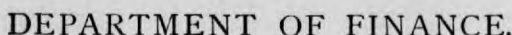

No. 20960. Cost of driving pile at the bath-house foot of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, North river, \$34 52, for collection from Philip F. Donohue.

No. 20963. Cost of cutting three gangways and driving spring piles on the south side of Pier, old 56½, North river, \$162.40, for collection from Benjamin Griggs.

No. 20968. Cost of redriving four piles near the foot of Sixty-eighth street, East river, \$120.07, for collection from the Central Brewing Company.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company, to construct a subsidiary connection for The New York Edison Company, leading to Pier, new 30, North river; all pavement to be replaced by the force of this Department at the cost and expense of said subway company.

Maine Steamship Company, to drive piles for fender rack for the protection of the outer end of the southerly side of Pier, new 32, East river.

New York and East River Ferry Company, to repair their ferry slips at the foot of East Ninety-second street, Borough of Manhattan, and at Astoria, Borough of Queens.

New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, to repair the Pier north of the transfer slips at Oak Point, Borough of the Bronx.

Peter Van Idenstine's Sons, to drive a row of piles in front of their crib-bulkhead on Newtown creek, at Blissville, Borough of Queens, about 800 feet south of the second bridge.

Louis Bossert & Son, to rebuild their bulkhead platform north of Grand street, Newtown creek, Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with plans to be hereafter approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

Mollenhauer Sugar Refining Company, to repair the Pier foot of South Eleventh street, Borough of Brooklyn.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

New York and College Point Ferry Company, to place a wheel-guard in front of the ferry-house at the foot of Ninety-ninth street, East river.

William L. Oliver, to maintain a boat-house and float at the foot of One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street, Harlem river, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

S. Tuttle's Son & Co., to erect a mast and gaff at the foot of Wilson street, on the east side of Wallabout creek, Borough of Brooklyn, and to repair their coal pocket thereat, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted as amended.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Comptroller—

1st. Advising that his certificate has been indorsed upon Contract No. 705, for building a steel tug, and that same is now a valid contract.

2d. In relation to substitution of surety on Contract No. 710.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted for the substitution of Thomas W. Kiley as surety, in place of James J. Phelan, on the estimate of James D. Leary, for building two crib-bulkheads between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, Harlem river, and for doing the necessary dredging thereat, under Contract No. 710.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Approving forms of Contracts Nos. 712 and 713.

2d. Approving form of bond submitted by the Uvalde Asphalt Paving Company for maintaining in good repair the asphalt pavement between Barclay and Warren streets, North river.

3d. Transmitting approved forms of leases of the Pier to be built at the foot of West Ninety-sixth street, to the New York Contracting and Trucking Company; and of a portion of the premises at Pier, old 42, and at the foot of West Fifty-fifth street, on the North river, and at the foot of Fortieth street, on the East river, to John Fleming. Commissioners authorized to execute same.

4th. Transmitting bills of costs as taxed by the Supreme Court in proceedings for the acquisition of Piers, old 4, new 7, and Pier, old 12, and of the bulkheads between Eighteenth and Twentieth streets, and between Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets, including the piers foot of Nineteenth and Twenty-first streets, East river. Chief Clerk directed to draw the necessary requisitions therefor.

5th. Advising that the claims against the North German Lloyd Steamship Company for the cost of repairing Pier, new 31, North river, where damaged by the steamship "Bremen," amounting to \$5,455.20; and against the New York & College Point Ferry Company for cost of removing the ferry structures at the foot of East One Hundredth street, Harlem river, amounting to \$1,312.96 cannot be collected. Treasurer authorized to charge off said claims on the books of the Department.

From the Department of Public Charities—Requesting that piles be driven on the east side of Randall's Island to enable said Department to renew the crib thereat. Engineer-in-Chief directed to drive the necessary piles as requested.

From the Bureau of Municipal Statistics—Requesting certain information in relation to the water-front of the city. Action of the Secretary in furnishing same approved.

From the St. John's Guild—Requesting permission to moor the floating hospitals during the summer season at the foot of Fifteenth street, North river, and at the foot of Twenty-eighth street, East river, and to take on and land passengers at the piers foot of West Thirty-fifth and West Fiftieth streets, North river, foot of East Third street, East Twenty-fourth street, East One Hundred and Twelfth street, Harlem river, and foot of North Second street, Borough of Brooklyn. Application granted, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Board.

From the Bleecker Street & Fulton Ferry Railroad Company—Transmitting agreement consenting to the dissolution of the injunction restraining this Department from proceeding with the improvement of the water-front between Fourteenth and Twenty-third streets, North river, provided this Department will relay said company's tracks on the newly made land after the improvements shall have been completed. Commissioners authorized to execute an agreement to that effect, and the Secretary directed to transmit same to the Corporation Counsel when executed.

From John Fleming—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolutions adopted July 1, 1901, agreeing to lease to him certain wharf property at Pier, old 42, North river, foot of West Fifty-fifth street, and at the foot of East Fortieth street.

From New York Contracting and Trucking Company—Accepting terms of resolution leasing Pier foot of West Ninety-sixth street.

From Bernard Rolf—Transmitting consent of sureties to extension of time to June 18, 1901, granted him for the completion of Contract No. 688.

From Anning J. Smith—Stating that he will not land the steamer "Nassau" at the Battery Landing on Sundays. Permit revoked.

From the Pennsylvania Railroad Company—

1st. Stating that no obstructions will be permitted on the newly made land between Piers, new 28 and 29, North river.

2d. Requesting permission to rebuild the Pier at the foot of North Fourth street, Borough of Brooklyn, and to extend same a distance of about 105 feet, and to construct a frame shed on said pier when completed.

On motion, permission was granted to rebuild and extend the pier as requested, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department in accordance with plans submitted; and the application for permission to erect a frame shed on the pier was denied, the plans therefor being in violation of the Building Code.

From the People's Co-operative Ice Company—

1st. Requesting permission to unload ice from its barges at the bulkhead between Charles and West Tenth streets, North river. Application denied.

2d. Requesting a lease of a portion of a pier below Houston street, East river, for the construction of an ice bridge thereat. Secretary directed to state that there are no vacant berths at present in that location.

From the Dock Superintendent—

1st. Report for the week ending July 6, 1901.

2d. Reporting that the steamer "Drew" vacated the berth at the Pier foot of Thirty-ninth street, North river, on June 28, 1901, and recommending that the permit therefor be revoked as of that date. Recommendation adopted.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Report for the year ending December 31, 1900.

2d. Reports for the two weeks ending July 6, 1901.

3d. Reporting the completion of the work of dredging on the East and Harlem rivers under Contract No. 695, June 27, 1901.

4th. Recommending that the permit granted the John P. Kane Company to use and occupy the newly made land on the north half of the block between Ninety-sixth and Ninety-seventh streets, North river, be canceled, to take effect July 15, 1901, in order that the work of building the Pier at the foot of West Ninety-sixth street may be proceeded with. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Recommending that the Fire Department be notified that the fire-boat "Zophar Mills" must be removed from the Pier foot of West Thirteenth street, as said pier is to be removed. Recommendation adopted.

6th. Recommending that William Bradley be directed to remove the stone dumped from one of his carts at the foot of West Fifty-second street, North river. Recommendation adopted, and the Secretary directed to notify said Bradley that unless said stone is removed within five days the work will be done by the force of this Department at his cost and expense.

7th. Recommending that the Department of Sewers be requested to repair the sewer at the foot of Ninety-sixth street, North river. Recommendation adopted.

8th. Recommending that the Department of Water Supply be requested to repair the water-pipe leading to Pier, new 16, North river. Recommendation adopted.

9th. Submitting list of old material and recommending that same be sold at public auction. On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That Philip A. Smyth, auctioneer, be and he is hereby authorized to sell on behalf of this Board, on Thursday, July 25, 1901, the old material as recommended by the Engineer-in-Chief, including the ferry house south of Thirteenth street, North river.

10th. Recommending that the sweepers' shanty on the Fordham Dock, Borough of The Bronx, recently destroyed, be replaced; that fenders be placed on the cluster of piles at the fire-boat landing at the Battery, and that a broken mooring pile on Pier, old 12, East river, be replaced, the work to be done by the force of the Department. Recommendations adopted.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Murphy, submitted his report of receipts for the week ending July 4, 1901, amounting to \$105,960.76, which was received and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

The action of the Secretary in transmitting the same, with requisitions for the amount, to the Finance Department for payment approved.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to request the Corporation Counsel to prepare a lease to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company of the land under water occupied by ferry structures, etc., at the foot of Desbrosses street, North river, amounting to 55,682 square feet, at the rate of 25 cents per square foot per annum, from June 1, 1901, the date on which the structures were ready for occupancy, in accordance with the resolution adopted September 20, 1894.

The Secretary reported that the pay-roll for the week ending July 5, 1901, amounting to \$15,747.51, had been approved, audited and transmitted to the Department of Finance for payment.

The Board then went into executive session.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—

1st. Stating that Thomas F. Lynch successfully passed the examination for promotion to the position of Chainman.

WE, THE UNDERSIGNED, COMMISSIONERS of Estimate and Assessment in the above-entitled matter, hereby give notice to all persons interested in this proceeding, and to the owner or owners, occupant or occupants of all houses and lots and improved and unimproved lands affected thereby, and to all others whom it may concern, to wit:

First—That we have completed our estimate and assessment, and that all persons interested in this proceeding, or in any of the lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises affected thereby, and having objections thereto, do present their said objections, in writing, duly verified, to us at our office, Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, on or before the 21st day of September, 1901, and that we, the said Commissioners, will hear parties so objecting, and for that purpose will be in attendance at our said office on the 1st day of October, 1901, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Second—That the abstract of our said estimate and assessment, together with our damage and benefit maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates, proofs and other documents used by us in making our report, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings of the Law Department of The City of New York, Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, in said city, there to remain until the 30th day of September, 1901.
