There were issued under the Sanitary Code, 5 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 104 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 89 visits were made, and 10 disinfections and 8 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 1.

The number of vaccinations performed was 18, of which 14 were primary, and 4 revaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 6,705 pounds of meat.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 29, the number of analyses of same made, was 3, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 50, the number of arrests made was 4.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 5,223 privies and water-closets, 5,201 yards, courts and areas, 4,777 cellars and basements, and 35 miles of street gutters.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 4,687.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 474.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 6 permits.

There were issued to remove manure from stables in the city, 3 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 7 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy-sinks, 80 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 66 visits were made, and 8 disinfections and 5 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious diseases removed to Riverside Hospital was 1.

The number of vaccinations performed was 3, of which were 2 primary, and 1 revaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 10,565 pounds of meat, and 250 pounds of fish and 3,000 pounds of tea.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 25, the number of analyses of same made, was 1, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed, was 52, the number of arrests made was 2, and the amount of fines imposed was \$80.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 5,604 privies; 4,747 yards; 4,069 cellars and thirty-three miles of street gutters.

The certificates of 589 births, 49 still-births, 200 marriages and 932 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, July 24, 1886. This shows a decrease of 40 births, 7 still-births, and 58 marriages, and an increase of 40 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885, there was an increase of 133 births, 9 still-births and 38 marriages, and a decrease of 162 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 6; alcoholism, 10; bronchitis, 8; pneumonia, 5; heart diseases, 5; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; apoplexy, 9; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 10; premature and preterm births, 4; suicide, 3, and drowning, 4; while the deaths from measles increased 5; diphtheria, 8; whooping-cough, 2; typhoid fever, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 23; inanition, 6; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 6; phthisis pulmonalis, 17; aneurism, 1; convulsions, 3; direct effect of solar heat, 2; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 12; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 8. The number of deaths from croup, malarial fevers, puerperal diseases, and cirrhosis and hepatitis, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 144 were in institutions, 601 in tenement-houses, 172 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 9 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 11 were on the basement floor, 178 on the first, 249 on the second, 185 on the third, 117 on the fourth, 36 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth; 924 were stated to be residents of New York City and 8 non-residents; 80 were stated to be single, 162 married, 77 widowed, and the condition of 613 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 932; still-births, 49; bodies in transit, 19; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 74 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 589 births, 200 marriages, 49 still-births, 932 deaths; 19 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 130 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 8 transcripts of the birth record, 11 of marriage and 74 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending July 24, 1886, was 71.8 degrees Fahrenheit, the mean reading of the barometer was 29.828; the mean humidity was 72, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 581, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.72 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 981 deaths and still-births, or 87.65 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 30; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 352; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 103; Greenwood (undenominational), 27; Lutheran (undenominational), 159; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 28; Evergreen (undenominational), 64; Woodlawn (undenominational), 23; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 22; Union (Methodist Protestant), 7; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 8; Machpelah, L. The actual mortality for the week ending July 17, 1886, was 897; this is 206 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1885, and 107.6 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 32.37 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,440,916.

The certificates of 602 births, 49 still-births, 168 marriages, and 887 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, July 31, 1886. This shows an increase of 13 births, a decrease of 32 marriages and 45 deaths, and the same number of still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885 there was an increase of 36 births and 7 marriages, and a decrease of 1 still-birth and 39 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from diphtheria decreased 1; malarial fevers, 2; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 66; inanition, 4; phthisis pulmonalis, 5; pneumonia, 12; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; convulsions, 9; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 2; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 7; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 7; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 6; croup, 4; whooping cough, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; alcoholism, 1; cancer, 2; bronchitis, 5; heart diseases, 4; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 16; meningitis and encephalitis, 6; apoplexy, 3; premature and preterm births, 11; surgical operations, 2; suicide, 1. The number of deaths from measles, typhoid fever, rheumatism and gout, aneurism, direct effect of solar heat, cirrhosis and hepatitis and drowning was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 145 were in institutions, 533 in tenement-houses, 189 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 14 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 12 were on the basement floor, 177 on the first, 241 on the second, 139 on the third, 112 on the fourth, 45 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 868 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 19 non-residents; 82 were stated to be single, 177 married, 87 widowed, and the condition of 542 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 878; still-births, 49; bodies in transitu, 16; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 82 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 602 births; 168 marriages; 49 still-births; 887 deaths; 16 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 143 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 3 transcripts of the birth record, 10 of marriage, and 72 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending July 31, 1886, was 77.5 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.808, the mean humidity was 75, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 870, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.47 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 829 deaths and still-births, or 88.57 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 24; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 331; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 98; Greenwood (undenominational), 51; Lutheran, (undenominational), 149; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 21; Evergreen (undenominational), 47; Woodlawn (undenominational), 27; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 32; Union (Methodist Protestant), 5; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 12; Machpelah, L. The actual mortality for the week ending July 24, 1886, was 930; this is 88 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1885, and 0.2 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 33.54 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,441,738.
