#### THE SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 21,252, so follows:

The number of complaints received from citizens during the three months ending December 31, 1878, was 1,128, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period granted, under instructions and authority of the Board, 862 permits to vessels to discharge cargoes upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 727 permits to scavengers to empty privies, their work being inspected by officers of this Board detailed for that purpose; 23 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; and 80 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

During the three months ending December 31, 1878, six thousand three hundred and seventy (6,370) permits were granted for burials. During the same period two hundred and sixty-seven (267) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; five hundred and forty (540) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; seven hundred and sixty seven (767) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; four hundred and forty-four (444) searches of the records of

births, marriages and deaths were made; and two hundred and ninety (290) transcripts of the records of deaths, fifty-three (53) of marriages, and fifty-nine (59) of births from said records were issued. There were four thousand four hundred and eight (4,408) persons registered as married during the quarter, and six thousand seven hundred and fifty-eight (6,758) children were born during the same period.

#### OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY-NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of the premises complained of. During the three months ending December 31, 1878, the number of notices issued by the Board was 2,584; these notices call attention of owners, lessees, and agents, to a violation of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleansing, and improvement of the premises named, within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon re-inspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquent, under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

The subject of the notices of the Board above referred to, and the number of each, are as follows:

Areas cleaned, connected with sewer, disinfected, pavement of graded and repaired, or walls repaired.

Balusters of stairs repaired.

Basements cleaned and disinfected.

Business of lard-rendering, slaughtering, gut-cleaning, fat-rendering, storing bones, manufacturing fertilizers, smoking sausages, or storing rags, discontinued

Buildings cleaned or inclosed.

Ceilings cleaned, whitewashed, or repaired.

Cows (number of notices).

Cesspools disinfected, emptied, cleaned, filled, constructed, repaired, or covered.

Chimneys repaired, extended, cleaned, or obstructions in removed.

Cisterns disinfected, emptied, cleaned, or covered

Drains cleaned, constructed, covered, repaved, removed, obstructions in removed, or connected with sewer.

Drains cleaned, constructed, covered, repaved, removed, obstructions in removed, or connected with sewer.

Excavations cleaned, repaired, relaid, graded, cemented, or connected with sewer.

Floors cleaned, repaired, relaid, graded, cemented, or connected with the sewer.

Fowls removed (number of notices).

Gutters (house or street) provided, repaired, cleaned, disinfected, obstructions in removed, connected with street-sewer, street-gutter, or cesspool.

Garbage receptacles provided, removed, cleaned, and disinfected.

Hydrants removed.

Joints closed or caulked with lead.

Leaders repaired, provided, extended, adjusted, connected with sewer, street-gutter, or privy-vault.

SIR—There were 557 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, March 29, 1879, which is a decrease of 66, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 27 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1878. The actual mortality for the week ending March 22, 1879, was 590, which is 46.2 above the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 28.05 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,093,629.

A T A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH
of the Health Department of the City of New York,
held at its office on the 4th day of March, 1879, the following resolution was adopted:
Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon
the Health Department, the following additional sections
to the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health,
be and the same are hereby adopted and declared to form
a portion of the Sanitary Code.
Section 202. Any cattle, meat, birds, fowl, fish, fruits,
or vegetables, found by any inspector or officer of this Department in a condition which is, in his opinion, unwholesome or unfit for use as human food, shall, upon the order
of the Sanitary Superintendent, be removed from any
market, street, or public place, and the owner or person in
charge thereof, when so directed by the said inspector or
by such order of the Sanitary Superintendent, shall remove, or cause the same to be removed, to the place
designated by the Sanitary Superintendent, or to the offail
dock, and shall not sell, or offer to sell, or dispose of the
same, for human food. And when, in the opinion of the
Sanitary Superintendent, any such meat, fish, fruits, or
vegetables shall be unfit for human food, or any such animal, cattle, sheep, swine, or fowls, by reason of disease,
or exposure to contagious disease, shall be unfit for human
food, and improper or unfit to remain near other animals
or to be kept alive, the Board of Health may direct the
same to be destroyed, as dangerous to life and health, and
may order any such animals, sheep, swine, or fowls, to be
removed by any inspector, police officer, officer, or agent
of this Department, and to be killed and taken to the offal
dock.
Section 203. That hereafter no person shall gather,
collect, accumulate, store, expose, carry, or transport in

dock.

Section 203. That hereafter no person shall gather, collect, accumulate, store, expose, carry, or transport in any manner through the streets and public places of this city, or in or to any tenement-house, cellar, or house in said city, any bones, refuse, or offensive material, without a special permit in writing from the Board of Health, in accordance with the conditions and subject to the limitations thereof, and in such manner as not to cause offensive odors or any nuisance whatsoever.
