The increase of 35 deaths was mainly due to a increase of 6 in the deaths from diphtheria. 6 from scarlet fever, 43 from diarrhoeal diseases, 18 from phthisis, 6 from heart diseases, and 10 from pneumonia, partly offset by a decrease of 10 in the deaths from diseases of the nervous system, of 13 from diseases of the respiratory organs other than pneumonia, of 16 from gastro-enteritis, enteritis and peritonitis, and of 18 from violence. The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth Ward, from measles in the Sixth, Seventh and Twentieth and from scarlet fever in the Seventeenth and Nineteenth Wards.
