

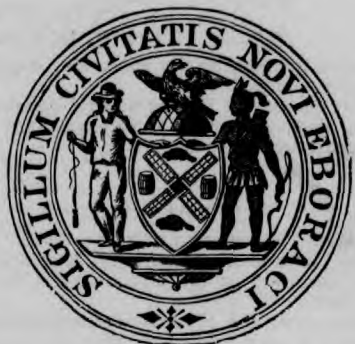

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DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks, held Friday, February 11, 1898, at 2 o'clock P. M. Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the two meetings held February 4, 1898, were approved.

Jere Pangburn, Jr., appeared on behalf of the coal dealers and requested that Pier, new 43, North river, be left open to commerce. He was informed that the matter would receive the consideration of the Board.

The communication from the Consolidated Canal and Lake Company, inclosing bill for top wharfage of 250 tons of material stored on the bulkhead foot of West Fifty-fourth street, North river, from November 4, 1897, to January 31, 1898, amounting to \$1,112.50, was referred to the Corporation Counsel for advice.

The communication from Ignatz Gross, requesting privilege of maintaining refreshment stands on the East Third Street Recreation Pier during the coming summer season, was referred to the Treasurer with power.

The communication from David McClure stating that the owners of the one hundred feet of bulkhead and the water rights next southerly of Perry street, North river, are willing to execute a contract for the purchase of same by the City in accordance with the agreement heretofore entered into, provided the matter is attended to promptly, was referred to Commissioner Meyer.

The following communications were tabled for one week :

From the Corporation Counsel—Transmitting forms of leases of certain wharf property between West Eleventh and Gansevoort streets, North river, approved as to form.

From the Finance Department—In relation to the ferry operated by the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, between Whitehall street and Communipaw.

From the Associates of the Jersey Company—Withdrawing their application of the 22d ultimo, in relation to the franchises of the ferries between Desbrosses and Cortlandt streets and Jersey City, and requesting a renewal of said franchises for a term of ten years, and for a further term of ten years immediately thereafter.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—Submitting an amendment to the plan adopted January 14, 1898, for the improvement of the water front in the vicinity of Twenty-third street, North river.

The communication from the New York and Monmouth Transportation Company, requesting a lease of Pier, new 1, North river, for a term of ten years with the privilege of renewal for a further term of ten years at an annual rental of \$35,100, was tabled for one week, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to submit a statement as to the cost of making necessary repairs to said pier.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board :

George Morton, to land the steamers "Peekskill" and "Fannie Woodall" at the outer end of Pier, old 42, North river, compensation to be fixed by the Treasurer.

Benjamin Griggs, to berth the steamer "William V. Wilson" at the south side of Pier, old 58, North river, compensation to be fixed by the Treasurer.

Union Ice Company, to use and occupy the bulkhead between Piers, new 54 and 55, North river, and to maintain ice bridge, etc., thereon, compensation to be paid thereafter at the rate of \$1,500 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, commencing May 1, 1898, the date of the expiration of the present lease to said company.

Joseph May, to maintain float at the north side of pier at West Thirty-fifth street, and to land naphtha or steam launches at the man-of-war landing foot of West Forty-second street, compensation for said privileges to be fixed by the Treasurer.

J. A. Hollister, to use and occupy during the pleasure of the Board the bulkhead extending from the northerly side of One Hundred and Fifteenth street to the centre line of the block between One Hundred and Fourteenth and One Hundred and Fifteenth streets, Harlem river, with privilege of maintaining derrick thereon, provided said permit does not interfere with the landing of the Department of Charities; compensation to be fixed by the Treasurer.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief :

New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, to dredge to a depth of 12 feet at mean low water in the slips on both sides of the coal dock at Port Morris.

New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, to drive 12 piles at the outboard end of its pier 600 feet south of Cabot street, Borough of The Bronx, and also a cluster of eight mooring piles about 175 feet south of said pier.

Arbuckle Brothers, to dredge in the slips foot of Adams and Jay streets, Borough of Brooklyn, it being understood that the granting of this permit shall not in any way prejudice any rights The City of New York may have in said premises.

The following permits were granted on the usual terms :

Lowell M. Palmer, to make general repairs to the docks between North Fourth and North Tenth streets, and between Freeman and Pink streets, Borough of Brooklyn, during the ensuing six months.

Merritt & Chapman Derrick and Wrecking Company, to land reel of wire on the bulkhead foot of Eighteenth street, North river.

The following communications were ordered on file :

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Advising that application for a lease of the offices occupied by the Engineer of the Wallabout Improvement at Wallabout Market, Borough of Brooklyn, should be presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and if granted by said Commissioners, the lease should be executed by the Comptroller.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to request the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to consent to the leasing of said offices.

2d. Requesting copy of the water grant to William R. Peters, referred to in Senate Bill No. 28.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to request the Secretary of State to furnish this Department with copy of said grant.

From the Police Department—Reporting repairs required to backing log on Pier 55, East river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair.

From the Department of Highways—In relation to the condition of pavement at the entrance to Pier, new 1, North river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to raise said pavement to conform with the grade of the deck of the pier.

From the Secretary of State—Transmitting notice of application of David W. Fenton for grant of lands under water of the East river at Long Island City; and notice of application of Patrick J. Mara for grant of lands under water at Flushing Bay, College Point, Borough of Queens.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to state that this Board has no objections to the granting of said applications, provided the usual covenants as prepared by the Corporation Counsel are inserted in the grants.

From Hon. George C. Austin—Inclosing copy of petition in relation to the release to William R. Peters of the claim to the title to certain lands referred to in Senate Bill No. 28.

From the Long Island Railroad Company—In relation to lease to be executed for the franchise of the ferry between Pine street, East river, and Long Island City. Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to prepare the proper form of lease.

From Shipman, Larocque & Choate—In relation to the removal of the frame buildings, etc., at the foot of Houston street, East river, in front of the premises occupied by the Nassau Ferry Company. Secretary directed to notify the Commissioner of Highways that the Board has no objections to the structures remaining there until May 1, 1898, provided the Nassau Ferry Company file an agreement to remove the same on or before that date.

From the Society for the Reformation of Juvenile Delinquent in The City of New York—Reporting repairs required to float foot of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, Harlem river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair.

From the Terminal Warehouse Company—In relation to the condition of the approaches to Piers, new 57, 58 and 59, North river; with report of the Engineer-in-Chief thereon, recommending that the new made land be paved in front of said piers, between the westerly line of Thirteenth avenue and the easterly line of the pavement already laid along the bulkhead-wall thereat.

On motion, the report of the Engineer-in-Chief was approved, and the Treasurer authorized to order said paving to be done under Treasurer's Order.

From J. B. & J. M. Cornell—Surrendering the premises heretofore used by them between Twenty-sixth and Twenty-seventh streets, North river.

On motion, the permit granted J. B. & J. M. Cornell to use and occupy said premises was revoked, to take effect February 15, 1898.

From Hugh Doherty—Requesting permission to place an ice bridge on Pier 37, East river, together with the report of the Dock Superintendent recommending that the application be denied owing to the crowded condition of the traffic at said pier. Application denied.

From Charles S. Hirsch & Company—Requesting an extension of time for the completion of the delivery of yellow pine timber under Contract No. 607.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted :

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the delivery of yellow pine timber under Contract No. 607, Charles S. Hirsch & Company, contractors, be and hereby is extended for a period of forty days, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract is filed in this Department.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Recommending that the action of the Board of February 4, 1898, granting permits to the Consolidated Ice Company to use and occupy certain wharf property be reconsidered, and submitting resolution providing for a lease of the following described property to said company for a term of ten years.

On motion, the recommendation of the Treasurer was approved, and the following resolution adopted :

Resolved, That by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board, and in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let to the Consolidated Ice Company for a term of ten years from March 1, 1898, all and singular, the wharfage which may arise, accrue and become due in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, for the use and occupancy of the following wharf property, to wit :

Bulkhead between Piers, new 24 and 25, North river, Borough of Manhattan, rental to be paid therefor at the rate of \$1,500 per annum.

Pier at the foot of West Forty-sixth street, Borough of Manhattan, rental to be paid therefor at the rate of \$2,500 per annum.

Pier at the foot of East Thirty-third street, Borough of Manhattan, rental to be paid therefor at the rate of \$1,800 per annum.

Pier at the foot of East Ninety-first street, Borough of Manhattan, with reservation for berth for public bath during the summer season, rental to be paid therefor at the rate of \$1,500 per annum.

Pier 2, Wallabout Basin, Borough of Brooklyn, rental to be paid therefor at the rate of \$2,500 per annum, with reservation for hay barges, if required.

All rentals to be paid quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, commencing March 1, 1898. The lessees shall have the privilege of erecting and maintaining on said wharf property, ice bridges, scales and tally-house; said structures to be erected under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

The above resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the Consolidated Ice Company shall, within five days after receipt thereof, file in this Department their written acceptance of the terms and conditions of the above resolution, and agree to execute leases when called upon to do so, containing the usual covenants and conditions embodied in leases of wharf property now used by this Department.

2d. Recommending that permission be granted M. Kane & Son to unload sand at the bulkhead between Piers, old 41 and 42, North river, during the pleasure of the Board; compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$350 per annum, payable monthly in advance to the Treasurer, commencing February 15, 1898. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that permission be granted Murray & Reid to use and occupy during the pleasure of the Board, the land under the jurisdiction of this Department, between One Hundred and First and One Hundred and Second streets, Harlem river, about 80 by 100 feet; compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$50 per month, payable monthly in advance to the Treasurer, commencing February 15, 1898. Recommendation adopted.

4th. In relation to the proposition of Robert M. Ferris, Agent, to use and occupy Pier 19, East river.

On motion, permission was granted Robert M. Ferris, Agent, to repair Pier 19, East river, and the following resolution adopted :

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted Robert M. Ferris, Agent, to use and occupy during the pleasure of the Board, the southerly half of Pier 19, East river; compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of two thousand dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, commencing February 15, 1898, it being understood that said Robert M. Ferris, Agent, is to put the pier in good order at an expenditure of between three thousand and our thousand dollars; and it being further understood that should the time of occupancy be extended after a period of one year, at the expiration of that time the matter of compensation for the use of said pier be again submitted to the Treasurer for adjustment.

From the Dock Superintendent—

1st. Report for the week ending February 5, 1898.

2d. Recommending that the permit granted J. E. Nagle, April 8, 1897, to maintain boat-house and runway between Lexington and Fourth avenues, Harlem river, be revoked, to take effect July 1, 1897. Recommendation adopted.

From Dock Master Fleming—Reporting dredging required in slip on south side of Pier 48, East river.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to order dredging thereat to a depth of 25 feet at mean low water, under Contract No. 562.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Report for the week ending February 5, 1898.

2d. Recommending that the Corporation Counsel and the Comptroller be requested to advise this Board when the proper papers shall have been executed in relation to the title to premises between Ninety-eighth and Ninety-ninth streets, East river. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that the plans submitted by the Erie Railroad Company for the erection of a shed on the bulkhead between Piers, new 20 and 21, North river, in accordance with the resolution adopted January 14, 1898, be approved as amended in red. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Recommending that an order be issued directing him to proceed with the work of building new piers foot of East Twentieth and West Thirty-fourth streets.

On motion, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted :

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and is hereby directed to proceed with the construction of a new pier under the "New Plan," about sixty feet in width and about seven hundred and ninety-five feet in length, at the foot of East Twentieth street, East river, and a temporary approach thereto within the established lines for the same, and that all the work hereby ordered be performed otherwise than by contract as provided by section 821 of the new Charter, and that it be done by the force of the Department by day's work, except so much of the labor and material as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all the materials, tools, and dredging necessary therefor, and not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and is hereby directed to proceed with the removal of the pier foot of West Thirty-fourth street, North river, and with the construction of a new pier under the "New Plan," about one hundred feet in width and about seven hundred

feet in length, at the foot of said West Thirty-fourth street, within the established lines for the same, and that all the work hereby ordered be performed otherwise than by contract, as provided by section 821 of the new Charter, and that it be done by the force of the Department by day's work, except so much of the labor and material as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all the materials, tools and dredging necessary therefor, and not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

5th. Recommending that an order be issued directing him to keep the pavement between Pier A and West Eleventh street, North river, in good repair and condition at an aggregate cost not to exceed \$900. Recommendation adopted.

6th. Recommending that dredging be ordered in the slip between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets, and the half slip north of Pier foot of One Hundred and Thirty-second street, North river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order said dredging under Contract No. 601.

7th. Reporting damage to the Pier foot of East Thirty-third street by the ferryboat "Sag Harbor," and recommending that said damage be repaired by the force of this Department and the cost thereof collected from the Long Island Railroad Company. Recommendation adopted.

8th. Recommending that repairs be ordered made to Pier 55, East river; Pier foot of East Thirty-third street, and bulkhead foot of East Forty-second street. Recommendation adopted.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Murphy, submitted his report of receipts for the week ending February 10, 1898, amounting to \$67,327.49, which was received and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:
Resolved, That the compensation of James Van Houten, Scowman, be and is hereby fixed at the rate of eighteen dollars per week, commencing February 12, 1898, subject to Civil Service regulations.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—Reporting the need of the services of additional Dock Builders, and recommending that same be appointed.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the following-named persons, having been duly certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as eligible for such position, be and are hereby appointed Dock Builders in this Department, with compensation at the rate of thirty cents per hour while employed: Michael Lynch, James McCarthy, James Oakley, Peter Petersen, Michael Rodgers, George Sparks, Oscar Tompkins, John O. Hill and Thomas F. Lynch.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to request the Municipal Civil Service Commission to submit a list of persons eligible for appointment as Laborers to fill two vacancies.

On motion of the Treasurer, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That Michael Clark, Laborer, having served the City with credit to himself for a period of over three years in the Department, be and hereby is promoted to the position of Boatman, said position being in the direct line of his duty, with compensation at the rate of fifteen dollars per week, to take effect this date, subject to Civil Service regulations.

Resolved, That the position of Superintendent of Repairs be and hereby is abolished from and after this date, and accordingly that Edward E. McCarty be and hereby is discharged from the service of this Department.

Resolved, That the salaries of the following-named employees be reduced, as hereinafter stated, to take effect this day:
