

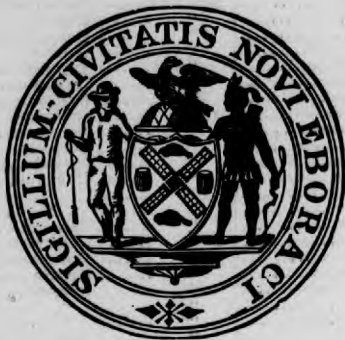

### DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS.

#### BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

IN BOARD OF EXAMINERS, JANUARY 10, 1899.

The Board of Examiners met this day at 3.20 P. M.

Present—Thomas J. Brady, Commissioner of Buildings for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, in the chair, and Messrs. Dobbs, Conover, Bonner, Post, Fryer, O'Reilly, Moore and McMillan.

The minutes of January 3, 1899, were read and, on motion, approved.

Petitions were then submitted for approval, as follows:

Plan 505A, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the Duffy plaster board (plastered) to be used on cellar ceilings, in place of metal lath, as stated in petition; southeast corner of One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street and German place. Petitioner, John DeHart. Denied.

Plan 825A, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the Duffy plaster board (plastered) to be used on cellar ceilings, in place of metal lath, as stated in petition; east side of Wilkin's place, 206.6 feet north of Jennings street. Petitioner, A. Lahr, Jr. Approved.

Plan 979, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the Bailey system of fireproof floor filling to be used with 6 inches of concrete, in place of brick arches, lower flanges of steel beams on first story to be covered underneath with wire lath, as stated in petition. Nos. 302 and 304 West Eightieth street. Petitioners, James & Leo. Approved. Mr. Fryer voting no.

Plan 1011, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the entrance hall partitions to be constructed of 4-inch angles, channels or T's, securely braced and fastened, placed 30 inches apart, and filled in solid with 4-inch burnt clay blocks, hard burnt brick or terra cotta blocks, ceilings to be constructed of 2-inch channels or T's, spaced 2 feet apart, and filled in with 2-inch burnt clay blocks, or 2-inch terra cotta blocks, as stated in petition; Nos. 621 to 629 East Ninth street. Petitioners, Schneider and Herter. Approved.

Plan 1012, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the entrance hall partitions to be built of 4-inch angles, channels or T's, placed 30 inches apart, securely braced and fastened, and filled in solid with 4-inch burnt clay blocks, hard burnt brick or terra cotta blocks; ceilings to be constructed of 2-inch channels or T's, spaced 2 feet apart and filled in with 2-inch burnt clay blocks or 2-inch terra cotta blocks, as stated in petition; No. 27 East Third street. Petitioners, Schneider and Herter. Approved.

Plan 1013, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the entrance hall partitions to be constructed of 4-inch angles, channels or T's, placed 30 inches apart, securely braced and fastened, and filled in solid with 4-inch burnt clay blocks, hard burnt brick or terra cotta blocks; ceilings to be constructed of 2-inch channels or T's, spaced 2 feet apart, and filled in with 2-inch burnt clay blocks or 2-inch terra cotta blocks, as stated in petition; Nos. 633 to 637 East Eleventh street. Petitioners, Schneider and Herter. Approved.

Plan 1017, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the main entrance hall partitions up to staircase to be constructed of 4-inch T's, angles or channels, placed not more than 30 inches apart, centres, well braced and filled in between solid with 4-inch brickwork or 4-inch thick porous terra cotta blocks, or 4-inch thick burnt-clay blocks well set in cement and plastered both sides; ceiling of same to be constructed of 2-inch T's, angles or channels placed not more than 24 inches from centres and filled in between solid with 2-inch porous terra cotta blocks well set in cement and plastered underneath, as stated in petition; No. 126 Elizabeth street. Petitioners, Kurtzer & Rohl. Approved.

Plan 1022, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow columns and girders to be erected in rear portion of cellar where span exceeds 18 feet in place of erecting an interior 8-inch brick partition wall; also to allow the stairs leading to cellar to be located under the main staircase, as shown on plans and as stated in petition; west side of Central Park, West, 25 feet north of Ninety-eighth street. Petitioner, George Fred. Pelham. Approved as to use of columns and girders, Messrs. Bonner and Post voting no. Approved as to location of cellar stairs, Mr. Bonner voting no.

Plan 1649, Alteration to Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the erection of an extension on rear of a two-story and attic frame house, extension to inclose the present piazza and extend 6 feet beyond in the shape of a bay-window, as shown on plans and as stated in petition; north side of One Hundred and Fifty-second street, 175 feet west of Boulevard. Petitioner, Richard R. Davis. Approved, on condition that the studs are filled in with 4-inch fireproof blocks, or brick properly laid.

Mr. McMillan here entered.

Plan 1006, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow a reconsideration of decision of Board of Examiners at meeting held December 27, 1898, so as to permit the erection of a storage building on the full size of grounds, occupying 87.5 feet on Sheriff street and 100 feet deep, as stated in petition; No. 27, 29, 31 and 33 Sheriff street. Petitioners, R. Hoe & Co. Reconsidered and approved.

Plan 1023, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow partitions enclosing first story hallway to be constructed of 4-inch angle and tee irons, spaced 30 inches apart, and to be filled in between with 4-inch terra cotta blocks, plastered on both sides; ceiling to be constructed of 2-inch tee irons, spaced 24 inches apart, and filled in with 2-inch terra cotta blocks plastered on underside, as stated in petition; Nos. 133 and 135 Broome street. Petitioner, Geo. Fred. Pelham. Approved.

Plan 1540, Alterations to Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow steel beams combined with the Fawcett ventilated fireproof floor construction, to be used in the mezzanine floor over main entrance on William street, space to be filled in being about 9 feet by 13 feet 6 inches, as stated in petition; southeast corner of William and Cedar streets. Petitioners, Lamb and Rich. Approved.

Fireproof Shutters—Petition for exemption from fireproof shutters on the westerly wall of the first, second, third, fourth and fifth stories, and substitute in place of fireproof shutters, wireglass construction, as stated in petition; Nos. 549 to 559 West One Hundred and Thirty-second street. Petitioners James E. Ware & Son. Approved, on condition that solid wireglass is used.

Petition for exemption from fireproof shutters on all the windows of buildings for reasons as stated in petition; Nos. 90, 92, 94 and 96 Clinton street. Petitioner, John Kroder. Referred to Mr. Fryer for examination and report.

Petition of Wm. H. Brodie & Co. for permission to apply Kinnear's steel rolling shutters to buildings Nos. 85 to 89 Liberty street. Laid over until next meeting.

## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Tuesday, January 10, 1899, at 11 o'clock A. M.

Present—Commissioners Ryan (President), Ten Eyck, Power and Windolph. The minutes of meetings of January 3 and 4, 1899, were approved. Commissioner Ten Eyck, as Chairman of the Committee of Finance and Audit, reported the examination and audit of estimates contained in Vouchers Nos. 12,660 to 12,662, inclusive, amounting to \$102,969.06.

The following communication of the Chief Engineer was referred to the Board by the Construction or Executive Committee:

REPORT No. 44.

NEW YORK, January 9, 1899.

To the Honorable the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—In confirmation of my verbal statement to yourselves I would report to you that I have given to the Division Engineers some modified orders in regard to the renting of the property held by the city in the New Croton Reservoir.

You know that it is desirable to begin this year the preparation of the Reservoir by allowing the contractor to cut all trees, bushes, remove buildings, and generally clear all the grounds. Such being the case, I have directed that no agreement be made which would not permit the city to take possession of buildings, now rented, at short notice.

Moreover, wherever farms are now being let, it would be well not to enter into any agreement after April 1, inasmuch as the renting of farms would be equivalent to a permission for cultivating the grounds during the proper season. The tenants of such farms claim also, with some justice, that after they have not had the use of the farm grounds their rent should be diminished by about one-half, which, I think, should be granted.

I think that all buildings in the lower part of the Reservoir, from Katonah to the dam, should be removed without any more waiting, but, in the upper part, at Croton Falls and Purdy's Station, which are above any possible elevation that the water in the Reservoir may reach for a few years, I believe that a number of people might be left in possession of the houses that they now occupy. This would be so much more desirable as it has always been the policy of the Aqueduct Commissioners not to cause any unnecessary hardship.

Such houses as I have mentioned, of which there are a little more than fifty (50), could be rented as usual.

This is to ask you to give me such directions as you may think proper, or if you are so disposed, to approve of such recommendations as I have made and such action as I have already taken.
