

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1882.

CHAPTER 403.

AN ACT to amend chapter three hundred and thirty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-three, entitled "An act to reorganize the local government of the city of New York," as amended by chapter four hundred of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight.

Passed July 1, 1882 ; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows : Section 1. Section four of chapter three hundred and thirty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-three, entitled "An act to reorganize the local government of the city of New York," as amended by chapter four hundred of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, is hereby amended so as to read as follows : § 4. The board of aldermen now in office shall hold office until the first Monday in January in

§ 4. The board of aldermen now in office shall hold office until the first Monday in January in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-three, the same being the term for which they were elected. There shall be twenty-four aldermen elected at the general election, which shall occur in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-two, one of whom shall be elected in the territory embraced in each assembly district as the same existed on the first day of January, eighteen hundred and eighty-two, and shall be residents of the districts in which they are elected. The members of the board of aldermen shall hold office for the space of one year, and shall take office on the first Monday in January next succeeding their election, at noon. Annually thereafter, at the general election there shall be elected a full board of aldermen, as hereinbefore provided. Any vacancy now existing or which may hereafter occur in the board of aldermen by reason of the death or resignation, or of any other cause, of a member of said board, shall be filled by election by said board, by a vote of a majority of all the members elected to said board ; and the person so elected to fill any such vacancy shall serve until the first day of January, at noon, next succeeding the first general election occurring not less than thirty days after the happening of such vacancy, but not beyond the expira-tion of the term in which the vacancy shall occur ; and at such election a person shall be elected to serve the remainder, if any, of such unexpired term. From and after the termination of the term of office of the board of assistant aldermen, as herein provided, the board of aldermen shall alone con-stitute the common council, and shall exercise the entire legislative powers of the said city. Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

NOTICE TO PROPERTY-OWNERS.

IN PURSUANCE OF SECTION 4 OF CHAPTER 33 of the Laws of 1881, the Comptroller of the City of New York hereby gives public notice to property-owners that the following lists of assessments for local improve-ments in said city were confirmed by the "Board ot Re-vision and Correction of Assessments" on the 1rth day of July, 1882, and, on the same date were entered in the Record of Titles of Assessments kept in the "Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments and of Water Rents," viz.: Seventy-first street flagging, north side, between Ninth and Tenth avenues. Minth avenue, fencing vacant lots, between Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets, etc.

JULY 20, 1882.

The above assessments are payable to the Collector of Assessments and Clerk of Arrears, at the "Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments and of Water Rents," from $9 \ A.$ m. until $2 \ P \ M.$, and all payments made thereon, on or before Sept. 13, 1882, will be exempt from interest as above pro-vided, and alter that date will be subject to a charge of interest at the rate of seven per cent per annum from the date of entry in the record of titles of assessments in said Bureau.

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REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK. BY ORDER OF HUBERT O. THOMPSON, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

"The said Commissioner of Public Works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of Croton water, which rents shall be collected in the man-ner now provided by law."—Chap. 574, Sec. 5, Session Laws of 1871.

The regular annual rents to be collected oy the Depart-ment of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit :

PORTER HOUSES, TAVERNS AND GROCERIES shall be charged an extra rate of either ten to twenty-five dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works. LAGER BERE SALOONS, with no water fixtures in the saloon, five dollars per annum. PRINTING OFFICES AND REFECTORIES shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SLAUGHTER HOUSES shall be charged at the rate of five cents for every bullock slaughtered.

five cents for every bullock slaughtered. STEAM ENGINES shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: for each horse-power up to and not ex-ceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; or each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars. The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, and about stables, is prohibited, because it is absolutely necessary to save water for more necessary purposes Where premises are pro-vided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the Police or Inspectors may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS-To each build-The Network of the second seco ther portion of the premises. other

WATER-CLOSET RATES—For hoppers, of any form when water is supplied direct from the Croton sup-ply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each per year twenty dollars. For any pan-closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied

supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars. For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe waste, as provided by the Board of Health Regulations, per year, two dollars.

METERS.

METERS. Under the provisions of section 73, chapter 335, Laws of 1873 (City Charter, water meters, of the pattern ap-roved in accordance with said section 73 of the Charter, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, a wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings. It is provided by section 73, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and set-ting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter. Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet for all manufacturing or other purposes.
