The action of the President in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, was approved.

From Counsel to the Corporation—Approving Contract No. 304, for repairing the crib-bulkhead between Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets, East river.

From Lieutenant Joseph Marthon, United States steamship "Minnesota"—Requesting repairs to Pier at Twenty-seventh street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Consolidated Gas Company—Requesting permission to change the service gas-pipe at entrance to Pier, new 45, North river, by turning it from where it now is about twelve feet south, as shown on the accompanying sketch. 12th. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 9363 and 9364, that he had made requisition for and superintended the dredging done between Pier, old 54, and West Eleventh street, North river.

13th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9395, that he had fenced off the bulkhead foot of Forty-second street, East river.

14th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9393, that he had repaired pavement in front of the bulkhead foot of Fifteenth street, East river.

15th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8918, as to removal of platform and building thereon from bulkhead between Piers, old 23 and 24, North river.

16th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7831, that he had superintended filling-in between Eighty-third and Eighty-fourth streets, East river.

17th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9445, reference to application of the Grand street and Forty-second Street Railroad Company to build bulkhead between Forty-second and Forty-third streets, North river.

18th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9439, that he had superintended repairing deck of Pier 49½, East river.

19th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9410, that he had superintended dredging at dump south of Twenty-ninth street, East river.

20th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9394, that he had superintended repairing and replacing planking in open space south of and in front of Pier, old 1, North river.

The Secretary reported that the right to collect and retain all wharfage which may accrue for the use and occupation of the Pier at the foot of West Eighteenth street, North river, for a term of three years, commencing September 1, 1889, had been sold to Robert S. Briggs, by Van Tassell and Kearney, auctioneers, at a public sale held April 30, 1889, at an annual rental of two thousand dollars.

The following resolution was,

On motion, adopted:

Resolved, That the right to collect and retain all wharfage which may accrue for the use and occupation by vessels of more than five tons burthen at the said pier, be and is hereby approved and confirmed, and the officers of the Board be and they hereby are authorized and empowered to execute the necessary lease therefor as prepared and in the form approved by the Counsel to the Corporation.

The Secretary reported that the pay-rolls for the General Repairs and Construction force for the half month ending August 31, 1889, amounting to \$15,848.43 had been approved and audited, and he had transmitted the same, with requisitions for the amount, to the Finance Department for payment.

On motion, his action was approved.

A communication from the Counsel to the Corporation, respecting the title to water-front between Ninety-eighth and Ninety-ninth streets, East river, occupied and claimed by the Consolidated Gas Company, and stating that he will bring an ejectment-suit at once to recover possession of the property upon being advised that it is the wish of the Department that such a course be taken, was

On motion, ordered to be placed on file and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and hereby is requested to take such steps as may be necessary to place the City in possession of the water-front between Ninety-eighth and Ninety-ninth streets, East river.

A communication, dated 4th instant, was received from Hon. J. S. Coleman, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, in relation to the dumping-board on Pier 12, East river, acknowledging the receipt of a copy of a resolution adopted by this Board, on August 22d ultimo, in relation thereto, stating that he had taken the advice of the Counsel to the Corporation on the subject of said resolution, who gives the following opinion:

"I have to advise you, therefore, that the rights of your Department to the use of Pier 12 as a dumping-board are unaffected by the passage of the Act of 1889."

Resolved, That in view of said opinion, this Department will not take any further action in relation to said resolution, so far as the same relates to the Department of Street Cleaning.

The communication from the Pacific Mail Steamship Company, requesting permission to sublet the north half of Pier, new 34, North river, to the Ocean Steamship Company of Savannah, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That license and consent be and hereby is granted to the Pacific Mail Steamship Company, to sublet to the Ocean Steamship Company of Savannah, so much of the wharfage granted by a certain lease, dated the 29th day of May, 1889, as may accrue at the northerly side of Pier, new 34, North river; provided the said lessee, the Pacific Mail Steamship Company, and the sureties to the said lease, shall execute and file an agreement in writing with this Board, that their obligations under the provisions thereof shall not in any manner be affected or impaired by reason of such license and consent to the said subletting.

James Dunn appeared before the Board and stated that he had filled-in at East One Hundred and Fourth street, for James Keely who claimed to have a permit therefor.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify James Keely to appear before the Board on Thursday, September 12, 1889, at 12 o'clock M., and show cause why penalty should not be imposed for violation of the rules.

The following resolution was,

On motion, adopted:

Resolved, That Van Tassell & Kearney, auctioneers on behalf of this Board, be and are authorized and directed to offer for sale at public auction, in the Board Room, Pier A, Battery place, North river, on Thursday, September 26, 1889, at 12 o'clock noon of that day, the right to collect and retain all wharfage accruing at the following wharf property, upon the following terms and conditions:

On the East River.

PIER 48, FOOT OF CLINTON STREET.

Reserving and excepting therefrom a berth one hundred and twenty-five feet long at the outer end of the westerly or lower side of the pier, and one-half of the surface of the pier next adjacent and contiguous thereto, together with the outer end of said pier, for a term of five years, commencing October 1, 1889.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF SALE.

The premises must be taken in the condition in which they may be at the commencement of the term of the lease, and no claim or demand that the premises or property are not in suitable and tenable condition at the commencement of the term will be allowed by this Department.

All repairs, maintaining or rebuilding, required or necessary to be done to or upon the premises, or any part thereof, during the continuance of the term of the lease, shall be done by and at the cost and expense of the lessee or purchaser.

No claim or demand will be considered or allowed by the Department for any loss or deprivation of wharfage or otherwise, resulting from or occasioned by any delay on account of or by reason of the premises or any part thereof being occupied for or on account of any repairs, rebuilding or dredging.

The up-set price of the parcel or premises exposed or offered for sale will be announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale.

The Department will do all dredging, whenever it shall deem it necessary or advisable so to do.

The term for which leases are sold will commence at the date mentioned in the advertisement, and the rents accruing therefor will be payable from that date in each case.

Each purchaser of a lease will be required, at the time of the sale, to pay, in addition to the auctioneer's fees, to the Department of Docks, twenty-five per cent. (25 per cent.) of the amount of annual rent bid, as security for the execution of the lease, which twenty-five per cent. (25 per cent.) will be applied to the payment of the rent first accruing under the lease when executed, or will be forfeited to the Department if the purchaser neglects or refuses to execute the lease, with good and sufficient surety or sureties, to be approved by the Department, within ten days after being notified that the lease is prepared and ready for execution at the office of the Department of Docks, Pier "A," North river, Battery place.

The Department expressly reserves the right to resell the lease or premises bid off, by those failing, refusing or neglecting to comply with these terms and conditions, the party so failing, refusing or neglecting, to be liable to the Corporation of the City of New York for any deficiency resulting from or occasioned by such resale.

APPROVED PAPERS

AN ORDINANCE to amend sections 52 and 53 of article 4 of chapter 6 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, relating to signs, obstructions and other purposes.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Sections 52 and 53 of article 4 of chapter 6 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 are hereby amended, and shall read as follows:

Sec. 52. No person shall hang or place any goods, wares or merchandise, or any other article, or suffer, maintain or permit the same to be hung or placed at any greater distance than three feet in front of his, her or their house, or store or other building, under the penalty of five dollars for each day's offense.

Sec. 53. No person shall place, hang or suspend at any greater distance than three feet in front of and from the wall of any house, or store or other building any sign, show-board or show-board, or suffer, maintain, or permit the same to be so placed, hung or suspended, under the penalty of ten dollars for each day's offense.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Schedule C shall include Policemen, both in the Police Department and Department of Parks, and the uniformed force in the Fire Department, and Doormen in the Police Department.

Schedule D shall include all persons for whose duty special expert knowledge is required not included in Schedule E.

Schedule E shall include physicians, chemists, nurses, orderlies and attendants in the city hospitals and asylums, surgeons in the Police Department and the Department of Public Parks, and medical officers in the Fire Department.

Schedule F shall include stenographers, type-writers and all persons not included in the foregoing schedules, except laborers or day workmen.

Schedule G shall include all persons employed as laborers or day workmen.

Positions falling within Schedules A and G are exempt from Civil Service examination.

Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only, under severe penalties. If exempt, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, if unpaid, will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
