Division of Permits.

On March 1, 1913, the new regulations with regard to deposit permits were made effective. Double the previous deposit is now required, half being kept for six months to insure good workmanship in backfill.

One dollar is now charged for all permits made out on financial stationery (where there is no other charge) to cover inspection cost.

On March 17, the "closed season" ended, but openings in the streets are still restricted when they are to be made in pavements laid last year, or if the openings are to be excessively long.

Hon. E. V. FROTHINGHAM, Commissioner of Public Works:  
Dear Sir—I have the honor to present the following report of the operations of the Bureau of Sewers for the quarter ending March 31, 1913:

On March 31, 1913, the sewerage system of the Borough consisted of 518.35 miles of sewers and 6,440 receiving basins.

During the quarter 2,659 linear feet of sewer and 8 receiving basins were built as new work.

The following works were completed during the quarter:

Alteration and improvement to sewer in 47th st., between 10th and 11th aves.  
Alteration and improvement to sewer in 72d st., between Amsterdam and Columbus

aves.  
Sewer in 173d st., between Broadway and St. Nicholas ave.  
The amount earned on the above work payable out of the Street Improvement Fund is \$16,799.00.

The work under construction March 31, 1913, payable out of the Street Improvement Fund, was:

Extension to barrel sewer under pier at the foot of 36th st. and North River.  
Sewers in 176th st., between Audubon ave. and St. Nicholas ave., and between Broadway and Wadsworth avenue.

Sewer in 190th st., between Wadsworth and St. Nicholas aves.  
Sewer in Bennett ave., between Broadway and 181st st.  
Sewer in Hillside ave., between Nagle avenue and Broadway.  
Storm and sanitary sewers in 217th st., between Park terrace east and Summit west.

Sewers in Park terrace east, between 218th st. and 100 feet south of 215th st.  
The contract prices for the above works amount to \$70,655.

The work under reconstruction March 31, 1913, payable from corporate stock was:

Sewer under pier at the foot of 129th st. and North River.

### DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

#### REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING AUGUST 2, 1913.

##### THE REDUCTION OF INFANT MORTALITY.

The work of the Department of Health for the reduction of infant mortality is being conducted during this summer along lines which have been gradually developed and placed in full operation during the last few years. Before outlining these plans in detail it may therefore be helpful to recall briefly the history of the development of this function of the department.

##### The Summer Corps.

In 1876 the Department of Health, having recorded an unusually high mortality among infants, applied for and obtained a special appropriation for the employment of a staff of physicians during the months of July and August. These physicians were known as the "Summer Corps," and they were assigned to duty in the congested tenement house regions of the City, where they treated all sick babies whose parents were unable to obtain medical care. This plan was followed each summer for many years, and without doubt has been a contributing factor in the steady decreases in the number of infant deaths during the last thirty years. The effectiveness of the work was limited, however, because its purpose was restricted to the treatment of sick babies, rather than the prevention of illness.

##### Work of Nurses.

In 1902 seventeen trained Nurses were employed by the department, primarily for the work of school medical inspection. These nurses, however, assisted the physicians of the summer corps during the vacation months of July and August, and in house to house visits instructed the mothers in the proper methods of preparing food for babies and demonstrated the correct principles of bathing, clothing and airing. Thus the real preventive work of the department was begun in a small way.

With the establishment of a special Division of Child Hygiene in 1908, the summer work for babies became an important function of the new division. In May of that year the Commissioner of Health had organized a conference on the care of babies in an effort to co-ordinate and make more effective the work of public and private agencies. This was the first definite effort to prevent duplication of such work, and the same idea is now carried out by the Babies' Welfare Association, organized in 1912.

##### Division of Child Hygiene.

The Division of Child Hygiene was formed in the autumn of 1908, and the appointment of a staff of 141 Nurses made possible an important extension of the preventive activities of the department. Since that time the department has endeavored to visit mothers as soon as possible after the birth of the baby, and to provide continuous instruction in the effort to keep babies well, rather than to rely upon curing them after they have become ill.

It was now possible to undertake lectures on the care of babies each week at the various recreation piers, public playgrounds and other social centres throughout the City. In co-operation with private agencies, the department assigned Medical Inspectors and Nurses to the infant milk stations conducted by the Brooklyn Children's Aid Society and the New York Diet Kitchen Association in 1909, 1910, 1911. Another idea which has been successfully developed and widely commented upon was the organizing of Little Mothers' Leagues among the girls attending the public schools.

##### Infants' Milk Stations.

In 1911 another important step was taken in the establishment of municipal infants' milk stations. Successful as the work has been since 1908, it was still limited to a special campaign each summer, whereas the idea of the department was to treat infant mortality as an all the year round problem. An experimental appropriation for the establishment of fifteen infants' milk stations under the administration of the department, to be operated throughout the year, was an important step in this direction. The New York Milk Committee and other private agencies operated a much larger number of stations, and the result of the combined efforts was so encouraging in 1911 that the City authorities granted an additional appropriation for 1912 sufficient to increase the number of milk stations to fifty-five. The appropriations are so arranged as to permit of doubling the staff of attendants during six months from May to November, but the stations are operated throughout the year, and the work of the department, along the lines which have been described, is now ceaseless. Moreover, the efforts of all private associations and individuals interested in saving the lives of babies are now co-ordinated in a more effective way than ever before by the Babies' Welfare Association.

##### Plans of the Present Summer.

The methods which have been referred to are being carried out during the present summer under all the advantages of accumulated experience and improved organization. At each of the fifty-five milk stations a Nurse is on duty all the time and a doctor is on duty two days each week. On May 1 an additional Nurse was assigned to each station for the extra work of the summer months. The milk stations are being developed constantly toward the ideal of educational centres, and breast feeding is particularly encouraged as far as possible. The number of mothers who now come to the stations in order to obtain milk for themselves, so that they may nurse their babies, is encouragingly large.

In the beginning of July all Nurses who had been doing school work were assigned to duty in the instruction of mothers. Each Nurse has 150 babies to take care of and works in a district which is not already covered by the activities radiating from an infants' milk station. This custom has been followed for the past two years with great success, the Nurse visiting the baby as soon as possible after it is born and keeping it under continued observation during the hot weather. Every morning each group of two or three Nurses meets with the Department Physician and consults with him regarding delicate or sick babies. If a child is not normal, the Medical Inspector visits it himself and refers the family to the proper dispensary or hospital to have the baby treated, if necessary. In 1912 38,000 babies were treated and 1,600,000 quarts of milk were dispensed at these stations.

The usual splendid co-operation of private agencies has been given again this year. About 80 different agencies are now federated in the Babies' Welfare Association, with its central clearing house for information and publicity at the headquarters of the Department of Health.

##### Pure Milk.

In addition to the specific preventive work, the efforts of the department to raise steadily the sanitary quality of New York's milk supply constitute an important factor in lowering the infantile death rate. The strenuous campaign for the extension of pasteurization, which has been made the first object of the Department of Health during the present administration, has had a marked effect, and the proportion of pasteurized milk to the total supply has risen from fifteen per cent. to fifty per cent. in two years. In round numbers this is equivalent to an increase in pasteurized milk from 300,000 to 900,000 quarts out of the daily supply. The latest step in the direction of pasteurization has been the adoption of the requirement that after July 1, 1913, cream shall be pasteurized, unless it is obtained from grade A or grade B milk. Increasingly stringent regulations of the sale of "loose" or "dipped" milk is also an important factor in the programme of the department.

## DEATH RATE FOR THE WEEK.

During the past week there were reported 1,310 deaths, against 1,367 deaths during the same week of last year, giving a rate per 1,000 of the population of 12.72, against 13.78 for the corresponding week in 1912. There were actually 57 fewer deaths, but had the same rate prevailed during the past week as during the corresponding week of 1912 there would have been 1,419 deaths; there was therefore a saving of 109 lives. This decrease in the death rate stands out even more strongly when we take into consideration the atmospheric conditions prevailing during the same week of 1912; the maximum temperature for the week ending August 3, 1912, was 86 degrees Fahrenheit, the mean temperature 70.7 degrees, against a maximum temperature of 95 degrees and a mean temperature of 77.3 degrees during the week.

There was an increase of 25 deaths from pulmonary tuberculosis, but this is to be accounted for by the intense heat, which undoubtedly hurried to a close the lives of many sufferers from tuberculosis. There was an increase of only 4 deaths from sunstroke, despite the great difference in the temperature.

It is particularly gratifying to note that there was a decrease of 51 deaths of children under one year of age, or about 13 per cent., and a decrease of 50 deaths or about 21 per cent., from diarrhoea under five years.

The deaths over 65 years of age remained practically the same as last year, there being a decrease of only one death.

The death rate for the first thirty-one weeks of 1913 was 14.61, as against a death rate of 14.80 for the corresponding period of 1912.

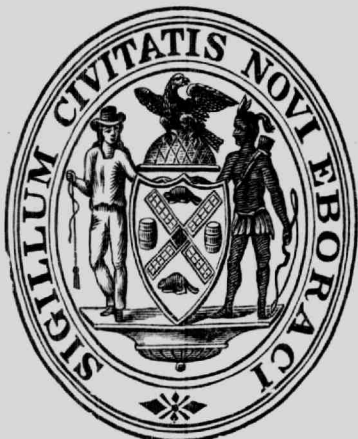

### Amendment to Sanitary Code.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health held July 30, 1913, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 142 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 142. A public or church funeral shall not be held of any person who has died of smallpox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, yellow fever, typhus fever, Asiatic cholera, measles or plague, but the funeral of such person shall be private, and it shall not be lawful to invite or permit at the funeral of any such person who has died of any one of the above diseases or of any infectious disease, or at any services connected therewith, any person whose attendance is not necessary, or from or to whom there is danger of contagion thereby.

### Amendment to Rules.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health held July 30, 1913, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the following method of procedure in the preparation, treatment and transportation of the remains of persons deceased from infectious diseases will be required to be observed by this Department on and after August 1, 1913:

1. In deaths from infectious disease where the remains are to be interred or cremated within the City limits:

(a) The undertaker shall notify the Division of Infectious Diseases immediately upon receiving notice of a death from smallpox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, yellow fever, typhus fever, plague, Asiatic cholera, measles or any other infectious disease dangerous to the general health of the community.

(b) An Inspector of Division of Infectious Diseases shall visit the premises wherein death has occurred, forthwith, to see that regulations of the Department are complied with as to treatment and enclosure of remains and sealing of coffin or casket.

(c) The certificate of death must be presented at the Department of Health forthwith, and attached thereto an affidavit made by the undertaker to the effect that the body has been properly prepared and enclosed and that the rules of the Department will be strictly complied with as to exposure of the remains, public funeral, burial or cremation within twenty-four hours, use of draperies, rugs, etc.

2. In deaths from infectious disease where the remains are to be shipped by rail or boat:

(a) The Inspector of Division of Infectious Diseases shall determine who may accompany the remains to the place of interment or cremation.

(b) The undertaker, in addition to complying with rules heretofore specified, shall file with this Department a certificate of death and an affidavit to the effect that the rules of the State Department of Health have been complied with as to the preparation, disinfection, embalming and enclosure of the remains, specifying in such affidavit the rule or rules under which the body is being shipped or transported, and he shall notify in the name of the Department of Health of this City, by telegraph and before shipment of the remains, the health officer at point of destination, advising the date and train upon which the remains may be expected.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer

in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless, The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

#### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

#### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
