

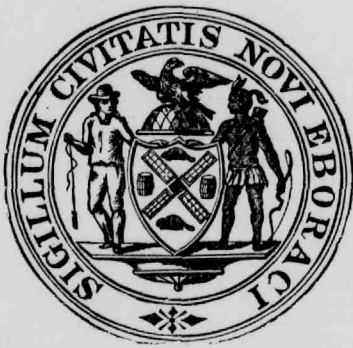

To the Honorable WILLIAM R. GRACE,
Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR—Pursuant to section 27, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York hereby respectfully submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force, for the three months ending March 31, 1881.

REPORT.

On the 31st day of March, 1881, the number of members of the force of the several grades, including Surgeons, was 2,566.

SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the Police force by reason of sickness, disabilities, and injuries, for the quarter ending March 31, 1881, and the details thereof are shown in the annexed table, marked "A," from which it will be seen that the time lost was 11,313½ days.

Report of the Work done by the Bureau of Street Cleaning for the Quarter ending March 31, 1881.

During the month of January, 1881, we removed eighty-seven thousand nine hundred and seventy-three (87,973) loads of ashes; three hundred and seventy-seven (377) loads of dirt; and twenty-one thousand four hundred and ninety-two (21,492) loads of snow and ice, from Broadway, avenues and principal streets. No sweeping was done, on account of the weather. Sweepers were engaged cleaning crosswalks, gutters, culverts, and removing snow and ice.

During the month of February, 1881, we removed eighty-seven thousand one hundred and sixty-five (87,165) loads of ashes; three hundred and sixty-five (365) loads of dirt; and twenty-eight thousand and seventy-one (28,071) loads of snow and ice, from Broadway, the avenues and principal streets. No sweeping was done, on account of the weather. Sweepers employed cleaning crosswalks and culverts, and removing snow and ice.

During the month of March, 1881, we removed eighty-four thousand nine hundred and sixty-seven (84,967) loads of ashes; forty-four thousand three hundred and seventy-seven (44,377) loads of rubbish; and eight thousand three hundred and ninety-four (8,394) loads of snow. Sweeping was commenced Sunday the 6th instant, and since then 140 4510-5280 miles of streets have been swept and cleaned, and 44,377 loads of dirt removed.

During the quarter ending March 31, 1881, we removed two hundred and sixty thousand one hundred and five (260,105) loads of ashes; forty-five thousand one hundred and nineteen (45,119) loads of rubbish and sweepings; and fifty-seven thousand nine hundred and fifty-seven (57,957) loads of snow and ice; and swept one hundred and forty 4510-5280 miles of streets.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 93 of article VIII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances, approved December 31, 1880.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section 93 of article VIII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances, approved December 31, 1880, is hereby amended by striking out the figures “74” and inserting in lieu thereof the figures “89,” and by striking out the word “hereinafter,” so that said section when so amended shall read as follows:

§ 93. The owner or driver of any hackney coach or cab shall not demand or be entitled to receive any pay for the conveyance of any passenger, unless the number of the carriage and rates of prices be conspicuously fixed in and on said carriage or cab, as provided by section 89 of this article, under penalty of five dollars.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 33.

AN ACT relative to the collection of taxes and assessments, and of arrears of taxes and assessments, and Croton water rents, in the City of New York.

(Passed March 16, 1881; three-fifths being present.)

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid on the first day of November, after the assessment-rolls and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by advertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily newspapers, and in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid to him at his office on or before the first day of December, in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following section of this act:

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day in which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing laws.

Section 4.
