

#### DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held January 8, 1879.

Present-Commissioners Dimock and Vanderpoel.

On motion, Commissioner Dimock took the chair.

The minutes of the meeting held December 31, 1878, were read and approved.

A report was received from the Engineer-in-Chief, with plans duly approved by him, of two piers, etc., to be built at the foot of Houston street, East river, by the Nassau Ferry Company, in pursance of the conditions of the lease purchased by said company at public sale on 16th December, 1878, and, being read,

pursance of the conditions of the lease purchased by said company at public sale on 16th December, 1878, and, being read, On motion, the communication from the Nassau Ferry Company, under date April 16, 1878, was taken from the table and placed on file, and the following resolution adopted : Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to the Nassau Ferry Co., lessee, pursuant to the terms and conditions set forth in the notice of public sale, held December 16, 1878, of wharf property and rights, foot of Houston street, East river, to erect at its own cost and expense in front of the bulkhead on the easterly side of Tompkins street, about 130 feet southerly from the south side of Houston street, extended, a pier upon piles about 225 feet in length and having a width at the outer end of about 24 feet, and inner end of about 53 feet; and also about 32 feet northerly of said pier, another pier on piles about 140 feet long and having a width at the outer end of about 12 feet, and about 52 feet at the bulkhead; with the privilege of placing and erecting in front of said bulk-head such floats, bridges and racks as may be necessary to establish a first class ferry, with the liberty to make from time to time such repairs thereto as may be required; provided, that the said company shall construct and erect both of said piers in conformity with the plans approved this date by the Engineer-in-chief of this Department, and that all the work hereby authorized, including the erection of said floats, bridges and racks, shall be done under the supervision of that officer; and provided further, that the said company shall agree in writing to pay to this Department, as rent for the land under water covered by said first-mentioned pier, the sum of \$300 per annum, payable quar-terly in advance. from and after 1st May, 1870, subject to the stipulations in regard to the tilt to said land under water, contained in the aforesaid notice of sale. 
