AN ORDINANCE in relation to the rehearing of charges against members of the Police Force and Fire Department of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. When a member of the Police Force or Fire Department shall have been dismissed or reduced, after trial by the Police Commissioner or Fire Commissioner, from the position or rank theretofore held by him, the person aggrieved may make written application to the Mayor, setting forth the reasons for demanding a rehearing of the charges upon which he was dismissed or reduced, and provided that such dismissed or reduced member of such force or department shall waive in writing all claim against The City of New York for back pay, the Mayor may, in writing, consent to such rehearing, stating the reasons why such charges should be reheard.

Such application for a rehearing shall be made within one year after this enactment, or within one year from the date of the dismissal or reduction, if such dismissal or reduction occurs after this act takes effect.

Such rehearing shall be had by and before the Police Commissioner of The City of New York, if the applicant be a member of the Police Department, and before the Fire Commissioner, if the applicant be a member of the Fire Department, and if such Commissioner shall determine that such member has been illegally or unjustly dismissed or reduced from his position or rank, such Commissioner may restore him to the position or rank from which he was dismissed or reduced, and allow him the whole of his time since any such dismissal or reduction, to be applied on his time of service in such department, or for such other or further relief as such Commissioner may determine just, or affirm the dismissal or reduction, as he may determine from the evidence.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

"The subjects and weights of the examination are as follows: Practical test, 70 per cent. required, 3; duties, 70 per cent. required, 5; experience, 2.

"A physical examination will be held. Only those who pass the physical

examination will be summoned for the practical test. Only those who pass the practical test will be summoned for the mental examination.

"Applications for this examination must be filed on a special blank, Form B. Experience blanks will be issued with the applications, and must be filed with the Commission at the time of filing applications.

"Candidates should be able to instruct boys in athletic and field games and to organize athletic meets.

"The age limits are 21 to 40 years.

"Certification will be made from this list for Playground Attendant and Gymnasium Instructor."

"Deputy Medical Superintendent, grade 3.

" * * * Candidates must have been licensed to practice medicine for a period of not less than five years and during that time must have had at least two years' administrative hospital or institutional experience and must be licensed to practice medicine in the State of New York.

"The subjects and weights of the examination are: Technical, 5; experience, 5. 75 per cent. is required on the technical paper and 70 per cent. on the entire examination.

"Applications for this examination must be filed on a special blank, Form B. Experience blanks will be issued with the applications and must be filed with the Commission at the time of filing applications.

"A physical examination will be held. Candidates failing to pass the physical examination will not be summoned for the mental examination.

"Certification may also be made from the resulting eligible list for vacancies in grades 1 and 2.

"The minimum age is 21."

"Rodman, grades B and C.

"The subjects and weights of the examination are as follows: Technical, 6; mathematics, 2; experience, 2.

"75 per cent. required on the technical, 70 per cent. on experience and 70 per cent. on all.

"Candidates will be tested as to their knowledge of simple, theoretical and practical surveying, computations and records of engineering work, the care and use of instruments and generally the methods of Municipal Engineering work. They should also have a good general education, some technical education or practical experience.

"Applications for this examination must be filed on a special blank, Form B. Experience blanks will be issued with the applications and must be filed with the Commission at the time of filing applications. The experience will then be rated.

"Candidates receiving less than 70 per cent. on the experience paper will not be summoned for the physical examination. Candidates failing to pass the physical examination will not be summoned for the mental test.

"The minimum age is 18 years.

"Candidates will be required to answer additional questions in order to qualify for grade C."

The forms of advertisement were approved.

On the recommendation of the First Assistant Chief Examiner in reports (3) dated September 23, the following promotion examinations were ordered:

Deputy Superintendent and Steward, Department of Public Charities, to be open to all Stewards, Deputy Superintendents (Lay), General Storekeepers, Purchasing Agents and fourth grade Clerks eligible under clause 7 of rule 15.

Ticket Agent, Department of Docks and Ferries, to be open to all Ticket Choppers eligible under clause 8b of rule 15 (a physical examination to precede the mental in accordance with the request of the department).

Assistant Bookkeeper, fifth grade, Police Department, to be open to all fifth grade Deputy Clerks of one year's service and to all fourth grade Deputy Clerks of three years' service (rule 15, clauses 8b and 8c).

On the recommendation of the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions in a report dated September 23, the Commission denied the request of the Acting General Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for an examination for promotion to Stationary Engineer, there being a preferred list for the position containing five names.

A report dated September 23 was presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner, stating that Joseph N. Quinlan, 14 Corteyou place, New Brighton, S. I., had been erroneously notified to appear for an examination for promotion to the position of fourth grade Bookkeeper, Department of Finance, and that the notice should have gone to Herbert Lester Powers, 455 Lincoln ave., Richmond Hill, N. Y., and recommending that another date be set for the examination of Mr. Powers and that Mr. Quinlan be informed that he had been notified in error. The recommendations were adopted.

A report dated September 23 was presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner, stating that in his opinion an error had been made in the rating on "Letter" (73 per cent.) of Frank J. Schwartz, a candidate for promotion to the position of second grade Clerk in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Borough of Richmond, held July 23, 1913, and recommending that he be given a rating of 80 per cent. on the subject mentioned and that his average rating in the examination be amended accordingly. The recommendation was adopted.

A report dated September 24 was presented from the Labor Clerk relative to the transfer of Patrick O'Connor and Francisco Lanzilotta, Laborers in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, from the Borough of Queens to the Borough of Brooklyn. Coiro, of 2d st., Rosebank, Staten Island, for medical re-examinations for Marble Polisher and Laborer, Borough of Richmond, respectively, for the reason that no further medical examinations would be held during September and the eligible lists for the positions mentioned would be promulgated on October 1, 1913. The recommendations were adopted.

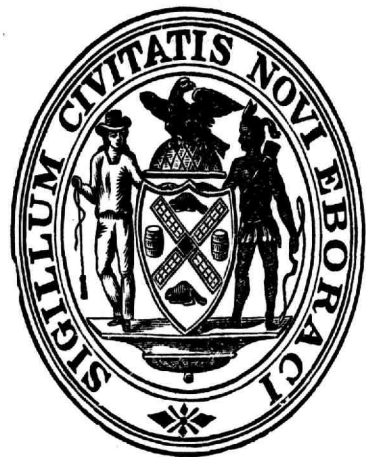

Such application will be made at a Special Term of said Court to be held in and for the Ninth Judicial District, at the Chambers of Mr. Justice Keogh, in the City of New Rochelle, Westchester County, New York, on the 29th day of November, 1913, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon of that day, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard.

The object of such application is to obtain an order of the Court appointing three disinterested and competent freeholders, at least one of whom shall reside in the County of New York, and at least one of whom shall reside in the county in which the real estate hereinafter described is situated, as Commissioners of Appraisal to ascertain and appraise the compensation to be made to the owners of and all persons interested in the real estate (as the term real estate is defined by said act) hereinafter described, as proposed to be taken or affected in connection with the construction of the dam and reservoir on the Bronx River, to be known as Kensico Reservoir, for the purpose of supplying The City of New York with an additional supply of pure and wholesome water, as provided for in said act.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
