POLICE DEPARTMENT.

The Board of Police met on the 29th day of May, 1875.

Present—Messrs. Matsell, Disbecker, Voorhis, and Smith, Commissioners.

The Chief Clerk submitted certain releases of claims against the Police Department, made by Michael Wallace and others of the Morrisania Police, which were ordered on file in the Treasurer's office.

Communication from Israel C. Jones, Superintendent of House of Refuge, asking detail of four Patrolmen on the occasion of their semi-centennial anniversary, and inviting the Commissioners of Police to be present, was referred to the Superintendent, and the Chief Clerk directed to accept the invitation.

Communication from B. J. Hart, Registrar of Permits, transmitted by his Honor the Mayor, relative to violations of city ordinances, was referred to the President to confer with the Mayor and Counsel to the Corporation.

An application of the "Veterans of the Mexican War" for permission to parade, was referred to the Superintendent, with power.

A communication from the "Veterans of the Mexican War," asking that such of their members as are officers or patrolmen in the Police Department be permitted to parade with them, was denied.

Communication from Benjamin A. Willis, Grand Army of the Republic, asking the detail of eight Patrolmen, as an escort to a certain portion of their procession, was referred to the Superintendent.

An application of Patrolman Samuel B. Ryer, Thirty-second Precinct, for detail, was referred to the Committee on Rules and Discipline.

On motion of Commissioner Smith, it was

Resolved, That William May be appointed clerk and assigned to clerical duty for the Committee on Rules and Discipline, at a salary of \$1,500 per annum.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That the Detectives wear a shield of the established numbers, with a ribbon annexed, with the word "Detective" engraved thereon. Lost, all voting no.

The Committee on Rules and Discipline presented the following resolutions, and on their recommendation the same were adopted:

Resolved, That the application of Patrolman Edward Murphy, Twentieth Precinct, for permission to receive ten (\$10) dollars as a reward for arresting William Cunningham, an escaped convict from the Penitentiary, be and is hereby granted.

Resolved, That ex-Patrolman John Mitchell, being (as appears by the opinion of the Corporation Counsel) entitled to pay from 6 P. M., November 25, 1874, to 6 A. M., December 15, 1874, (twenty and a half days) during which period he was suspended from duty; payment for the time mentioned be and is hereby authorized; and that the Treasurer cause such payment to be made on a special pay-roll.

SIR—In obedience to instructions calling for a meeting of the Board of Surgeons and the appointment of a committee for the purpose of examining into the material landed from the scows at Harlem Flats, the character of the material deposited, the condition of that portion and locality known as Harlem Flats, where no material has thus far been deposited, and the condition of that locality as to its healthfulness. We have also embraced in the report the opinions that we have formed on the question whether portions already filled in are in any way dangerous to health. We have also inquired into the manner

of the filling in, whether it has been accomplished in accordance with the best plan that can be devised under the circumstances. We have also suggested the measure that we deem necessary to be pursued, not only for the time being, but to be continued, to insure the health of all those living in that section of the surrounding neighborhood.

In the examination of the scows that were unloading at the foot of Ninety-seventh street, at the time we visited this locality (half-past four P. M.), and the wind being southeast, we found that, on walking to the dock beyond First avenue, there was very little odor from the unloading of the scows and the dumping of the refuse. Had there been any great amount of dead vegetable material, with the wind so blowing, it would have been quite impossible to have avoided the noxious smells, if any had existed. We found that under the rule adopted by the Board of Health, and strictly enforced by the Inspector at the dock, that no loads are permitted to landed if containing more than five per cent. of garbage.

On an inspection of the loads at the dock—of which we made a thorough examination—there was not in our judgment more than two or three per cent. of garbage; and of straw and shavings about one per cent., and one per cent. more would cover all the other materials considered unfit for filling-in purposes.

This, then, shows that the bulk of the filling-in material is ninety-five per cent. ashes and street-sweepings.

The course pursued in disinfecting at the dock is as follows: The lime is slackened in water sufficiently to form a light powder and mixed with dead oil—eight gallons to one barrel of lime.

After it is prepared, each cart-load, before it leaves the scow, is thoroughly covered with this disinfectant. There are ten men under the Board of Health detailed at the unloading grounds at the Flats to carry out the instructions of the Health Board. As to the men employed there and the people occupying shanties along the borders of the Flats, we found them in a condition of health not surpassed by those living in any other locality in the city. We found sixty-five cartmen; and twenty-eight laborers employed in the removal of dirt from the scows, and not one of them, thought several had worked there years, had had a day's sickness from malarial disease. The whole area between Ninety-second and One Hundred and Sixth streets, and Third avenue and the East river, together with a portion between Third and Fourth avenues, and One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Eighth streets, was passed over by us and the condition of its surface carefully examined.

The two blocks between Third and Fourth avenues, and One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Seventh streets, have been recently filled, and are in a very satisfactory condition, being four feet at least above high water mark, and covered with three feet of fresh earth. That portion of ground between Ninety-fifth and Ninety-ninth streets, from Second avenue to the river, is filled to the grade of Second avenue, and is free from all objections. That portion between Ninety-second and Ninety-fifth streets; also the portion between Ninety-ninth and One Hundred and Third streets, and east of the Third avenue, is that portion of the Flats which has been filled in under the direction of the Department of Public Works. The depth of filling deposited on the meadow surface is about two and a half feet.

It was evident to us, after a thorough examination of this section, that this depth of filling in was insufficient to bring the grade of the land above, and to be free from any overflow of any high tide. No objection can be found with the filling itself, but it is the lack of depth of soil which could and should be remedied by a greater depth of filling in. That portion between Ninety-ninth and One Hundred and Sixth streets, and east of First avenue; also the block between Third and Fourth avenues, and One Hundred and Seventh and One Hundred and Ninth streets, as well as the blocks between One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Eighth streets, between Second and Third avenues, and the blocks between One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Ninth streets, and Third avenue and East river, have received no filling, and are consequently subject to tidal overflows.

These, of course, are unhealthy localities, and the only effective remedy is to fill them in. We scarcely deem it necessary to enter into any account of the causes of the unhealthfulness of the swamp lands that are subject to overflows and are constant deposits of pools of stagnant water. This is too well understood to need more than a mere mention in this report. A thorough investigation of the topography of the whole of that section of the city known as Harlem Flats, extending from Ninety-second street as far as One Hundred and Tenth street, and from the East side of the Fourth avenue to the edge of the East river, made with special reference to its bearing on the health not only of this section but surrounding suburbs of the city, forces us to the following conclusions:

First—The most unhealthy parts of this section are the swamps that were never filled in (marked blue in the map.)

Second—The only unhealthy features of those portions that have been filled are spaces that have not been sufficiently filled in to bury the poisonous effluvia that arises after being submerged, which now and then occurs after a very high tide; these parts (marked red in the map), have only received about thirty inches of filling as far as we can judge. This section is the portion recently filled under the direction of the Department of Public Works. The filling, as far as it has been extended, is undoubtedly a great improvement, but a sufficient amount has not been deposited over the meadows to bring them to a grade that cannot be overflowed by any tide. Unpleasant odors undoubtedly arise from this section, and which must continue until more filling of natural soil is deposited.

Third—As an evidence of the fact that no injurious influence is exerted by immediate contact with the material used for filling in the health of the persons employed by the contractors bears sufficient testimony. These facts we deem ample proof that the material used and the manner of filling in is not, under any circumstances, injurious to health.

Fourth—The description we have given of the character and composition of the dirt, the thorough manner in which it is disinfected, the good condition of all those laboring on the scows, those carrying the dirt, and living in the immediate vicinity is, in our judgment, ample proof that the whole work is properly and scientifically performed.

Fifth—There can be no permanent or entire immunity from noxious odors until the whole of this swamp lands in this section have been entirely and completely filled in. This we regard as the only remedy that will be a permanent benefit. The odors arising from the stagnant pools in the depressed portions of the meadow extending north of Ninety-ninth street as far as One Hundred and Second street, and east of First avenue, are especially offensive, and demand immediate attention.

Sixth—The dirt is composed of about five per cent. of street sweeping and ashes as shown on the scows and in the parts filled in. It forms a hard and concrete mass when sufficiently deposited, that is proof against any effects of temperature, rain, or even overflow (marked black in map), and does not emit any injurious or unhealthy odors, and particularly so when covered with two feet of natural earth.

This conclusion was especially impressed upon us from the examination we made of the two blocks bounding One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Seventh streets and the Third and Fourth avenues.

Seventh—We would respectfully suggest, as a measure of improvement, that it may be advisable to apply the disinfectant while the scows are being loaded, and also the covering of pure earth over the deposited dirt be kept closer to the original filling, there being in some instances a hundred feet of street sweepings filling ahead of the pure earth covering.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to issue permits for the removal of manure before 10 A. M. and after 6 P. M., from stables where the carts are unable to enter the inclosed yards or stables.

That the Boards of Health of Brooklyn and Long Island City be respectfully requested to meet this Board for consultation and co-operation in respect to certain alleged nuisances, which are complained of by residents of the three cities.

Whereas, The condition of that part of Lexington avenue, lying between One Hundred and Ninth and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets, the contracts for the grading and paving of which are not yet let, is dangerous to life and detrimental to health, by reason of privy-vaults upon said avenue, which require immediate cleaning and filling; therefore,

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent be authorized and directed to contract for the cleaning and filling of said privy-vaults, at an expense not to exceed four hundred dollars.

That the resolution adopted May 25, asking the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer the sum of \$5,000 from the Police Fund of 1874, to the Health Fund of 1875, for the purpose of disinfecting the garbage and street sweepings of the Street Cleaning Bureau of said Police Department, be rescinded, other arrangements having been made for such necessary disinfection.

That the Board of Police be respectfully requested to detail, temporarily, an officer to each of the three ambulances employed by this Department in the removal of small-pox patients from this city to Riverside Hospital, for the purpose of preventing persons from approaching such patients while being removed, and thereby contracting the disease and spreading the contagion.

That the New York Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children be respectfully informed that this Board does not see the propriety of acceding to the request contained in a resolution adopted by said society on the 31st of May, for the appointment of the Secretary of said society as an Assistant Sanitary Inspector, without salary, in this Department; and that said society be assured that any complaints upon any subject within the province of this Department, will receive prompt attention from its sanitary officers.

That the communication of Dr. G. Treskatis, in respect to certain violations of the Sanitary Code, lie on the table.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending May 29, 1875. The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,754, as follows, viz.:

1 public building, 745 tenement houses, 89 private dwellings, 202 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 10 stores and warehouses, 53 stables, 66 slaughter-houses, 3 manure

heaps, 1 cattle-yard, 5 dumping-grounds, 1 tunnel, 3 roadways, 11 fat-rendering establishments, 52 sunken and vacant lots, 63 yards, courts, and areas, 66 cellars and basements, 53 waste-pipes and drains, 170 privies and water-closets, 31 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 12 dangerous stairways, 1 cistern and cesspool, 1 dangerous chimney, 14 other nuisances, and 90 visits to contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 618.

During the past week 116 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

396 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

65 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of this Port.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 114 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected 102 houses. They have also disinfected 3,271 privies, 30 cellars, 55 yards and 150 miles of street gutters.

The Ambulance Corps have removed 64 cases of small-pox to the hospital, and 1 dead body to the morgue.

3 tanks and 1,295 cans of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending May 29, 1875: cattle, 1 carcass; calves, "bob," 6 carcasses; calves, "case," 2 carcasses; hogs, 11 carcasses; beef, 250 pounds; poultry, 14 pounds; game, 65 pounds; fish, 8,780 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending May 29, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 524 burial permits for city deaths, 39 for bodies *in transitu*, and 57 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 524 deaths, 165 marriages, 369 births, 57 still-births, 39 applications for transit permits, and 69 returns from Coroners. There were 22 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 24 transcripts of death-record, were issued from this Bureau. 2 cases of deaths were referred to Coroners.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, for the week ending May 29, 1875.

The Commissioners received a deputation of fifteen gentlemen representing the North Side and Central Associations of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, who urged the adoption and filing, as soon as possible, of the maps laying out said wards. The following preambles and resolutions adopted by the Central Association were presented by the deputation to the Commissioners, viz:

Whereas, The members of this association deem the question of health to the citizens of the annexed district of paramount importance, and that the proper drainage of said district would add materially to its healthfulness and prosperity; and

Whereas, A topographical survey has been made, and a map prepared at a considerable outlay of money, raised by taxation in this district during the past seven years, under the supervision of the Department of Public Parks, which map has been inspected and carefully considered by, and received the approval of the taxpayers of the district, they believing that the adoption of said map and plans would be in the interest of the inhabitants and property owners; and

Whereas, This association is informed that the Board of Commissioners have meditated and considered the expediency of material changes in the matter of laying out said district, which, if adopted, would undoubtedly result in a new survey and change of the existing map and plans, thereby causing unnecessary delay, a useless expenditure of a large amount of money and the probable presentation of a map and plans less meritorious than those now existing; and

Whereas, This association of taxpayers was organized for the purpose of advancing the interest, not only of the property owner, but of those who might be induced to become residents among us, and believing that the speedy completion of the improvements contemplated would bring about the objects sought by this association; therefore be it

Resolved, That we do earnestly protest against any material change in the topographical survey of this district, and the plans of improvements as now proposed; and respectfully ask the Commissioners of Public Parks to adopt said survey and plans at once, and to proceed without further delay with the work of drainage in this district and opening the main avenues, thereby affording us that relief to which we are entitled;
