GENTLEMEN—In the matter of a communication from the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, under date of January 22, requesting certain transfers within the appropriations made for the Aquarium in the Budget for the year 1909, which was referred to me for consideration, I submit the following report:

The transfers requested are only within appropriations provided for the maintenance of the Aquarium, which, while nominally under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, is directly managed by the New York Zoological Society, under the terms of a contract or lease made with the City. GENTLEMEN—A communication addressed to the Secretary of your Board by the Board of Health, transmitting a copy of a resolution adopted by said Board of Health on February 4, 1910, requesting the transfer of \$1,300 from the appropriation made to the Department of Health for the year 1910, entitled No. 290, Division of Communicable Diseases, Contingencies, to the appropriation entitled No. 1334, Rents, for the same year, has been referred to me for consideration.

I would report that it appears the Board of Health, December 22, 1909, adopted resolutions requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize the Comptroller to execute leases to the City of the premises No. 339 East One Hundred and

Ninth street, Manhattan; No. 362 Bradford street, Brooklyn, and No. 493 East One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, The Bronx, for use as clinics for the treatment of pulmonary diseases, at an aggregate annual rental of \$1,560.

It has been ascertained that there are insufficient funds in the general Budget appropriation for Rents, to which rentals such as those proposed to be paid are properly chargeable, and the Board of Health agrees to the transfer of the necessary amount from its Departmental Contingencies appropriation to provide means for the leasing of the above premises from and after March 1, 1910, viz., \$1,300.

In the Budget for 1910, about \$250,000 over that provided for the same purpose in 1909 was allowed to the Division of Communicable Diseases for the prosecution of the work against the spread of tuberculosis. The funds necessary for the payment of staffs in three new tuberculosis clinics, as well as for supplies, etc., were included in that extra allowance. DEAR SIR—I am instructed by the Justices of this court to request that you change the present line heading in the Budget appropriation of the Court of Special Sessions, First Division, for the year 1910, from: "One Clerk at \$720 and \$480 unassigned," so as to read: "One Clerk at \$1,200."

The reasons for making this request are: The Justices last year promoted Mr. James F. O'Connell, a Clerk in this office, receiving \$720 a year, to an existing vacancy of a Clerkship at \$1,200 a year. There was a Civil Service technicality that stood in the way of Mr. O'Connell's receiving this position. The position of a Clerkship at \$720 was abolished by the Justices, although the position had already been graded according to section 56 of the Charter. In order that Mr. O'Connell could receive his salary in 1910 it was necessary that the line heading of the Budget be changed from a Clerk at \$1,200 to one Clerk at \$720 and \$480 unassigned.

What the Justices ask now is that this \$1,200 position be restored. The Civil Service Commission has acquiesced in this, and the technicality above referred to has been removed.

GENTLEMEN—In the matter of the application of the Justices of the Court of Special Sessions, First Division, dated February 10, 1910, for a further modification of

the schedule supporting the budgetary salary appropriation for said court for 1910, I would report as follows:

The Budget for 1910 provided for one Clerk at \$1,200 per annum. The allowance of this amount for the salary of the position was made at the request of the Justices of said Court, who desired to promote James F. O'Connell, a Clerk who was receiving a salary of \$720 per annum. After Mr. O'Connell had been appointed to the position of Clerk at the rate of \$1,200 per annum, a civil service technicality arose which prevented him receiving salary at said rate for the month of January. The budgetary salary appropriation for 1910 was therefore amended in order that he should receive a salary for the month of January at the rate of \$720 per annum.

I am informed by William M. Fuller, Chief Clerk of the Court, that the Municipal Civil Service Commission has notified him that the technicality which prevented Mr. O'Connell receiving a salary at the rate of \$1,200 per annum has been removed and that he is now entitled to compensation at said rate.

In view of the fact that the Justices of the Court are in favor of increasing the salary of this Clerk because of his efficiency and for the further reason that his salary at the rate of \$1,200 is established and was provided for in the Budget appropriation for 1910, I would recommend favorable consideration of the resolution hereto attached.

GENTLEMEN—Two communications addressed to the Secretary of your Board by the Board of Health, transmitting copies of resolutions adopted by said Board of Health on January 21 and January 28, 1910, respectively, requesting further modifications and changes in the schedules supporting the salaries appropriations in the Budget for the year 1910, for the Department of Health, and the transfer of \$660 to make said modified schedules effective, have been referred to me for consideration.

I would report that the Board of Health desires to have changed the item line, "Clerks, 4 at \$900, \$3,600," to read "Clerks, 5 at \$900, \$4,500," in schedule No. 258, in order that a Telephone Switchboard Operator at the same salary, who has qualified before the Municipal Civil Service Commission, may be advanced to a clerkship. SIR—On October 15, 1909, a resolution was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorizing the advertising and award of Contract No. 1199 for reconstructing Pier 42, at the foot of Morton street, North River.

This pier is now occupied by the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique and is to be vacated by that company as soon as it obtains possession of the new pier in the Chelsea section.

Contract No. 1199 calls for the reconstruction of the pier and for the extension of the pier out to the pierhead line, this work being necessary to place the premises in condition to be turned over to the new lessees, the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company. The contract was advertised and bids have been opened, the lowest being \$99,768. The contract contains a clause allowing extra work, should same be found necessary during the work of construction, the extra work being limited to 5 per cent. With this entire 5 per cent, the work will amount to \$104,756.40. It is urgent that the work be pushed forward as much as possible in order that the lease may become operative and so that the City can receive rental.

I respectfully request that this contract be reauthorized in order that I can proceed with its execution.

SIR—Hon. Calvin Tomkins, Commissioner, Department of Docks and Ferries, in communication dated February 3, 1910, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize him to award a contract for reconstructing Pier 42 at the foot of Morton street, North River, the cost of said reconstruction not to exceed \$104,756.40.

It is expected that the present occupants of Pier 42, North River (the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique), will remove within two weeks to Pier 57, North River, as their freight and passenger sheds on Pier 57 are practically completed. Pier 42, North River, has been leased for twenty years to Sanderson & Co., agents for the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, the lease to commence after the pier has been vacated by the present tenants and the old pier practically removed and rebuilt, and an extension 122½ feet long and 75 feet wide added by the City.

As no rental will be received for the pier from the time it is vacated by the present tenants until it is occupied under the new lease, it is desirable that the work of reconstruction proceed as rapidly as possible.

Acting under authorization by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 15, 1909, the Department of Docks and Ferries opened bids for this work January 10, 1910. The lowest bid received was \$99,768, subdivided as follows:

The Secretary presented the following communications from the Department of Health requesting an issue of \$7,200 special revenue bonds to provide for the employment of twelve Physicians, for a period of six months, together with a report of the Comptroller, to whom this application was referred on January 28, 1910, recommending an issue of \$2,800 special revenue bonds (chapter 535, Laws of 1893, and section 170 of the Charter) to provide for the payment of salaries of seven Hospital Physicians for a period of four months beginning February 1, 1910, at the rate of \$1,200 per annum, to be distributed as follows:

SIR—I am enclosing a copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Health at its meeting held January 21, 1910, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$7,200, as provided by chapter 535 of the Laws of 1893, for the employment of twelve additional Hospital Physicians, for a period of six months, with salaries at the rate of \$1,200 each, per annum, to be distributed as shown in said resolution, and which you are requested to submit to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at its next meeting for consideration.

There were on January 21, 1910, seventy-five diphtheria patients, two hundred and forty-two scarlet fever patients and five patients with mixed infections, making a total of three hundred and twenty-two patients at the contagious disease hospitals on the grounds of the Willard Parker Hospital, foot of East Sixteenth street, Borough of Manhattan. At Riverside Hospital there were three hundred and forty-five tuberculosis patients, and at the Kingston Avenue Hospital in the Borough of Brooklyn there were the following patients:

At the sanatorium for the care and treatment of persons living in The City of New York suffering with tuberculosis, located at Otisville, Orange County, N. Y., there were three hundred and nine patients affected with tuberculosis.

The number of hospital physicians provided to care for this large number of patients is totally inadequate, and should the present conditions prevail for any length of time it will be absolutely necessary to employ the services of the additional physicians specified for a period of at least six months.

All hospitals, aside from the Otisville Sanatorium, have a certain number of internes who are paid salaries of \$120 per annum, and given their maintenance. These internes are, of course, young and inexperienced, and are used mainly for ambulance work. They do make rounds of the different wards, but could not be entrusted with the care of patients.

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of your Board held on January 28, 1910, a communication was presented from the Board of Health, transmitting a copy of a resolution adopted by said Board of Health on January 21, 1910, requesting the authorization of an issue of \$7,200 special revenue bonds, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 535, Laws of 1893, to provide for the employment of twelve additional Hospital Physicians, for a period of six months, with salary at the rate of \$1,200 each per annum, to be distributed as follows:

Willard Parker Hospital, Manhattan.....	3

—which matter was referred to me for consideration.

The President of the Board of Health, in conference with an Examiner of the Department of Finance, made the following statement as to the reasons for this request:

"I have asked for these additional Hospital Physicians because they are needed at once. As Dr. Herman M. Biggs, General Medical Officer, has stated, the conditions at Riverside Hospital are simply abominable. On February 11 there were 351 cases of tuberculosis in that hospital. Many of those patients are in the last stages of the disease, and must receive attention. There are now one Visiting and three Resident Physicians in Riverside Hospital. If we do not receive help in this matter, we shall have to turn out some of the patients, many of whom have no place to go where they would receive care or treatment. They come from boarding houses and lodging houses and are without means.

"At Willard Parker Hospital there are three Resident and four Visiting Physicians. On February 11 there were 422 patients in the hospital, the majority of them children with scarlet fever, the acute cases requiring constant attention.

"At Kingston Avenue Hospital there are two Resident and two Visiting Physicians. On February 11 the census showed 324 patients in the hospital. The conditions there are similar to those at Willard Parker Hospital.

"At the Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Otisville there were 323 patients on February 10. New sheds are ready to be opened to accommodate more patients now on the waiting list of incipient tuberculosis cases at the Health Department Headquarters. The five Hospital Physicians now on duty are not sufficient to care for the increasing number of patients. Frequent examinations of patients must be made, in order that proper records be kept of the progress of the disease.

"It is nearly impossible to get a reputable and competent physician at the salary we can pay to live permanently in one of our hospitals, and thus sacrifice all his private practice, so we induce Visiting Physicians to accept \$1,200 a year for their services, they giving several hours each day to hospital work.

"Medical Inspectors cannot be assigned from other Divisions of the Department to the hospital service for the reason that we have not now a sufficient number of Medical Inspectors to do the work necessary in those Divisions. The three Medical Inspectors now in the hospitals perform chiefly diagnosis work.

"This matter requires immediate consideration, if proper treatment of patients in Health Department hospitals is to be assured."

The following tabulation shows the number on the medical staffs of the four hospitals on February 11, 1910, and on January 1, 1909; also the census of patients on February 11, 1910, and the average number of cases daily during the first quarter of 1909:

While the total number of Hospital Physicians has been increased from 14 in 1909 to 18 in 1910, the census of February 11, 1910, shows an increase of patients over the average number daily for the first quarter of 1909 of nearly 37 per cent.

It appears that during the period from January to June of each year the greatest demands are made upon the hospitals of the Department of Health, and this year contagious diseases seem to be more prevalent than usual, thus resulting in a large increase in the number to be cared for in the City hospitals.

It would seem that some relief should be granted to the Board of Health; also that the condition is sufficiently emergent to call for the prompt allowance of a reasonable amount of funds, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 535, Laws of 1893, which empowers the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to make additional appropriations for the preservation of the public health without the concurrence of any other body.

I therefore recommend that provision be made for the employment of seven additional Hospital Physicians for a period of four months, beginning February 19, 1910, at the rate of \$1,200 per annum, to be distributed as follows:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby respectfully requested to authorize the Board of Health to advertise, award and execute a contract for furnishing all the labor and materials necessary or required to erect and complete the superstructure of two pavilion buildings and other work incidental thereto on the grounds of the Riverside Hospital at North Brother Island, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, at the estimated cost of sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000).

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby respectfully requested to authorize the Board of Health to execute a contract for furnishing and installing rails, fittings, etc., together with all necessary alterations and other work incidental thereto in the office building at the southwest corner of Fleet and Willoughby streets, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, for the sum of two thousand nine hundred and eighty-nine dollars (\$2,989).

The first resolution quoted above has to do with the provision for additional tuberculosis patients at Riverside Hospital, North Brother Island. At the present time every bed in that hospital is full and there is a long waiting list of those needing hospital treatment.

On June 25, 1909, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized an issue of corporate stock amounting to \$110,000 for the purpose of providing for four hospital pavilions for tuberculosis patients at Riverside Hospital.

The reasons making such an appropriation advisable at that time are, if anything, more urgent now, and I therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate suspend the resolutions of December 18, 1908, and January 14, 1910, in so far as to permit the Board of Health to execute a contract in the sum of \$15,850, for the foundation of two pavilion buildings and other work incidental thereto on the grounds of the Riverside Hospital at North Brother Island.

The second resolution requests authority to contract for the electric and gas lighting fixtures which were not included in the main contract for the construction of the new Brooklyn office building of the Board of Health. The award of this contract is necessary to the proper use of the building, which is already occupied.

The work has been advertised and the lowest bid for the work is \$2,690, which is a reasonable amount to expend for fixtures for the building. Sufficient corporate stock has already been authorized to pay for this contract.

I would therefore advise that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment suspend the resolutions of December 18, 1908, and January 14, 1910, in so far as to permit the Board of Health to award and execute a contract for furnishing and installing electric and gas lighting fixtures, etc., with all necessary alterations and other work incidental thereto, in the office building at Fleet and Willoughby streets, Borough of Brooklyn, at a cost not to exceed \$2,690.

The third resolution is for authority to execute a contract for plumbing in the Drug Laboratory Building in East Fifteenth street, on the grounds of the Willard Parker Hospital. The Drug Laboratory Building above mentioned was formerly a three-story stable, which has been rebuilt and put in service for a drug laboratory.

but without the necessary new plumbing. It is proposed to install on the three floors of the building modern plumbing of the type and character adapted to such a building.

The funds for this work will come from an unexpended balance of an appropriation of \$995,000 for new buildings, etc., for the Department of Health made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 31, 1905.

In order, therefore, to render available the expenditure already made, I advise the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to suspend the resolutions of December 18, 1908, and January 14, 1910, in so far as to permit the Board of Health to proceed with the execution of a contract for installing plumbing at the Drug Laboratory Building on the west side of Avenue D, near East Fifteenth street, on the grounds of the Willard Parker Hospital, at an estimated cost of \$2,000.

The fourth resolution was, I am informed, intended to be a repetition of the resolution adopted by the Board of Health February 3, 1909, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to approve the award of contracts for the installation of an electrical equipment for lighting the building and grounds of the Otisville Sanatorium, and for the equipment of a disinfecting plant, except that the estimated cost is now placed at \$15,000 instead of \$11,750.

This increase is not caused by any change in the plans, but because it was thought doubtful if the amount formerly requested was large enough for the purpose.

The proposed electrical equipment consists of one 50-kilowatt generator connected to 80-horsepower high-speed engine and foundation for same; 100 fixtures and wiring for road lights on the grounds, light regulators, transformers, switchboard, etc.

The above apparatus is sufficient for 1,000 lights and can be operated from the boilers now in use.

The generator, etc., are to be placed in an extension to one of the present buildings.

The present method of lighting the frame buildings at the sanatorium is by means of oil lamps, which are troublesome and somewhat dangerous, owing to the fact that the windows of the buildings are nearly always open.

The disinfecting plant requested consists of a steam sterilizing oven for clothing, bedding, etc., to be installed in the present laundry building, and estimated to cost \$1,500.

Sufficient corporate stock for all of the above mentioned work is available from the appropriation of \$225,000 authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment September 14, 1906.

The proposed work being a valuable and necessary improvement, I would recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment suspend the resolutions of December 18, 1908, and January 14, 1910, in so far as to permit the Board of Health to award contracts for the furnishing and installation of an electric light and power plant, including engine, generator, transformers, electric wiring and all other work incidental thereto, and for the equipment of a disinfecting plant at the Sanatorium, at Otisville, New York, at a total cost not exceeding \$15,000.

The fifth resolution has to do with the superstructure of the two pavilions at North Brother Island mentioned in the first resolution. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment is asked to supplement the expenditure for the foundations by authorizing the expenditure of sufficient funds to erect and complete two pavilions ready for occupation and service.

I therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment suspend the resolutions of December 18, 1908, and January 14, 1910, in so far as to permit the Board of Health to execute a contract for the erection and completion of the superstructure of two pavilions for tuberculosis patients at Riverside Hospital, North Brother Island, and other work incidental thereto, at a cost not to exceed \$60,000.

The sixth resolution is a request for authorization to contract for certain rails, fittings, alterations, etc., which were not included in the general contract for the erection of the new Brooklyn office building of the Board of Health, and which are necessary for the division of the office space in order that proper use may be made of the building. Bids have been received for this work, the lowest being \$2,989. Sufficient corporate stock for this work is available.

I would therefore advise that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment suspend the resolutions of December 18, 1908, and January 14, 1910, in so far as to permit the Board of Health to execute a contract for furnishing and installing rails, fittings, etc., together with all necessary alterations and other work incidental thereto, in the office building at the southwest corner of Fleet and Willoughby streets, Borough of Brooklyn, for the sum of \$2,989.

The Secretary presented a report of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, referring to a communication from The Bronx West Side Association relative to the unfinished condition of the easterly basin of the Jerome Park Reservoir, and submitting copy of communication addressed to the Mayor, under date of February 10, relative to the construction of said reservoir as originally planned, and suggesting that the communication to the Mayor will serve as an answer to the complaint of the above association.

Which was referred to the Comptroller and the Chief Engineer, and the Secretary was directed to transmit a copy of the above report to The Bronx West Side Association.

(On February 4, 1910, the above matter was referred to the Comptroller and the Chief Engineer of the Board, and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity was requested to submit to the Board his views with respect to the disposition of the property originally planned for the easterly basin of the Jerome Park Reservoir.)

The Secretary presented the following report of the Comptroller and the Chief Engineer of the Board, to whom on December 30, 1909, the report of the Jamaica Bay Improvement Commission was referred, briefly reviewing the project of the improvement of Jamaica Bay from its inception to the present time, stating that this project has received recognition by the Federal Government, and the majority and minority reports submitted by the Commission, while agreeing in essential respects, differ as to the precise work to be first undertaken, and that both reports agree upon the great desirability of an initial appropriation of at least \$1,000,000 to secure to the City title to lands under water, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 568 of the Laws of 1909; also communication from the Jamaica Bay Improvement Commission relative thereto.

Communications from the Twenty-eighth Ward Taxpayers' Protective Association of Brooklyn, and the Taxpayers' Association of the Thirty-second Ward, Brooklyn, and resolution of the Board of Aldermen urging an appropriation of \$1,000,000 for the above purpose were placed on file.

(On February 18, 1910, the above matter was laid over for one week.)

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—The Board having, at its last meeting, agreed to give a hearing on February 18 on the Jamaica Bay Improvement project and the several reports made by the Jamaica Bay Improvement Commission having been referred to the Comptroller and Chief Engineer, we have prepared for the information of the members of the Board a brief review of the project from its inception up to the present time, as follows:

The project for the improvement of Jamaica Bay and the development of a capacious harbor originated in a communication addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York, under date of November 17, 1905, by the Hon. Edward M. Grout, who was then Comptroller of the City. In this report the possibilities of the use of Jamaica Bay as a harbor were pointed out, while a development on the lines indicated would not only do much for the commerce of The City of New York, but would enormously increase the value of property in the bay already owned by the City. On March 2, 1906, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriated the sum of \$25,000 to pay the expense of the work. On April 26, 1906, his Honor the Mayor appointed a Commission of three to investigate and report upon the improvement suggested by Mr. Grout. On May 31, 1907, the Commission submitted to the Board a majority and a minority report, which differed in the proposed treatment of the interior of the bay, the majority report suggesting the creation of a number of islands, separated by waterways varying from 400 to 1,300 feet in width, these waterways following in a general way the existing channels between the islands and the marshes of the bay, while the minority report provided for a main channel from 700 to 2,000 feet in width between pierhead lines, with two large islands separated by a waterway 700 feet between pierhead lines. On June 7, 1907, the Commission was reappointed, with instructions to confer with the War Department and continue its work on lines which would meet with the approval of that department. The Commission, in its further investigations, worked in harmony with Colonel, now General, John G. D. Knight, of the Corps of Engineers, and after agreement upon a tentative harbor line for the westerly side and a portion of the northerly side of the bay, Colonel Knight submitted, under date of January 30, 1909, a report to the Chief of Engineers of the United States Army, recommending that the Federal Government undertake the dredging and maintenance of an entrance channel into Jamaica Bay, this channel to have a depth of 18 feet and a width of 500 feet, and to be subsequently widened to 1,500 feet and deepened to 30 feet, constructing necessary jetties, if required, for its maintenance, but that the first channel be not dredged until the Secretary of War is satisfied that The City of New York is prepared to undertake the dredging of the main channel to a like depth. The recommendation of the reporting officer was also that the Federal Government reimburse The City of New York for the dredging of the main channel at the rate of ten cents per cubic yard for all material dredged. This report was referred to the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors for review, and this Reviewing Board was of the opinion that the extent of the reimbursement to The City of New York for the dredging of the main channel was too large. The Board, however, finally recommended that the amount to be paid to the City for such dredging be fixed at eight cents a cubic yard.

The result of this recommendation was that the River and Harbor Bill passed by the last Congress provided that the Secretary of War should report as soon as he became satisfied that The City of New York was prepared to undertake the work to be done by it preliminary to or contemporaneous with any dredging to be done by the United States Government, as recommended in the report. The Legislature of the State of New York enacted a bill which took effect on May 29, 1909, as chapter 568, by which the State of New York conveyed to the City such right, title and interest as the State may have to the lands under water in Jamaica Bay and Rockaway Inlet, this grant to become operative "upon the United States Government making its first appropriation for the creation of the new harbor mentioned in this act or upon The City of New York appropriating and setting aside a sum not less than \$1,000,000 for the same purpose."

On July 2, 1909, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriated the sum of \$75,000 to meet the expenses of the Jamaica Bay Improvement Commission, including the necessary surveys to determine the amount of filling and dredging required and to accurately locate the harbor line which has been tentatively adopted. The Commission submitted a further report to the Board, under date of December 27, 1909, this being again in the form of a majority and a minority report. The majority recommended a complete development of a specific portion of the shore of the bay, covering an area of about 625 acres, including the purchase of the property, the construction of streets with sewers, water mains, etc., and the dredging, with rip-rap wall, of so much of the 18-foot channel as would give access to this section. The estimated cost of such an improvement, deducting the rebate from the Federal Government and the cost of such land as would be in the nature of an investment, is given as \$3,500,000, but the first outlay by the City would be about \$4,750,000. The minority report recommended the purchase, as soon as possible, of the land necessary for the dredging and disposal of material from the 18-foot channel to Cornell Creek, and building bulkheads along the entire front with partial high development of one or more basins, with progressive appropriations of about \$12,000,000 within the next ten years. This estimate is predicated upon a rebate of \$1,240,000 from the Federal Government.

Both reports agree in the recommendation that at least \$1,000,000 be appropriated at the earliest possible date in order that title to the lands under water in Jamaica Bay may pass to the City in accordance with the provisions of chapter 568 of the Laws of 1909 of the State of New York already referred to.

There has been incorporated in the River and Harbor Bill of the present Congress a provision which would make available the sum of \$250,500 for the dredging of the entrance channel, so that the time appears opportune to take advantage of the disposition of the Federal Government to substantially assist in the carrying out of this project and to insure the City's title to the lands under water in Jamaica Bay.

GENTLEMEN—In compliance with a recent request of the Hon. William A. Prendergast, Comptroller, that this Commission endeavor to make a unanimous report before February 18 as to recommendations to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for an immediate appropriation, instead of divided recommendations, this Commission has the honor to submit a unanimous report and recommendation as follows:

We desire to point out that the present needs of the local communities bordering upon the bay warrant an improvement of the water-front; that the probable rate of growth of the Port of New York seems to demand that so good an opportunity to open the bay for commerce should not be lost, and that, finally, it would appear to be good public policy to demonstrate to the Secretary of War that The City of New York intends to do its part of the work of the proposed improvement, and wishes to take advantage of the rebate (when earned) recommended in the report of the Secretary of War February 26, 1909, as well as to secure the benefits which will accrue to the City from the satisfaction of the provisions of chapter 568 of the Laws of 1909.

It is suggested, therefore, that \$1,000,000 be set aside for the purposes of this improvement, that the harbor line plan submitted to your Board by this Commission be referred to the Dock Commissioner for approval, in accordance with section 819 of the Charter, and that before the expenditure of the money your Board pass upon the question of where and how the money can best be expended.

GENTLEMEN—I transmit herewith a communication under date of February 14, 1910, from the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, relative to a further appropriation for the Maintenance and Distribution of Water Supply, in the Borough of Brooklyn, during the year 1910; and present my report thereon as follows:

The Commissioner states that certain of the appropriations provided for such purpose have proved to be insufficient, and requests that either additional amounts be allowed, aggregating \$15,600, or that such an amount be provided by transfer from the account entitled S-164, Operation, Special Contract Obligations, Fire Hydrant, Rentals and Water Purchased.

The accounts which the Commissioner desires to increase: the original estimates of the amounts required for the year 1910, and the preliminary appropriations made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 17, 1909, are as follows:

I am advised that the present needs of the accounts referred to are as follows:

S-162, Fuel—Contracts for an estimated year's supply of both anthracite and semi-bituminous coal aggregating \$494,673.60 were awarded in December, 1909.

The preliminary appropriation for Fuel, namely, \$485,000, recommended by the Comptroller and approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 17, 1909, was predicated upon the amount of the contracts previously noted, it being stated by the representative of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that \$10,000 of anthracite coal contract would be certified against the 1909 fuel appropriation, a transfer of \$10,000 to that fund having been made for said purpose, hence requiring approximately \$485,000 additional to permit the complete certification of both contracts. It now appears, however, that the 1909 allowance for Fuel was found to be so encumbered by open market orders that there was a balance of only \$1,800 to admit of the proposed partial certification, hence but one of such coal contracts has as yet been certified. An additional allowance of \$10,000 to permit of such certification and leave a small balance for wood, appears to be proper. This will make the total allowance for 1910, \$495,000, or \$15,000 less than was allowed for Fuel in 1909.

S-167, General Supplies—Based upon the expenditures for such supplies, i. e., tools, in previous years, a tentative allowance of \$3,000 was set up by the Examiner of this Department and a preliminary allowance of \$1,000 recommended by the Comptroller and approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as previously noted. It appears, however, that it is necessary to certify contracts for tools at this time to the amount of \$2,655.11 in addition to open market orders outstanding, hence approximately the full amount of the tentative allowance is now required. The request for an additional \$2,000 for General Supplies is therefore approved herewith.

S-168, Materials for Repairs and Replacements by Departmental Labor—The preliminary allowance for this purpose was, as previously stated, \$15,000. I am advised that contracts for such materials, to the amount of \$3,121.70 are now awaiting certification in addition to present contract and open market order liabilities of \$12,881.29. An additional allowance of \$2,500 would bring the total appropriations to less than half of the amount estimated as required for the year, and \$17,500 is well within the amount that probably will be needed for such purpose, the average yearly expenditures for such materials during 1908 and 1909 being \$21,835. This request is therefore approved.

S-171 and S-181, Forage, Shoeing and Boarding Horses—The total of the original estimates for these two accounts was \$3,640, and a preliminary allowance was made therefor of \$950, as previously stated. A further allowance of \$1,100 is now requested to permit of the certification of contracts for forage to the amount of \$1,367.34, and to provide for outstanding open market orders and future requisitions. As the expenditures for such purpose in 1909 was \$3,138, and additional horses were purchased in the latter part of such year, the requested increase of \$1,100, making the total allowance \$2,050, is apparently well within the probable needs for the current year; therefore, the request is herewith recommended for approval.

In the near future I shall submit to your Honorable Board a full report on the amounts which, in my opinion, are required for the proper maintenance and distribution of the water supply of the Borough of Brooklyn, during the current year. Pending the completion of such report, and in view of the preceding statements, I recommend the adoption of the resolution hereunto attached.

GENTLEMEN—In the matter of two communications received from the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, under date of February 8, 1910, in which he requests a modification of various schedules supporting the appropriations for Salaries and Salaries and Wages made in the Budget for 1910, which was referred to me for consideration, I submit the following report:

Upon the request of the Commissioner of Parks, the Municipal Civil Service Commission on May 21, 1902, adopted a resolution changing the titles of three employees of that Department, as follows:

John J. Odell, from Clerk to Chief Bookkeeper.
William F. Richards, from Assistant Engineer to Principal Assistant Engineer.
Alfred N. GaNum, from Mechanical Assistant to Meteorological Mechanic.

The changes were made so that the titles of these employees would be more descriptive of the actual duties performed by them, and the incumbents were placed on the payrolls of the Department and have been paid under the new titles until the present time.

These positions have not been established under section 56 of the Greater New York Charter. In order that these employees may receive compensation pending advice under section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, it is necessary to modify the schedules to include the old titles in place of the new ones which were made a part of the Budget for 1910.

The Commissioner further requests in another communication under same date a modification of the Budget schedule supporting the appropriation made for 1910, entitled

No. 844, Commissioner's Office, Salaries and Wages. In said schedule provisions were made for three Stenographers and Typewriters at \$1,080 per annum each. At present two of said incumbents receive this amount and one receives \$900 per annum. The Commissioner desires to increase the latter to the grade of \$1,080, but the Municipal Civil Service Commission refused to pass the payroll for January, for the reason that the incumbent had not been in the Department for one year, and therefore is not eligible for advancement. It will therefore be necessary to modify this schedule by placing the incumbent at the old rate of \$900.

The same may be said of the request for a modification of Schedule No. 846, Engineer's Office, Salaries and Wages. The Stenographer and Typewriter in this office is at present receiving \$600 per annum and pending her eligibility under the civil service rules to receive the amount appropriated, the Commissioner requests that the schedule be modified so as to read Stenographer and Typewriter at \$600 per annum in place of \$1,080 per annum. In both instances the difference in the amounts will be placed in unassigned balances.

In view of the facts herein stated, I recommend favorable consideration of the resolution herewith attached.

During the week ending December 25, 1909, the total number of visits made by Medical Inspectors in cases of contagious diseases was 4,071; the total number of Medical Inspectors in the Division of Contagious Diseases, in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Brooklyn and Queens is forty. This means that during the week mentioned, each Medical Inspector had to make an average of more than one hundred visits to cases of contagious diseases. It is utterly impossible for this Department to perform the work efficiently and maintain isolation when so many visits have to be made.

If the fifteen Inspectors were available at the present time their assignments would be as set forth in the resolution. It is requested that you will submit the resolution to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at its next meeting for consideration.

The President of the Board of Health explained to an Examiner of the Department of Finance the duties of Medical Inspectors in the different Divisions of the Department and how the Inspectors were distributed in performance of their various functions.

It appears that one Medical Inspector employed in the Office of the General Medical Officer is on special work, being mainly engaged in devising plans for improvement in the care and treatment of patients in the hospitals. One Medical Inspector in the Bureau of Records is assigned there to visit medical certificates, issue burial permits, etc.

Of the 161 Medical Inspectors provided for in the Division of Child Hygiene, 144 are now at work regularly in the schools. Seventeen have been temporarily assigned

to the Division of District Medical Inspection to assist the Inspectors on contagious diseases work.

In the Division of District Medical Inspection 82 Medical Inspectors, including the 17 from the Division of Child Hygiene, are now engaged in contagious diseases work in the tenements.

Of the 36 Inspectors in the Division of Communicable Diseases, 31 are engaged in administering antitoxin in cases of diphtheria, the others doing general work. The antitoxin Inspectors are on duty 24 hours daily and off 24. They are liable to be called upon at any hour of the day or night for the treatment of diphtheria patients. They are detailed to one station on the West Side and to three stations on the East Side of the City.

In the Division of General Sanitary Inspection there are 11 Medical Inspectors. Most of these have been for years in the Department, and their knowledge as Medical Inspectors is of value in the prosecution of the sanitary work.

The one Inspector in the Division of Milk Inspection examines into cases reported of danger of transmission of contagious diseases from the milk supply.

The two Inspectors in the Research and Vaccine Laboratories are engaged on special laboratory work.

The nine Inspectors in the three Clinics for Contagious Eye Diseases treat trachoma.

One Inspector in Willard Parker Hospital treats diphtheria, one in Kingston Avenue all diseases, and one in Riverside Hospital tuberculosis.

Examination of the daily report cards of the antitoxin Inspectors, on file in the Department, shows the name of the patient, address and nature of treatment, the number of cases treated daily being from 5 to 20.

The report cards of the Inspectors in the Sanitary Division show the average number of visits weekly by the men to be: In Manhattan, 100; Brooklyn, 85; The Bronx, 70; Queens, 70.

The President stated that in the Division of Child Hygiene each Inspector had to care for about 5,000 children, the number of school houses visited varying according to the size of the school and distances to be travelled; that from 9 until 10.30 a. m., the men looked after the children who for any reason might be excluded from the classes, and from 10.30 a. m. to 12 m. made examinations of the children in the class rooms; that at 1 p. m. the Inspectors go out into the districts inspecting the children who may be isolated in their homes, the men making about 10 or 12 visits each, in which they are occupied until nearly 4 p. m., or later if circumstances require.

In the Division of District Medical Inspection the report cards show visitations to cases of diphtheria, scarlet fever, measles and chicken-pox. The card also shows the name of the person visited, age, address, character of building, number in family, disease, date reported, action required, whether inspection, fumigation or termination of case. The cards showed that the number of visits weekly ranged from 100 to 175, averaging for the week about 140 in Manhattan. In Brooklyn the average number of visits was about 110. About one-half were revisits, which did not require the time necessary to give to first visits. The President stated that 90 visits a week would be a fair average to expect of a conscientious Medical Inspector.

Owing to the prevalence of contagious diseases, a new plan was inaugurated on February 17 by which the Medical Inspectors in the Child Hygiene Division were required to attend to the school children in the morning, and in the afternoon to take up general contagious diseases work in the districts. This scheme may prove of doubtful utility on account of the long hours of work up to 6 p. m. As a Physician is required in the evening to write a full report of his work during the day, he is thus virtually cut off from all outside practice. The plan resulted in three resignations of Inspectors on the first day's trial. Card reports of visitations by Inspectors were not in vogue in February, 1909, so that no comparison may be presented with the work done in the same period of 1910.

The President stated positively that he could not make transfers of Medical Inspectors from other Divisions to the Division of District Medical Inspection; that School Principals were now complaining of the neglect of the Health Department in making prompt examinations of suspicious cases among the children, which has been caused by the temporary transfer of 17 men from the Child Hygiene Division to District Medical Inspection to meet the present emergency; that this matter should be considered at once by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

In view of the facts stated by the President of the Board of Health, it appears that contagious diseases are unusually prevalent in the Greater City at the present time. However, it is entirely probable that with the coming of the early summer season there will be a material falling off in the number of cases. The Board of Health requests 15 additional Medical Inspectors for 11 months of the year 1910, but it would appear that if provision were made for that number for a period of four months, the present emergency would be met.

I therefore recommend that, as the situation appears to be emergent, the request of the Board of Health for \$16,500 be approved to the extent that, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 535, Laws of 1893, the sum of \$6,000 special revenue bonds be authorized to provide for the payment of 15 additional Medical Inspectors in the Department of Health, for the period of four months, beginning February 26, 1910.

The Secretary presented the following resolution of the Board of Aldermen, requesting an issue of \$50,000 special revenue bonds (subdivision 8, section 188 of the Charter), the proceeds to be used by the President of the Borough of Manhattan for the purpose of replenishing the fund for repairing street pavements where the period of maintenance has not expired:

In the Board of Aldermen.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), the proceeds whereof to be used by the President of the Borough of Manhattan for the purpose of replenishing the fund for repairing street pavements where the period of maintenance has not expired.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen February 15, 1910, three-fourths of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

of the Greater New York Charter, to issue special revenue bonds of The City of New York, to an amount not exceeding fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), redeemable from the tax levy of the year succeeding the year of their issue, the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid.

The Secretary presented report of the Comptroller recommending that the Commissioner of Bridges be authorized, pursuant to the provisions of resolution adopted January 14, 1910, to proceed with the work of removing the old bridge and approaches, building fenders, etc., over the Eastchester Bay, Pelham Bay Park, Borough of The Bronx, at an estimated cost of \$60,000.

Which was laid over for consideration with the corporate stock Budget.

(On February 18, 1910, the request of the Commissioner of Bridges for authority as above was referred to the Comptroller.)

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Comptroller recommending a further authorization of corporate stock to the amount of \$925,000 to permit the certification of contracts already made and of obligations already incurred for the New York Public Library Building at Bryant Park, Manhattan:

GENTLEMEN—On February 4, 1910, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment selected the bid of the Cobb Construction Company in the sum of \$543,750 for work and materials for the furniture and equipment of the New York Public Library, Fifth avenue, Fortieth and Forty-second streets, Borough of Manhattan, and duly approved the awarding of the contract to such bidder.

The New York Public Library Fund has been administered in the past as a continuous account, being replenished from time to time by the issue and sale by the Comptroller, upon the authorization of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, of corporate stock of The City of New York "in such amounts as said Board shall from time to time in its discretion determine to be needed."

I am informed that the previous administration did not make sufficient provision to meet the indebtedness incurred prior to the present year. The status of the New York Public Library Fund, as of February 19, 1910, was as follows:

As, however, certain small expenditures of a contingent nature will doubtless be required before the completion of the work already approved, I would suggest that the additional amount of corporate stock to be authorized be fixed at \$925,000.

In order, therefore, that the contracts already certified and agreements entered into by the previous administration may be fully provided for and that the Comptroller may certify the pending contract of the Cobb Construction Company, including the architects' fees thereon, and may provide for such other incidental expenses as may be necessarily connected with the completion of the work, I recommend the adoption of the resolution hereunto attached.

The total amount of the contract awards being \$448,000.47, or \$22,503.60 in excess of the unencumbered balance in the Brooklyn Repaving Fund, examination has been made to determine which of the above specified contracts were last awarded. Inasmuch as there exist ample unencumbered balances in the repaving funds for the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Queens, there appears to be no objection to the certification of the contracts already awarded in these Boroughs; provided your Board may deem it expedient to release the amounts necessary therefor from the terms of the resolution adopted January 14, 1910, directing the heads of all City Departments under whose jurisdiction expenditures from corporate stock funds had been previously authorized, to refrain from incurring any further liabilities or executing any further contracts chargeable to such funds without the express authorization of your Board. The amount available for repaving purposes in Brooklyn is \$22,503.60

less than the aggregate of the contracts for which awards have been made, as shown by the books of the Department of Finance on this date.

I am of the opinion that the work on the contracts specified in the foregoing schedules should be proceeded with as soon as the weather conditions will permit, and I would therefore recommend the release of the sum of six hundred and ninety-eight thousand six hundred and sixty-four dollars and twenty-two cents (\$698,664.22). I would also recommend the approval by your Board of the authorization of an additional issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$22,503.60, to provide the means for the completion of the contract awarded by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for the repaving of Fifth avenue, from Union street to Prospect avenue, as herein previously set forth. Resolutions to effect both are herewith transmitted.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIRs—Our attention was called to the facts that the Wheelwrights employed in the several City Departments at the beginning of last year had their salary reduced from \$4 per day to \$3.50. Shops on the outside of the Departments are paying from \$4 to \$5 per day for competent men, which would mean that the class of work which is done by the City Departments, including the building of bodies along with the repairing and building of wheels, requires a general knowledge. Such is required of the City employees and their salary should be \$5 per day. As none of these Wheelwrights were members of this organization, it was in the later part of last year that our attention was called to the fact. We presented a petition to the last Board and were informed that the matter was referred to a Committee consisting of ex-Comptroller Metz and ex-President of the Board of Aldermen McGowan. But it being so near the end of the term, they failed to act on it. We send you this petition because an injustice has been done to these men. The pay of a carpenter is \$5 per day and they do not require as many tools as a wheelwright, and a wheelwright can do a carpenter's job where a carpenter could not do a wheelwright's job. Hoping that you will give this matter your earliest consideration, I remain

Apprentices, bodygear or wheelwrights, shall receive as follows: First year \$6 per week, second year \$10 per week, third year \$16 per week, fourth year \$21 per week.

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of your Board held on February 11, 1910, a communication was presented from the Carriage, Wagon and Automobile Workers' Union of New York, requesting that the compensation of Wheelwrights employed in the City Departments be fixed at \$5 per diem, which matter was referred to a Select Committee, consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, for consideration.

We would report that at a meeting of your Board held on October 29, 1909, a communication was presented from the secretary of the Carriage Trades Council of New York City, asking that Wheelwrights employed in the City Departments be paid the prevailing rate of wages, but no action was taken on that application.

It appears that the Civil List for July 31, 1909, shows the following as the number of Wheelwrights and the rates paid in the eight City Departments in which these mechanics are employed:

Examination of the Civil List for July 31, 1900, shows a total of 25 Wheelwrights in seven Departments. Of these, 15 were compensated at \$4, 1 at \$3.75, 7 at \$3.50 a day, 1 at \$1.000 a year, and 1 foreman at \$4.50 a day, the majority receiving \$4 a day.

In June, 1907, conferences were held with representatives of labor unions of the Greater New York by a Special Committee appointed by your Board to consider rates of wages to be paid mechanics in the employ of the City. The Special Committee received a communication dated June 19, 1907, signed by the President and Secretary of Local No. 73, Carriage and Wagon Workers International Union, stating that the wages received by Wheelwrights, Body Builders, Blacksmiths, Trimmers and Painters was from \$15 to \$22 a week. Your Special Committee, upon this information, decided that \$3.50 per diem would be the prevailing rate to allow competent men, and submitted that rate to your Board in their report of October 4, 1907.

The Department heads generally adopted the rate of \$3.50, in the majority of cases a reduction of 50 cents per diem, in the preparation of their salary schedules for the Budgets of 1909 and 1910.

In a communication to the Comptroller, dated October 28, 1909, the chairman of the Carriage Trades Council says:

"I have been instructed to inform you that the prevailing rate of wages for wheelwrights in the organization is \$4 per diem, while some of the mechanics outside of the Departments receive from \$25 to \$30 a week. Through some misunderstanding a reduction was made in the Departments, owing to the fact that no delegate was present at the meeting held in your office in June, 1907."

With a communication dated November 15, 1909, presented to your Board from the Woodworkers' Branch of the Carriage, Wagon and Automobile Workers' Union, the organization which now applies to have the rate fixed at \$5 a day, there is transmitted the agreement and scale of wages of the union, in which Wheelwrights are rated as follows:

Class A, \$5 a day; Class B, \$4 a day; Helpers, \$2.50 a day and up, as per ability. It is further stated in the communication that "the wages of general woodworkers, such as Wheelwrights, in the City Departments were reduced from \$4 to \$3.50 a day. We respectfully request that you at least restore to them their former wages."

Inquiries made by an Examiner of the Department of Finance at the large establishments of Studebaker Brothers Company, Broadway and Forty-eighth street; Flannan & Co., No. 406 Broome street; Brewster & Co., Broadway and Forty-seventh street; Healy & Co., No. 1652 Broadway, elicited the information that since the advent of the automobile the number of wheelwrights employed has been greatly reduced; that one or two men are sometimes employed; that handwork in wood by wheelwrights is gradually disappearing, as the making and repairing of automobile wheels are mostly done by machinery; that when required on repair work wheelwrights are paid \$3.50 to \$3.75 a day, according to their ability.

Mr. C. A. Carey, No. 34 West Sixty-sixth street, said: "I employ more wheelwrights than any other establishment in New York City. I pay wheelwrights \$3.50 to \$4 a day, according to the class of work done. A man who can make a wheel is certainly worth \$4 a day."

In view of all the facts above stated, we recommend that the Board of Aldermen be requested to establish the grade of position of Wheelwright, with wages at the rate of \$4 per diem, for all City Departments.

DEAR SIR—With reference to communication referred to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for consideration and report, concerning the application made by Bird S. Coler, former Borough President of Brooklyn, under date of June 21, 1909, for the establishment in this Department of the positions of Licensed Fireman and Coal Passer, with salaries at the rate of \$3 per day and \$2.50 per day, respectively, I would respectfully request that you prepare resolutions for adoption by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment recommending to the Board of Aldermen the establishment of these positions at the salaries named.

For the Board's information I would state that, owing to the fact that the Municipal Civil Service Commission amended the classification of positions in the labor class by striking therefrom the title of Stoker and adding thereto the titles of Licensed Fireman and Coal Passer, it is necessary that these positions be established for this Department because of the fact that we will, from time to time, be compelled to appoint persons under these titles and the Comptroller, through an opinion of the Corporation Counsel, requiring that all salaries be specifically fixed for all positions as directed by section 56 of the Greater New York Charter.

At the present time we have only two Licensed Firemen employed in this Department through an arrangement with the Municipal Civil Service Commission, who have consented to allow their names to appear upon the payrolls of this Department as Stokers with the additional information that the character of the duties performed by them are those of Licensed Firemen, and such arrangement holds good pending the establishment of the positions.

I would therefore request the Board to act on this matter at its earliest convenience.

GENTLEMEN—The Art Commission of The City of New York asks for your approval of these increases of salaries of the positions of the Assistant Secretary and of the Stenographer and Typewriter, respectively, for the following reasons:

The salary of the Assistant Secretary has never been increased since it was fixed eight years ago, although the work and responsibilities of this official have trebled. As an example of this increase in work, I cite the number of matters submitted to the Commission. In 1902, the designs submitted to the Commission numbered 64. In 1909, the designs submitted to the Commission numbered 175. In addition to this the Commission is required before the last payment on any public structure is made, to issue a certificate to the effect that the structure has been erected in substantial accordance with the designs which the Commission previously approved. All this increase in the work of the Commission has greatly added to the duties and responsibilities of the Assistant Secretary.

With the increase in the labor and responsibilities of the Assistant Secretary, there has been a corresponding increase in the work and responsibilities of the Stenographer and Clerk. Her duties include not only the usual clerical and stenographic work of such an office, but she is also required to report verbatim the meetings of the Commission and of such public hearings as are held from time to time.

The Stenographer to the Art Commission is appointed under the rules and classifications of the Municipal Civil Service Commission. Her original examination by this Commission was for an "unlimited grade," and having passed it satisfactorily, she is entitled to receive any amount without further examination.

I may add, further, that the office force of this Commission has not been increased since its establishment, and although it may be necessary in the future to require additional help, so far the present office force, by arduous labor, have been able to carry on the work of the Commission.

Another fact should be noted, that although the work of the Commission has greatly expanded, we have managed to get along without an increase in our Budget and this increase in salaries will not affect our Budget.

It is the earnest desire of the Commission that these increases take effect January 1, 1910, as these two officials have as yet received no salary for January.

GENTLEMEN—In the matter of two requests of the Commissioner of the Fire Department, dated January 26 and 27, 1910, respectively, for the establishment of the positions of Oil Surveyor at \$2,000, and Storekeeper at \$1,200 per annum, which were presented to your Board on February 4, 1910, and referred to a Select Committee, consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, for consideration, we report as follows:

The appropriation made to the Fire Department for the year 1910 includes an allowance for 16 Oil Surveyors connected with the Bureau of Combustibles, Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, and 8 for Brooklyn and Queens, at an annual compensation of \$1,500 each, who are under the supervision of an Inspector and Assistant Inspector of Combustibles with salaries of \$3,000 and \$2,500 respectively. It is the purpose of the Fire Commissioner, if his request for the establishment of an additional grade of the position of Oil Surveyor at the rate of \$2,000 per annum be approved, to advance to the new grade Edwin F. Horne, one of the Oil Surveyors now receiving \$1,500. Mr. Horne entered the service of the Department in August, 1899, and has proved to be a competent and efficient employee, the Fire Commissioner and the head of the Bureau of Combustibles both speaking highly of the services he has rendered. In addition to his work on outside investigations of matters connected with the business of the Bureau, he acts as Principal Assistant to the Chief Inspector, has charge of the office work in the latter's absence, assigns the work of the various Oil Surveyors and examines their reports.

While the title of the position is Oil Surveyor, its duties are not restricted to the investigation of matters relating to oil, as under the provisions of section 727 of the Greater New York Charter, the Bureau of Combustibles is charged with the execution of all laws relating to the storage, sale or use of all combustible materials in the City. During the year 1909, there were made 30,112 visits to determine the fitness of premises used for the sale, storage or use of combustibles of every description; of this number, 7,433 were for the investigation of complaints, about one-half of which related to dangerous conditions in tenement house property. In addition to the visits mentioned, blasting operations, averaging 180 daily, have been supervised, 885 inspections made of theatres, and public and private garages examined. During the past year the sum of \$52,735.50 has been received for blasting, gunpowder, fireworks, oil, and other licenses and permits issued, and paid over to the New York Fire Department Pension Fund.

The appropriation for 1910 for the Fire Department Repair Shops, Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, makes provision for the employment of three Moulders at \$4 each per day for 304 days, or \$1,216 per year for each incumbent. It appears that one of the Moulders has been for some time performing the duties of a Storekeeper, having charge of the repair shops supplies. On the recommendation of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, the Fire Commissioner proposes to change his title to that of Storekeeper, he having passed the necessary examination for that position, and fix his salary at \$1,200 per annum, a grade which has not been established in accordance with section 56 of the Charter, the existing grade being \$1,500, paid to two Storekeepers in charge of the general supplies of the Department.

In view of the facts stated herein, we would recommend the establishment of the grade of Storekeeper at \$1,200 and the establishment of the grade of Oil Surveyor at \$1,750, instead of \$2,000, as requested, and offer the resolution hereto attached for approval.

GENTLEMEN—Referring to the communication addressed to your Honorable Board under date of January 20, 1910, by the President of the Borough of Queens, requesting the establishment of the grade of the position of Clerk at \$540 per annum, which was referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, we submit the following report:

It appears that one Charles A. McManus, Clerk, receiving an annual salary of \$300, was transferred on December 15, 1909, from the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears in the Department of Finance, Borough of Queens, to the Topographical Bureau, under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Queens. Under a misapprehension that the grade of the position of Clerk at \$540 per annum had been established, the Borough President fixed the salary of the said Charles A. McManus at said annual rate. In view of the non-establishment of the grade of the position of Clerk at \$540 per annum, the Department of Finance has withheld the payment of any salary to the said Charles A. McManus, since the date of his transfer, December 15, 1909.

Mr. Bernard Fee, Chief Clerk of the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears in the Borough of Queens, stated that while employed in said Bureau, Mr. McManus performed duties of a clerical nature that would ordinarily be discharged by a Clerk receiving \$1,200 per annum. Mr. Fee also stated that Mr. McManus had been recommended for an increase in salary prior to his transfer, and upon failing to receive such salary increase, accepted his transfer to the Borough President's Office on the assumption that he would receive \$540 per annum. Mr. McManus entered the service of the City February 27, 1908, and is about 21 years of age. He has enjoyed no increase in salary since his entrance into the service. He is at present engaged in copying documents filed in the County Clerk's Office of the County of Queens, for the use of the Topographical Bureau.

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of your Board held January 21, 1910, a communication was presented from the Secretary, Board of Trustees, College of The City of New York, submitting a communication from the Secretary of District Lodge No. 15, International Association of Machinists, relative to the payment of Machinists at the college at the per diem rate of \$4.50 in order that their compensation may be fixed at the same rate as that of the Machinists employed in other City departments, which matter was referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen for consideration.

We find that the two Machinists employed in the College of The City of New York are classified as Mechanics, but were taken from the Civil Service eligible list of Machinists. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees says they are engaged in constructing, repairing, assembling and dismantling all kinds of machinery; also, in the making of tools, special appliances and special hardware, making of metals and repairing of locks, all of which is machinist's work.

The two Machinists are paid at the rate of \$1,200 per annum each. It is proposed the men be compensated at the rate of \$4.50 per diem, as Machinists are in other City departments, so the provisions of the prevailing rate of wages law may be complied with.

In view of the facts stated, we recommend that the request of the Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York be approved.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIRS—The Justices of this Court desire me to renew the request embodied in their resolution of November, 1909, wherein it was resolved, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and hereby is requested to establish additional grades of positions in the Children's Court of the First Division and in the main branch of this Court as follows: Clerk of the Children's Court of the First Division, \$4,000;

male Probation Officer in the Court of Special Sessions, First Division, \$2,500, and female Probation Officer in the said Court, \$2,500.

This request was made to the Board of Estimate of 1909. The same having been returned to me, I now return the resolution and renew the request to your Honorable Body, in conformity with instructions I have received. I am instructed to inform you more particularly with reference to the requests herein contained.

The salary of the Clerk of the Children's Court, First Division, which is now \$3,000, has not been increased since that Court was established in 1902. Since the time the Children's Court was opened, more than 70,000 children have been arraigned there and that Court is now handling cases of between 10,000 and 12,000 children a year. The salary of the Clerk of the Brooklyn Children's Court is \$3,000, and that Court is handling about one third of the amount of work disposed of by the Children's Court of the First Division.

The establishment of the Children's Court, which was an experiment in 1902, has been a pronounced success from the start and has far exceeded any hopes or expectations then entertained of the project. It is the largest Children's Court in the world, and because of the effectiveness of this work, this Children's Court has been taken as a model for similar institutions in many cities of the United States, as well as in those of foreign countries.

The economic value of the Children's Court should be taken into serious consideration. It is daily saving, from ways that lead to reformatories, jails, prisons and almshouses, children who but for this Court would develop into parasites and burdens upon the taxpayers. The Justices feel that those who have so ably helped to place this Court on such a high plane of effectiveness should be properly compensated.

The Probation Officers of the Court of Special Sessions, First Division, are engaged in work of a most important character and one that is requiring ability of an extraordinary kind. There probably is no other Court in this or any other country whose probation officers are obliged to handle as many adult offenders as these two officers, viz., the male and female Probation Officers of this Court have under constant supervision. Through their efforts there are daily being saved to good citizenship thousands of men and women who but for their help and guidance would become confirmed criminals.

In the case of the female Probation Officer, some charitable women have contributed a large house at No. 221 East Sixty-first street for her special use and accommodation. This involves no expense to the City and here our female Probation Officer cares for from fifteen to twenty-five girls and young women at a time, watches over them with fostering care until the salutary lessons of their experience and of her guidance have transformed otherwise vicious characters into law abiding and self-respecting women. These young women are supervised day and night and turned out, one by one, as they may be safely turned upon the community, with the assurance that their lessons have been well learned, and that they may safely be entrusted to care for themselves. Very often our female Probation Officer occupies positions for them wherein they may become self-sustaining and the percentage of derelicts in this regard is nominal, scarcely more than 1 per cent. of the total number cared for. The Justices feel that \$1,200 a year for work of this vast importance, and work at once so arduous and trying, is very small compensation indeed, and not at all worthy of the interests of this great City that our female Probation Officer so ably represents.

The same may be said of the male Probation Officer of this Court, who has on his files more than ten thousand cases of delinquent young men who have been under his supervision and of this great number less than 2 per cent. have gone to prison. Our male Probation Officer is practically on duty every waking hour of the year, four. He receives at his quarters in the Children's Aid Society Building reports of from no less than 75 delinquents weekly. It may be here stated that he has two Clerical Assistants, although he should be properly given a Clerk to help him with his records. He is obliged, in order to keep these records straight, to work for part of the night for no extra compensation. It is a great saving to the City and the Justices feel that his salary of \$1,500 is totally inadequate.

Trusting that these matters may receive your favorable consideration, and on behalf of the Justices, I beg to remain,

Graveur, and a grade of female Probation Officer in the same court at \$1,800, which will provide an increase in the salary of Mrs. Sophie B. Axman of \$600. Your committee recommends the adoption of the resolution transmitted herewith which establishes the grades for the present incumbents only.

A statement showing all local improvements authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment which have been completed and accepted, but for which certificates of cost with assessment lists and maps had not been transmitted to the Board of Assessors at the close of the quarter. This statement to show:

- (a) Character of improvement and street and limits affected.
- (b) Date of final certificate to the contractor.
- (c) Amount earned under the contract.
- (d) Incidental expenses charged against the improvement.

3. A statement showing all local improvements authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment placed under contract prior to the close of the quarter, but which were then incomplete. This statement to show:

- (a) Character of improvement and street and limits affected.
- (b) Date of contract.
- (c) Date of order to contractor to commence work.
- (d) Number of working days allowed for the completion of the contract.
- (e) Amount of the bid.
- (f) Amount earned under the contract.

4. A statement showing all local improvements contracted for during the preceding quarter, which were authorized by the Local Boards without the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and pursuant to section 435 of the Charter.

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Board be directed to have printed and to forward to the several Borough Presidents, blank forms for the proper and convenient presentation of the quarterly reports above described.

Resolved, That the Board will suspend the authorization of local improvements in any Borough which fails to forward the quarterly report as hereinbefore described, until such report be forwarded.

Resolved, That, until otherwise provided by this Board, the value of improvements completed and accepted, but for which assessment lists have not been forwarded to the Board of Assessors, be limited for each of the Boroughs as follows:

Second—That an improvement be finally authorized only after the Borough President has submitted a statement showing that all of the above described work has been done, that he has secured the approval of the form of contract by the Corporation Counsel, that he is prepared to place the improvement under contract as soon as he receives the consent of the Board, and that the assessment map will be completed on or before the date of payment on acceptance, this report being accompanied by a further statement showing the quantity of work to be performed under each item and the unit price thereof, the expense incurred for ordinary work, the allowance to be made for additional engineering and contingencies, the total probable cost, and the number of working days to be allowed the contractor for carrying out the work.

The only change is the one from Superintendent at \$3,000 per annum to Deputy Medical Superintendent at \$1,800. This change is requested because the Superintendent of the institution was removed, December 31, 1909, and the position has not been filled except by the appointment on February 2, 1910, of a General Medical Superintendent of all institutions on Blackwells Island, and to be paid on the City Hospital roll.

I consider this a better organization, both for the care of the patients and the interest of the City. The appointment of a resident Deputy Medical Superintendent will amply provide for that institution. He will be under the direct control of the General Medical Superintendent.

This is the same arrangement as at present in operation at the Kings County institutions under the jurisdiction of this Department and in the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and has proven very satisfactory.

GENTLEMEN:—In reference to a request made by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities, under date of February 7, 1910, for a modification of certain salary schedules supporting the appropriations for said Department for the year 1910, and the transfer of \$1,200 to provide for the proposed modifications, I report as follows:

The salary schedules affected by the proposed modifications are as follows:

Institutions, Manhattan and The Bronx.

- No. 584, City Hospital.
- No. 585, New York City Training School for Nurses.
- No. 586, New York City Home for Aged and Infirm.
- No. 587, Metropolitan Hospital.

—and involve the transfer of \$1,200 from Item No. 587 to Item No. 584.

In Item No. 584, City Hospital, the modifications are:

First—It is the purpose of the Commissioner to place all the Department institutions on Blackwells Island under the supervision of a General Medical Superintendent, a legally established position in the Department, believing that it will result in a better organization than exists at present. To accomplish this it is proposed to abolish the position of Superintendent at the City Hospital, for which a salary allowance of \$3,000 per year was made in the Budget for 1910, and substitute a General Medical Superintendent, to be filled by the appointment of the present Superintendent, Dr. C. B. Bacon, who is now performing the duties pertaining to the office of General Medical Superintendent. It is proposed to continue Dr. Bacon as Superintendent up to June 30 at his present salary of \$3,000 per year, the position and grade of General Medical Superintendent at that rate not having been established in the Department in accordance with the provisions of section 56 of the Charter, and on July 1, next, appoint him to the new position at \$5,000 per annum, the grade for which has been established. This would make the salary cost for the current year \$4,000, or \$1,000 in excess of the allowance for the position which it is intended to abolish, and to provide for this deficit request is made for the transfer of \$1,000 from the appropriation for Metropolitan Hospital. Considering the fact that the modification requested, if approved at the present time, would not become effective until July 1, it does not seem advisable to approve so far in advance any contemplated increase of salary, and I therefore recommend that this modification be not now approved.

Second—Requested increase of salary of the Deputy Superintendent from \$1,000 to \$1,200, the request being made upon the ground that the present salary is less than that paid to the Steward (\$1,200), although his responsibilities are much greater. The grade of \$1,200 for the position of Deputy Superintendent has not been established in the Department of Public Charities, and recommendation is therefore made that the proposed modification be not approved.

Third—The addition of a Cook at \$600 and a Dietitian at \$720 per annum. The duties of both these positions have been performed by employees classed as Hospital Helpers at salaries of \$600 each. The Hospital Helper who acted as Cook has resigned, and it is proposed to fill the vacancy by appointing a new employee, to be designated as Cook, at the same salary as paid to the former employee. In connection with the application for a Dietitian at \$720 (the lowest established grade), it is stated by the Chief Dietitian of the Department that it is impossible to retain the services of competent employees of that class at \$600, as higher salaries are paid elsewhere. As the proposed modification will not increase the total yearly salary cost, provision for the two positions being made from the bulk allowance for Hospital Helpers, it is recommended that the request be approved.

The modification in Items Nos. 585 and 586 call for the appointment of two Dietitians at \$720 each. The reasons for this request are the same as stated in this report upon Item No. 584, and it is recommended that the proposed modifications be approved.

Item No. 587—The Budget for 1910 provides an allowance for the employment of a Superintendent at \$3,000 per year. On December 31, 1909, the then Superintendent was removed and the position abolished. The modification consists in the elimination of the line item Superintendent at \$3,000 per annum, and substituting that of Deputy Medical Superintendent at \$1,800, leaving an unassigned balance to the credit of this account of \$1,200. Approval of the request is recommended.

In view of the facts stated herein, I recommend the approval of the request made by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as per resolution attached hereto, which renders any transfer unnecessary.

DEAR SIR—I beg to acknowledge return of various communications addressed by me as Clerk of this court, to your Honorable Body during the year 1909, as per your resolution of January 14 of the current year.

I am instructed by the Justices to renew my communication of December 27, 1909, wherein I asked your Honorable Body to request the Board of Aldermen to fix and grade the position of Clerk at \$1,000 a year in the Children's Part of the Court of Special Sessions, First Division, in conformity with section 56 of the Greater New York Charter. The Justices desire me to call your particular attention to the fact that this position (Clerk) and the money therefor has already been provided for in the Budget for 1910 for the said court. The Children's Court has been much embarrassed by the fact that the Budget for 1909 provided for an Attendant at \$1,000 a year. The nature of the work required in the Clerk's office of the Children's Court is clerical, and not such work as an Attendant would be called upon to perform, and the Justices realizing that they could get better service from an appointment from the eligible list of the Civil Service of a Clerk than that of Attendant, have requested your Honorable Body at odd times to bring about this change of title. This has been done in the 1910 Budget, but the Charter provision referred to has not been complied with. This vacant Clerkship is very much desired by the Children's Part of this court, and the Justices will feel very much obliged if you will prefer the request to the Board of Aldermen to change this title as above requested.

DEAR SIR—In accordance with a resolution adopted by the Justices of this court I am instructed to ask your Honorable Board to request the Honorable Board of Aldermen to fix and grade the position of Clerk in the Children's Part of the Court of Special Sessions, First Division, in conformity with section 56 of the Greater New York Charter. The money has already been provided for this position in the Budget for 1910.

The Children's Court was much embarrassed last year by the fact that the Budget for that year provided for an Attendant at \$1,000 a year. The nature of the work in the Clerk's office of the Children's Court was clerical and not such work as an Attendant would be called upon to perform. The Justices realizing that they would get better service from an appointment from the eligible list of the Civil Service in the Clerk's grade than from that of Attendant, requested your Honorable Body last July to change the title. The matter was referred to the Special Committee and has rested there without action since, thus causing the Children's Court serious embarrassment because of lack of sufficient help.

We have been advised by the Comptroller's office to renew this request at the beginning of this year as it is the opinion there that as the matter was not disposed of by the last Board of Estimate and Apportionment the application of last July died with that Board.

If your Honorable Body will give this your prompt attention it will be greatly appreciated by the court and will be of great assistance.

Fuller, Clerk of the Court of Special Sessions, First Division, requesting the establishment of the additional grade of the position of Clerk in the Children's Court, First Division, at the rate of \$1,000 per annum, which matter was referred to a Select Committee, consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, for consideration. In connection therewith, your Committee submits the following report:

The position of Attendant in the Children's Court, First Division, with salary at the rate of \$1,000 per annum, remained unfilled during the year 1909 although there was a Budget allowance for the salary of the position. The position of Attendant was originally held by the present Deputy Clerk. Since the latter's promotion the position of Attendant has remained vacant. The Justices say that the Court is in need of more clerical help and that the position of Attendant is a useless adjunct of the Court.

The estimate of expenditures for the Children's Court for 1910, as transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, did not include a request for an allowance for an Attendant at \$1,000 per annum. The estimate, however, did include a request for an allowance for a Clerk at an annual salary of \$1,000. Acting on the request of the Justices, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment provided for a Clerk in place of an Attendant. This provision, however, cannot become operative unless the position and grade of Clerk at \$1,000 is established.

William M. Fuller, Clerk of the Court of Special Sessions, says that the Justices of the Court believe that they would get better service for the purposes needed from an appointment from the eligible list of the Civil Service in the Clerk's grade than from the eligible list of Attendants. He also says that the nature of the work

in the Clerk's office of the Children's Court is clerical and not such work as an Attendant would be called upon to perform.

The change of the official designation of the position from that of Attendant to that of Clerk will not increase the annual amount allowed in the Budget for salaries.

In view of the facts herein presented, your Committee would recommend approval of the request of the Clerk of the Court of Special Sessions, First Division, representing the Justices of said Court, in accordance with the resolution hereto attached.

On January 14, 1910, the request of said Clerk, Court of Special Sessions, was referred to the said Select Committee.

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held January 14, 1910, a communication was presented from the Clerk of the Court of Special Sessions, Second Division, requesting the establishment of the following additional grades of positions in said court:

One Assistant Clerk at \$2,000 per annum; one Stenographer and Typewriter at \$1,200 per annum; which communication was referred to a Select Committee, consisting of the Comptroller and President of the Board of Aldermen, for consideration. In connection therewith your Committee submits the following report:

The Court of Special Sessions, Second Division, as now constituted, was organized in 1898. During that year it disposed of 2,180 cases. During the year 1908, it disposed of 12,310 cases. This increase is at the rate of 550 per cent. During a period of eleven years the clerical force of the Court has been increased only once, and then by the appointment of an additional Clerk at a salary of \$1,200 per annum.

The business of the Court, it is stated, has been seriously embarrassed and hampered by the actual need of additional clerical help. The Justices have for several years endeavored to obtain a larger Budgetary allowance for salaries to provide for the appointment of additional Clerks, but their requests were not granted until the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in making the appropriations for 1910, allowed an amount sufficient to pay the salaries of an additional Assistant Clerk at \$2,000 per annum and an additional Stenographer and Typewriter at \$1,200 per annum.

The Court of Special Sessions, Second District, has jurisdiction in three Boroughs, namely, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, and the clerical work necessary for the transaction of the business of the Court is increasing each year. The Budget appropriation for salaries for the Court of Special Sessions, Second Division, for 1909, was \$64,500. The appropriation for the same purpose for 1910 is \$68,000. The Budget appropriation for salaries for the Court of Special Sessions, First Division, for 1909, was \$86,470. The Budget appropriation for the said Court for salaries for 1910 has been fixed at \$90,550. There is not much difference in the volume of business transacted in the two courts. During the past ten years the increase in the number of cases disposed of has been much greater in the Court of Special Sessions, Second Division, than in the Court of Special Sessions, First Division.

Your Committee is of the opinion that the new grades of positions asked for, the salaries for which have been provided for in the Budget appropriation for 1910, should be established, and we would recommend approval of the request in accordance with the resolution hereto attached.

DEAR SIR—In the reorganization of the Engineering Division of the Department I have designated I. M. de Varona as Chief Engineer for the entire City. There will be under his immediate direction the Engineers who have heretofore acted independently for the Boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond. I have subdivided the engineering work into different classes and in order to perfect the plans it will be necessary to establish a position of Deputy Chief Engineer at a salary of \$7,500, and the grades of Assistant Engineer and Stationary Engineer at \$5,000 and \$2,100 per annum, respectively. There is no contemplated increase in the establishment of these grades. Under the proposed reorganization plan there will be an ultimate saving, as several positions will be abolished. I would, therefore, respectfully ask that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to section 56 of the amended Charter, establish these grades.

For a number of years past Patrick J. McKiernan, Axeman, has been acting as Inspector of Fuel and Supplies for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. His duties are practically those of a Storekeeper under the classification as applied to other Departments and in order that he may continue at this work, at which he has given entire satisfaction, I would respectfully ask that the position of Storekeeper be established at \$1,200 per annum, for the present incumbent, this change of title being necessary so that there will be no violation or evasion of the Civil Service Regulations.

GENTLEMEN—In the matter of a communication, under date of January 24, 1910, addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, requesting the establishment of certain positions and grades of positions in addition to those already existing in said Department, which request was, on January 28, 1910, referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, your Committee presents its report, as follows:

The new positions and grades of positions requested by the Commissioner are—Deputy Chief Engineer, at \$7,500 per annum; Assistant Engineer, at \$5,000 per annum; Stationary Engineer, at \$2,100 per annum; Storekeeper, at \$1,200 per annum.

The Commissioner, in his communication, states that in a reorganization of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity he has designated I. M. de Varona as Chief Engineer for the entire city, intending to place under the immediate direction of such Chief Engineer the Engineers who have heretofore acted independently in the Boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, and that the said reorganization will require the establishment of the engineering positions and grades now requested. He also states that such request is not based upon any contemplated increase of salary expenditures but that under the proposed reorganization plan there will be an ultimate saving to the City, as several existing engineering positions will be abolished.

We are advised that the Commissioner proposes, as soon as the requested position of Deputy Chief Engineer, at \$7,500 per annum, shall have been created, to abolish the existing position of Chief Engineer at \$7,500 per annum for the Borough of Brooklyn, which position will have then become unnecessary; and that the grades of Assistant Engineer at \$5,000 per annum and of Stationary Engineer at \$2,100 are necessary to make the existing schedules more elastic from an administrative standpoint.

An inspection of the Civil List as of December 31, 1909, shows that there was on that date attached to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Assistant Engineers at \$3,500 and \$4,800 per annum, and Stationary Engineers at \$2,500 per annum and \$1,800 per annum. The establishment of the requested grades will, by the creation of intermediate grades, facilitate a reorganization of the engineering forces of said Department.

In regard to the requested position of Storekeeper at \$1,200 per annum, the Commissioner states that such position, if established, is intended for the present incumbent in the position of Axeman, who has been acting as Inspector of Fuel and Supplies for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx and whose duties are practically the same as those of a Storekeeper in other City Departments. The position is therefore requested so that the title of such employee may conform to the nature of the service rendered by him.

In view of the Commissioner's statement that the establishment of said positions and grades of positions are required by the contemplated reorganization of the Department under his jurisdiction, which reorganization, he has assured us, will result in an ultimate saving in the total salaries paid for engineering services in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity; the said request is hereby recommended for approval. In consideration of the restrictions imposed by the Budget resolution relative to salaries and wages schedules, which requires the assent of twelve votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment before any existing salary or wages schedule can be modified through the utilization of the new positions and grades herewith approved, there would appear to be no good reason for placing a restriction upon the number of incumbents in such positions or grades; therefore the resolution herewith presented for adoption does not stipulate the number of incumbents.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—Referring to the communication addressed to your Honorable Board under date of February 17, 1910, by the President of the Borough of Queens, requesting a revision of the schedules of salaries and wages supporting the appropriations made to the several bureaus under his jurisdiction, for the year 1910, I would report thereon as follows:

By the requested modification, it is proposed to create a Division of Accounts under the direction of the Chief Clerk, to whom will be assigned for accounting purposes certain employees now engaged in the President's office, and one Clerk to be transferred from the Bureau of Highways; also to assign certain other employees of the President's office, and one Typewriting Copyist and one Inspector of Complaints to be transferred from the Bureau of Highways, to the performance of specific duties under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works, while the remaining employees of the President's office, excepting one Clerk to be transferred to the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, and one Bookkeeper to be transferred to the Bureau of Highways will remain in their present respective positions under the immediate direction of the Borough President.

It was also contemplated to make provision by the transfer of funds for one Attendant in the office of the Commissioner of Public Works and one Messenger in the Division of Accounts, but in view of the fact that the grades of these positions have not been established, it is recommended that the requested modification in this respect be not approved.

In the Bureau of Highways, it is proposed to substitute a Clerk at \$1,200 for one Auto Engineman at the same salary, and also to provide for the payment of the salary of one Chief Inspector at \$2,500 per annum by reducing the amount allowed for Foremen in the maintenance of highways. The grade of position of Chief Inspector at \$2,500 per annum was established on June 22, 1909, and the salary thereof was paid last year from the appropriation account Maintenance of Highways which was unsupported by a schedule of salaries and wages in the Budget for 1909. In the final compilation of the figures for this year's Budget, as disclosed by the working sheets on file in this Department, the salary of the Chief Inspector was cast in the line item of Foremen as appearing in the schedule supporting the appropriation made for Maintenance of Highways for 1910. To correct this palpable error, the request revision in this respect is necessary.

By reducing the amount allowed for laborers in the maintenance of highways, provision is made for one Watchman at \$900 a year, while the services of two Watchmen at the same salary in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices are dispensed with.

While monetary provision in this year's Budget was made for the employment of five Inspectors of House Connections and one Inspector of Sewers, yet in segregating the total budgetary allowance for the maintenance of sewers, the aggregate salaries of the aforementioned employees was included in the amount allowed for Foremen. By reducing the amount thus allowed erroneously, provision is made by the revision under consideration for the correction of the error thus made and for the continued employment of these Inspectors.

In the Bureau of Street Cleaning, it is proposed to dispense with the services of an Auto Engineman and to use in part the amount thus saved for the employment of additional Laborers. The modification under consideration provides for the employ-

ment of an additional Section Foreman at \$1,200 per annum, which position is to be filled by promotion; also the reduction of the number of Assistant Foremen at \$900 per annum from five incumbents to three, and for an increase in the number of incumbents of the position of Assistant Foremen at \$3.25 per diem from four to five. The services of an automobile having been dispensed with, it is proposed to utilize the saving effected thereby to replenish the appropriation made for the hire of horses and carts.

In the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, it is proposed to devote the amount appropriated, viz.: \$1,590, for the care of the free floating bath to the employment of additional Laborers and Cleaners. During the summer months regular employees of the Bureau will be assigned to the care of the bath. By dispensing with the services of male and female Attendants at the interior bath, provision is made for the employment of Cleaners and Laborers, who, the Superintendent of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices states, may be assigned to the performance of more general duties in and about the bath than Attendants are required to perform.

To conform with the prevailing rate allowed to Engineers, viz.: \$4.50 per day, provision is also made, by the reduction of the amount allowed for Attendants, for the yearly compensation of the Engineer at the above rate.

In the Bureau of Buildings, it is desired by the requested modification to dispense with the services of one Clerk at \$1,050 per annum and to substitute therefor one Messenger at the same salary. As appears from the supporting schedule, there is at present no Messenger assigned to the Bureau of Buildings.

The Borough President states that the requested revision is made necessary by the reorganization of the several Bureaus under his jurisdiction; to conform with the several changes made in the various supporting schedules since the making of the Budget for the current year, and finally, for the proper conduct of the business of the several Bureaus within his control.

In view of the foregoing, I recommend that the request be granted as indicated herein, and herewith I submit the necessary resolutions providing for the said revision of the supporting schedules and for the transfers of funds within the appropriations made to the office of the President of the Borough of Queens, to render the same effective.

I am advised that the proposed changes in Schedules No. 369 and No. 370 are required to meet the present organization of the forces of the Commissioner's office, the Central Office and the Laboratories, a Clerk at \$1,050, and a Clerk (typewriting) at \$1,200 now being attached to such laboratory force. The changes in the Schedules of the Water Register in the several Boroughs is in accordance with a reorganization of the accounting system in said offices now being perfected by a Committee, consisting of representatives of the Comptroller, the Commissioners of Accounts, the Bureau of Municipal Research and the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

A memorandum approved by said Committee and submitted to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, contains the following reference to such new method of accounting and general reorganization of the force:

The new system shortly going into operation, provides for the control of each individual consumer's ledger by a controlling account to be operated in the general ledger, through the medium of the Consumer's ledger journal. Frontage and Meter Rate revenue journal; Rebate, Refund, Cancellation and Corrections journal; Schedule of meter readings, Schedule of Meter and frontage rates accounts receivable, and the daily report of bills paid. While such provisions will develop all significant totals, and operate to advantageously segregate every governing element with a minimum of clerical labor, the labor must be, however, of a high class of intelligence and trained to bookkeeping processes, and the standard of efficiency measured by six hundred dollars per annum is obviously unavailable for such kind of work. Regarding the regulation of Inspectors, it is believed that a more trustworthy and efficient performance could be assured by appointing or detailing a Supervising Inspector over each section, and holding such persons responsible for the actions of the men under their directions.

While, as will be noted, the proposed schedule changes contain numerous small increases in the compensation of the present force of employees attached to the Water Register's offices, the revision is in general the abolishment of the \$600 grade and \$750 grade of Clerks, and increases in the number of incumbents in the higher grades.

Since the requested modifications in no way violate the Budget resolution as to salaries and wages schedules, and as the requested transfer necessitated by the proposed changes are all within the appropriations for the schedules thus modified, I recommend that the Commissioner's request be granted through the adoption of the resolution hereunto attached. As the Commissioner states that the communication herewith reported on is to take the place of his communications under date of February 7, 1910, and February 14, 1910, said previous communications are returned herewith.

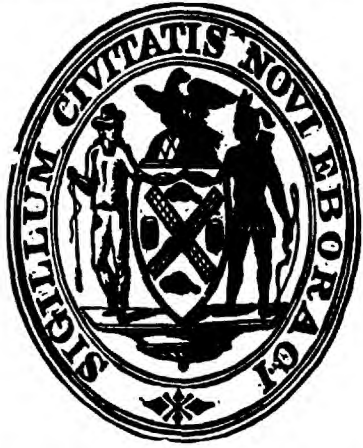

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or officer of the City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the bidders, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guarantee or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
