OPERATIONS OF THE BOILER SQUAD.

The Boiler Squad is empowered by law to inspect and subject all steam boilers carrying over ten pounds of steam to the square inch to a hydrostatic test once a year, and to examine and qualify engineers and firemen to operate them.

The force of the Boiler Squad consists of ten members of the uniformed force, three Deputy Clerks, two civilian Boiler Inspectors and four civilian Drivers, under command of a Lieutenant.

Two members of the uniformed force who are practical Engineers, are assigned to examine applicants for Engineers' and Firemen's certificates, and to hear and determine charges preferred against Engineers and Firemen for neglect of duty. There are nine Boiler Inspectors, seven are members of the uniformed force and two are civilians. civilians.


