Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a report of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 8, 1884:

The number of inspections made during the week by the Inspectors was 5,455; the number of complaints received from the Inspectors was 837.

During the past week 148 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary

Inspectors for investigation and report.

32 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

65 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 63 premises where contagious diseases were reported, and have performed 60 disinfections and 20 fumigations.

II patients sick with contagious diseases were removed to Riverside Hospital.

The total number of vaccinations performed was 838, of which 153 were primary and 685

The Meat and Fish Inspectors have seized and condemned 5,875 pounds of meat and 16,150 pounds of fish.

The Milk Inspectors have examined 89 specimens of milk.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 671 births, 46 still-births, 236 marriages, and 624 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, March 8, 1884. This shows a decrease of 29 births, 2 still-births, 11 marriages and 4 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1883, there was an increase of 148 births, and 85 marriages, and a decrease of 6 still-births and 45 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 3; diphtheria, 5; croup, 1; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 3; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrhœal diseases, 2; inanition, 2; rheumatism and gout, 4; phthisis pulmonalis, 12; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 6; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 3; suicide, 2; and drowning, 2; while the deaths from measles increased 1; whooping cough, 5; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 1; alcoholism, 2; cancer, 7; bronchitis, 5; pneumonia, 8; heart diseases, 6; aneurism, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; convulsions, 3; apoplexy, 1; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 11; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; premature and preternatural births, 2; surgical operations, 2. The number of deaths from cirrhosis and hepatitis was the same in the two successive weeks. two successive weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 128 were in institutions, 348 in tenement-houses, 140 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 2 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 2 were on the basement floor, 125 on the first, 146 on the second, 112 on the third, 90 on the fourth, 16 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth; 624 were stated to be residents of New York City, and — non-residents; 94 were stated to be single, 152 married, 88 widowed, and the condition of 290 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

AT 9.30 P. M. ON THURSDAY THE 15TH instant, the aqueduct had to be shut off to repair a large leak that could not be repaired in the usual manner from the exterior. This leak had suddenly devoloped in the section south of Yonkers, where smaller fissures had previously occurred.

The examination showed fissures aggregating 2,000 feet in length. The repairs were finished and water was again turned on by 4 F. M., on Saturday, the 17th instant.

While the flow through the aqueduct was interrupted the supply in the Central Park reservor was drawn down five eet.

the supply in the Central Park reservoir was drawn down five eet.

This loss of supply in the city reservoirs, occurring now, as winter is approaching, makes it necessary to take extra precautions against waste of water. Being aware of the temptation to leave faucets open in cold weather to prevent freezing in the pipes, I specially protest against that practice, and appeal to all citizens to abstain from wasteful use of water in any manner whatever. The present condition of the supply and the possibility of a necurrence of similar leaks in the aqueduct make it my duty to give this public notice that I shall hereinafter resort to the peremptory measure of shutting off the water in all places where persistent waste is discovered.
