Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:
From March 15 to March 21, inclusive, thirty-seven operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, two at Gouverneur Hospital, twenty-one at Harlem Hospital and eleven at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the Attending Surgeons or their

at Bellevue Hospital, two at Gouverneur Hospital, twenty-one at Harlem Hospital and eleven at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the Attending Surgeons or their Assistants were present.

A conference was held with the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital regarding the Out-Patient Department. The great increase in six years of more than 80 per cent, is still continued. For example, in an average of thirteen days in the month of March there were six physicians to attend 224 medical cases and eighty physicians for 122 surgical cases. Consequently the physicians are overworked and the patients are seen hastily. As it is impossible to have any more physicians work in the institution than there are at present, and as it is also impossible to give any additional room in the hospital for the use of the Out-Patient Department, there is but one solution of the problem, and that is to have the City acquire additional ground (preferably a vacant lot to the northeast of the hospital) and erect a dispensary building on this site.

Attention is again invited to the fact that the contract of John Fury for the construction of a coal vault at Gouverneur Hospital should have been completed on December 18, and it is recommended that the architect take means to insure prompt completion of the work or have it declared abandoned.

An estimate has been received from the Kny-Scheerer company at \$270, and one from the Hospital Supply Company at \$260, on four aseptic instrument cabinets needed for Gouverneur Hospital. A careful inspection has been made of the sample cabinets submitted by each of these firms, and the Supervising Engineer reports that from the structural standpoint the cabinet manufactured by the Kny-Scheerer Company is the better. It is therefore recommended that authority be granted to purchase the four cabinets from that company.
