable delay, some of the cases were at last put in shape for action, and the summonses and complaints were served upon the City; that owing to the lapse of time occasioned by the destruction of these papers by fire, more than six years had passed since the right to extra compensation had accrued to the claimants, and the City, in its answer, set up as a bar to these actions, the statute of limitations; that these circumstances impelled him to apply for relief to the Legislature, and his efforts resulted in obtaining the passage of the bill known as chapter 748 of the Laws of 1905.

In the schedule annexed to this report, I have set forth the names of the sixty-four claimants whose claims come within the provisions of chapter 748 of the Laws of 1905, but not in the order mentioned in the law. Of these sixty-four, eighteen, those numbered from 1 to 18 in the schedule, should be disallowed, as said claimants were appointed subsequent to April 26, 1894, the date when the period for which overtime was allowed had expired. Ten of these claimants, numbered 19 to 28 in the schedule annexed, were paid for their claims, having been included in the judgment to P. J. McNulty. These, therefore, are duplicate claims and should be disallowed. The names of three of said claimants, numbered 29 to 31 in the schedule, did not appear on the pay-rolls of the Department of Street Cleaning at any time between the dates of May 2, 1892, and April 26, 1894, the period of allowance. Thirty-three claimants, numbered



32 to 64 on the schedule, however, would seem to be entitled to various allowances for overtime.

Peter S. Doring, an Examiner employed in this Department, in his report dated December 8, 1905, states that he has made an exhaustive examination of the time books of the various stables to which these claimants have been assigned in order to ascertain the exact amount of overtime for which these claimants should be allowed. The result of this investigation is shown in the annexed schedule, indicating in three columns the actual overtime for which allowance should be made to these claimants during the years 1892, 1893 and 1894.

In certain instances it was impossible to ascertain from the time books of the various stables the exact or actual amount of time over the regulation eight hours per day for which the claimants are entitled to an allowance. In these cases the Examiner ascertained from the various registers the number of days on which the claimants were employed over the regulation number of hours per day and allowed them an averaged overtime of four hours per day, as this was the amount of time allowed by the Referee in the P. J. McNulty case to those claimants where it was impossible to ascertain, without great difficulty, the actual overtime the claimant was employed. This allowance is acceptable to the attorney for the claimants and undoubtedly represents considerable saving to the City.

The number of hours' overtime allowed to claimants is shown in the schedule under the column entitled "Averaged Overtime." The actual overtime of the various claimants ascertained by the Examiner from the time books in the various stables, taken in consideration with the averaged overtime allowed the claimants, where the actual overtime could not be readily ascertained, represents the total amount of overtime for which the claimants are entitled to extra compensation at the rate of twenty-five cents per hour. The last column of the schedule represents the amount to which these claimants are entitled. The thirty-three claims which should be allowed amount to the sum of \$6,285.56.

From all the foregoing facts it is, therefore, respectfully recommended that Claims Nos. 1 to 18, inclusive, on the annexed schedule, be disallowed, as claimants were appointed subsequent to April 26, 1894, the date of the expiration of the period for which allowance has been made; that Claims Nos. 19 to 28, inclusive, on the annexed schedule, be disallowed, as these claimants were previously paid by judgment to their assignee, P. J. McNulty; that Claims Nos. 29 to 31, inclusive, on the annexed schedule, be disallowed, as said claimants were not on the payrolls of the Department of Street Cleaning; that Claims Nos. 32 to 64 on the schedule annexed be allowed in the amounts set forth therein, aggregating the sum of \$6,285.56.

It is further recommended that the claims and all papers in connection therewith be transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its consideration in accordance with the provisions of chapter 748 of the Laws of 1905.

Mr. JAMES T. MAHONEY, Auditor of Accounts:

SIR—In reclaim 45244 of James Brennan and others for overtime as Drivers in the Department of Street Cleaning, Borough of Manhattan, during the years 1892, 1893 and 1894, I report as follows:

The above claims are similar in character to the claims of Patrick J. McNulty and 797 others, which were paid upon a report of the referee, Hon. H. W. Bookstaver, and an opinion of the Appellate Division under date of April, 1901.

In arriving at the amounts due the various claimants I have taken the exact time each driver left the stable (in which he was employed) in the morning and the exact time of his return to the stable in the afternoon, and all time in excess of nine hours per day is credited to overtime (this is allowing the drivers one hour for dinner).

There are two stable daily blotters missing, one belonging to Stable A and another of Stable E, and in the absence of the exact time I have allowed claimants four hours per day for the days actually worked.

In the cases of Woods and Muller, who were regular Drivers detailed to act as Clerks, I have allowed them four hours per day. I am informed by the various stable Foremen that said Clerks Woods and Muller were compelled to work from twelve to sixteen hours per day. The said Woods and Muller have no claim for overtime for the year 1894, as they were paid for said overtime, as shown on the weekly payrolls.

In the cases of James Fitzgibbons and Frank Miller, who were detailed Drivers to work in the stable and also acted as Watchmen, I am informed that they were compelled to work twelve or more hours per day and therefore I have allowed them four hours per day during such detail.

The various amounts allowed claimants are more than 50 per cent. less than the amounts allowed on the McNulty judgments, owing to the fact that with the exception of the above four cases overtime is allowed only for the exact time shown on the daily stable blotters, while in the McNulty judgment overtime at the rate of four, four and one-half, five and six hours per day was allowed each claimant for the total number of days worked during the entire period (that is, between May 2, 1892, and April 26, 1894). The total amount due the various claimants who would be entitled to overtime amounts to \$6,213.45.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

At the session of the Legislature of 1905 a bill was passed which became chapter 748 of the Laws of 1905, which said bill authorized and empowered the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York to examine and inquire into, and to audit and allow, the claims of various persons named in the bill for compensation for services rendered as Drivers in the Department of Street Cleaning in The City of New York.

The men named in the bill were all Drivers employed in the Street Cleaning Department in the years 1892, 1893 and 1894. During those years the Drivers in the Street Cleaning Department were entitled to extra pay of twenty-five cents per hour overtime, whenever such overtime was necessary to the work of the Department or was directed by the Commissioner in charge. The right to compensation under the law that then existed has been determined by the Court of Appeals in the case of McNulty vs. City of New York, and judgment against the City in that case has been paid. The men whose names are set forth in chapter 748 of the Laws of 1905 have not received any compensation for work in excess of the usual number of hours during the years 1892 to 1894. They were not included in the action of McNulty against the City, but their claims can be in no way distinguished from those which the City has already paid in that action.

In the action of McNulty against the City the Commissioners of Street Cleaning were called as witnesses and testified that the work done by the Drivers in excess of the ordinary day's labor was necessary not only to the proper working of the Department but also for the preservation of the health of the City, and that the men were kept at work upon a promise that they would receive compensation as provided by law.

The men in whose behalf this application is made had begun proceedings looking to the enforcement of their rights against the City, and the papers were in my hands and active preparation for the prosecution of actions against the City in progress when, in December, 1898, a fire occurred at No. 258 Broadway, at which number my office was located, which completely destroyed the building and its contents, including all the papers in the actions against the City. The men having in many instances left the Department and their addresses being unknown, it was practically impossible to get the cases again in shape for prosecution, as even the names of the plaintiffs have been lost. After considerable effort the cases were at last put in shape for action and a summons and complaint served upon the City. Owing to the delay occasioned by the destruction of my papers more than six years had elapsed since the right to the extra compensation had accrued, and the City in its answer set up as a bar to the

action the statute of limitation. I have applied to the various Corporation Counsels with a view to obtaining a waiver of that defense on the ground that the claim was an entirely valid and just claim and the delay in bringing the action was occasioned through no fault, but the City's representatives, while not denying the intrinsic merit of the case, have stated that in their opinion their position as representatives of a municipality was such that they could not legally waive the statute. For that reason an application for relief was made to the last Legislature, which resulted in a bill authorizing this Board to consider and allow the claim. I would therefore respectfully request your Honorable Board at its next meeting to take up the question of the allowance of these claims and to make provision for their payment.

Section 1. Clifford, John Mack, Thomas Finn, Cornelius Grinnan, John Kelly, John Brady, Thomas Carmine, Thomas Searson, Michael Mallery, James McHeary, John Condon, Chris. Geyer, Nicholas Glavin, Patrick Whalen, Fred. Worth, James McCormack, Peter Woods, Nicholas Moran, James Clark, Thomas Knevenee, Alfred P. Thorley and Phillip Morrison, for compensation, under chapter four hundred and fifteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-two, for services rendered as drivers in the department of street cleaning in the city of New York; and to audit and allow such claims, or such part thereof as the said board may deem just and equitable, as a charge against the city of New York.

Sec. 2. The said board of estimate and apportionment may, in its discretion, direct the comptroller of the city of New York to pay the amount which it may have audited and allowed as aforesaid out of any unexpended balance of any appropriation made to any of the departments of the city of New York for any purpose for the year nineteen hundred and four; or the said board of estimate and apportionment may provide for the amount which it may have audited and allowed as aforesaid by the issue and sale, in the manner provided by law, of corporate stock of the said city and including the said amount in the first estimate made by the said board for the expenses of said city after the audit and allowance of the said amount, or in any other manner which to the said board may seem expedient and appropriate.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

GENTLEMEN—I have received a letter from your Secretary, Deputy Comptroller Stevenson, dated December 12, 1905, transmitting a certified copy of a resolution requesting me to prepare an amendment to section 724 of the Laws of 1905, in regard to an additional supply of pure and wholesome water for The City of New York, so as to provide that bonds for water purposes, which now are limited to a period of twenty years, may be issued for a longer period in the same manner as other Corporate Stock of the City.

I have prepared such a bill and inclose a copy thereof.

I will also see that the bill is introduced into the Legislature at an early date.

An act to amend section thirty-three of chapter seven hundred twenty-four of the laws of nineteen hundred and five, in regard to an additional supply of pure and wholesome water for The City of New York.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section thirty-three of chapter seven hundred twenty-four of the laws of nineteen hundred and five, entitled "An act to provide for an additional supply of pure and wholesome water for the city of New York; and for the acquisition of lands or interests therein and for the construction of the necessary reservoirs, dams, aqueducts, filters and other appurtenances for that purpose; and for the appointment of a commission with the powers and duties necessary and proper to attain these objects" is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 33. The comptroller of the city of New York is hereby authorized and directed to raise from time to time by the issuance of corporate stock of the city of New York, in addition to the amount which he is now authorized to raise for such purposes, such sums of money as shall be sufficient to pay for the salaries of the board of water supply and their subordinates, and for any real estate, or for the extinguishment of any right, title or interest therein acquired, and all damages appraised to persons interested therein, together with all expenses necessarily incurred in surveying, locating and acquiring title to said real estate, or in extinguishing claims for damages thereto, and also to pay for all construction work that may be contracted for and accomplished under this act, and for all other expenses of any nature or kind whatever that may be legally incurred under the provisions of this act. Such corporate stock shall be issued by the comptroller when thereto authorized by the board of estimate and apportionment, without the concurrence or approval of any other board or public body, and as provided in section one hundred and sixty-nine of the Greater New York charter [but the term of the corporate stock issued under the authority of this act shall not exceed twenty years]. Such corporate stock shall be deemed to be bonds to provide for the supply of water within the meaning of section ten of article eight of the constitution of the state of New York, and in accordance with the provisions of said section a sinking fund shall be created on the issuing of the said corporate stock for its redemption by raising annually by taxation a sum which will produce an amount equal to the sum of the principal and interest of said corporate stock at its maturity. All payments from the proceeds of the sale of such corporate stock shall be made upon proper vouchers and authorizations in accordance with the provisions of this act and with the laws, regulations and practice now in force in regard to the payment of money by the comptroller of the city of New York.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

To obtain the best results, taking into consideration the bids, it is my opinion that all the pianos should be divided between William Knabe & Co. and George Steck & Co.

I am informed by the Building Bureau of the Board of Education that the awards were so distributed in order to include and encourage as large a number of manufacturers as possible, and still obtain good results; this has been the custom in the past and is favorable to competition.

While I consider my contention correct, that the pianos made by Walters Piano Company will not wear as well, or give as good results as those manufactured by William Knabe & Co. or George Steck & Co., but since the award is small, only three (3) pianos at \$235 each, making a total of \$705, it may be well to give the Walters Piano Company a trial, and if this meets with your approval I think the awards as submitted by the Board of Education may receive the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

SIR—By agreements dated June 19, 1903, and April 28, 1905, made pursuant to chapter 425 of the Laws of 1903, as amended by chapter 639 of the Laws of 1904, between The City of New York, through the Board of Estimate and Apportionment,

and the New York and Harlem Railroad Company and its lessee, the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, to provide for further regulations of the terminal and approaches thereto of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, at and north of Forty-second street, in The City of New York, and the public highway structures over said terminals and approaches; both of these agreements have been duly approved of as to form by the Corporation Counsel and signed by the Mayor, after due authorization by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

In said agreements certain obligations are required by the City; in the first agreement, section 10, dated June 19, 1903:

"The party of the first part (The City of New York) covenants and agrees to bear and pay to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, in full compensation for all the work, labor and services to be rendered and for material furnished by said The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, as hereinbefore and as in said act provided, the sum of six hundred thousand dollars (\$600,000) of the cost and expense of constructing the viaducts and bridges carrying the streets from Forty-fifth street to Fifty-sixth street, both inclusive, over the said tracks, and also the entire expense of constructing the viaduct carrying Park avenue over the said tracks from Forty-ninth street to Forty-fifth street, and also the expense of constructing so much of the viaduct or bridge carrying Forty-fifth street over the said tracks as shall be in excess of fifty feet in width, at the time or times, and in the manner following, which were agreed upon by the said railroad company and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York at or prior to the time of approving and filing the said plans and profiles, to wit:

"The party of the first part shall and will pay the said The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company for the work as the same progresses upon vouchers certified by the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the manner and at the periods hereinafter provided. Whenever and as often as the said The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company shall have actually expended for or on account of the work of, or for materials for, constructing such viaducts or bridges, in accordance with the said plans and profiles, approved as aforesaid, a sum or sums aggregating not less than fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), a certificate shall be prepared by the Engineer and approved by the President or Vice-President of the said The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, showing that such sum or sums have been expended for the said purposes, or some of them, and containing a detailed statement of the amount or amounts so expended and the particular purposes of the several expenditures, and such certificate shall be delivered to the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York. The said Board shall, as soon as practicable thereafter, verify the correctness of such certificate and either accept such certificate as correct, or if it finds it to be incorrect, return such certificate to the said The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, specifying in writing the respects in which it finds such certificate to be incorrect; and the said The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company shall give to the said Board, or to such person or persons as it may in writing designate, opportunity to verify the correctness of any such certificate. Upon the verification of the correctness of any such certificate, or if any such certificate shall be found to be incorrect, upon its being corrected, the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall thereupon forthwith prepare and certify a voucher in due form for payment by the party of the first part to the said The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company of seventy-five per cent. of the sum shown by such certificate to have been actually expended for the work so done and material so furnished, and the amount so certified by the said Board shall be forthwith paid by the party of the first part to the said The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company. Upon the completion of the work of constructing such viaducts and bridges, in accordance with the said plans and profiles, approved as aforesaid, a final certificate shall be prepared by the Engineer and approved by the President or Vice-President of the said The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, showing the fact of such completion and the total amount expended by said The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company for or on account of the construction of such viaducts and bridges and for all the work, labor and services done or performed, and for all materials furnished by the said The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, for and on behalf of and as contractor with the said party of the first part, as herein and as in said act provided. Such final certificate shall be delivered to the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York and shall be subject to the like verification as the certificates hereinbefore mentioned. Upon the verification of the correctness of any such final certificate, or if any such final certificate shall be found to be incorrect, upon being corrected the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall thereupon prepare and certify a voucher in due form for payment by the party of the first part to the said The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company of the balance of the entire expense of constructing the viaduct carrying Park avenue over the said tracks from Forty-ninth street to Forty-fifth street, the balance of the expense of constructing so much of the viaduct or bridge carrying Forty-fifth street over the said tracks as shall be in excess of fifty feet in width, and the balance, if any, of the said sum of six hundred thousand dollars (\$600,000) of the cost and expense of constructing the viaducts or bridges carrying the streets from Forty-fifth street to Fifty-sixth street, both inclusive, over the said tracks. The amount so certified by the said Board shall be forthwith paid by the City to the said The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company. Nothing here contained shall be so construed as to require the party of the first part in any event to pay more than the said sum of six hundred thousand dollars (\$600,000) on account of the cost and expense of constructing the viaducts or bridges carrying the streets from Forty-fifth street to Fifty-sixth street, both inclusive, over the said tracks, except that it shall pay the entire expense of constructing so much of the viaduct or bridge carrying Forty-fifth street over the said tracks as shall be in excess of fifty feet in width."

In agreement, dated April 28, 1905, section 10:

"The party of the first part (The City of New York) covenants and agrees to bear and pay to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company seventy (70) per cent. of the entire cost and expense of constructing the viaduct carrying Park avenue over the said tracks from Forty-ninth street to Forty-fifth street, in accordance with the said plans and profiles, approved as aforesaid on the day of the date hereof; payments on account of such expense to be made in the manner agreed upon and specified in paragraph 10 of the grant and agreement made by and between the parties hereto, June 19, 1903; and the said The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company covenants and agrees to bear thirty (30) per cent. of the entire cost and expense of constructing the said viaduct; and it is understood and agreed by and between the parties hereto that for the purpose of arriving at the cost and expense of constructing the said viaduct, one-half of the areas of the viaducts formed by the intersection of the said viaduct carrying Park avenue over the said tracks with the viaducts carrying Forty-sixth street, Forty-seventh street and Forty-eighth street, respectively, over the said tracks shall be chargeable to the cost and expense of constructing the said viaduct carrying Park avenue over the said tracks, and one-half of said areas shall be chargeable to the cost of constructing the viaducts carrying Forty-sixth street, Forty-seventh street and Forty-eighth street, respectively, over the said tracks."

The amount the City will have to pay I estimate at \$810,000, calculated as follows:

By first agreement, dated June 19, 1903, for the construction of viaducts and bridges carrying streets from Forty-fifth to Fifty-sixth streets, both inclusive .....	\$600,000 00
By second agreement, April 28, 1905, for the construction of the viaduct carrying Park avenue over said tracks from Forty-ninth to Forty-fifth streets; estimated cost of entire structure, \$300,000; City's share, 70 per cent. of \$300,000.....	210,000 00

While the agreements have been properly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, no money has been authorized by the Board to provide for the City's share in these improvements.

Section 7, chapter 425, of the Laws of 1903, reads:

"The Comptroller of The City of New York shall from time to time, when authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and without the concurrence or approval of any other Board or public body, prepare and issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York for the purpose of bearing and paying such portion of the cost and expense of constructing the viaducts and bridges mentioned in section 1 of this act, as is provided to be borne by The City of New York."



The work upon these improvements is about to begin, and I would suggest that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 7, chapter 425, of the Laws of 1903, to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of \$810,000, to provide for the improvement of Park avenue, from the south side of Forty-fifth street to the north side of Fifty-sixth street, as set forth in agreements between The City of New York, through the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and the New York & Harlem Railroad Company, and its lessee, the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, under dates of June 19, 1903, and April 28, 1905.

It will not be necessary to issue the entire amount at once. The Comptroller can issue amounts from time to time which will be sufficient to carry on the work. But it is essential that the full amount be authorized in order that the contracts or agreements may be certified to by the Comptroller.

I would also suggest that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment transmit a certified copy of the agreement to the Comptroller, in order that they may be certified to by the Comptroller and registered in the Finance Department. Until this is done no payments for the work can be made by the Comptroller.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the General Attorney of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, and report of the Principal Assistant Engineer of the Department of Finance, relative to the conveyance of certain parcels of land in the Borough of The Bronx to said railroad company.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller, City of New York, New York City:

DEAR SIR—I understand that Mr. Mortimer J. Brown, of your office, has appraised the park lands in the neighborhood of Washington Bridge, which the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company desires to acquire from the City under the provisions of chapter 548 of the Laws of 1905, at \$1 per square foot for so much thereof as lies west of the railroad tracks; 80 cents per square foot for that part east of the railroad tracks, and \$1.40 per square foot for that part in the neighborhood of the bridge near Fordham.

I beg to say that the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company will acquiesce in these valuations, and will consent to pay for the land acquired on that basis.

Part of this land, however, is under a lease or license from the City to certain boat clubs which have boat houses on the Harlem river. As the prices fixed by Mr. Brown represent the full value of the lands, I suggest that the right of the boat clubs be extinguished either (1) by the City; (2) by the Company, subject to the approval of the City as to the amount paid; or (3) by condemnation proceedings instituted by the company.

In case either the second or third method is adopted, then the City is to repay the company whatever amount is to be paid to the boat clubs.

I shall be pleased if you can arrange to have this matter put in such shape at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on Friday as will make it possible to close it at once.

SIR—Mr. Albert H. Harris, general attorney for the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, in communication addressed to the Comptroller under date of December 28, 1905, in relation to the application of the railroad company, for the conveyance to them by The City of New York, of certain parcels of land in the Borough of The Bronx, states that the railroad company will acquiesce in the valuations appraised by Mr. Mortimer J. Brown of this Department, and will consent to pay for the land acquired on that basis.

All of the parcels the City owns free and clear and are not encumbered with any condition, except Parcel 4, which has been leased to a number of boat clubs.

Chapter 301 of the Laws of 1903, authorized and empowered the Park Commissioner of the Borough of The Bronx, in his discretion, to lease such portion of Macomb's Dam Park, in the Borough of The Bronx, of The City of New York, as he may deem necessary unto any athletic or boat club or association, for such period of years and under such terms and conditions as the said Park Commissioner may deem advisable for the establishment in said park of a public recreation ground for out-door athletics and the erection of suitable buildings for boat houses, dressing rooms, lavatories and public comfort stations.

Acting under the authority of said Act, the Commissioner of Parks, executed the following leases of land and land under water abutting on the railroad right of way, from Macomb's Dam Park, which are represented on the map hereto attached, entitled "Bulkhead line, scale 1 inch, equals 50 feet." As Parcel 4 encroaches upon these leases, any conveyance of that parcel must be subject to them:

In relation to Parcel 4, Mr. Harris says:

"Part of this land, however, is under a lease or license from the City to certain boat clubs which have boat houses on the Harlem river. As the prices fixed by Mr. Brown represent the full value of the lands, I suggest that the right of the boat clubs

be extinguished either (1) by the City, (2) by the company, subject to the approval of the City as to the amount paid, or (3) by condemnation proceedings instituted by the company."

The area of Parcel 4 is 18,088 square feet, using the rate as quoted by Mr. Harris, the value of the plot would be \$18,088. I have been informed by a representative of the railroad company that the boat clubs demand at least \$10,000 for the damages sustained to their leases.

If the railroad's proposition is carried out, the City would only receive about \$8,000 for land that is worth at least \$18,000.

The leases I consider a very bad bargain for the City and all in the interest of the boat clubs.

In order that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly consider the question of the damages sustained by the boat clubs by the conveyance of this strip of land to the railroad company, I would suggest that the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, be directed by the Board to prepare a map or plan showing the location and dimensions of said parcels leased to the several boat clubs in Macomb's Dam Park, and also show on said map the location and dimensions of all buildings, floats, etc., erected by the said boat clubs.

SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Health, held December 20, the following preambles and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The President of this Board lately obtained options on certain parcels of land located in the Town of Mount Hope, Orange County, State of New York, containing 1,200 acres, more or less, for the purpose of locating a sanatorium for the care and treatment of persons resident in The City of New York affected with tuberculosis; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment at its meeting held July 14, 1905, did authorize the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$250,000 (two hundred and fifty thousand dollars) for the purpose of providing means to acquire the site located in the Town of Mount Hope, Orange County, State of New York, covered by the options obtained by the President and for the erection of proper and suitable buildings to be used for the care and treatment of such persons as were admitted; and

Whereas, No provision has been made for the moneys required for the care of the patients to be treated in this sanatorium for the payment of the salaries of Hospital Physicians, Internes, Nurses, Orderlies and other employees thereat, or for the purchase of supplies and such contingencies as are required; therefore be it

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 535 of the Laws of 1893, the Board of Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York hereby certifies to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the sum of \$150,000 (one hundred and fifty thousand dollars) should be appropriated for the year 1906 for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses required to be incurred by the Board of Health for the preservation of the public health in caring for the patients to be treated in the Tuberculosis Sanatorium, conducted and operated by the Department of Health of The City of New York, in the Town of Mount Hope, Orange County, State of New York, for the payment of the salaries of Hospital Physicians, Internes, Nurses, Orderlies and other employees thereat, and for the purchase of supplies and such contingencies as are required.

It is the purpose of the Health Department to acquire about 1,200 acres in all and to divide the whole site into two divisions, the upper portion to be used for hospital purposes, the lower portion to be utilized for a dairy farm.

The farm-houses and out-buildings, stables, etc., upon the nine (9) farms acquired and under contract, with certain alterations, can be used for administrative purposes, lodgings for Physicians, Nurses, Cooks, Laborers, dining room purposes, etc. There are, in my opinion, at present no buildings which can be used for the accommodation of tuberculosis patients.

It is the purpose of the Health Department to erect small one-story frame buildings holding about sixteen (16) patients each, and to begin the use of the site for hospital purposes as quickly as possible. For this purpose the appropriation of \$150,000 is requested.

In my opinion, any appropriation made will not be available before February 1, and it will be impossible to provide places for any patients before May 1, and on account of the necessary delay in erecting new buildings, etc., \$70,000 is all that can be profitably used during the coming year for running expenses.

Therefore, if the financial condition of the City warrants the expenditure, I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to chapter 535 of the Laws of 1893, to issue Revenue Bonds in the amount of \$70,000, to provide for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses required to be incurred by the Board of Health for the preservation of the public health, in caring for the patients to be treated in the Tuberculosis Sanatorium, conducted and operated by the Department of Health of The City of New York, in the Town of Mount Hope, Orange County, State of New York, for the payment of the salaries of Hospital Physicians, Internes, Nurses, Orderlies and other employees thereat, and for the purchase of supplies and such contingencies as are required.

DEAR SIR—I beg to submit herewith for your consideration a plan for constructing a foot bridge over the tracks of the New York Central Railroad, from the foot of West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street to the dock and other property on the west side thereof.

The contract plans for sections Nos. 3 and 4 of the extension of Riverside Drive provide for a retaining wall at the foot of this street, which cuts off access to the property on the other side of the railroad, unless a flight of steps be constructed immediately down to the tracks, or a foot bridge be built as shown by the accompanying plan.

It seems to me very dangerous to have persons crossing the tracks at grade, especially as the railroad company has just put in a third track at the point, thus making three tracks to cross. Trains are constantly being switched about at this point, which makes it extremely dangerous, especially in summer time, when thousands of people are coming and going from the bathing sheds on the river front.

The cost of the foot bridge as shown on the drawing will not exceed five thousand dollars, and would give people a safe passage over the tracks, relieving the City from any possible damage suits on account of loss of life.

I respectfully ask, therefore, that you will approve the construction of the bridge, and secure the sanction of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the expenditure of the money, as the work can lawfully be done under the present contract for the extension of Riverside Drive.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—With the accompanying communication addressed to the President of the Borough of Manhattan by Mr. F. Stuart Williamson, Consulting Engineer in charge of the extension of the Riverside drive, is submitted a plan for a footbridge over the tracks of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company from the foot of West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street to the dock and other property lying west of the railroad tracks, and the Engineer recommends that the plan be approved, and the construction of this bridge be authorized, at an expense not to exceed \$5,000.

The contract plans for sections 3 and 4 for the extension of Riverside drive provide that West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street shall be carried to the Riverside drive extension at its full width; that at the easterly side of the drive the street shall be contracted to a width of 40 feet and carried beneath the solidly built portion of the new drive by a tunnel expanding to a width of about 48 feet under the overhanging section of the Riverside drive, and stopping at a retaining wall to be built just back



of the westerly property line of the City, which is the easterly property line of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad. The plans do not provide any means of crossing the railroad tracks, although temporary wooden steps have been built by which the level of the tracks is reached when these must be crossed at grade. While the water front has not been developed for commercial purposes, there are a number of bath houses at and near the foot of this street, and I have been informed that not a season has passed without a fatal accident at this crossing. It would certainly appear most unwise for the City to perpetuate these conditions by providing steps leading to the easterly side of the tracks, and at the same time it would seem unfair to shut off all access to the property lying west of the railroad, especially as very few streets will be carried across or under this new driveway. It is not improbable that after the development of this water front a highway bridge will be carried across the tracks, and that, therefore, a temporary wooden structure might answer the purpose of a footbridge. Developments which would require such facilities are very improbable for a number of years, and it would seem wise to provide a more permanent steel bridge. The estimate named in the letter of the Consulting Engineer seems somewhat high for such a structure, and I am advised that it has not been based upon any careful computation of the amount of steel required, but the recommendation limits the cost to what is considered a safe outside figure. The proposed bridge is eight feet in width and will have a clear span of 75 feet.

In my judgment the City should not invite further accidents, and I would recommend that the construction of the bridge be authorized.

SIR—In order to provide a more efficient organization for the triangulation of The City of New York, and to avoid conflicts with other Departments through the certification of Axemen now employed therein, I beg to recommend that the Board authorize the establishment of the grades of Heliotroper at salaries of \$900, \$1,050 and \$1,200 per annum, and that the Board at the same time request the Municipal Civil Service Commission to hold a competitive examination in order to provide an eligible list of Heliotropers from which appointments can be made. Under the special provisions of section 439 of the Charter as amended it does not appear to be necessary to have these positions established by any other authority than the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, so that the concurrence of the Board of Aldermen will not be needed. The men now employed as Axemen are doing the work of Heliotropers, but their title does not properly designate the nature of their duties.

This position is already provided for under the rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of the City of New York, and the salary has been fixed in the borough government of every borough except this one. Hitherto the Chief Engineer of the Bureau has acted as Superintendent. The work of the Bureau is increasing constantly and is bound to increase in the future. As the suburban sections develop the engineering work becomes more and more onerous, and it is now extremely desirable that the Chief Engineer devote his talents to this branch of the service without being hampered by the also increasing duties and responsibilities of an administrative head of department. These duties have been somewhat lightened for him during the past two years by the fact that the Commissioner of Public Works has been able to give a great deal of attention and time to the administrative details of the Bureau. It has been a heavy task upon him for the last year, as the amount of contract work done by the department amounted to \$2,500,000, and the amount of expenditure charged to the

Budget account amounted to \$500,000 more, making a total expenditure of more than \$3,000,000 represent the volume of business done by the Bureau. Highly important sewer improvements have already been initiated, and the execution of the plans for the development of a practically new sewer system, as well as other important improvements of a character distinct from those over which the Bureau of Highways has jurisdiction, must take up the attention of the Commissioner of Public Works for the next few years.

In view of all these facts the President believes that the interest of the City will be best served by the appointment of a Superintendent of Highways, and requests you to adopt the resolution fixing the salary for that place.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on December 29, 1905, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn submitted a communication requesting the Board to establish the position of Superintendent of Highways for the Borough of Brooklyn and to fix the salary at \$5,000 per annum, and the matter was referred to the Engineer of the Board for investigation and report.

In his communication the President of the Borough states that the Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Highways has heretofore acted as Superintendent; that the work of the Bureau is constantly increasing and will continue to increase, and that with the development of the suburban sections the engineering work becomes more and more onerous, and it is desirable that the Chief Engineer should be able to devote his entire time to such work without embarrassment through the duties and responsibilities of the administrative work of the Bureau. He further states that, while the Commissioner of Public Works has in the past been able to give much of his time to the administrative details of the Highway Bureau, there are complicated problems of design and construction awaiting solution, so that it will not be possible for the Commissioner of Public Works to devote as much time to the highway work as heretofore. The President states that the cost of the contract work done by the department during the last year was \$2,500,000, and the Budget appropriation for repairs, etc., was some \$500,000. In find upon further inquiry that the actual cost of the contracts carried out under the supervision of the Chief Engineer for the year 1905 was \$2,793,842; that the amount expended for repairs and material was some \$420,000, while the salaries amounted to some \$65,000.

One of the reasons given for referring this communication to your Engineer was the fact that he had previously held the office of Chief Engineer of Highways for the Borough of Brooklyn.

As to the engineering work, there is, in my judgment, no difficulty in caring for it with the present organization, which is efficient and elastic. It is improbable that the appointment of a Superintendent would affect the organization or methods of the Engineering Bureau. The work of repairs to stone and macadam pavements and the care of unimproved highways is in charge of a capable and efficient Engineer, and the work is so intelligently done that it is unlikely that any change would be made in this respect. The question is therefore one of administration in the office of the Borough President and of the Commissioner of Public Works. Whether they would find it easier and conducive to efficiency to administer the affairs of the Highway Bureau through a Superintendent, as is done in the other boroughs, instead of dealing directly with the Engineers, I am unable to say. It is a curious fact that in the Borough of Manhattan the positions of Superintendent of Highways and Superintendent of Sewers are in the classified service, while the Chief Engineers of these Bureaus are in the exempt class; while in the other boroughs in which these grades have been established the reverse is the case, the positions of Superintendent being in the exempt class and those of the Engineers in the classified service. The borough of Brooklyn has a Superintendent in the Sewer Bureau, but in the Highway Bureau, where the force is larger and the annual expenditures greater, there is none.

The salary proposed is the same as that attached to the office in the larger boroughs.

—and referred to the Investigations Division for examination, I beg to report as follows:

The Change of Grade Damage Commission was created by chapter 537 of the Laws of 1893. Sections 2 and 5, chapter 567, Laws of 1894 (an Act amendatory of chapter 537, Laws of 1893), provide for the appointment of three Commissioners, a Clerk and a Stenographer. Section 6 provides that the expenses of the Commission and the fees of the Commissioners "shall be provided for by the issue of bonds, by the Comptroller of said City of New York." Section 7 reads as follows:

"Said commissioners, or their successors, shall each be entitled to receive for his services the sum of three thousand dollars per annum, payable in equal monthly installments. A properly verified voucher shall be filed in the finance department, together with a certificate signed by said commissioners, or a majority of them, as to the amount of the other expenses of said commissioners, all of which, including said compensation to the commissioners, shall be payable as provided in section six of this act."

An examination of the Department of Finance books shows that the total amount expended in 1905 for items similar to those in the statement of estimated expenses for 1906, previously noted, was \$15,374.50. In addition to this sum there are unpaid bills for stenographer's services amounting to \$2,452.71, for a part of the year 1905 (the payment of which is in dispute), making the total expense of the year \$17,827.21. I am informed by the Clerk to the Commission that between April, 1904, and November, 1905, Stenographer's services were paid for at the rate of 45 cents per folio for five copies, but since November, 1905, the Stenographer is being paid a salary at the rate of \$3,000 per annum. The Clerk also states that the yearly expense of the Commission for the past thirteen years has been from \$17,700 to \$18,000.

I therefore respectfully recommend the adoption of the resolution attached hereto.

The Secretary presented the following opinion of the Corporation Counsel, relative to resolutions authorizing the issue of Corporate Stock, fixing salaries, selecting sites, etc., which were passed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as it was constituted previous to January 1, 1906, and not acted upon by the former Board of Aldermen, and resolutions passed by the former Board of Aldermen, which were duly approved by the Mayor before January 1, 1906, requesting the issue of Special Revenue Bonds:

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor:

SIR—I have received your communication of January 3, 1906, in which my opinion is requested in regard to the following questions:

First—Can the present Board of Aldermen legally act upon a resolution which was passed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as it was constituted before



the 1st day of January, 1906, and which was not acted upon by the former Board of Aldermen, or should such resolution be repassed by the present Board of Estimate and Apportionment in order to legally bring it before the present Board of Aldermen. This question particularly applies to resolutions authorizing the issuance of Corporate Stock, fixing salaries, selecting sites, etc.

Second—Can the Board of Estimate and Apportionment properly consider a resolution requesting the issuance of Special Revenue Bonds, which was passed by the former Board of Aldermen and which was duly approved by the Mayor before the 1st day of January, 1906.

In my opinion each of these questions should be answered in the affirmative, and this follows from the position which it would seem must now be taken that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is a continuing body, and does not cease to exist temporarily at every change in its membership, and therefore that it should not be organized anew each time such change takes place.

One of the principal opinions from this Department upon the subject was forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under date of January 14, 1904. Since that opinion, however, was rendered, the case of *People ex rel. Lefferts vs. McClellan* has been decided by the Court of Appeals in 178 N. Y. 615, affirming 92 App. Div. 615, which affirmed a decision by Mr. Justice Dickey.

The following is quoted from Mr. Justice Dickey's opinion:

"Provisions of Charter carefully provide for the Board to be a continuing body, with no interregnum.

"It will not be contended that a change of one member of the Board after the receipt of the resolutions of the Local Board of Improvement will prevent all action. I do not see how a change of the entire membership will work any such result.

"The Board is a Board made up of officials who at the time happen to be in office, and comprises a Board without reference to the persons who hold the particular offices.

"It does not seem to me that under the Charter, as amended in 1901, it was intended that in any year when there is an election of officials in November who take office in January following, all local improvement proceedings should stop for some months before January 1, unless they can be so hurried that the particular persons who constituted the Board of Estimate that year approve or reject the joint action of the Local Board and the Borough President.

"The approval contemplated is the approval of the Board existing when action is taken, standing for and representing the City at the time action is taken, not the particular men who held the places when the proceedings began or at any precise stage of the progress of the proceedings."

The Lefferts case is also an authority for distinguishing the Board of Estimate and Apportionment from a legislative body like the Board of Aldermen. There is a class of cases like *Wetmore vs. Story*, 22 Barb. 419; *Matter of Beams*, 17 How. Pr. 459; *Matter of Beekman*, 19 How. Pr. 518, in which it was held that where a proposed resolution was adopted by one Chamber of the Common Council in one administration and by the other Chamber of the Common Council in a succeeding administration, and then approved by the Mayor, it did not constitute a valid act of the Common Council.

This was but applying the principle generally recognized in all purely legislative bodies that the unfinished business of one legislative body dies with that body, and if it is to be taken up again it must be taken up de novo by the new legislative body.

This distinction seems to rest largely upon the fact that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is not in any proper sense a legislative body, at least as to many of its duties, but rather an executive body, and that its relation to the City is analogous to that of the Finance Committee of a large corporation to that corporation. It should not, therefore, be considered as one chamber of a bicameral legislative body.

The foregoing will be sufficient to indicate my opinion upon the subject, without going into an elaborate review of the authorities. As already intimated you are justified in holding that resolutions which were passed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as it was constituted previous to January 1, 1906, and were not acted upon by the former Board of Aldermen, may now be submitted to the present Board of Aldermen for its action; and also in holding that the present Board of Estimate and Apportionment can properly consider a resolution requesting the issuance of Special Revenue Bonds, which was passed by the former Board of Aldermen, and approved by the Mayor before January 1, 1906, but was not acted upon by the previous Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—In recommending that the grade of Telephone Operator be established, with salaries fixed at \$750, \$900 and \$1,050 per annum, in the Department of Finance, I beg to say:

The Telephone Operator in this Department has heretofore been included in the general contract with the telephone company for services, and consequently has not been placed in the classified list up to this time. The reason for this has been that the Comptroller has been able to command of the telephone company its most skillful operators because the demand for this service in the Department of Finance is most important.

The salary at present paid by the telephone company to the operator now employed in this Department is \$20 a week. She is highly skilled in her work and during the two and a half years that she has been the operator in this Department she has given unqualified satisfaction in every respect. She now stands at the head of the eligible list of the Civil Service Commission, and it is recommended that if this grade is established she be appointed to this position from the eligible list certified by the Civil Service Commission.

The fixing of the salary at \$1,050 is but \$10 more per annum than she is now receiving and brings the grade within those uniformly employed in the several other classifications throughout the Department.

GENTLEMEN—There was referred to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, at a meeting of your Board held on December 29, 1905, preamble and resolutions submitted to the Board by the Twenty-eighth Ward Taxpayers' Protective Association, with relation to the numbering of houses and lots in this borough. I have a report on this matter, dated January 8, 1906, by George W. Tillson, Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Highways, who says:

"I am aware that a great deal of confusion has arisen and is constantly arising on account of change of house numbers in this borough. While I am not particularly pleased with the system in use at the present time, I do not believe that the trouble is caused so much by our system as by the changes that are being made in lots by the builders. For instance, house numbers have been assigned to property on a basis of one house for every 20 feet, and in some cases for every 25 feet. The builder purchases a plot, say 100 or 150 feet long, in the center of the block, and erects houses in this plot 16½ feet in width. In this case he will require six numbers for each 100 feet, while the official map gives but five. If he applies to this office for his numbers before erecting them on his houses, he gets the proper numbers with an A number for the extra number required; but in some cases the builders do not apply for the numbers, and so the confusion arises.

"The Philadelphia system, referred to in the attached communication, is applicable to a city that is laid out on a rectangular system, as Philadelphia is, and is without question a most desirable method, but with a city laid out with so many systems of streets as is the Borough of Brooklyn, it is not advisable as a whole. It has already been adopted in certain outlying sections of the borough, such as the Thirtieth Ward and a portion of the Eighth Ward south of Thirty-ninth street; also certain sections of Flatbush.

"The question of house numbering in an old and irregularly laid out city such as the Borough of Brooklyn is a perplexing one, but I do not think it would be simplified with entirely wiping out the old system."

I respectfully submit this report, which has my approval, to your Honorable Board, and would suggest that a copy of it be forwarded to the Twenty-eighth Ward Taxpayers' Protective Association.

I therefore, at his request, write to you, and after investigation of the matter I think you will see the justice of his claim for the payment to him of the amount of his deposit, with interest.

SIR—At the last meeting of the Board of Estimate last year, a resolution was passed looking to the reimbursement of Dr. Rainey for money paid by him to the City many years ago, for which, in fact, he received no consideration.

The records of the Board of Estimate show the facts fully, and they are known to Mr. Mahoney, in charge of the Bureau of Law and Adjustment.

The resolution as passed contemplated only the repayment of the principal sum of \$5,000, saying nothing about interest. I did not notice the omission of interest at the time, or would have moved to repay him that also. I believe that Theodore W. Myers, who was Comptroller at the time the money was paid to the City, is of the same opinion as myself, that is, that the interest as well as the principal sum ought in equity to be paid. I have no interest in the matter except the desire to see Dr. Rainey justly treated.

It seems to me that the City ought to repay him the interest as well as the principal sum, which it has had all these years.

SIR—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held December 29, 1905, adopted a resolution requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to refund to Thomas Rainey the sum of \$5,000, upon his presenting to the Comptroller a proper deed, approved by the Corporation Counsel, transferring to The City of New York all his right, title and interest and that of the New York and Long Island Bridge Company in a certain piece or parcel of land, bounded and described as follows:

"Beginning at a point which is the intersection of the centre line of East Sixty-fourth street produced, with the bulkhead line of the East river as established by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund December 19, 1887, and running thence northerly 85 feet to a point 7 feet 1 inch westerly from the said bulkhead line; thence on a line perpendicular to the last-described course 28 feet, more or less, to the high water line according to Randel's map; thence southerly along the said high water line as it runs to the intersection of the same with a line drawn perpendicular to the first-described course from the point of beginning; thence easterly along said perpendicular line 37 feet, more or less, to the point or place of beginning."

The action taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was in accordance with a communication of the Corporation Counsel.

It seems that Dr. Thomas Rainey on February 28, 1893, paid to the then Comptroller, Hon. Theodore W. Myers, the sum of \$5,000 on the above-described property. Dr. Rainey made a claim for the repayment of this \$5,000 for the reason that when he took possession of the land he was ejected therefrom by the upland owners. The matter of this claim has been passed upon by the Division of Law and Adjustment of the Finance Department, and, as stated above, by the Corporation Counsel.

In the proceedings to acquire Exterior street by the City, an award was made of \$1 to the New York and Long Island Bridge Company, subject to a perpetual easement and right of way of the said New York and Long Island Bridge Company, which, as the Corporation Counsel stated, shows on its face that the bridge company and Dr. Rainey had interest therein.

Dr. Rainey desires, in addition to the sum of \$5,000 to be refunded by the City, that he be allowed interest thereon from the date of his payment to the present time. The money having been paid into the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, should be paid therefrom and any interest that is paid thereon should also come from the same fund. I have been informed by Mr. Sullivan, of the Finance Depart-



ment, that the amount of interest earned by the Sinking Fund during that period was 3 per cent. It seems to me that if Dr. Rainey is entitled to his principal, he is certainly entitled to interest thereon, and I see no reason why The City of New York should not, in equity, in refunding the \$5,000, allow Dr. Rainey the sum of \$1,925, which would be interest at the rate of 3 per cent. per annum on the \$5,000 from February 28, 1893, to December 28, 1905, and I so recommend.

LAW DEPARTMENT, OFFICE OF THE CORPORATION COUNSEL,

*To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:*

DEAR SIRS—While the Budget for the year 1906 was under consideration, I appeared before your Board and called attention to the urgent need for increasing the office force of this Department, and when the Budget was finally fixed your Board was kind enough to appropriate the amount which I had asked for. Before I can carry into effect my plans for adding to the office staff, it is necessary to have the salaries of the new positions fixed by your Board and the Board of Aldermen. I have prepared a resolution which I attach hereto, adding to the schedule of positions now in force, the following:

Not more than 30 Special Process Servers to be paid at the rate of \$1.15 for each summons or process actually served, the compensation not to exceed \$100 per month in any individual case.

All of the positions in the above schedule, except the seven Assistants, are in the classified Civil Service schedules and will be filled by promotion or appointment from the eligible lists, pursuant to the requirements of the Civil Service rules.

In my provisional estimate for this year, I explained at length that the present force of this Department was utterly unable to cope with the work which is being placed upon it. I dwelt at considerable length on the great increase in the ordinary business of the office, the important litigation with the gas and electric light companies, the thousands of sewer overflow damage cases and the great number of tax certiorari proceedings, and I do not think at this time it is necessary to say anything further on the subject.

The only item in the above list which probably does need explanation is the last one—"thirty Special Process Servers," whose compensation is fixed at \$1.15 for each summons served. I will explain the purpose of this as briefly as possible.

In the Bureau for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes and in the Tenement House branch office of this Department it is necessary each year to serve thousands of summonses and other similar processes. This work has been paid for in the past at the same rate as is now proposed, but from the Contingency appropriation to this Department. The system was introduced by my predecessor, Mr. Rives, who concluded that it would be more economical to pay for the work in this manner than to appoint a large force of Process Servers at a stated salary. In this conclusion he was entirely correct and subsequent experience has justified the method which was employed. There are two important reasons why it is better to pay for this work according to the amount of work done instead of by regular salary. The first and more important reason is this: It is impossible to determine just how many summonses any Process Server should serve, and it is therefore impossible to tell whether he is shirking his work. It is very often exceedingly difficult to serve these papers, and the defendant is finally served in some cases only after the most persistent efforts. Our experience in the past has been that most of these papers can be served during the evening better than during the usual office hours. If Process Servers were appointed at a regular salary they would be indifferent as to whether they succeeded in serving the papers and would not be apt to do much work at night. As most of these actions are for arrears of personal taxes, it is a loss to the City whenever the defendant cannot be found by a Process Server.

The second reason why it would seem advisable to adopt the plan which I have suggested, is this: This work is not regular and continuous. There are seasons in the year when there are comparatively few summonses to be served and there are other times when there are thousands ready for service. It would be almost impossible to appoint a force of Process Servers at stated salaries and to keep them regularly employed.

The reason why it is necessary now to change from the present system of paying for these services out of the Contingent Fund is as follows:

On March 22, 1905, the Comptroller wrote to me calling attention to the fact that the services of the persons who were employed as Process Servers had become more or less continuous, and asking whether it was not a violation of the Civil Service Law, which required that all persons permanently employed should be appointed from the Civil Service eligible lists. Under date of March 26, 1905, I replied at considerable length to the Comptroller's letter and stated that, in my opinion, there were very grave doubts as to the legality of the system then in force, but inasmuch as no appropriation had ever been made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, nothing could be done until an appropriation had been made.

When the Budget for the present year was considered by your Board, this matter was called to your attention and you made an addition to the salary appropriation for the express purpose of paying for this work. The only question now to be considered, therefore, is whether the work should be done by persons employed at a stated salary per month, or in the manner which I have suggested, that is, at the rate of \$1.15 for each summons actually served. I am sure your Board will agree with me that this is much the more economical and satisfactory way of paying for these services.

As the money for these additional appointments has already been appropriated by your Board, and as the services of these persons are greatly needed at the present time, I would be very glad if your Board would approve the resolution and send it to the Board of Aldermen at your earliest convenience.

SIR—In regard to the application of the Corporation Counsel made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with a view to amending the schedule of positions and salaries in his Department, referred to this Division for examination, I beg to report as follows:

The application contemplates certain additions to the office force of the Law Department with certain increases in salaries.

The Corporation Counsel asks for seven additional Assistants, stating that while, owing to increase of work in the Department, he is in need of more than seven, he is limited to that number by Civil Service regulations.

The sixty-eight Assistants now on the pay-roll receive, two of them \$10,000; two, \$7,500; ten, \$6,000; ten, \$5,000; three, \$4,500; three, \$4,000, and two \$3,500 each per annum, the rest being paid salaries ranging from \$2,500 to \$1,500 each.

The Corporation Counsel asks that he be allowed to appoint three additional Assistants at \$3,500 each, two at \$5,000, one at \$6,000 and one at a new grade of \$7,000, his purpose being to advance to these positions men now in lower grades and to install new men in lower grades.

The remaining additions and changes asked for relate to positions in the classified Civil Service schedules, as follows:

For two additional Junior Assistants, at a salary of \$1,950 each, the seventeen now on the pay-roll being paid salaries ranging from \$1,950 to \$1,200. This request, it will be seen, contemplates no new grade, but simply an addition of two by promotion or otherwise to the existing \$1,950 grade.

For an increase in the salary of Assistant Chief Clerk, from \$3,600 to \$4,000, involving no addition to the office force.

For two additional Law Clerks at a salary of \$2,100 each, the nine now on the pay-roll being paid salaries ranging from \$1,050 to \$1,800. This request contemplates a new grade to be filled by promotion from those below, and the placing of new men in lower grades.



For two additional Telephone Switchboard Operators at a salary of \$750 each. This contemplates a new grade, the present operators, five in number, being paid salaries of \$800 and \$900.

For two additional Examiners at a salary of \$1,200 each, there being at present two at salaries of \$900 and \$1,800, the proposed intermediate grade to be filled in part by promotion, as in cases above.

For one additional Messenger at a salary of \$1,200, those now on the pay-roll receiving, two of them, \$1,200, and three, \$900.

For five additional Process Servers at a salary of \$1,200 each, the nine now on the pay-roll being paid salaries of \$1,200, \$1,050 and \$900.

Also for not more than thirty Special Process Servers, to be paid at the rate of \$1.15 for each summons or process actually served, the compensation not to exceed \$100 per month in any individual case.

This request contemplates no addition to the office force, but rather a substitution of appointees from the civil list in place of persons heretofore employed, as it would seem, in violation of Civil Service rules, the necessity having arisen from lack of regular appropriation for this class of services.

The proposed manner of paying for the services of this grade of Process Servers seems well calculated to secure prompt service and to insure the City against payment for time not spent in its service.

The Corporation Counsel states that in the Law Department Budget appropriation for 1906 the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at his request, made allowance for increasing the force in his office, but that the action for which he now asks is necessary to the carrying out of his purpose in that regard.

There would seem to be nothing unreasonable or irregular in the several requests made either as to increase of force or compensation, and consultation with the Corporation Counsel has confirmed the impression that they are made with a view to the best interests of the City.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, relative to the employment of additional Engineering Assistants, Clerks and Stenographers in the Bureau of Franchises, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

THE CITY OF NEW YORK,  
OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN,  
BROOKLYN, January 19, 1906.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—Since assuming office I have been confronted with the fact that the Borough President's office is insufficiently supplied with data upon which to base proper action on application for permits to the various public service corporations now operating in our streets, and in consequence I have declined to issue permits until the company shall furnish me with satisfactory proof of its rights. Even when such information is furnished by the company, it is necessary to have the same checked and verified, and in many cases it requires an interpretation of the entire right of franchise granted to the company to see if it is entitled to the privilege asked and that the company has previously complied with all the terms and conditions of the grant. The mere fact that it has the right is not sufficient, in my opinion, to warrant the issuance of a permit for further concessions, unless it shall have been found that the company has in good faith liquidated all its obligations to the City.

I was informed that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment now contained a bureau wherein information concerning the rights, privileges and franchises of all public corporations were being collated and systematized and, in consequence, I made a visit to the bureau. I find that such work has been done, more particularly in reference to the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, but in Brooklyn but little information has as yet been obtained, owing to the insufficiency in the force. I find that the Bureau now contains three Assistant Engineers, one Draughtsman, four Clerks and three Stenographers, who have, in addition to the work of searching, been collecting the information for the reports upon all applications for new franchises which have been presented to the Board, as well as those before the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners. This force is certainly not sufficient to bring the work quickly to such a point where it will be available for the use of the several Borough Presidents, and it would appear to me that it should be so increased that work will proceed simultaneously in searching the records of all the boroughs and completing the files of information against each corporation at an early date. It is manifest that such information properly indexed will be of the greatest value to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in making future grants, as well as to the individual members, in properly conducting their own departments, and to the Law Department, where such information is vitally necessary, in the defense and prosecution of all suits.

I would therefore recommend to you that the Secretary be empowered to employ such additional Engineering Assistants, Clerks and Stenographers, within the appropriation made for the Board, as may be required by the Assistant Engineer in charge of the Bureau, and that the Bureau be directed to make such searches and investigations, and to bring up to date such records in each of the boroughs at an early date, that inquiries from the offices of the several Borough Presidents may be quickly replied to, and in this way the interests of the City fully protected.

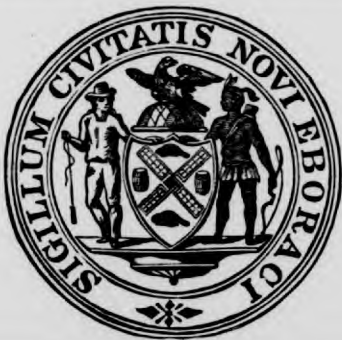

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
