**Police Commissioner—Request for Authority to Contract, Without Public Letting, for the Erection of a Reviewing Stand for the Police Parade.**

City of New York, Police Department, June 18, 1918.

The Honorable Board of Aldermen, New York City, N. Y.:

Gentlemen—It is respectfully requested that the Board of Aldermen, pursuant to section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, authorize the erecting of a reviewing stand for the Police parade, which was held on May 11, 1918, at the Worth Monument and at the westerly side of Madison Square Park, in the open market instead of by contract at public letting, at a cost not to exceed \$2,976.

The original estimates as received were deemed to be excessive and an agreement was entered into with the American Red Cross Society whereby the stand would be erected at a cost to the Police Department not to exceed \$3,000, as they agreed to pay a like amount to contractor who erected the stand. **Commissioner of Public Markets—Request for Authority to Purchase Refrigerating Machine, Etc., Without Public Letting.**

Department of Public Markets, The City of New York, Municipal Building, New York, June 22, 1918.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Sir—In accordance with the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, I hereby request the Board of Aldermen to authorize the purchase of the following articles in the open market without public letting:

1 four-ton Brecht compressor refrigerating machine, 3 ice boxes, 10 cutting blocks, 50 feet of show casing.

The reason for this request is that there is an opportunity to purchase the above-named articles for about one-third the price they would cost if submitted to public letting, and, further, there is such a shortage of machinery and deliveries of it are so delayed that it would be practically impossible to secure the same for the use that it is to be put to, namely, refrigeration of articles for the extremely warm weather in Queensboro Market. **Dock Commissioner—Request for Authority to Contract, Without Public Letting, for Dredging in Slips in the North River.**

The City of New York, Department of Docks and Ferries, Office of the Commissioner, Pier A, North River, June 13, 1918.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Dear Sir—The leases of the piers in the Chelsea section to the International Mercantile Marine and Cunard Steamship Company provide that the City shall do the necessary dredging in the slips adjoining the leased property. According to a report of the Chief Engineer of this Department, dredging is necessary to the extent of 61,500 cubic yards. These piers are used very intensively for transporting over-seas troops, supplies and materials for the prosecution of the war.

In addition to this, dredging is very urgent at other points along the waterfront, aggregating in all 110,000 cubic yards.

This Department advertised for bids to be opened on March 29, 1918, but no bid was received.

Bids were again advertised and opened May 20, 1918, and only one bid was received from James Mannix to do the work at \$1.50 per cubic yard, which, in my opinion, is out of all proportion to the work required to be done even in the existing emergency.

Under the circumstances, I beg to request that a resolution be adopted by the Board of Aldermen, in pursuance of the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter authorizing and empowering the Commissioner of Docks to contract in open market without public letting for dredging to the extent of 110,000 cubic yards. In case such authority is granted by the Board of Aldermen, I am of the opinion that I will be able to have the dredging done at not to exceed one-half of the price specified in the only bid submitted. At an opening of bids held on June 17, 1918, the lowest bids were in excess of the total funds available for the work, hence it will be necessary for us to secure additional funds before we can award any contracts, it will take some time to secure these additional funds and it is on this account that we request this extension of time. **Sheriff, Bronx County—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$1,200, to Provide a Separate Room for Female Prisoners in Bronx County Jail.**

Sheriff's Office, Bronx County, Bergen Building, Tremont and Arthur Avenues, June 19, 1918.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, *President, Board of Aldermen*, City Hall, New York City:

Dear Sir—The members of the State Commission of Prisons visited the Bronx County Jail and called my attention to the fact that a separate room should be provided for female prisoners. At that time the Commission requested that I open the former Bronx County Jail, located in the Bronx County Court House, 161st street and 3d avenue.

I told them that the number of female prisoners was too small to justify incurring the extra expense that would be necessary to maintain a separate jail for women, and that until there was a larger number of women prisoners I would not undertake to put the City to the expense of maintaining two separate jails.

I told them that the provisions of law relating to the keeping of witnesses and civil prisoners apart from prisoners charged with crime were being complied with and showed them that the woman prisoner who was then here was being housed apart from the other prisoners, and that her place of confinement was in a corner of the chapel, where she had a cot and other needed accommodation.

The Commission recommended at the last meeting in connection with the report of the conditions in the Bronx County Jail "that a separate room should be provided for female prisoners as was discussed when they visited the jail in January. They reported that a separate room could be provided by using a portion of the present room with a separate entrance door."

The provisions of law relating to this are as follows:

"Section 92. Custody and control of prisoners. Persons in custody on civil process, or committed for contempt, or detained as witnesses, shall not be put or kept in the same room with persons detained for trial or examination upon a criminal charge, or with convicts under sentence. Persons detained for trial or examination upon a criminal charge shall not be put or kept in the same room with convicts under sentence. \* \* \*

The present facilities of Bronx County Jail do not provide a separate place for female witnesses and civil prisoners, unless resort is had to the use of the chapel for purposes of confinement. I do not desire to be put in a position of being criticized as a result of the present conditions of the jail, and inasmuch as I desire to comply with the law in every respect, I feel that it is necessary that a separate compartment or room be provided in accordance with law and in accordance with the suggestion of the Prison Commission.

I do not know what day I may be confronted with the duty of keeping, possibly, ten women civil prisoners and witnesses. This is always possible, and, in view of that possibility, the present situation should be remedied and remedied speedily.

I have had several contractors submit to me estimates for the doing of this work, and I find that the lowest bid for the completion of this separate room in fireproof fashion, as required by law, amounts to twelve hundred dollars.

I was recently called upon to make certain other changes and improvements in connection with the jail, and in view of the fact that the jail is in a private building, I was advised by counsel that under the terms of the lease it was the duty of the City to pay for these changes. The Corporation Counsel has likewise construed this lease. The same rule applies to the improvements now desired to be made.

I accordingly request that you provide for the issue of special revenue bonds amounting to twelve hundred dollars, to meet the expense of this improvement. Yours very truly, JAMES F. DONNELLY, Sheriff, Bronx County.

Dear Sir—I desire to place before your Board a request for the issuance of special revenue bonds in the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000), under the provisions of subdivision 8, section 188, of the Greater New York Charter.

This request is made to enable me to purchase an automobile prison van to take the place of the one now in use, as same is worn out and dilapidated and altogether too small and lightly constructed for my use in transferring prisoners to and from institutions, and has cost for repairs and maintenance every year as much as original cost of same. My idea is to purchase a G. M. C. or Federal truck with body attachment suitable to carry from 12 to 18 inmates. I have several bids from reliable concerns upon which I base my request.

**Commissioner of Street Cleaning—Request for Authority to Purchase Harness Without Public Letting.**

Department of Street Cleaning of The City of New York, Office of the Commissioner, Municipal Building, New York City, June 18, 1918.

Mr. ALFRED E. SMITH, *President, Board of Aldermen*, City Hall, New York City:

Dear Sir—In accordance with the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, I hereby request that the Board of Aldermen authorize the purchase in the open market, without public letting, of forty-eight (48) sets of double truck harness, at \$77.90 each, a total expenditure not to exceed \$3,739.20.

The reasons for this request are as follows: The last time we purchased double truck harness was in March, 1917, at the same price per set as now offered. Since then the United States Government has fixed the price of harness leather at 75 cents per pound, which is about 7 cents per pound higher than in March, 1917. Owing to the demands of the Government for linen thread, such as is used in making harness, it is impossible to obtain the same at the present time without a Government release.

The Linen Thread Company, which is the largest thread manufacturer in this country, will not furnish thread except to those who hold contracts with the government for making harness or aeroplanes. This Department has had considerable difficulty in obtaining a release for a sufficient quantity of thread with which to make necessary repairs to harness.

Under the circumstances it appears to our advantage to accept the offer now made of \$77.90 per set for 48 sets of harness, because if we advertise for bids undoubtedly higher prices will prevail. Yours truly,

**President, Borough of Richmond—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$91,000, to Repave the Space Between the Tracks and the Rails of the Tracks of Surface Railroads on Certain Streets in the Borough of Richmond.**

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Richmond, Borough Hall, Staten Island, June 18, 1918.

Honorable Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Sirs—The pavement on Van Duzer street, from Richmond turnpike to Hannah street, and from Swan street to Wright street, and from the iron slag pavement south of Broad street to Vanderbilt avenue, between the tracks and the rails of the tracks of the Staten Island Midland Railway Company is entirely worn out and in a disgraceful condition.

The railroad company has been notified to repave its portion of the street, but declines on the plea of lack of funds (see copy of letter attached from R. L. Land, Vice-President). There are no funds available for this work, and it is very necessary that it be done, and I therefore request an issue of special revenue bonds in the amount of \$91,000 to repave the space between the tracks and the rails of the tracks on Van Duzer street, from Richmond turnpike to Hannah street, and from Swan street to Wright street, and from the iron slag pavement south of Broad street to Vanderbilt avenue.

The cost of the work, when completed, will be sued for and recovered from the Staten Island Midland Railway Company.

Official notice to do this work on a form approved by the Corporation Counsel has been served on a proper officer of the company and affidavit of such service is on file in this office. Very truly yours,

**Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Resolution Modifying a Contract for Five Aerial Hook and Ladder Trucks for the Fire Department.**

City of New York, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Office of the Secretary, Municipal Building, June 24, 1918.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I transmit herewith, for concurrence by the Board of Aldermen, certified copy of resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 21, 1918, modifying the contract between the City, acting by the Fire Commissioner, and the Front Drive Motor Company, dated July 14, 1917, for furnishing and delivering five 3-section 85-foot hook and ladder trucks for the sum of \$53,500; recommending that the time be extended to July 15, 1918, for the performance of the contract and further recommending that the liquidated damages incurred under said contract be released.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby consents to an agreement between the City, by the Fire Commissioner, and the Front Drive Motor Company, modifying the contract entered into by the City, through the Fire Commissioner, and the said company, dated July 14, 1917, for furnishing and delivering five 3-section 85-foot hook and ladder trucks for the sum of fifty-three thousand and five hundred dollars (\$53,500), as follows:

The motors are to be four cylinders of 5½-inch bore and 7-inch stroke, instead of six cylinders to test to 100 brake horsepower.

Electric starters are to be furnished instead of air and gasoline starters.

Gear shifts are not to be of the "H" frame type and are to have two speeds forward instead of three.

There are to be two single seats at front of apparatus instead of one double seat.

The contract price is to be forty-five thousand dollars (\$45,000) instead of fifty-three thousand five hundred dollars (\$53,500).—and be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby unanimously recommends to the Board of Aldermen that the time for the performance of such contract, as modified, be extended to July 15, 1918; and be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment unanimously recommends to the Board of Aldermen that the liquidated damages incurred under this contract be released.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Committee on Finance and Budget, June 18, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—The Committee on Finance and Budget, at its meeting on June 17, 1918, considered a communication dated June 3, 1918, which was referred to it on June 14, 1918 (Cal. No. 151), from the Fire Commissioner requesting that this Board recommend to the Board of Aldermen (1) the release of the Front Drive Motor Company from liquidated damages accrued under its contract for the delivery of five 85-foot 3-section hook and ladder trucks, (2) the extension of the time for the performance of such contract and (3) the consent of this Board to a proposed modification of said contract.

An Engineer of the Board has reported on the matter as follows:

On March 30, 1917, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved the specifications and estimate of cost of \$44,750 for five 3-section 85-foot hook and ladder trucks. This is at the rate of \$8,950 each. On June 29, 1917, an increased cost, \$53,500, or \$10,700 each, was approved in order to permit the acceptance of the lowest bid received on April 16, 1917. These specifications called for six cylinder engines.

On July 14, 1917, a contract was made with the Front Drive Motor Company for these trucks for \$53,500. At the time this contract was let there was only one fire truck of this type in use in this country. This was a truck manufactured by the Front



Drive Motor Company and placed in service on May 21, 1917. It is located with Hook and Ladder Company No. 18 at No. 84 Attorney street and is giving satisfactory service. It contains a four-cylinder engine and gearshift identical with what the contractor proposes to furnish with the five trucks under the present contract. It cost \$8,950.

The contractor states that after receiving the contract he found it impossible to use the type of motor called for in connection with the remainder of the tractors to be manufactured. He, therefore, completed the trucks to conform, except for improvements in detail, with the one furnished under the previous contract and offers them to the City at \$9,000 each, instead of \$10,700, the contract price.

The reduction in the contract price offered by the contractor will fully compensate the City for the difference in value between the trucks as contracted and as specified.

The procedure proposed in order to grant an extension of time on the contract and to accept at the reduced price apparatus departing from the specifications is in accordance with the recommendations of the Corporation Counsel to the Fire Commissioner under date of May 14 and 28, 1918.

The Committee recommends the adoption of the attached resolution, which will grant the requests of the Fire Commissioner. Respectfully,

In connection with the foregoing proposition the President laid before the Board the following communication from the Fire Commissioner:

Fire Department, City of New York, June 21, 1918.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Sir—The Front Drive Motor Company has built under contract for this Department five three-section aerial hook and ladder trucks to cost \$10,700 each, or \$53,500 for five.

After the first truck delivered had successfully passed the required road and ladder-raising tests, it was found on checking up the specifications that there were several departures therefrom, the most material being a four-cylinder instead of a six-cylinder motor.

There is urgent need of these trucks in the Department and it is doubtful if others could be built and delivered within a year. It is important, therefore, that these trucks be accepted upon a satisfactory adjustment with the contractor.

Under date of May 21, 1918, the Front Drive Motor Co. offered, in writing, to reduce the cost \$1,700 on each truck, or \$8,500 on five, if releases from all claims which the City may have under the contract were granted. I consider this a very substantial reduction and sufficient to compensate fully for the departures from the specifications.

The Corporation Counsel was consulted and in an opinion dated May 14 outlined the procedure to be followed, and later in an opinion rendered May 28 stated:

"If the City desires to accept the offer contained in the communication from the contractor to you, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should unanimously adopt a resolution recommending to the Board of Aldermen the release of the contractor from the liquidated damages already accrued and extending the time for the performance of the contract. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment should also consent to the proposed modification for the reasons stated in the opinion to you heretofore referred to. If the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopts the resolution above referred to, the matter should then be presented to the Board of Aldermen for action on its part."

On June 3, 1918, I wrote a letter to the Honorable John F. Hylan, Mayor and Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requesting the Board to grant the Front Drive Motor Co. an extension of time until June 30, 1918, on this contract, No. 47922, dated July 14, 1917, as provided in section 418 of the Charter, requesting the Board to recommend to the Board of Aldermen that the liquidated damages accrued under the said contract be released and requesting the Board to consent to the modification of the contract and specifications to the extent necessary to permit the acceptance of the fire apparatus in question.

On this 21st day of June, 1918, the Board of Estimate adopted a resolution, a true copy of which is hereto annexed. It is, therefore, requested that the Board of Aldermen adopt a resolution in conformity with the said resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. A copy of the proposed resolution is hereto annexed.

**An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances by Adding a Section Thereto Relating to Heat in Buildings.**

AN ORDINANCE to amend chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances by adding a section thereto, relating to heat in buildings.

*Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:*

Section 1. Chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by the addition of a new section, to be numbered 10 and to read as follows:

Sec. 10. No owner or lessee of any house or building, or portion thereof, which is either rented, leased, let or hired out, to be occupied, in whole or in part, as the home or residence of three families or more, living independently of each other, and doing their cooking on the premises, for which house, building, or portion thereof, heat is furnished by the said owner or lessee as part of the rental agreement with any one of the said three or more families living therein, shall permit the said house, building or portion thereof to remain heated at temperature of less than 68 degrees Fahrenheit, between the 15th day of October and the 15th day of April in any year, except between the hours of 10 p. m. and 7 a. m.

Upon the conviction of any person for the violation of the above section, said person shall be punished by a fine of \$250.

Section 2. Section 10 of chapter 27 is hereby renumbered as section 11.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

That the purpose of this ordinance is to provide a protection against fire and consequent panic in moving picture theatres. Voluminous data has been submitted to the Committee relative to the dangers of fire from broken films and defective machinery. Numerous petitions from operators of moving picture machines advocating the passage of such an ordinance have been received by the Committee. In its investigation the Committee was advised that no such protection is provided at present and believing that there is an imperative need for such, it recommends the adoption of the accompanying ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 35 of article 2 of chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "fire prevention."

*Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:*

Section 1. Section 35 of article 2 of chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances relating to "fire prevention," is hereby amended by inserting therein a new subdivision to read as follows:

2. To prevent films in projecting machines from taking fire. Every motion picture projecting machine used for the projecting of motion pictures, shall be equipped with an approved automatic shutter placed between the condensers and the film, and so arranged as to close immediately and automatically should the film become stationary through breakage or failure of the take-up to work properly.

Sec. 2. Subdivision 2 of section 35 of article 2 of chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby changed to and shall be known as subdivision 3.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, I respectfully request that the Board of Aldermen adopt a resolution authorizing and empowering me as Commissioner of Docks, to enter into a contract without public letting for insuring ferryboats belonging to the City of New York at a cost not to exceed \$64,500, pursuant to Proposition "B" contained in the said memorandum.

*Memorandum in Relation to Insurance of Ferryboats.*

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held July 8, 1907, a resolution was adopted authorizing the Commissioner of Docks to secure and carry for the benefit of the City of New York fire, accident and collision insurance on the ferryboats which are now or may hereafter be operated by the City.

Insurance was accordingly secured and carried on ferryboats operating on the Municipal Ferries between the foot of Whitehall Street, Manhattan, and the 39th Street, Brooklyn, and St. George, Staten Island, until July 16, 1914, when it was discontinued by the previous City Administration.

In my opinion it is absolutely necessary that the ferryboats should be insured. They are, owing to the nature of their construction and operation, subject to unforeseen damage which must be repaired immediately if the successful operation of the ferries is to be continued.

The preparation of contracts, the approval of forms by the Corporation Counsel, advertising, awarding, attaching certificates and approval of sureties by the Comptroller consumes about two months, even if these preliminaries are pushed vigorously, and in the meantime the damaged boats are lying idle, which means a serious derangement of the ferry service.

The dry docks in this port are now working to their full capacity night and day and extraordinary wages are paid to workers. Besides the natural increase in the number of commercial craft in this harbor, there is an ever increasing number of United States Army and Navy vessels requiring repairs and overhauling, which will make the dry dock repair situation daily more acute. I am informed that in the near future it will be impossible to secure bids on a contract calling for a lump sum for repairs to vessels, including ferryboats, so that no damage can be made good by contract after advertised bids except on a cost and percentage basis, which means that all such work must be done practically without public letting. In my opinion, the best way to overcome these difficulties is to insure the ferryboats. In the past when insurance was carried, the companies upon notice of damage immediately ordered the boats to a dry dock and the work was expeditiously completed.

A tentative proposition for fire, marine and collision insurance on the ferryboats belonging to the City has been received as follows:

It will be noted that the quotations above involve a lower rate under Proposition "B", which is based upon insuring each of the boats for a larger amount than they have heretofore been insured for. Owing to the increased cost of labor and material, the boats cannot be replaced or rebuilt in case of total loss for the amounts set forth in Proposition "A."

It will also be noted that Proposition "B" provides for \$825,000 more insurance than is provided for in Proposition "A" for a premium only \$4,500 in excess of that quoted in Proposition "A." \$100,000 additional insurance is provided for the six large boats and \$75,000 additional insurance is provided for the three small boats. These amounts of insurance can be collected in case of total loss by fire or marine disaster.

Boat insurance rates are governed largely by the amount of insurance carried in proportion to the reproducible value, hence the lower rates for the larger amounts of insurance.

The City has heretofore insured these boats at rates varying from \$1.53 to \$2.11. In view of the fact that the losses sustained by the City heretofore have consisted entirely of damage to the boat by collision, etc., and that if these boats were to be damaged during the ensuing year to the same extent physically, it would cost the insurance companies twice as much to make the repairs at the present time as it cost them while the former insurance existed, it is apparent that the rates quoted above are much lower than the City has heretofore paid.

The policies which it is proposed to furnish will cover all the hazards included in the former policy with additional features of coverage, as follows:

"Loss or damage to hull or machinery through negligence, bursting of boilers, breakage of shafts or any latent defect in the machinery or hull or from other causes."

The policies formerly used restricted coverage of this nature unless caused by stranding.

In brief, the advantages which will be gained by insuring the ferryboats are as follows:

- (1) The City will not be liable for damages resulting from collision or accident.
- (2) It enables this Department to make immediate repairs to damages in excess of \$1,000, and avoids the delays under the present system caused by the preparation and advertising for contracts, and in addition the obtaining of appropriations by the action of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.
- (3) It affords the public the quickest relief in the matter of bringing transportation service back to normal.
- (4) The adjustment of claims against the Municipal ferryboats are more readily made and greatly facilitated through the medium of the insurance adjusters.

For your information I submit herewith a statement of the most recent collision and accidents to the ferryboats:

The amount of damage liable to occur in any one year is problematical, but it is reasonable to assume that the cost of insurance will be in excess of the claims paid, but there is always the risk of a disaster or complete loss.

The inconvenience and delay caused by public letting is exemplified in the case of the ferryboat "Manhattan" which was out of use from November 25, 1917, to March 6, 1918, due to loss of propeller wheel and consequent damage to the tail shaft. In this case, after all the preliminaries had been gone through, extending over a period of some months, the contract was advertised and no bids received, which made it necessary to obtain permission from the Board of Aldermen to award this work without public letting. Meanwhile the loss of the services of the boat made it impossible to maintain the schedule.

The loss of the services of the ferryboat "Manhattan" made it necessary to place the ferryboat "Mayor Gaynor" on the Staten Island Division. As this boat is comparatively small-built for the 39th Street service,—it has not the speed of the larger boats and the result was the disruption of the running schedule.

A resolution was adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, May 9, 1918, approving of the policy of authorizing this Department to secure and carry for the benefit of the City, fire, accident and collision insurance on its ferryboats.

Pursuant to subdivision 3, section 78 of the Labor Law, and upon application to be made by the employer to the Industrial Commission, women eighteen (18) years of age and upwards may be employed or permitted to work in canning or preserving perishable products in fruits and canning establishments between the twenty-fifth day of June and the fifth day of August, nineteen hundred and eighteen, in excess of ten (10) hours in any one day and sixty (60) hours in any one week, but not in excess of twelve (12) hours in any one day nor sixty-six (66) hours in any one week, nor six (6) days in any one week, upon compliance with the following regulations:

A woman may be so employed: First—At any process or part of the work which does not require continuous standing while at work, except that she shall not be so employed in the processes of labeling or packing cans. Second—Provided that every floor on which such woman is employed be drained free of liquids; but whenever any such floor cannot be kept entirely free from liquids, slat platforms shall also be furnished upon which such woman may rest her feet while at work. Third—Permits granting exemption under these rules and regulations shall be revocable by the Industrial Commission for violation of any of the above regulations.

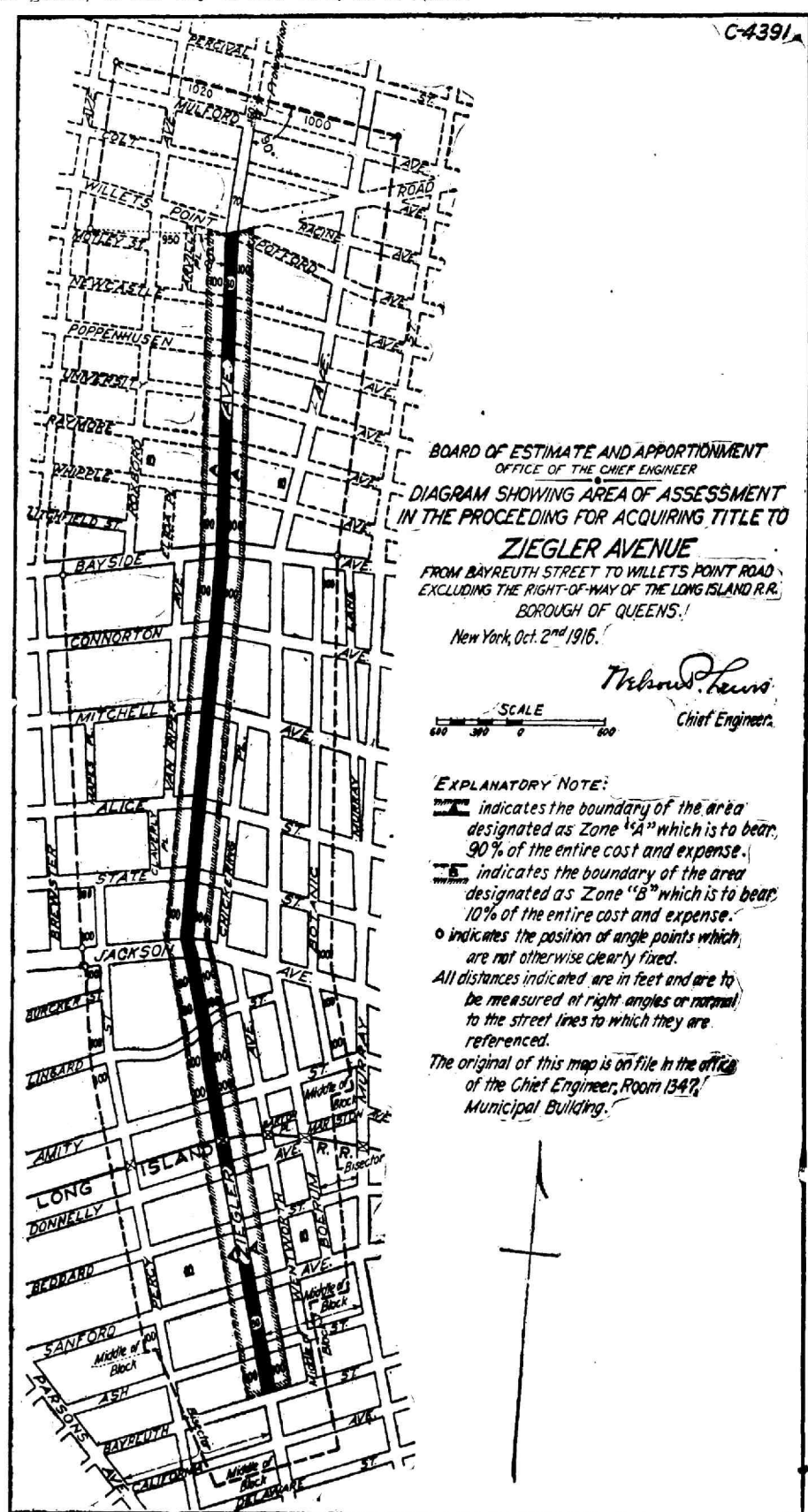

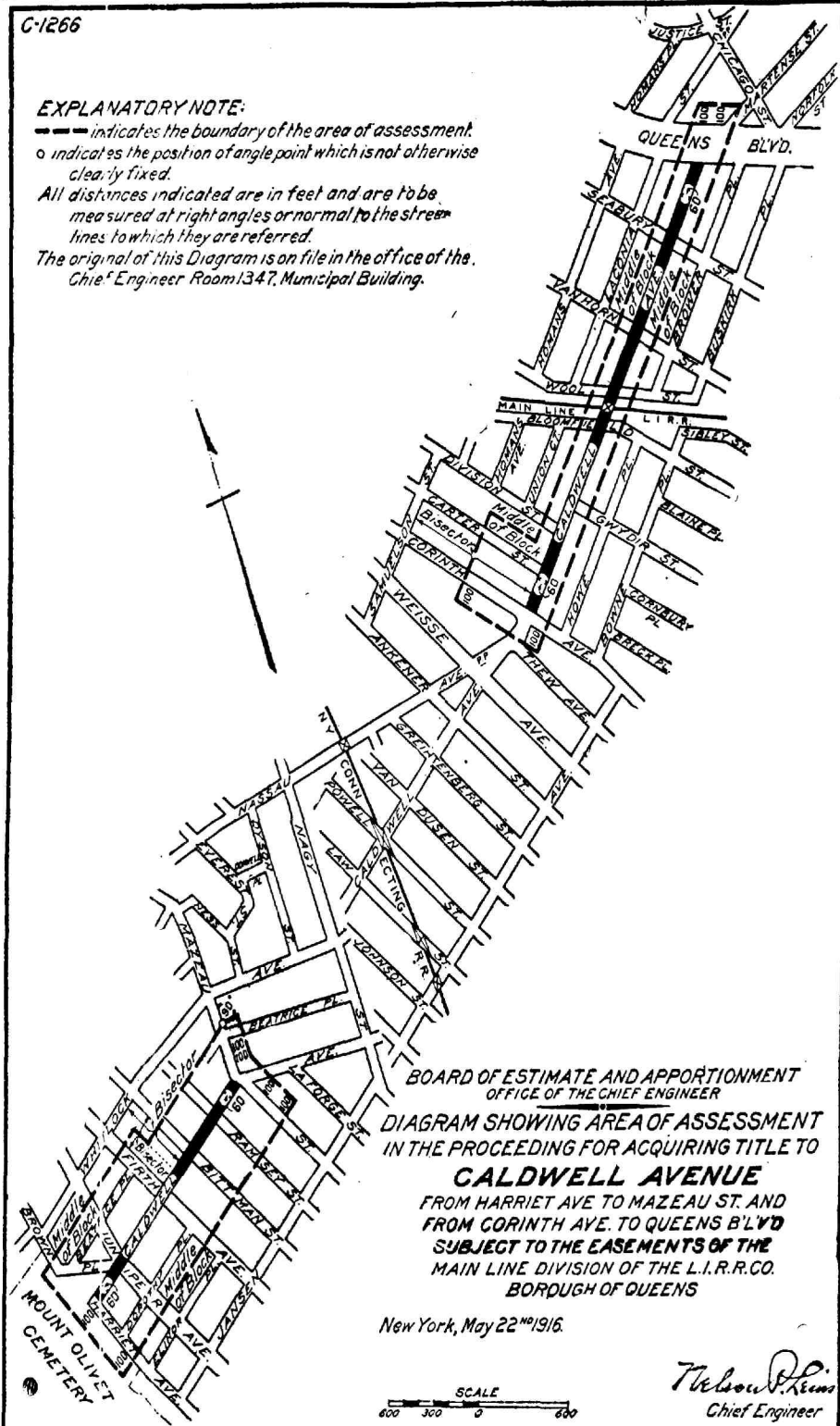

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. All the material of buildings, sheds, walks, structures and collars of whatever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from the demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture

of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
