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## ART COMMISSION.

### MINUTES OF SPECIAL MEETING OF ART COMMISSION HELD AT ITS OFFICE, ROOM 21, CITY HALL, ON TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 18, 1906, AT 4 O'CLOCK P. M.

Present—President de Forest, presiding, Commissioners Healy, Beckwith, Cook, Boyle and Hon. James W. Stevenson, Commissioner of Bridges, in respect to the designs for the Blackwell's Island Bridge approach, Queens.

On communications from Commissioners Mansfield, Bigelow and Crimmins, explaining their absence, they were excused.

The Committee on Blackwell's Island Bridge Approach, Queens, recommended that the designs (of a public structure exceeding \$1,000,000 in cost) submitted by Hon. John H. Little, Acting Commissioner of Bridges, be approved.

On motion the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs and location of the approach to the Blackwell's Island Bridge, in the Borough of Queens, represented by Exhibits "61-S," "61-T," "61-U" and "61-V," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified, with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted, to Hon. James W. Stevenson, Commissioner of Bridges.

The Committee was thereupon discharged.

Submission 476.

The Committee on Ralph Avenue Fire Station, Brooklyn, recommended that the designs submitted (on request of the Mayor) by Mr. Walter E. Parfitt, architect, be approved.

On motion the following resolution was adopted, Commissioner Beckwith asking to be recorded as voting in the negative:

On Tuesday, July 31, 1906, the meeting was adjourned.

Minutes of Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, Tuesday, August 7, 1906, at 12 o'clock noon.

Present—Commissioners Cowan (President), Ten Eyck, Ryan and Windolph and Chief Engineer Sears and William H. Burr, Expert Engineer.

## TO CONTRACTORS.

## CROTON FALLS RESERVOIR.

Sealed bids or proposals will be received by the Aqueduct Commissioners at the above office until 12 o'clock noon on Tuesday, August 7, 1906, at which place and hour the bids will be publicly opened and read; the award of the contract, if awarded, will be made by the Aqueduct Commissioners as soon thereafter as practicable, for constructing a reservoir, including the building of a large masonry dam across the west branch of the Croton river, an earth diverting dam across the east branch of the Croton river and an open connecting channel. The site of the main dam is about one mile by road north of the Croton Falls station of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, Harlem Division, approximately forty-eight miles from New York. The site of the diverting dam is about two miles southwest of Brewster's station on the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, Harlem Division, approximately fifty-two miles from New York.

The security required will be five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000).

The contract will be required to be completed within thirty-two consecutive months following the month in which the contract is signed by the Commissioners.

The main dam is to be built of cyclopean masonry with a facing of concrete blocks. The diverting dam is to be built of earth and will have a core wall of cyclopean masonry.

Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer contained in the foregoing report, the salaries of Frederick B. Faitoute and Daniel P. Lanahan, Inspectors of Masonry, and John D. White and Michael M. Reynolds, Superintendents of Dam Construction, be and hereby are fixed at the rate of \$5 a day each, to take effect August 14, 1906.

Resolutions of Board of Aldermen, dated July 10, 1906, in regard to granting leave of absence to member of Medal of Honor Legion and to Civil War Veterans to attend

annual convention and encampment, were ordered filed and the Secretary and Chief Engineer directed to comply with the resolutions so far as practicable.

Communication from the Comptroller, dated August 3, 1906, transmitting report of Engineer of Finance Department, dated August 2, in regard to voucher for \$75 in favor of William J. Flanagan for erecting gate at private entrance of Muscoot Dam, under resolution adopted February 13, 1906, was referred to the Chief Engineer for a report.

The Commissioners then adjourned until Thursday, August 9, 1906, at 2 p. m.

Resolved. That sections 68 and 69 of the Sanitary Code be and the same are hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 68. No person shall have, sell or offer for sale in the City of New York any food which is adulterated or misbranded. The term food as herein used shall include every article of food and every beverage used by man and all confectionery.

Food as herein defined shall be deemed adulterated:

(a) If any substance or substances has or has been mixed and packed with it so as to reduce or lower or injuriously affect its quality or strength.

(b) If any inferior or cheaper substances have been substituted wholly or in part for the article.

(c) If any valuable constituent of the article has been wholly or in part abstracted.

(d) If it consists wholly or in part of diseased or decomposed or putrid or rotten animal or vegetable substance, or any portion of any animal unfit for food, whether manufactured or not, or if it is a product of a diseased animal, or one that has died otherwise than by slaughter.

(e) If it be colored or coated or polished or powdered, whereby damage is concealed or it is made to appear better than it really is.
