To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment: GENTLEMEN—I beg to submit for your consideration the following statement: I find that the appropriations for "Salaries—Register's Office," for the current year, for the reasons hereinafter explained, will not be sufficient for necessary disbursements. In my estimate for the year 1889, anticipating a large increase in the number of documents to be recorded, I asked for the sum of \$37,500, with which to pay the Clerks engaged in recording by the folio; but the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriated only \$27,500,00 less than the amount asked for. Of this sum there was expended to and including June 30, 1889, \$18,130.70, leaving only \$9,369.30 to continue the work for the latter half of the year. To enable you to fully understand the exact situation with respect to this matter, I submit the following statement showing the number of papers recorded in this office for the first six months of the current year, and the corresponding months of the previous year, together with the amount of fees received for the same :

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The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works. The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged. METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and theywill be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them. All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of supler.

their own service-pipes, strete tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water. The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot oe per-mitted. No horse-troughs or norse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permit must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in where, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed. Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced. Tountauns or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioreries or other buildings are strictly prohibited. The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this depart-ment may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water. The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding-nules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like mamer as all other charges for unpaid water rates. NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

N UMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by de-fective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., with-out the knowledge or consent of the owners of the prem-iers.

out the knowledge of constant of water-meters is to enable ises. The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and un-warrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this ob-ject can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted. Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises re-sponsible for the amount of water used or wasted. Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all iurther applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occu-pants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings. Mouse-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year. year.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Eugineer of the Croton Aque-duct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be car-ried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.
