

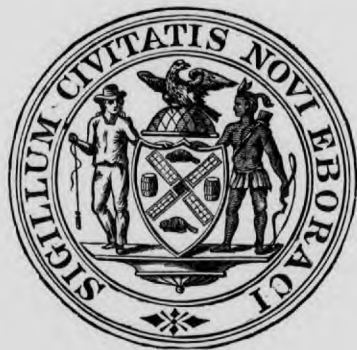

DEAR SIR—Annexed I beg leave to submit to your Honorable Board my report for the quarter ending September 30, 1886, the number of prisoners received and discharged, the labor on which they have been employed, and the result accomplished during the quarter.

Blacksmiths—Made 1 pair iron stairs, 14 feet long, 19 steps ; 1 well-hole railing, 14 feet long, 3 feet high ; 2 brace plates across-beams, 10 feet long, for boiler house at Lunatic Asylum ; 2 fire-escapes, 4 balconies, 2 pair stairs, from second to third story, 2 swinging ladders, 105 feet railing for Gouverneur Street Hospital ; 4 meat carts, 281 iron bedsteads, 60 cot frames, 5 hand carts, 1 iron wheelbarrow, 2 iron tension rods, 30 feet long, 2 pair iron gates, for new home for nurses ; 15 keys, 1 large iron lamp frame, 1 wrench, 1 rake, 3 knives, 4 water-cooler stands, 30 hinges, 18 hasps, 28 staples, 84 corner irons, 1 ice pick, 12 steel hammers, 24 drills, 60 points, 24 chisels, 1 pitching tool, 71 iron seat rests, 72 plates, 112 bucket handles, 75 bucket straps, 125 standards, 200 ears, 100 staples, 100 braces, 50 spindles, 5 steel turnishers, 48 plugs, 108 feathers ; 75 iron bedsteads repaired ; also all necessary repairs to carts, wagons, wheels, wheelbarrows, tools, etc., etc.

Tinsmiths—Made 480 feet stove-pipe, 39 elbows, 14 dippers, 16 quart cups, 1 biscuit cutter, 27 cans, 4 pails, 7 splice-boxes, 2 boilers, 3 pots, 2 basins, 8 joints vapor pipe, 2 sauce-pans, 200 bake-pans, 14 water coolers, 1 ice-box lined with zinc, also all necessary repairs to tinware belonging to the institution and roof of prison and adjoining buildings.

Carpenters and Harness-makers—Made 121 buckets, 42 pails, 8 tubs, 1,536 coffins, 6 mallets, 4 meat carts, 2 hand carts, 16 handles 62 wheelbarrows, 2 ice chests, 3 tables, 55 boxes, 2 ironing boards, 1 bosom board, 475 clothes pins, 36 gardeners' sticks, 2 meat chests, 1 wardrobe, 1 water-barrel, 1 gangway, 1 bench, 3 refrigerators, 5 document boxes, 9 chairs, 1,300 bed-blocks, 1 boat, 1 pair shafts, 24 salt cups, 1 whiffle-tree, 12 signs, 20 stair treads, 1 door, 4 4-tray and 4 5-tray wash tubs, 12 settees, 1 large bath tub ; Harness-makers, made 24 pair hame straps, 3 sets breeching, 2 pairs lines, 12 halters, 12 surcingles, 6 saddle pads ; also repaired 25 carts, 3 ambulances, 1 buggy, 7 wagons, 2 vans, 1 coach, 3 trucks, 9 wheels, etc., etc.

Broom and Brush-makers—Made 76 dozen brooms.

Shoemakers—Made 2,799 pairs men's and 1935 pairs of women's shoes ; repaired 1,380 pairs men's and 84 pairs women's shoes.

Tailors and Cot-makers—Made 275 woolen vests, 472 caps, 420 pairs woolen pants, 200 pairs mittens, 75 cot-bottoms ; repaired 547 jackets, 1,340 pairs pants, 124 vests, 818 caps, 1,173 cot-bottoms.



At the Sewing Room—The female prisoners have made 134 bed ticks, 1,000 shrouds, 836 shirts, 1,760 dresses, 250 petticoats, 46 table cloths, 650 sheets, 716 pillow-cases, 200 pairs pants, 525 chemises, 100 night gowns, 250 pairs suspenders, 370 towels, 102 pillow-ticks, 575 pairs shoes bound; repaired 3,412 shirts, 2,218 pairs pants, 24 undershirts, 62 pairs socks, 515 dresses, 598 chemises, 374 petticoats, 403 pillow-ticks.

At the Stone Shed—The prisoners have cut 840 feet building-stone, 250 feet water table, 180 feet window jambs, 165 feet corner-stone, 240 feet steps, 96 feet coping, 96 feet platform stone, 13 feet door sills, 4 feet lintels, 20 feet chimney caps, 13 feet stone blocks, 24 feet flagging, 10 feet pier stone.

By prisoners employed at out-door labor, the roads and sea-wall have been kept in proper repair: 630 tons of ice and 650 tons of coal have been discharged from boats.

The average daily number of male prisoners during the quarter has been 898, employed as follows:

CITY PRISON, NEW YORK, October 1, 1886.

The following improvements and repairs have been made at First, Fourth and Sixth District Prisons, from July 1 to September 30, 1886, by prison labor and without expense to the Department of Public Charities and Correction, except the cost of the material:

FIRST DISTRICT PRISON.

Painting—Halls, corridors, iron railing and ceiling of female prison, counsel rooms, Warden's office, boys' prison, new male prison, twenty windows, rooms in female prison, store-room, closets, doors, iron gates, blinds, iron bars, etc., etc., have been painted.

Mason work—Built up six doorways with brick and one gate on Leonard street, three brick arches, two brick walls, pointed up with cement wall at office, built two brick pillars and plastered walls and cells.

Plumbing—Placed gas-pipe from new prison to male prison and female prison to male prison; built water-closet in wash house.

Repaired roof female prison; placed iron bars in boys' prison.

FOURTH DISTRICT PRISON.

Built nine wooden bunks and sent glass for windows.

SIXTH DISTRICT PRISON.

Repaired two wooden sashes and placed glass in windows.

CHARITY HOSPITAL, BLACKWELL'S ISLAND.

Labor Report for Quarter ending September 30, 1886.

Carpenters—Made 2 chests, 25 dozen swab sticks, 3 screens, 5 pairs crutches, 2 wooden legs, 2 towel racks, 2 closet seats, 5 dozen tallies, 2 meat boards, 2 washstands, 6 keys, 1 ash box. Repaired 41 chairs, 1 wardrobe, 76 stools, 10 locks, 20 sash cords, 10 sets blinds, 1 step ladder, 1 clothes box, 9 screens, floors, doors, windows and water closets and various other jobs.

Painters—Painted 18 rooms, 16 closets, 12 medicine chests, 15 medicine boxes, 12 wardrobes, 53 windows, 8 window-guards, 50 doors, 36 bath-tubs, 11 foot-tubs, 8 screens, 31 boxes, 3 ice-boxes,



33 radiators, 28 stands, 26 tables, 43 chairs, 93 stools, 42 pails, 17 pantries, 28 pairs of blinds, 39 cans, 700 card-racks, 24 signs, 1 safe, 1 hand-press, 20 fire fenders, 3 water coolers, 3 stoves, 1 writing desk, 45 frames, 3 iron gates, Warden's office stairway railing, water closets, front doors, steam-pipes throughout the hospital; stained 9 floors and put in 213 lights of glass.

Tinsmiths—Made 2 5-quart coffee pots, 1 2-quart coffee pot, 1 2-quart tea pot, 2 pint measures, 2 paper files, 760 hooks and 194 pieces for card holders, 2 pail covers, 2 8-quart pails, 6 wash-basins, 1 10-quart pail, 2 pairs pans, 2 galvanized iron vases, 6 galvanized iron garbage pails, 6 dozen 1-quart cups, 4 dozen pieces for gas fixtures, 1 drip pan, 50 joints 6-inch stove pipe, 13 6-inch elbows; took down stoves; lined meat boxes; put down zinc and repaired and marked a large quantity of miscellaneous tinware.

Plasterers—Relaid brick walks and flag stones; paved gutters; repaired plastering of wards, halls, stairway and office; whitewashed closets and cellar and other jobbings.

Painting—Halls complete on third-floor, Matron's rooms; Wards complete, 24 and 29; closets in Wards 21 and 23; servants rooms on fifth-floor, ceilings calcimined.

Carpenter work—Making 41 pair crutches; repairing 60 stools, 51 chairs, 29 bed-springs, 27 screens, 13 pairs blinds, floors, windows, etc.; putting up 100-foot board fence on Twenty-eighth street side of grounds.

#### WORK DONE BY CARPENTERS.

Bellevue Hospital—1,600 temperature charts, 8,500 history blanks, 1,000 history slips, 6,000 blanks, 3,000 bed charts, 100 pamphlets, 350 pamphlets (31 pages). For General Drug Department—4,000 permit cards, 1,000 labels, 1,000 strips, 300 tags. For Charity Hospital—3,000 blanks, 200 transfer blanks, 150 pamphlets, 3 reams letter headings, 2 boxes envelopes, 5,000 bed cards, 200 examining notices. For Workhouse—400 lists, 1,000 passes, 1 ream property blanks, 150 pamphlets. For Lunatic Asylum—1,000 blanks, 1,000 extra diet blanks, 2,500 passes, 200 programmes for concert, 3 boxes envelope headings, 2 boxes note headings. For Storehouse—5 reams receipts. Homoeopathic Hospital—2,000 census blanks, 2,000 wash lists, 1,000 cards, 2 boxes envelope headings. For Insane Asylum—2,500 envelope headings, 1,500 cards, 2,000 ferry tickets, 1,000 sick notices, 5,000 labor reports, 1,200 blanks, 7,000 visitors' passes, 500 certificates. For Randall's Island—2 reams note headings, 1,000 blanks, 500 extra diet blanks. For Hart's Island—5,000 census returns, 1,700 blanks, 2,000 receipts, 2 reams note headings, 50 notices, 200 death notices.

Washhouse—Attendants' wash, 11,988 pieces. Patients' wash, 241,485 pieces.

Matmaker—Made 84 rush foot mats, 114 rush mats for spittons, 2 extra large mats, 240 brooms, 2 mattresses, 24 coir mats.

Shoemaker—New work: made 21 pairs shoes, 14 pairs slippers. Repaired: 791 pairs shoes, 5 pairs slippers.

Tailor—New work: made 26 pairs pants, 72 blouses trimmed, 33 vests. Repaired: 3,320 pairs pants, 34 blouses, 1,465 jackets.

Mason and Plasterer—Cut through foundation walls for new sewer mains; cut through brick walls for new door in centre buildings; repaired stone walls in exercise grounds; cut through foundation walls in boiler-house for plumber; flagging in boiler-house and annex building relaid; cemented cellar under the main building. General repairs throughout building.

Plumber—Connected leaders, pipes, traps, water closets, etc., with new sewer pipes; pipes connected with old sewer taken out. General repairs to plumbing.

Carpenter—Made 2 roller towel racks; 1 coal truck, 1 egg-box, 1 pump, 1 water barrel, with stand, 3 handbarrows, 6 ladles for kitchen, new steps at salt water bath, 2 stretchers, 1 cover for boiler-house, 1 step-ladder, 2 vegetable boxes, 1 pair of oars for boat, 2 doors in kitchen, sluice gate for salt water bath; Staff's new dining-room fitted up, Ward 12 finished; commenced on Ward 5; two new rooms made and fitted-up in main building; shelving put up in store-room. General repairs throughout building.

Painter—Wards 12 and 5 and Staff's new dining-room painted; floor of Ward 13 varnished; new shelving in store-room painted; glazing and painting repairs throughout building.

Tinsmith—New work: Made 6 Ward boxes, 1 butter-box, 3 large pans, 2 oil cans, 6 ten-gallon cans, coppered oars for boat, crates for washhouse. Repaired: 12 ward boxes, 3 butter boxes, 8 dish-pans, 2 ice boxes, 16 spittoons, 226 chambers, 6 attendant's canes, 3 sauce-pans. General repairs to tinware.

Out-door Improvements—Low lands at rear of building filled-in and graded; new walks and roads laid out and graded; roads repaired and macadamized; lake and rustic bridge built at lower end of island; salt water bath improved and kept in repair; ashes, etc., removed from Homoeopathic Hospital grounds.

Carpenter—Making book-case for Acting Medical Superintendent; making new hand cart: shingling Pavilions D and E; new hot water tank for Pavilion G; making two tool closets for Boiler-houses; making six wardrobes for Attendants' rooms; making new door for back entrance Hall No. 1, Main Building; taking down old stairs in Halls Nos. 1, 2 and 3, and fitting up rooms in their place for patients; making 8 new doors for sitting rooms, Halls Nos. 2 and 3; making new skylight for dome, Main building; making new dining-room table, 28 feet long, Hospital Hall; new closet, and putting down new dining-room floor for the same hall; new closet seat, Retreat No. 2; repairing 32 settees and 25 chairs, also general repairs to windows, doors, locks and keys throughout the Asylum.

Engineer—Removing bath tub, sink and water closet, Pavilion C, and resetting the same with new connections, hot and cold water; putting up new connection to hot-water tank, Pavilion O, also dug up and re-set 40 feet of 4-inch waste pipe; removing and resetting water closet, Pavilion F; new waste and trap put in; reset 80 feet 4-inch waste pipe for same; removing water closets, Pavilion H, and connecting the same with new waste and trap; laid 175 feet of new 12-inch earthen drain pipe from Pavilion H to river; removing 100 feet 1-inch water pipe and relaying again, Pavilion B; repairing 14 new radiators at New Retreat; repaired all steam pipes in Main Building Lodge, and repainted the same; repaired all steam pipes in Old and New Retreat; repaired 75 feet 1-inch pipe, Boiler-house; repaired 20 stoves in pavilions, new fire pots, stove pipes, etc.; repaired hot-water tanks in Pavilions A, B and H; removing 3 privy sinks and waste pipes from Halls Nos. 1, 2 and 3, Main Building, to allow rooms to be made for the accommodation of patients; removed 3 5-inch valves and replaced, Main Building; also all necessary repairs to gas fixtures of the Institution, burners, etc.

Painting and Glazing—Painted Hospital Hall throughout, also Hall No. 8, Main Building; priming and painting water closet, bath-room and tank-room, Pavilion C; painting passage leading from Halls Nos. 4, 5 and 6, New Retreat, also painted steam pipes in cellar of same building; painted outside doors, Halls Nos. 1, 2 and 6, Main Building; painted new hand cart and meat-box; put in 290 panes of glass throughout the Institution.

Plastering and Whitewashing—Patched ceiling and repairing sidewalls of the eight halls of the Main Building; patching and whitewashing throughout the six halls of the Lodge Building; whitewashing Staff and Officers' kitchen; also patching in Steward's office and store.

#### LABOR REPORT.

Carpenters have been employed in making alterations in the rooms of Assistant Physicians and Matron, removing partitions in dormitory and dining-room, laying basins and new flooring in dining-room, and putting in one window. They made three dish closets and twelve spit boxes, and repaired broken furniture of this Institution and Hart's Island Hospital; kept the woodwork in repair, and did all other necessary jobbing about the buildings.

Painters have painted walls, ceiling and woodwork of Main Dormitory and adjoining rooms, the new woodwork in Physician's and Matron's rooms, and repainted 50 iron bedsteads. New paper for walls and ceilings of Physicians' rooms and dining-room was hung, and window-glass was put in where required.

Plasterers were employed in making necessary repairs to walls and ceilings, but were principally engaged in making or repairing asphalt walks.



Workhouse Help was engaged in making and repairing roads and walks, mowing, raking and keeping the walks and lawns in trim condition and neatness, watering flower-beds, pruning trees, etc.; 16 men were assigned to duty in the kitchen, and to carry meals to the different pavilions and remove the garbage; others were detailed to assist the Engineer. The out-door laborers were employed (in addition to the work of making roads, etc.), in delivering coal to the pavilions and hospital wards, removing ashes, conveying soiled clothing to the laundry and returning the same, hauling freight at steamboat dock and store, and, latterly, in replacing stoves for the winter.

Male patients have, since their substitution for workhouse help, performed the labors of the latter under direction of Attendants.

Female patients have been chiefly employed in making and repairing bedding and clothing for their own pavilions and for the Insane Asylum on Ward's Island. An appended statement is given, showing the number of articles made to be 78, and the number repaired to aggregate 27,477. In addition to this employment the general housework of the Institution has been attended to. 27 patients have been working in the laundry, where the number of pieces washed and ironed for this Institution was 32,585, for Hart's Island Hospital 16,009, and for the Medical Staff of the Ward's Island Asylum 1,857, amounting in all to 50,451 pieces.

#### Engineer's Department.

The Engineer and helpers have been employed in relining with lead hot and cold water tanks, repairing other tanks and pipes, stop-cocks, valves, faucets, sinks, bath-tubs, hand pumps, etc.; in making and fitting keys and repairing broken locks, cleaning and repairing sewer pipes and hot and cold water pipes underground, laying salt-water connection to large pumping engine, increasing the supply of hot and cold water in laundry, kitchen and dormitory, and in cleaning and overhauling the large and small boilers at intervals.

The Blacksmith has repaired stove-guards, hand carts, wheelbarrows, tools, etc., and has made guards for the transoms of cells in the pavilions, as substitutes for sashes. He has also made all the tools required by the Engineer.

The Tinsmith has been employed in making or repairing ventilators, stove-pipes, tea and coffee pots, mess boxes, mess pans, cans, etc., and in repairing tin roofs, gutters and leaders, and he has put up all the stove pipes.

## REASONS FOR THE PROVISIONAL ESTIMATE FOR THE YEAR 1887.

Resolved, That the Provisional Estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 30th day of October, 1886, of the amount required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business in the City and County of New York, in each department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-seven (1887), be submitted to the Board of Aldermen, with the reasons for it in detail, as required by section 189 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as follows:

## THE MAYORALTY.

The amount asked for in the Departmental Estimate is twenty-six thousand dollars (\$26,000), and the amount appropriated in the Provisional Estimate is twenty-six thousand dollars (\$26,000), which sum is deemed to be necessary and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Mayor's office, including the salary of the Mayor, as fixed by law.

## THE COMMON COUNCIL.

The amount asked for in the Departmental Estimate is seventy-two thousand seven hundred dollars (\$72,700), and the amount appropriated by the Provisional Estimate is seventy-two thousand seven hundred dollars (\$72,700), a sum considered necessary and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Common Council, including the salaries of the members of the Board of Aldermen, as fixed by law.

## THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

The amount asked for in the Departmental Estimate is two hundred and seventy-two thousand five hundred dollars (\$272,500), and the amount appropriated is two hundred and seventy-two thousand five hundred dollars (\$272,500), which sum is deemed to be necessary and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Finance Department, including the salary of the Comptroller, as fixed by law.

## THE STATE TAXES.

The quota of State taxes to be raised by tax in the City and County of New York, in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-seven (1887), as provided by law, including the sum of twelve thousand eight hundred and ten dollars and forty-nine cents (\$12,810.49) for the compensation and expenses of the Shore Inspector, is four million two hundred and fifty-eight thousand five hundred and twenty-seven dollars and ninety-three cents (\$4,258,527.93).

## INTEREST ON THE CITY DEBT.

The sum of seven million three hundred and seventy-seven thousand nine hundred and seven dollars and ninety-three cents (\$7,377,907.93) is appropriated, as required by law, for the payment of interest on the City debt which will become due and payable in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-seven (1887), including interest on the bond debt of the territory annexed from Westchester County, and on Revenue Bonds to be issued in anticipation of taxes in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-seven.



## BOND DEBT OF ANNEXED TERRITORY AND AMOUNTS RAISED ANNUALLY FOR REDEMPTION OF THE CITY DEBT.

The sum of nine hundred and ninety thousand nine hundred and seventy-one dollars and fifty-four cents (\$990,971.54) is appropriated, as provided by law, for the payment of the bond debt of the Annexed Territory and for amounts to be raised annually, pursuant to section 192 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, and section 11 of the Amendment to the State Constitution, adopted at the General Election held November 4, 1884.

## ARMORIES AND DRILL-ROOMS.

The sum of one hundred and twenty thousand seven hundred and fifty-two dollars (\$120,752) is appropriated for rents of armories and drill-rooms and wages of armorers, janitors and engineers for the State National Guard, pursuant to the provisions of law.

## RENTS OF PUBLIC OFFICES, ETC.

The sum of one hundred and eleven thousand six hundred and sixty-three dollars and fifty cents (\$111,663.50) is appropriated for rents of property required for public offices, civil courts and hospitals.

## JUDGMENTS.

The sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) is appropriated for the payment of judgments not otherwise provided for, which may be obtained against the City, deemed to be required and sufficient for the purpose in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-seven.

## THE LAW DEPARTMENT.

The amount asked for in the Departmental Estimate is one hundred and eighty-eight thousand five hundred and sixty dollars (\$188,560), and the amount appropriated is one hundred and eighty-six thousand three hundred and fifty dollars (\$186,350), which sum is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Department, including the salaries of the Counsel to the Corporation, the Corporation Attorney, the Public Administrator and the Attorney for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes.

## THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS.

The total amount asked for in the Departmental Estimate is three million two hundred and ninety-eight thousand eight hundred and seventy-six dollars (\$3,298,876), and the total amount appropriated is two million seven hundred and twenty-three thousand seven hundred and twenty dollars (\$2,723,720), which sum is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Department for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-seven (1887), including the salary of the Commissioner of Public Works as fixed by law.

## THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

The total amount asked for in the Departmental Estimate is one million thirty-eight thousand four hundred and twenty-two dollars (\$1,038,422), and the amount appropriated is nine hundred and thirty-one thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$931,250), which sum is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Department, including the salary of the President, as fixed by law.

## THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES AND CORRECTION.

The total amount asked for in the Departmental Estimate is one million nine hundred and sixty-nine thousand one hundred and forty-five dollars and fifty cents (\$1,969,145.50), and the amount appropriated is one million five hundred and forty-three thousand dollars (\$1,543,000), which sum is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Department, including the salaries of the Commissioners, and the amount fixed by law for the use of the Poor Adult Blind of the City of New York.

## THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

The total amount asked for in the Departmental Estimate is four hundred and twenty thousand six hundred and twenty-eight dollars (\$420,628), and the amount appropriated is three hundred and ten thousand dollars (\$310,000), which sum is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Department, including the salaries of the President of the Board of Health and other officers of the Department, as fixed by law.

## THE POLICE DEPARTMENT.

The total amount asked for in the Departmental Estimate is four million six hundred and eighty thousand seven hundred and twenty-seven dollars and fifty-six cents (\$4,680,727.56), and the amount appropriated is four million one hundred and eighty-four thousand two hundred and fifty-seven dollars and six cents (\$4,184,257.06), which sum is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Department, including the amount of salaries of the Commissioners and other officers and the uniformed police force, as fixed by law.

## THE DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING.

The amount asked for in the Departmental Estimate is one million two hundred and seven thousand eight hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,207,850), and the amount appropriated is one million and fifty thousand dollars (\$1,050,000), which sum is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Department, including the salary of the Commissioner, as fixed by law.

## THE FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The total amount asked for in the Departmental Estimate is two million forty-two thousand two hundred and forty-six dollars (\$2,042,246), and the amount appropriated is one million seven hundred and eighty-seven thousand seven hundred and sixty-five dollars (\$1,787,765), which is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Department, including the salaries of the Commissioners and officers and firemen, as fixed by law.

## THE DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS.

The amount asked for in the Departmental Estimate is one hundred and nine thousand seven hundred dollars (\$109,700), and the amount appropriated is one hundred and nine thousand seven hundred dollars (\$109,700), which sum is deemed to be required and sufficient for the purposes and objects of the Department, including the salaries of the Commissioners, as fixed by law.

## THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The total amount asked for in the Departmental Estimate is four million thirty-four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,034,500), and the amount appropriated is three million eight hundred and forty-one thousand nine hundred and fifty dollars (\$3,841,950), which sum is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Board of Education in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-seven (1887).

## THE COLLEGE OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The amount asked in the Departmental Estimate is one hundred and forty thousand dollars (\$140,000), and the amount appropriated is one hundred and forty thousand dollars (\$140,000), which sum is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the College, the limit fixed by law being one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000).

## ADVERTISING, PRINTING, STATIONERY AND BLANK BOOKS.

The amount asked for in the Departmental Estimate is two hundred and twenty-two thousand nine hundred dollars (\$222,900), and the amount appropriated is two hundred and eighteen thousand four hundred dollars (\$218,400), which sum is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the appropriation, including the publication of the CITY RECORD and the preparation and printing of the Register of Voters.

## MUNICIPAL SERVICE EXAMINING BOARDS.

The amount of the Departmental Estimate is seventeen thousand seven hundred and twenty dollars (\$17,720), and the amount appropriated is seventeen thousand seven hundred and twenty dollars (\$17,720), which sum is deemed to be required and sufficient for the purposes of the appropriation.

## MISCELLANEOUS PURPOSES.

*The Coroners.*

The amount of the Departmental Estimate is fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), and the amount appropriated is fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), salaries, etc., being fixed by law.

*The Sheriff and County Jail.*

The amount asked for in the Departmental Estimate is ninety-three thousand two hundred and sixteen dollars and sixty-two cents (\$93,216.62), and the amount appropriated is sixty-three thousand two hundred and sixteen dollars and sixty-two cents (\$63,216.62), which sum is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the appropriation.

*The Register.*

The total amount asked for in the Departmental Estimate is one hundred and twenty-five thousand two hundred dollars (\$125,200), and the amount appropriated is one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), which sum is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the appropriation, including twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000) for salary of the Register, as provided by law.

*Election Expenses.*

The Departmental Estimate amounts to one hundred and eighty-three thousand nine hundred dollars (\$183,900) for salaries and office expenses, to which sum is added twenty-seven thousand dollars for advertising election districts and other incidental expenses of the Bureau of Elections, after deducting \$500 for salary of the Chief Clerk, making a total of two hundred and ten thousand four hundred dollars (\$210,400) appropriated, which sum is deemed to be required and sufficient for all objects and purposes.

*Jurors' Fees and Expenses.*

The amount of the Departmental Estimate is forty thousand dollars (\$40,000), and the same sum is appropriated, which is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the appropriation.

*Commissioners of Accounts.*

The amount asked for in the Departmental Estimate for salaries of Commissioners and Assistants is thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000), and the amount appropriated is twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), which sum is deemed to be required and sufficient for the purposes of the appropriation, including ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) salaries, two Commissioners, as provided by law.

*Preservation of Public Records.*

The amount of the Departmental Estimate for the Preservation of the Public Records in the Register's, the County Clerk's and the Surrogate's Offices, is fifty-eight thousand one hundred and fifty dollars (\$58,150), and the amount appropriated is fifty-five thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$55,750), which sum is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects of the appropriation.

*Fund for Street and Park Openings.*

The sum of one hundred and sixty-four thousand five hundred and five dollars and twenty cents (\$164,505.20), is appropriated for this purpose, under the provisions of chapter 173 of the Laws of 1885.

The sum of ninety-nine thousand and twenty-six dollars and twenty-five cents (\$99,026.25) is appropriated for the following miscellaneous minor items, as required for various objects and purposes, including appropriations for the settlement of just and legal claims and for deficiencies in appropriations of former years, as required and provided by law, viz.:

## JUDICIARY—SALARIES, ETC.

(Embracing Supreme and Superior and City Courts, Court of Common Pleas, Court of General and Special Sessions, Surrogate's Court and Office, District Attorney's and County Clerk's Office.)

The total amount asked for in the Departmental Estimates is one million sixty-seven thousand seven hundred and eighty dollars (\$1,067,780), and the amount appropriated is one million four thousand seven hundred and ten dollars (\$1,004,710), which sum is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the several courts and offices, including the salaries of judges, and officers of the courts and offices, as provided by law.

## THE POLICE COURTS.

The amount asked for in the Departmental Estimate is one hundred and fifty-four thousand five hundred dollars (\$154,500), and the amount appropriated is one hundred and fifty-one thousand three hundred dollars (\$151,300), which sum is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the District Police Courts, the salaries of the justices, clerks, etc., being fixed by law.

## THE DISTRICT COURTS.

The total amount asked for in the Departmental Estimate is two hundred and four thousand nine hundred and ninety dollars (\$204,990), and the amount appropriated is two hundred and one thousand five hundred dollars (\$201,500), which sum is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the District Courts, the salaries of the justices, clerks, etc., being fixed by law.

## ASYLUMS, REFORMATORIES AND CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

The total amount of the appropriations for such institutions is one million four hundred and eleven thousand and seventy-six dollars and eighty cents (\$1,411,076.80), under various provisions of law for the payment of specific sums and per capita allowances for the care and support of inmates, and including the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) to provide for the support of children committed by magistrates to various charitable institutions in the City of New York, at a per capita allowance of two dollars (\$2) per week for each child, including deficiency for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-six (1886).

SIR—There were 715 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 13, 1886, which is an increase of 35, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 153 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending November 6, 1886, was 679, which is 101.2 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.28 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,454,068.

Welsh, the bulkhead property and rights on the North river, commencing at the northerly side of Harrison street extended, and running thence northerly a distance of seventy-five feet to a point about one hundred feet distant from the southerly line of Franklin street extended, together with all the riparian rights, titles, easements and privileges incident thereto, was referred to Commissioners Koch and Matthews.

The application of William P. Clyde & Co., for permission to repair Piers 33 and 34, East river, and the bulkhead between, was,

On motion, taken from the table and, with the report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 5948, ordered to be placed on file, and permission granted, the said work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

On motion, the subject-matter respecting the amount of rent due from the Old Colony Steamboat Co., for 2,387 square feet of land under water covered by extension to platform at Pier, old 28, North river, was referred to Commissioner Matthews, with power.

The Engineer-in-Chief was directed to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for building a pier and approach five hundred feet long and sixty feet wide at the foot of West Fifty-sixth street, North river.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to paint on the outer end of each pier, under the jurisdiction of this Department, the number of said pier in black figures, with a white ground.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to remove the canal-boat sunk on the north side of Pier north of Bloomfield street, North river.

On motion, the permit to use land under water south side One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street, Harlem river, granted to George T. Gaden & Co., June 29, 1883, was transferred to McDonough & Co.

On motion, the President was authorized to request John Nesbit's Sons to call on the Commissioners in reference to the penalty imposed upon them for violation of Rule No. 4 of the Rules and Regulations.
