Damages Under Special Statutes.

During the past quarter, 12 awards were made, aggregating \$126,000. The largest, \$102,500, was made under the claim of Jordan L. Mott for injury to property fronting on the Harlem River, Mott Haven Canal and 3d avenue, adjoining the approach to the Third Avenue Bridge. David Valentine received an award of \$15,000 in the proceeding to ascertain the damages caused by the erection of the bridge over the Newtown Creek at Vernon avenue, Borough of Queens. Ten claimants in the East River Bridge (Delancey street) proceeding received awards aggregating \$8,500, making the total of \$126,000.

One claim was dismissed. Certiorari proceedings were brought to review the action of the Board in the following cases: Third Avenue Bridge Approach, Mullen claim, northwest corner of 3d avenue and 129th street; no award. Newtown Creek Bridge at Vernon avenue, Valentine claim; award \$15,000, alleged insufficient. Fordham road at the Harlem River, Barlow Estate claim; no award.

The 79 claims for damages under special acts pending before this Board on January 19, 1910, the date of its appointment and five claims for damages filed subsequently, making a total of 84, have been disposed of. One claim, filed during the past quarter, would have been also disposed of except for a question of law now pending before the Appellate Division raised in another proceeding and affecting the consideration of this claim. It has been stipulated that no interest shall run on this claim pending the court decision.

Damages Under the Charter.

The Board in connection with the completion of various assessment lists considered 108 claims affecting damages alleged to have been due to change of grade. Fifteen awards were made, aggregating \$15,350, which sum was included in the several assessment lists which they affected. Ninety-three claims were dismissed.

Comparative Statement.

On July 1, 1909, the amount of assessment lists unapportioned was \$5,619,838; the amount unapportioned on July 1, 1910, was \$1,299,838.

Reference to the item of \$350,962.50 above stated shows the contrast at the end of the second quarter of this year, bearing in mind at the same time the fact that the assessment lists representing \$336,809.70 of this amount were received during the last week of June. On June 25 the unapportioned assessment lists in the office amounted to only \$14,152.95.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held at the Offices of the Commission, No. 299 Broadway, on Wednesday, May 24, 1911, at 10 o'clock A. M.

Present—President James Creelman and Commissioners Alexander Keogh and Richard Welling.

The President, Mr. James Creelman, presided.

The minutes of the meeting held May 17 were approved.

William H. Laurence of 352 Senator street, Brooklyn, appeared before the Commission to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list of Stationary Engineer, Electric Pumping Stations, pursuant to the provisions of paragraph 14 of Rule 7, by reason of an inaccurate statement in the Experience paper of his examination. After hearing the candidate's explanation, the Commission decided to allow his name to remain on the eligible list and the papers were ordered filed.

George McCabe of 546 Bergen street, Brooklyn, appeared before the Commission relative to his request that his name be removed from the blacklist and that he be permitted to file an application for Attendant. The request was granted.

Thomas E. Finn, of 2138 Crotona avenue, Borough of The Bronx, appeared before the Commission relative to his request that his name be removed from the blacklist and that he be permitted to file an application for the position of Attendant. The request was granted.

George H. Smith, of 986 Columbus avenue, Manhattan, having failed to appear, as directed, on motion his application for the position of Process Server was rejected, pursuant to the provisions of paragraph 14 of Rule VII, and it was ordered that his name be placed upon the blacklist.

Samuel J. Jones, of 362 West 58th street, an applicant for the position of Gas Engineman, appeared before the Commission. On motion, the application was accepted.

Mr. William Rumble, of 1873 Washington avenue, Borough of The Bronx, appeared before the Commission, as directed, relative to the report of the Board of Water Supply, that, owing to his defective hearing, it would be dangerous to appoint Mr. Rumble on construction work. After considering the matter, Mr. Rumble waived appointment from the preferred list of Transmittal in the Board of Water Supply, and it was ordered that his name be retained on the list for certification to other departments.

Daniel F. McCort, of 2638 Marion avenue, Borough of The Bronx, appeared before the Commission, and protested against the certification made to the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx from the eligible list of Inspector of Sewers for the appointment of one Inspector of Sewers with a knowledge of concrete masonry, on the ground that his name appeared on a preferred list of Inspector of Masonry Construction. Mr. McCort was informed that the Commission had certified in accordance with the request of the head of the department, who, under the law, had the sole right of selection for appointment.

Alfred J. Talley, Esq., Attorney and Counsellor-at-Law, appeared before the Commission relative to the case of Lieutenant James M. Wheelwright, a candidate in the recent examination for promotion to Captain, who had requested a re-rating of his record by taking into consideration an award received after the holding of the examination. The request was denied for lack of power.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Transfers, the following transfers were approved:

The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated May 9, relative to a communication from Mr. Albert E. W. Wyeth,

an Architectural Draftsman in the Building Bureau, Department of Education, who requested to be informed why he had not been permitted to take the promotion examination held May 8 for the position of Deputy Superintendent of School Buildings. The report stated that the examination had been ordered by the Commission at its meeting of January 18; that it had not been open to Architectural Draftsmen for the reason that under the rules the position was not in line of promotion to Deputy Superintendent of School Buildings; that the question of extending eligibility to Architectural Draftsmen in accordance with Rule XV., paragraph 16, had been considered by the Commission at its meeting of March 15, when it was decided that they should not be admitted to the examination. The Secretary was instructed to submit a statement of the facts to the applicant.

A communication was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated May 20, relative to the eligibility for examination for promotion to Third Grade Clerk of Thomas F. Larkin and Thomas S. Roche, who had been appointed Telephone Operators in the Department of Health and promoted to the Second Grade of Clerkship on December 1, 1909. After careful consideration of the matter, the Commission ruled that the candidates should have served three years in the Clerical Service to be eligible for admission to a promotion examination for the next higher grade.

A report was presented from Mr. P. S. Hildreth and Mr. M. C. Ihlseng, Examiners, dated May 9, relative to the examination for promotion to Third Grade Inspector of Masonry and Carpentry in the Bureau of Buildings, Borough of Manhattan, held May 2.

On motion it was

Resolved, That the examination for promotion to Third Grade Inspector of Masonry and Carpentry, Bureau of Buildings, Borough of Manhattan, held May 2, be and the same hereby is cancelled, it appearing that owing to an error for which the Commission is responsible, the character of the examination was not such as to properly test the applicants for promotion.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is instructed to proceed with a new examination for promotion to Third Grade Inspector of Masonry and Carpentry in the Bureau of Buildings, Borough of Manhattan.

The Secretary called the attention of the Commission to a communication from the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated May 15, notifying the Commission of the appointment of Russell R. Brown, of 689 Macon street, Borough of Brooklyn, as Storekeeper in the Borough of Manhattan, at a salary of \$1,200 per annum. It appeared that on May 2, 1911, in response to a requisition from the Department for an eligible list from which to appoint one Storekeeper, three names had been certified from the most nearly appropriate list (Inspector of Supplies and Repairs); that in response to a requisition on May 13, seven additional names had been certified from the same list and that the department had been notified that appointment must be made from among the three persons standing highest on the list who were willing to accept; that Mr. Brown's name appeared No. 10 on the eligible list. Fireman, First Grade, at a salary of \$1,400 per annum, and reinstating him in such position, taking effect at 8 a. m., May 3, 1911. The Secretary was instructed to note the action of the Fire Commissioner on the records.

A communication was presented from the Fire Commissioner, dated May 18, notifying the Commission of the emergency appointment of Philip A. Curran as Cable Tester for a period of fifteen days, with compensation at the rate of \$1,400 per annum. 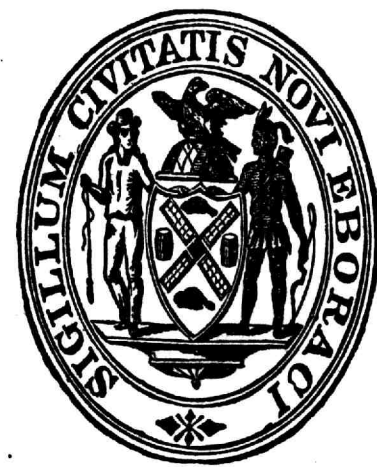

Also, beginning at the corner of Flatbush avenue and Lafayette street (Borough of Brooklyn), and running thence in an easterly direction under said street to Fort Greene Park; thence under said park to the northerly boundary thereof.

Pipe Lines.

Beginning at a proposed shaft at the corner of Flatbush and Third avenues (Borough of Brooklyn) and running thence under Third avenue in a southeasterly direction to Baltic street; thence in a southeasterly direction under said street and Park place to Sixth avenue; thence under said avenue in a southeasterly direction to Twenty-fourth street; thence under said street in a northerly direction to Fifth avenue; thence under said avenue in a southeasterly direction to Sixty-fourth street; thence under said street in a northerly direction to Fourth avenue; thence under said avenue in a southeasterly direction to Sixty-seventh

street; thence under said street in a northerly direction to Ridge boulevard; thence under said boulevard in a southeasterly direction to Seventy-ninth street; thence under said street in a northerly direction to The Narrows, New York harbor; thence continuing in a northerly direction under said Narrows to the established pierhead line, in the Borough of Richmond; thence in a southeasterly direction to the foot of Arrietta street; thence continuing in a southeasterly direction under said street to Tompkins avenue.

Also, beginning at a proposed shaft in Fort Greene Park (Borough of Brooklyn) and running thence under the northerly and easterly boundaries of said park in easterly, southeasterly and southerly directions, to Willoughby avenue; thence under said avenue in southeasterly directions to Evergreen avenue; thence under said avenue in a northerly direction to Troutman street; thence under said street, Flushing avenue and Grand street, in a northeasterly direction to Mueller street; thence continuing in a northeasterly direction under said street to Fisk avenue; thence under said avenue in a northerly direction to the Queens boulevard.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.
