My Dear Sir—At the last meeting of your Honorable Board the application of this Department for one hundred thousand dollars corporate bonds for improvement of parks and parkways, authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, was reported adversely by the Finance Committee, and their report approved by the Board.

This action, according to the public press, was caused by a statement male by the Chairman of the Finance Committee that the Park Commissioner for the Borough of The Bronx had declined to appear before the Committee and explain the need for this money, notwithstanding he had been twice invited so to do; and it would appear from the statements in the public press that the action of the Board of Aldermen was based on the belief that I had been disrespectful to your Honorable Board or its Committee and negligent in my duties; and if the facts stated were true I should agree heartily with the action of the Board, but as I never received either of the invitations sent by the Committee, and knew nothing about any meeting

of the Finance Committee in which this matter was to be considered, it would seem rather strange that they took such hasty action without finding out whether their notices had been received by me.

The next day after the meeting I called on the Clerk of your Board to find out

The next day after the meeting I called on the Clerk of your Board to find out when and where the notices were sent, thinking they must have miscarried, and I was surprised to learn that they had no record of any notice having been sent to me or of any meeting of the Finance Committee having been held to consider the matter of the bond issue for this Department. I have been further surprised to learn that similar bond issues for the other two departments have been approved by your Board, without the Commissioners being notified to attend a meeting of the Finance Committee.

I most respectfully ask that you appoint an investigating committee to inquire into this matter in order that I may, in a proper way, deny the charge so publicly made of neglect of duty and disrespect to your Honorable Board.

The maxium salary now paid and that has been paid for many years is \$1,200.

Before consolidation officers in New York and Brooklyn were appointed at \$1,000 for the first year and advanced to \$1,200 by action of the Board of Education.

At present under this schedule twenty-four (24) officers in Manhattan and The Bronx and nine (9) officers in Brooklyn receive \$1,200.

In Brooklyn five (5) officers appointed in 1900 at \$1,000 were raised to \$1,100 in 1901 with the understanding that in 1902, as provided in the schedule of salaries for Attendance Officers adopted by the Brooklyn Borough Board, the salary should be \$1,200. Since consolidation of the schools under the new Charter this provision has not been carried out, but, on the contrary, they were reduced to \$1,050 to conform not been carried out, but, on the contrary, they were reduced to \$1,050 to conform to a new schedule.

The budget of the Board of Education, approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the year 1903, provided for the increase of the salaries of the five (5) Brooklyn officers, and for the increase of the salaries of several other officers in other boroughs (see pages 2105, 2262, 2292, 2306 of the Journal of the Board of Edu-

cation)

cation).

The Board of Education had intended to put the new schedule into effect January I, 1903, subject to the approval of your Honorable Board.

A careful investigation of the work required and of the efficiency of these officers has been made. It is found that the work required in all the districts in Brooklyn and Queens and some of the districts in Richmond is as difficult and as exacting as in the districts where the officers are receiving \$1,200.

It is important that a uniform schedule be established whenever the work is of equal difficulty, because the officers are frequently transferred from one borough to another, as has been the case of three officers transferred to Manhattan this year.

The Board of Education realizes that justice to the officers and a proper recognition of merit and fitness demands the proposed increases.

I. Openings of Street or Sewer—No person or corporation shall open or excavate any highway or place any encumbrances thereupon, or open any public sewer or private sewer leading into a public sewer, or any private sewer in a public street, or cause any of the above acts to be performed in the Borough of Richmond without a permit issued by the President of the Borough, or his duly authorized representative.

sentative.

2. Application for Permit—Application for such permit must be made in writing to the President of the Borough, upon blank forms to be furnished by him, such form of application to contain a diagram of the location affected, with the dimensions of street surface to be disturbed.

3. Time—Work must be begun within twenty-four (24) hours from the time of issuance of the permit, and be prosecuted without unnecessary delay to completion.

4. Refilling Trenches—Excavations in public streets shall be refilled by the party by whom such excavation was made, but only under the supervision and at all times in the presence of a City Inspector specially assigned to the work by the Superintendent of Highways, whose duty shall be to see that each and every part of the filling shall be placed and thoroughly rammed in layers of not more than eight (8) inches in depth up to the level of the bottom of the street pavement. The street pavement shall be loosely and temporarily replaced by the party by whom the excavation had been made, but in such manner as, in the opinion of the City Inspector, shall be safe for travel.

5. Guarding—Any trench or opening or incumbrance upon the highway shall at all times be properly guarded for the prevention of accidents, and be properly lighted at night.

Sidewalks Protected—Where any heavy teaming is necessary across sidewalks, either the flagstones shall be removed and a clean dry walk maintained, or the crossing shall be so thoroughly protected with heavy planking as to prevent injury thereto and present no obstruction to the safe use of the same by pedestrians.

20. Non-interference with Traffic, etc.—All work to be done must be carried on in such manner as not to unnecessarily interrupt business on the streets, or in any way interfere with existing sewers, piping, subways, tracks or other public conveniences or utilities already laid under authority.

Snow Removal—The person or corporation to whom a permit for street opening is granted must remove within twenty-four (24) hours all snow and ice that may fall or form upon the street within five feet upon either side of the opening, and keep the space free from snow and ice until the opening is properly refilled.

22. Competent Men—All work must be carried out by men competent and skilled in their respective duties, and full compliance must be given to all laws affecting the work or the employment of labor.

Dear Sir—I send you herewith a map and technical description for the extension of Grand street, from Union avenue to Havemeyer and South Fifth streets, in order to make an approach to the new East river bridge.
