# DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At an adjourned meeting of the Board of Docks, held Thursday, July 11, 1901, at 2 o'clock

Present-President Cram and Commissioner Meyer.

Absent—Commissioner Murphy.

The minutes of the meeting held July 1, 1901, were approved.

The report of the President recommending that three months' notice be given the Hoboken Ferry Company to vacate the premises at the foot of Fourteenth street, North river, the property being required for the new improvement now under way, together with the application of the Hoboken Ferry Company requesting that the Manhattan terminus of the Hoboken Ferry be changed from the foot of West Fourteenth street to a point south of the Erie Ferry Station, between Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets, North river, after the improvements shall have

between Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets, North river, after the improvements shall have been completed, was received.

On motion, the application of the Hoboken Ferry Company for a change in the Manhattan terminus was referred to the Treasurer and Commissioner Meyer to examine and report as to whether such transfer is practicable, and the following preambles and resolutions were adopted.
