

## DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS.

## [BOARD OF EXAMINERS.]

At a meeting of the Board of Examiners, held at the office of the Superintendent of Buildings, No. 2 Fourth avenue, on Tuesday, the 24th day of December, 1878, at 3 o'clock P. M., in pursuance of the call of the Acting Superintendent of Buildings, Henry J. Dudley.

There being present thereat, Henry J. Dudley, Deputy Superintendent; James M. McLean, Edwin Dobbs, John Banta, and Henry Dudley; Acting Superintendent Henry J. Dudley, presiding. The minutes of the previous meeting having been read for the information of the Board, the Chairman submitted for the action of the Board the hereinafter named petitions and applications, to wit:

Petition of Anthony Smyth, for permission in the erection of eight three-story and basement brick and brown stone front dwellings, on the north side of East One Hundred and Fourteenth street, commencing 130 feet east of Fourth avenue, four to be 15 by 45, and three to be 16 by 45, and one to be 17 by 45 feet (the last mentioned being an outside house which will have independent walls), to be allowed to so far vary or deviate from the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the upper portion of the party-walls of the said buildings, from the level of the third story beams thereof to the coping, only eight inches in thickness, in all other respects the said buildings to be erected in conformity with the Specifications and Plans for New Buildings Nos. 657, 658, and 659, filed November 4, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Thomas Diederlein, builder, for and on behalf of Mrs. Annie Crook, owner, for permission to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law, in the erection of two three-story and basement brick and brown-stone dwelling houses, on north side of One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street, 210 feet east of Sixth avenue (each to be 12 feet 6 inches by 50 feet, and 43 feet in height), as to allow the two outside and rear walls to be constructed 12 inches in thickness, the front wall 16 inches in thickness, and the centre wall but 8 inches in thickness (the same being a party wall), in conformity with the Specifications and Plans for New Buildings No. 689, filed November 15, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of James Mulry, for permission to so far deviate from the strict provisions of the Building Law as to permit the building No. 1191 Second avenue to be altered, enlarged, and an additional story added to same, in conformity with the Specification and Plan for Alterations No. 1077, filed December 7, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of James S. Jones and Patrick Sheehy, for permission to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law, in the erection of three two-story and basement brick and brown stone dwellings, each 16 feet 8 inches by 48 feet and 32 feet in height, on the south side of Eighty-fourth street, commencing 250 feet east of First avenue, as to permit the erection of the side walls of said buildings but 8 inches in thickness, and in all other respects to be built in conformity with the Specifications and Plans for New Buildings No. 722, filed December 2, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Samuel H. Merritt and Robert Hall, for permission to so far vary or deviate from the strict provisions of the Building Law, in the erection of twenty-five (25) brick buildings, each to be 15 feet by 32 feet and 24 feet in height (five of which to be located on north side of One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, 171 feet east of Southern Boulevard; five on north side of One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, 371 feet east of Southern Boulevard; ten on south side of One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, 105 feet east of Southern Boulevard, and five on south side of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, 101 feet east of Southern Boulevard—all at Port Morris, in the Twenty-third Ward) as to permit them to construct all the walls of said buildings but eight (8) inches in thickness, excepting the front walls, which are to be 12 inches in thickness, in conformity with the Plans and Specifications for New Buildings Nos. 733, 734, 735, and 736, filed December 12, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted, upon condition that all the front and rear walls of said buildings be built 12 inches thick.

Petition of James E. Ware, architect, on behalf of Lawrence Daly, owner, for permission, in the erection of two (2) brick and brown stone dwellings, each 12 feet 6 inches by 55 feet, four stories and basement, 53 feet in height, on the south side of Sixty-fourth street, 80 feet west of Park avenue, to so far vary from the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the walls of said buildings to be constructed as follows, to wit: The easterly brick wall is to be 12 inches thick all the way up from the foundation wall of cellar, the party wall to be 20 inches thick in cellar (and recessed for cellar stairs), 12 inches brick wall in basement, and 8-inch brick wall above; the westerly wall to be 8 inches thick and secured to the adjoining wall with wrought iron hold-fasts or anchors; the cellar wall on westerly side to be of stone, 20 inches thick. The beams to be set on party wall and alternated; the front walls to be 16 inches thick and the rear wall 12 inches thick; in all other respects to be erected in conformity with the Specifications and Plans for New Buildings No. 701, filed November 1, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of J. V. Hogan and Walter Powers, for permission, in the erection of twenty (20) brick two-story and basement dwellings, 14 and 15 feet front and rear and 38 feet in depth, two of which to be on west side of Fifth avenue, northwest corner of One Hundred and Nineteenth and eighteen on north side of One Hundred and Nineteenth street, adjoining said corner, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the party walls of the said buildings, above the basement stories, to be built only 8 inches in thickness, in conformity with the Specifications and Plans for New Buildings No. 739, filed December 17, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of James Patterson, builder, on behalf of M. Smith, owner, for permission to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit him to erect an extension of brick, 21x32 feet, to rear of building No. 239 West Tenth street, in conformity with the Plan and Specification for Alterations No. 1098, filed December 16, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

On motion of Henry J. Dudley, the petition of J. B. Squier, for permission in the erection of four 3-story (with basement and attic) brown-stone and brick dwelling-houses, each 12 feet 6 inches by 60, and 49 feet in height, on south side of Seventy-seventh street, commencing 45 feet east of Madison avenue, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law, as to permit the erection of the easterly wall and two of the party-walls of the building but eight inches in thickness, instead of twelve inches, and otherwise in conformity with the Specifications and Plans for New Buildings No. 681, filed November 13, 1878, and which petition was denied by the Board of Examiners, at Board Meeting of November 26, 1878, was re-referred to the Board of Examiners, and, upon motion of Edwin Dobbs, the former action of the Board, denying said petition, was reconsidered, and the petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of John Davidson, owner, for permission in the erection of fifteen (15) three-story brick, 13 and 18x40 feet dwellings, each 38 feet in height, on the south side of Seventy-sixth street, 100 feet east of Second avenue, to be allowed to so far vary from the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the party-walls of the said building to be erected but eight inches in thickness, in conformity with Specifications and Plans No. 745, filed December 23, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of John H. Brady, William Stewart, Mrs. F. Graber, and Charles Kue, for permission to so far vary or deviate from the provisions of the Building Law, in the alterations proposed to be made upon and to the buildings Nos. 58, 60, 62, and 64 Third avenue, respectively, as will allow and permit of the alteration and the placing of an additional story upon each of the said buildings, in conformity with the Specifications and Plans Nos. 1084, 1085, 1086, and 1087, filed December 11, 1878. Upon motion, so much of the foregoing petition as refers to the buildings Nos. 58, 60, and 62 Third avenue, being the inside buildings, was granted; and so much of said petition as refers to the building No. 64 Third avenue, being the corner building, was denied.

Petition of William H. Hume, architect, for and on behalf of George C. Eyland, owner, for permission to so far vary or deviate from the provisions of the Building Law, as will permit the said owner to alter and enlarge the building No. 16 Beekman street, by erecting an additional story thereon, in conformity with the Specifications and Plans No. 1105 for Alterations, filed December 19, 1878. Petition, upon motion, denied.

Petition of H. Smith, owner, for permission in the erection of a two-story brick dwelling, 19x26, and 22 feet in height, on the south side of One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, 120 feet west of Third avenue (Twenty-third Ward), to so far deviate from the provisions of the Building Law as to permit him to erect the brick wall of said building but eight inches in thickness, in conformity with the Specifications and Plans for New Buildings relative thereto, No. 747, filed December 24, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of M. S. Hayman & Sons, for the exemption of their building on rear of lot No. 54 Crosby street, from the provisions of the Building Law, chapter 625 of the Laws of 1871, section 16, requiring and providing for the placing of fire-proof metal shutters on all the window and other openings above the first story of a certain class of buildings. Petition, upon motion, granted, except so far as relates to the rear of the rear building, which was denied.

Petition of the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company, by O. Chanute, Chief Engineer, for permission to remove the Company's sheds and buildings, now at ferry landing between Piers 30 and 31, North river, foot of Reade street, to its new ferry landing between Piers Nos. 29 and 30, North river, the said buildings and sheds being wooden structures—Special Applications, No. 517, filed October 28, 1878. Petition or application, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Benjamin F. Spink (No. 2), bearing date November 29, 1878, for permission to be allowed, in the erection of a new brick and brown-stone five-story apartment house, at No. 118 West Twenty-third street, 25x90, to so far vary the strict provisions of the Building Law, as will permit him to use the westerly independent wall already standing, constructed of stone in cellar 20 inches in thickness, and of brick 12 inches in thickness above cellar, leaving a projection of eight inches of the stone wall from the brick wall, and which brick wall it is proposed to line up with brick to an additional thickness of eight inches to the under side of the third tier of beams, by cutting out every fifth stretcher course of brick of the old wall, four inches deep, and forming a header course binding the new 8-inch wall into the old 12-inch wall, such 8-inch lining to be laid up in cement and sharp sand

mortar, thoroughly bonding the old and new wall together, and making the wall 20 inches in thickness throughout; and also to, in the same manner, line up the easterly party-wall the whole height from cellar bottom to top of present wall, and above that to carry it up 16 inches in thickness, the lining of said party-wall to be locked and bonded and laid in cement mortar—Plans and Specifications New Buildings, No. 629, filed October 15, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

There being no further business, the minutes of the meeting were read, and, upon motion, approved as read.

And the Board, upon motion, adjourned, subject to the call of the Superintendent of Buildings.
