They have also disinfected 199½ miles of street gutters in the following wards: Twice in the Fourth and Sixth, and once in the First, Second, Third, Fifth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth, Tenth, Eleventh, Thirteenth, and Fourteenth, lower portion of the Fifteenth, Sixteenth, Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Twentieth, and Twenty-first.

They have disinfected 627 privies and water-closets, 219 yards, courts, and areas, and 60 cellars and basements.

10 cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital, and 2 dead bodies to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

Permits have been granted consignees of 85 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of this port.

218 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending July 4, 1874, there were issued from this Bureau 491 burial permits for city deaths, 22 for bodies in transitu, and 52 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 491 deaths, 163 marriages, 500 births, 52 still-births, 22 applications for transit permits, and 51 returns from coroners. There were 23 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 1 transcript of birth record, 4 of marriage, and 18 of death were issued from this Bureau; 1 case of death was referred to the coroners.

During the week ending July 11, 1874, there were issued from this Bureau 562 burial permits for city deaths, 13 for bodies in transitu, and 29 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 562 deaths, 185 marriages, 628 births, 29 still-births, 13 applications for transit permits, and 50 returns from coroners. There were 28 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 5 transcripts of birth record, 3 of marriage, and 20 of death were issued from this Bureau; 3 cases of deaths were referred to coroners.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

In the week ending on Saturday, the 11th inst., there were 562 deaths reported in the city. The total number in the previous week was 452. The increase of mortality was observed only in young children and in the sufferers from phthisis. The last two weeks—the first two in the third quarter of the year—have been marked by the lowest death-rate of any corresponding fortnight in the first weeks of midsummer since 1867.

The mean temperature last week was 73 degrees Fahr., the maximum being 91, and the minimum 61 degrees, while the average degree of atmospheric moisture was 69—total saturation being considered as 100. The rain-fall measured 3.9 inches depth of water. The mean temperature of the five weeks ending last Saturday, was 71.7 degrees. This continued and healthful warmth, with an average of three-fifths (60.100) of total saturation of the atmosphere, has been attended by the least mortality which this city has experienced in many years. 2,403 deaths have occurred in these five weeks, or an average of 480.6 per week. On the 3d day of July only 48 deaths occurred in the city. This is the smallest number of deaths that has occurred during any one day in this city in several years. It was a pleasant, clear day, with a mean temperature at 69.3 degrees, maximum 76, minimum 61, and the average humidity 62 degrees. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.9 inches on the barometer. Such a day of passover in our New York midsummer is worthy of notice.

There were 24 deaths from diphtheria reported last week, against 31 deaths by that cause the previous week; 142 deaths by diarrhoeal diseases, against 64 the previous week; and 335 deaths of children under 5 years of age, against 238 in the previous week.

Of the 28 deaths by violence, 9 were by drowning and 5 by street accidents. 6 of the deaths by drowning occurred in the North river, and the others upon the eastern side of the city. The death-rate in the city, in the week ending July 4, was equal to 22.60 per 1,000 inhabitants annually, and last week at 28.10 per 1,000. The First, Fourth, Eighth, Tenth, Eleventh, Thirteenth and Twenty-second Wards had far the highest death-rates.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending July 4, 1874.

The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,480, as follows:

4 public buildings, 768 tenement houses, 134 private dwellings, 58 other dwellings, 9 manufacturing and workshops, 22 stores and warehouses, 45 stables, 24 slaughter-houses, 3 manure dumps, 5 fat-rendering establishments, 2 gut-cleaning establishments, 1 brewery, 5 public sewers and

drains, 2 dumping grounds, 59 sunken and vacant lots, 46 yards, courts and areas, 52 cellars and basements, 53 waste pipes and drains, 106 privies and water-closets, 55 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 6 dangerous stairways, 2 cisterns and cesspools, 7 other nuisances, together with 12 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 752.

During the past week, 112 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 49 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 34 houses, 34 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. They have also disinfected 161 miles of street gutters, 504 privies and water-closets, 255 yards, courts and areas, and 76 cellars and basements.

7 cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Permits have been granted consignees of 100 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

160 permits have been granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported during the week ending July 4, 1874: Typhoid fever, 3; scarlet fever, 48; measles, 25; diphtheria, 64; small-pox, 12; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 2.

520 loads of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy vaults of the city.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers, as unfit for human food, during the week ending July 4, 1874:

Cattle, 2 carcasses.
Calves (case), 1 carcass.
Sheep, 1 carcass.
Lambs, 2 carcasses.
Beef, 248 pounds.

Opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation with reference to health drainage in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

Hon. HENRY G. STEBBINS,

President of the Department of Public Parks:

SIR—Your letter of the 24th ult., to the Counsel to the Corporation, referring to a previous letter of Mr. Wales, asking his opinion as to the powers of the Department of Public Parks in regard to the drainage of land in that part of the city recently annexed from Westchester County, and in reference to the validity of assessments for such work, if done by the Department, under and pursuant to Chapter 566 of the Laws of 1871, was duly received.

The only statute, so far as I am aware, which confers powers upon the Department of Public Parks, in relation to the drainage of lands in said district, is to be found in Section 14 of the amended annexation act, Chapter 329 of the Laws of 1874. That section provides, among other things, that the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks shall have the exclusive power "to construct and maintain all bridges, tunnels, sewers, streets, road and avenues" which may be located and laid out by said Commissioners in said district. I do not think that the law authorizes the Park Department to construct what are called "blind drains." I am advised by a competent engineer that drains of this description are quite different from sewers, and that they are not classed or considered as sewers. The language employed in Chapter 566 of the Laws of 1871 shows a clear intent to make a distinction between "blind drains" and sewers. Section 1 of that act provides as follows: "Whenever it shall appear to be necessary for the protection of the public health that any part or parcel of land within the corporate limits of the City and County of New York needs to be drained by other means than by sewers, and it shall be so certified by the City Sanitary Inspector, and said certificate is filed among the records of the Board of Health of the Health Department of said city, the said Board shall direct that the same be done, by and under the direction of the Department of Public Works of said city and county." Section 2 of that act also provides, as follows: "All parts and parcels of land lying below the levels of the sewers adjacent thereto, upon which surface water remains stagnant, or through which water courses have or at present do run, may be so drained by a properly constructed 'blind drain,' which shall be carried along such natural water course, until it can be made to enter any sewer at its proper level, or if such sewer cannot be reached, it shall be carried to the adjacent river." The distinction made in this act between a sewer and a blind drain is obvious, and I am of the opinion, both from the language employed in this act and from my information as to the way the matter is regarded by practical engineers, that the word "sewer," used in the annexation act, does not include so entirely a different structure as a blind drain; and that the Department has no authority to lay such drains; and that an assessment therefor upon the property supposed to be benefited would be invalid. I regret that I am forced to this conclusion, for I presume it was intended by the annexation act to give to the Department of Parks as full powers in the annexed district, in relation to drainage, as are possessed by the Department of Public Works in reference to other parts of the city; and I presume that it would be extremely desirable that the Department should have this particular power to construct "blind drains" in certain parts of the new district. I cannot, however, allow considerations of this character to interfere with my opinion upon a question of law, and I must therefore advise the Department as above stated.
