SIR—In conformity with section 27, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, we have the honor to submit the following report of the operations and actions of the Department of Docks during the quarter ending December 31, 1874:

ORGANIZATION, APPOINTMENTS, ETC.

Salem H. Wales, appointed Commissioner of Docks, by his Honor S. B. H. Vance, December 11, 1874, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of William Gardner, December 4, 1874, appeared and presented to the Board his certificate of appointment, and stated that he had duly qualified as such Commissioner, and was prepared to enter upon his duties, and thereupon took his seat as a member of the Board of Docks. December 14, 1874.

The President, by virtue of the power conferred by the By-laws, appointed Commissioner Wales as Chairman of the Executive Committee and Auditing Committee, made vacant by the death of Commissioner Gardner. December 14, 1874.

William N. Radenhurst, Draughtsman, to be rated as Inspector, at a salary of \$2,000 per annum, from December 1, 1874. December 8, 1874.

J. W. Bogert, Captain Steam-tug "Alert," resigned, to take effect from and after December 26, 1874.

Charles H. Dixon, appointed Captain Steam-tug "Alert," at a salary of \$125 per month, to take effect December 28, 1874. December 24, 1874.

RULES AND ORDERS.

November 18—The Superintendents of Docks assigned to duty from and after November 23, 1874, as follows:

William McConkey,	to district known as number one.

December 15, 1874—In all cases where a scow is chartered for the use of the Department or a tug is hired for towing, the officer or employee in charge of the Department work at which the scow or tug shall be employed, must cause to be recorded in his journal the name of the tug or scow, the day and hour of its arrival and departure, and the point of its destination, unless discharged from further service, and in event of detention caused by the Department, make a proper note thereof, and upon presentation of the bill for the service rendered, shall certify the same as to the time employed, if correct.

December 18, 1874—All persons encumbering dock property on the North and East rivers, within the jurisdiction of this Department, shall be directed by the Secretary to remove the encumbrance within ten days after receipt of notice, and the Commissioner of Public Works be requested to co-operate with this Department in effecting such removal.

December 24, 1874.—In all cases where charges are preferred against any person in the employ of this Department, either for dereliction of duty, or breach of discipline, such person shall have a hearing before the President or one of the Commissioners of this Board, to be selected by the President, who shall examine into the charges preferred, and report the result to this Board for its final action.

December 24, 1874.—The Engineer-in-Chief and Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies, authorized to suspend, for cause, any men of the working force under their respective supervision, and in such cases, they shall, without delay, transmit to this Board their reasons for such suspension; but in no case shall any such employee be removed except by the action of this Board.

December 31, 1874.—All offices and tally-houses on Piers, for which permits have been or may hereafter be granted by this Board, shall be placed on wheels so as to allow of their being easily moved, to accommodate the traffic of the Piers upon which they are placed, and to prevent the accumulation of dirt.

December 24, 1874.—Commissioners Wales and Budd appointed a Committee to report upon the service rendered by the several employees of the Department, and of their fitness to discharge the duties assigned to each person so employed, and whether the salaries paid are, in any case, in excess of the value of the services rendered.

SECOND.—IMPROVEMENT OF THE WATER-FRONT.

For details of the work of improving the water-front under the new plans adopted, you are respectfully referred to the following report of Charles K. Graham, Engineer-in-Chief of the Department:

SIR—I have the honor to make the following condensed report of the work done under my supervision during the three months ending December 31, 1874, all extended statements and more minute details being necessarily deferred for complete presentation in the customary Annual Report.

The work of the draughtsmen and other employees at the office of the Engineer-in-Chief has been of the usual routine nature—in the preparation of maps, drawings, tracings, specifications, reports, etc., as called for by the requirements of works under construction or proposed, or for the illustration of contracts, or by the orders of the Board of Commissioners. The large map of grants of land under water, on the water-front of the City, was completed, printed, and prepared for delivery during the quarter.

At the Battery section, on new Pier No. 1, North River, the pier-blocks for Arch No. 10 were placed in position and the centre set. The voussoirs and spandrels of Arches Nos. 9 and 10 were also set, and the concrete decking of both arches nearly completed. Two cribs were also built, and Crib No. 10, for Arch No. 11, placed in position and filled with concrete. The base-blocks were also set in this crib. 356 lineal feet of string-pieces have been placed on the pier and 14 oak fenders set. A neat and comfortable waiting-room, or weather shelter, has been constructed at the boat-landing.

At the Christopher street section, which the work done during the quarter has carried very nearly to completion, the following figures present the condition of the works at the present date:

Bulkhead wall, beton blocks laid.....	1,115 lineal feet.
" granite laid.....	1,080 "
" foundation piling laid.....	1,135 "
" equivalent finished length.....	1,100 "

The coping-stones are not yet laid. The total amount of beton blocks employed is 7,242 cubic yards, all laid since May 4, 1874. The total dredging amounts to 200,837 cubic yards. The piers whose completion may be credited to this quarter, although several of them were previously so far advanced as to be in actual commercial use, were as follows:

New piers Nos. 43, 44, 45, 46, and 47; the Hoboken ferry platform; the platform connecting new piers Nos. 46 and 47.

At the King street section, North river, the foundation piles were driven for 150 lineal feet of the new bulkhead wall.

At the Canal street section the caisson is completed for the foundation of the bulkhead wall of beton in mass for a length of 193 lineal feet. This section includes new pier No. 34, now leased to and in use by the Pacific Mail Steamship Company; and which is finished, with the exception of its connection with the bulkhead wall. The dredging done at this section amounts to 14,800 cubic yards.

At the Gansevoort street yard, on the completion of the beton blocks required for the construction of the Christopher street section, those for the Battery section being now manufactured on the spot, and the Canal street section not employing them, the extensive platforms for beton block manufacture were removed, permitting the carrying out of the street improvement at that point. The store-house has also been modified and strengthened, and the floor raised.

At the East Seventeenth street yard, with a view to greater rapidity and economy in the receipt and delivery of cargoes of stone and other material, 1,050 feet of additional railway track have been laid, and by this means stone can be transferred on the stone-truck to and from any part of the yard and the bulkhead. Two tracks have also been laid from the store-house to the bulkhead, and two cars constructed for trucking cement. The work at this yard, of dressing the granite for the bulkhead wall, has been done by a force of stone-cutters, averaging thirty-five in number, and at an average cost of \$1.03 per cubic foot.

The work of rebuilding and repairing wooden piers and bulkheads performed by the Department during the quarter ending December 31, 1874, is as follows:

Pier at One Hundred and Fifty-second street, extended 200 feet by 60 feet, shoot built and spring piles driven at outer end for steamboat landing.

Pier at One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, extended 85 feet by 48 feet, shoot built and spring piles driven at outer end for steamboat landing.

Pier at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, shoot made and spring piles driven at outer end for steamboat landing.

Pier at Twelfth street, small repairs.

Pier at Twenty-sixth street, small repairs.

Pier at Forty-seventh street, surface repaired.

Pier at Fifty-seventh street, surface repaired.

Pier at Twenty-eighth street, sheathed at outer end.

On the

East river—

Pier No. 7, large surface repairs and spring piles driven at outer end.

Pier at Fifth street, substructure and surface repaired.

Pier at Seventy-ninth street, substructure and surface repaired, fendered, etc.

Pier No. 61, sheathed 25 feet by 30 feet.

Pier No. 6, small repairs.

Pier No. 21, small repairs, fence built 12 feet high, 290 feet long.

Pier at Twenty-third street, surface repaired.

Pier at Twenty-sixth street, surface and other repairs.

Dumping-boards—

At Thirty-seventh street, on the North river, and at Jackson and Fifth streets, and Piers Nos. 37 and 61, on the East river, have been repaired, and a number of piles recovered, which had been sunk in the slip foot of Thirty-fourth street, North river.

Dredging—

Has been done at different points on the water-front, and eighty-seven thousand two hundred (87,200) cubic yards of mud, and eleven thousand five hundred and five (11,505) tons of stone, removed.

Lease of Pier 37, East river, except portion used as a dumping-board, for five years from May 1, 1875, at an annual rent of \$3,000. October 1, 1874.
- To Frederick Hoeft and Richard Ficken—
Of the southerly half of Pier No. 55, East river, except outer end thereof, for five years from November 1, 1874, at an annual rent of \$1,700. November 5, 1874.
- To Oceanic Steam Navigation Company—
An allowance granted said company of \$3,750, on rent to be paid November 1, 1874, consequent upon premises leased to said company not been entirely completed for use. November 12, 1874.
- To Society for the Reformation of Juvenile Delinquents—
A reduction of \$1,126.12, made in the rent due from said society, lessees of pier foot of One Hundred and Seventeenth street, Harlem river, owing to north side of said pier being set apart and used by the City since January, 1871. December 24, 1874.
- To William H. Brown—
An allowance of \$168.75, made said party, lessee of Piers Nos. 56 and 57, East river, he having been deprived of the use of said premises while repairs were being made thereto. December 31, 1874.
- To Hoeft, Ficken & Co.—
Lease to said parties of south half of Pier No. 55, East river, granted by resolution, May 14, 1874, rescinded and annulled. November 5, 1874.
- Mutual Benefit Ice Company—
Lease of berth at pier foot of Forty-sixth street, North river, surrendered from and after November 1, 1874. October 22, 1874.
- To Houston Street Ferry Associates—
Of so much of the wharf property and water-rights lying south of the southerly line of Houston street, East river, extended, and east of the easterly line of Tompkins street, extended, as may be necessary for the construction of two ferry slips for the purpose of operating therefrom the ferry now established at the foot of Houston street, East river, for five years from May 1, 1874, with a privilege of two renewals of five years each, at an annual rent of \$6,500 during term of five years from May 1, 1874, \$8,000 per annum during first renewal term, and \$10,000 during second renewal term, if terms and conditions are agreed to. December 12, 1874.
- To New York and Brooklyn Ferry Company—
Of premises foot of Grand street, East river, and of such wharf property as is vested in and owned by the Corporation at the foot of Grand street, Brooklyn, E. D., for the purpose of operating therefrom a ferry, for five years from February 1, 1875, with a privilege of two renewals of five years each, at an annual rent of \$3,000 for first term of five years, \$4,000 per annum for second term, and \$5,000 per annum during second term, if terms and conditions are agreed to. December 31, 1874.
- To Gideon Lee Knapp—
Of ferry premises foot of Twenty-third street, East river, for five years, from May 1, 1874, at an annual rent of \$3,000, if terms and conditions are agreed to. December 31, 1874.

- To Patrick Brady—
For furnishing 8,000 cubic yards of sand, at 79 cents per cubic yard. Total amount of contract, \$6,320. Expires December 9, 1875. Dated December 9, 1874.
- To Charles A. Harrington and John A. Bouker—
For furnishing broken and rip-rap stone, at \$2.40 per cubic yard for broken stone for concrete; \$1.50 per cubic yard for broken stone for foundation; 85 cents per cubic yard for rip-rap. Total amount of contract, \$52,000. Expires December 17, 1875. Dated December 17, 1874.
- To Watrous & Willson—
For furnishing spruce timber and plank timber sawed nine to twelve inches square, from twenty to thirty feet in length, at \$22 per one thousand feet, board measure; plank, three to four inches by nine to twelve inches, from twenty to twenty-five feet in length, \$22 per one thousand feet, board measure. Total amount of contract, \$3,869.80. Expires April 7, 1875. Dated October 7, 1874.

FIFTH.—RECEIPTS AND DISBURSEMENTS.

During the quarter ending December 31, 1874, the sum received by the Department of Docks, from collections and rents of wharf property deposited with the City Chamberlain to the credit of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, amounts to \$189,463.53.

Resolved, That five hundred (500) additional copies of the report of the Police Justices of the City of New York, be printed for the use of the Justices, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.
