\$1,000 REWARD.

Whereas, JAMES H. SIR—The Board of Health of the Health Department of the City of New York respectfully submits the following report for the three months ending June 30, 1875, with the vital statistics of the city for the same period:

THE SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases:

The number of complaints received from citizens during the three months ending June 30, 1875, was 1,158, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period granted, under instructions and authority of the Board, 916 permits to vessels to discharge cargoes upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 3,077 permits to scavengers to empty privies, their work being inspected by officers of this Board detailed for that purpose; 193 permits to remove and transport manure; and 84 permits were granted to land rags (in bulk) under bonds.

The number of places visited where cases of contagious disease were found and reported was 1,277; the number of persons sick with contagious disease, who could not be properly isolated or cared for at their own houses, and were therefore removed to hospital, was 791; the number of premises disinfected and fumigated, where contagious diseases had prevailed, including privy sinks, clothing, bedding, etc., was 1,134; the number of bodies removed to the Morgue was 39; the number of visits made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases was 1,180.

The amount of meat and fish condemned by the officers of the Sanitary Company of Police during the quarter ending June 30, 1875, was as follows: Cattle, 15 carcasses; calves (bob), 1,040 carcasses; calves (case), 25 carcasses; sheep, 2 carcasses; hogs, 33 carcasses; beef, 2,561 pounds; veal, 2,765 pounds; poultry, 1,798 pounds; mutton, 198 pounds; game, 265 pounds; and fish, 31,354 pounds.

The Disinfecting Corps was engaged in the disinfection of houses infected with contagious diseases and the removal of patients and dead bodies therefrom. Also in the disinfection of privies and street gutters in the crowded tenement-house districts of this city, as follows:

1st. Houses Infected with Contagious Diseases.

The following disinfectants were used for this class of work: Carbolic acid solution and sulphate of zinc for the disinfection of clothing and bedding, and carbolic acid and sulphurous acid, the latter prepared by the combustion of sulphur, for fumigation of clothing, bedding, and rooms.

2d. Disinfection of Privies, Yards, and Cellars.

The disinfectants used for this work were dead oil and a solution of chlorides, and sulphates of iron and manganese of a nominal specific gravity of 32 deg. 5 B, costing about seven cents per gallon.

For privy vaults, in the following quantities were employed:

- 2 quarts manganese liquor.
- 1 quart dead oil.
- 3 quarts water added.

For yards and cellars the quantity of disinfectants used depended on the condition of the grounds.

Some of the force were detailed to disinfect street sweepings used for filling in at the “Harlem Flats.” The disinfectants in this case were furnished by the contractors engaged in filling in.

Disinfection of Street Gutters.

For the disinfection of street gutters 70 gallons of manganese liquor 25 deg. B and 4 gallons cressylic acid were diluted with 226 gallons of water, and distributed by means of sprinklers to such parts of the streets and gutters as required it.

A large amount of dead oil was used for the disinfection of "Harlem Flats," bounded as follows: East Ninety-second street, Third avenue, East One Hundredth street, and East river; East One Hundred and Sixth street, Third avenue, East One Hundred and Ninth street, and East river; East One Hundred and Eighth street, East One Hundred and Sixth street, Third avenue, and Madison avenue, during the month of June.

During the three months ending June 30, 1875, seven thousand and sixty-one (7,061) permits were granted for burial. During the same period three hundred and sixty (360) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; five hundred and seventy-nine (579) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; eight hundred and fifty-seven (857) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; three hundred and five (305) searches of the records were made; and two hundred and sixty-seven (267) transcripts of the records of deaths, twenty-nine (29) of marriages, and forty-six (46) of births from said records were issued. There were four thousand two hundred and seventy-four (4,274) persons registered as married during the quarter, and five thousand five hundred and nineteen (5,519) children were born during the same period. 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The death rate in the spring quarter was equal to 26.66 per 1,000 living inhabitants, estimating the total population at 1,060,000. This includes all deaths of strangers and immigrants in the city.

The marriage register shows that during the spring quarter, 4,274 persons were married, and caused the record of their marriage to be duly furnished to the Bureau of Vital Statistics. This exceeds by 972 the number registered in the winter quarter, and is equal to a marriage rate of 16 in the 1,000 of the inhabitants annually.

The number of births registered during the quarter was 5,519, or 678 less than in the winter quarter. It is conceded by the present system of voluntary returns from the professional persons who furnish the certificates about 35 per cent. of the births and 25 per cent. of the marriages failed to be certified and registered. Though the individuals and families which are thus registered, as the law requires, enjoy the full benefit of the records which are separately perfect, the State and great numbers of persons suffer a loss from the imperfection of the laws which permit the duty of a public registry of marriage and birth to be in any sense dependent upon voluntary certificates.

The records of the quarter show that the excessive rate of mortality which, during winter, was produced by the unusual prevalence and fatality of inflammatory diseases of the respiratory organs and by the increase of diphtheria and small-pox, continued until the middle of May. The mean temperature had continued to be unusually low until the second week of May, but in the following week, with mild weather, the number of deaths from bronchitis and pneumonia fell from 108 to 75, while in that and the succeeding weeks diphtheria and small-pox attained their greatest fatality. From the third week of May, when these two diseases caused 53 and 45 deaths respectively, they gradually decreased under the sanitary measures, which were enforced with as much thoroughness as possible. The last week of May and the first three weeks of June were as remarkable for the small number of deaths from ordinary causes as the preceding three months had been for excessive mortality. The week ending June 12 had the lowest death rate recorded in this city in many years, and on the ninth of that month, only 53 deaths occurred from all causes. Thus the summer opened favorable for the general health of the people, except as to the two contagious diseases before mentioned, and which decreased as vaccination and sanitary cleansing were pressed forward. Deaths attributed to diarrhoeal disorders were at their lowest number the last week in April, when the temperature was at 48 degrees Fahr., and the least number of infants under a year old (89) and of all ages (201) under five years, died in the week ending June 12, when the mean temperature was at 66 degrees; but when, in the last week of June, the mean day and night temperature exceeded 74 degrees, twice as many infants, under a year, died, and the mortality from diarrhoeal disorders was six times greater than the minimum which was marked in the last week of April. The number of deaths in hospitals and other institutions was unusually large, for they were unusually crowded during the spring quarter. The abundance of food supplies was offset by the light demand for labor, and the enormous influx of destitute persons into the city during the first half of the year.

ORDERS OF THE BOARD.

The orders of this Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of the premises complained of. During the three months ending June 30, 1875, the number of orders issued by the Board was five thousand seven hundred and fifty-five. Of this number fourteen hundred and two were issued under the first sub-division of section 14, chapter 74, Laws of 1866, by the terms of which the party served is allowed three days in which to demand a hearing by the Board of the testimony, which may be presented to show that the order should be modified or revoked. In cases where no hearing has been asked for, and the orders have not been complied with, final orders in the original or amended form, to the number of three hundred and twenty, have been issued, and the Board has directed the Attorney to commence actions for penalties for non-compliance with such orders. All other written orders, in number four thousand three hundred and fifty-three have been issued, under the second sub-division of section 14, chapter 74, Laws of 1866, and are of a peremptory character, requiring that the nuisance be abated within five days, and if not complied with, directing the Sanitary Superintendent to enforce the same without further notice, unless the Board shall elect to commence a suit for penalty in lieu of the execution of the order by its officers or agents.

APPROVED PAPERS.

Whereas, Proceedings have again been taken to have Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment appointed by the Supreme Court, on Monday, June 28, 1875, in the matter of a Parade Ground in the upper part of this island of about 100 acres of land; and

Whereas, Proceedings previously taken to carry out this project were discontinued by the Department of Public Parks for good and sufficient reasons, and this discontinuance was sustained by a decision of the Court of Appeals against an appeal made by property owners in interest; and

Whereas, The laying out of a Parade Ground in the proposed locality was projected prior to the annexation of a portion of Westchester County to the City of New York, as presenting the most eligible site then available for the purpose; and

Whereas, The present time is one of great financial embarrassment, causing a depression in business bearing heavily upon the resources of all classes of the community, and crippling the means of taxpayers, especially by reduction of rentals and incomes from city property, making it imperative that all unnecessary expenditures by the city and increase of the public debt shall be avoided as far as possible; and

Whereas, The estimated cost of the proposed Parade Ground, for lands taken and laying out the grounds alone, will amount to about one million and a half dollars (\$1,500,000), to be added to the city debt by the issue of bonds, the interest on which, with the expenses of maintenance, will require the sum of at least one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars (\$125,000) to be raised annually by taxation for this object; and

Whereas, So large an increase of the funded debt and of the taxes, already so oppressive and heavy upon the taxpayers of this city, are not wise and judicious measures at this time of general depression of business; therefore

Resolved, That the Department of Public Parks be respectfully requested to discontinue the proceedings aforesaid, and thereupon the Counsel to the Corporation be respectfully requested to withdraw the pending application for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment for the opening of said proposed Parade Ground, and the Supreme Court be respectfully requested not to appoint Commissioners for such purpose; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be transmitted to the Department of Public Parks, the Corporation Counsel, and to the Supreme Court.

CORPORATION SALE OF FERRY FRANCHISES.

SEALED BIDS WILL BE RECEIVED AND
publicly opened at the Comptroller's office, on

of Franchise or right to maintain and operate several fer-
ries around the City of New York for the terms and on the
conditions hereafter set forth.

The leases will be made to conform to the requirements
of the laws relative to ferries, and subject to such regula-
tions, ordinances, or by-laws, as now are or hereafter may
be made or passed by the Common Council or State Leg-
islature, and the lessees will also provide that the lessees
shall take and assume at their own costs and charges all or
any responsibilities and liabilities of the Corporation of the
City of New York to the present lessees of ferries in re-
lation to boats, fixtures, etc., belonging to such lessees at the
respective ferries.

The minimum rate for which the ferry franchise or
license to operate ferries shall be used or enjoyed, has been
appraised and set by the Commissioners of the Sinking
Fund at two and one-half per centum of the gross re-
ceipts for ferriage that shall hereafter accrue at each
separate ferry, to be paid quarterly-yearly to the Corpora-
tion, and a covenant will be contained in each lease re-
quiring the lessees to make and deliver to the Comptrol-
ler of the City of New York, quarterly-yearly, a statement

designated by the Comptroller of the actual total gross
receipts for ferriage received by such lessee during the
preceding three months, and also that the lessees shall
keep regular books of account showing the daily gross
receipts of the ferry leased, and allow said Comptroller
or any person designated by him to examine such books.

The Department of Docks of the City of New York
has fixed and established the rent for which it will lease
the property in wharves, piers, slips, and lands under wa-
ter belonging to the Corporation, at the several ferries to be
leased to the parties or persons to whom the lease of the
ferry franchise shall be awarded by the Commission-
ers of the Sinking Fund, for the term specified for the
lease of the franchise, at the rates set forth hereafter, and
no deviation will be made from the same, and covenants
will be contained in such leases for construction, main-
tenance and surrender of all necessary fixtures and appur-
tenances to the wharf and pier property belonging to the
city used by such respective ferries.

Proposals for the lease or license to use the ferry fran-
chise at the respective ferries, to state the maximum
percentage on gross receipts which the person or persons
offering to take each ferry will pay in addition to the
rent fixed by the Department of Docks for the use of the
pier or wharf property belonging to the city, but no lease
will be given at less than the minimum rate of 2½ per
cent. on the gross receipts.

Security satisfactory to the Comptroller will be re-
quired for the punctual performance by the lessees of the
covenants of the lease of the franchise in their behalf.

The several ferries at which the franchise only is to be
leased are as follows:

1st. The ferry from the foot of Tenth street, East river,
to Greenpoint, Long Island, for the term of five years
from October 1, 1875.

2d. The ferry from the foot of Barclay street, North
river, to Hoboken, in the State of New Jersey, for the
term of two years from October 1, 1875.

The several ferries at which the franchise is to be
leased, with use of pier and wharf property belonging to
the City of New York, are as follows:

3d. The ferry from the foot of Grand street, East river,
to Grand street, Brooklyn, E. D., including such wharf
property as shall have been heretofore used by the ferry
run from these points, for the term of ten years from
October 1, 1875, subject to payment of \$2,000 per annum
for the first five years and \$3,000 per annum during the
second five years, rent payable quarterly-yearly to the De-
partment of Docks.

4th. The ferry from the north side of Twenty-third
street, East river, as now occupied, to Greenpoint, Long

river, to Pavonia, New Jersey, for the term of one year
from May 1, 1875, subject to \$15,000 per year rent, payable

lessees will, at all times during the term of their respective
leases, well and sufficiently repair, uphold, sustain, amend,

damage to the bulkheads and piers adjoining their respec-

tinuance of the demised term the Department of Docks
shall require any of the premises connected with any ferry

desire of the Department of Docks to progress with the

lessees shall surrender up the premises and vacate the same
without any claim upon the City of New York for any
