Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board on December 27, 1900 (see Minutes, page 1285), approving of the institution of condemnation proceedings by the Corporation Counsel, for the acquisition of a site for a public hospital on Lenox avenue, is hereby rescinded; and

Resolved, That, pursuant to the resolution adopted by the Commissioners of Public Charities, under date of March 14, 1901, under the provisions of chapter 723 of the Laws of 1897, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves, by the concurrent vote of all its members, of the institution, by the Corporation Counsel, of proceedings to acquire title for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, to the following described property, as a site for a public hospital:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the easterly side of Lenox avenue with the southerly side of One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, and running thence easterly along the southerly side of One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street 310 feet; thence southerly and parallel with Lenox avenue 199 feet 10 inches to the northerly side of One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street; thence westerly along the northerly side of One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street 210 feet to the easterly side of Lenox avenue, and thence northerly along the easterly side of Lenox avenue 199 feet 10 inches to the point or place of beginning.

This requisition is made pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Rapid Transit Board, by the concurrent vote of four members thereof at a regular meeting held on the 2d day of May, 1901.

GENTLEMEN—I beg to invite the attention of your Honorable Board to a communication, of which the inclosed is a copy, sent you under date of January 22 last, submitting plans showing proposed improvement of two parks in the Borough of Richmond, and requesting a bond issue, under the provisions of the Charter, to enable this Department to carry out the work. As no action has been taken in this matter, so far as I am informed, I am constrained by repeated and urgent requests on the part of residents and taxpayers of Stapleton and Port Richmond, in the Borough of Richmond, to renew this application and request your favorable consideration of the matter. These are the only parks in the borough. They are in a state of dilapidation and a source of complaint from the citizens of the two localities, who feel that something should be done to improve these parks, which in their present shape are an eyesore and discreditable to the City.

SIR—Hon. George C. Clausen, Park Commissioner, boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, in a communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of January 22, 1901, states as follows:

"Herewith I beg to submit plans showing proposed improvement of two parks in the Borough of Richmond, namely Washington Park, in the town of Stapleton, and the small park in Port Richmond. In their present condition these parks are very unsatisfactory. They are without proper walks and wholly unprotected. There is a considerable number of trees in both parks, all of which have been incorporated in the designs. The lawns and shrubberies, however, are in a very poor condition and will have to be renewed and rearranged.

"I inclose separate estimates of the cost of the construction of these parks, the former amounting to \$21,263.50, and the park at Port Richmond, \$20,332.26, and respectfully request that your Honorable Board will authorize a bond issue, under the provisions of the Charter, to meet the cost of the proposed improvements."

SIR—Mr. James H. Haslin, Deputy and Acting Commissioner of Water Supply, in communication of April 18, 1901, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, says:

"I have the honor to request that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will authorize the following bond issues, which are required for necessary works and expenditures for the maintenance and improvement of the water supply for the Borough of Brooklyn.

"In pursuance of section 178 of the Charter, and chapter 583, Laws of 1888, title XV.:

"For land in Thirty-second Ward, Borough of Brooklyn.....	\$200,000 00
"For wells, buildings, pumping stations, pumps, boilers, etc.....	120,000 00

"The Engineer in Charge of the Borough of Brooklyn, in his report to the Deputy Commissioner of Water Supply for the Borough of Brooklyn, recommending the condemning of land in the Thirty-second Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, known as the Cornelius B. Kouwenhoven Farm, states that this farm plot has been tested in past years by this Department, with a view to the establishment of a driven well station, and the indications are favorable. He believes that a daily supply of from 3,000,000 to 4,000,000 gallons of water might probably be obtained therefrom. In establishing a driven well station at this point the City would be less liable for damage suits than at almost any other site tested by the Engineers of this Department, owing to the location of the land and to the agreements with neighboring owners protecting the present owner against suits, which have been secured by him."

"As this recommendation has the approval of the Deputy Commissioner of Water Supply of the Borough of Brooklyn, the Engineer in Charge and the Chief Engineer of the Department, I would respectfully request early action by your Board."

It is, undoubtedly, very important to obtain all the water possible for the supply of the Borough of Brooklyn, and this particular tract of land is considered by the Engineers, after testing its capacity, to give a promise, by wells and appurtenances erected on it, of a yield of from 3,000,000 to 4,000,000 gallons daily supply. It is intended, as I learn from the Chief Engineer, Mr. George W. Birdsall, to use the supply from wells, to be sunk on this property as an adjunct to the supply from the Flatbush Water Works, when those works shall have been acquired by the City, proceedings for which are now in progress.

The sum asked for, \$200,000, is not an amount agreed upon for the purchase, but a probable amount, the exact figures to be fixed hereafter by condemnation proceedings. The amount asked for "for wells, buildings, pumping stations, pumps, etc.," is the estimated probable cost thereof.

I am of the opinion that the issue of bonds as requested may properly receive the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Hon. WILLIAM DALTON, Commissioner of Water Supply:

SIR—Under date of December 3, 1900, you transmitted to me copies of a certain map stated to have been duly approved by the Board of Public Improvements, signed by yourself as the Commissioner of Water Supply, and asking that legal proceedings be instituted for the appointment of Commissioners of Appraisal for the purpose of acquiring lands for the improvement of the water supply in the Borough of Brooklyn.

I have not complied with your request for the reason that before doing so it is necessary that the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be first obtained, and if that has not been done it will be necessary for you to secure their approval, requesting that they ask me to commence condemnation proceedings.

In examining the maps which you transmitted to me I find that they have not been approved by the President of the Board of Public Improvements and yourself as the Commissioner of Water Supply, so I return them to you for the purpose of obtaining such approval.

The necessary steps then to be taken are:

First, a resolution by the Board of Public Improvements, approving the maps, and that the property be taken by condemnation for the purpose of adding to the water supply of the Borough of Brooklyn.

Second, that copies accurately describing the property to be taken in the proceeding be transmitted.

Third, the taxable values of the property to be taken.

When this information is obtained, and the maps and the description, the resolutions of approval by the Board of Public Improvements and the taxable values of the property should be transmitted in a letter by you to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, asking that the Corporation Counsel be requested to institute condemnation proceedings for the purpose of acquiring the land. If the resolution is approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment it will come to me, and I will then have the authority to institute the proceedings requested in your letter.

SIR—James H. Haslin, Deputy and Acting Commissioner of Water Supply, in a communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of May 6, 1901, states as follows:

"I have the honor to transmit herewith for approval by your Board, a map showing lands in The City of New York, in the Borough of Queens and in the Town of Hempstead, County of Nassau, to be acquired for the purpose of maintaining, preserving and increasing the supply of pure and wholesome water for the use of The City of New York, Borough of Brooklyn, the lands in question being contiguous to the 48-inch pipe conduit for the Brooklyn water service, now in course of construction, from Millburn Pumping Station, in the Town of Hempstead, to Spring Creek, within the boundaries of the Borough of Brooklyn.

"I also inclose a copy of the preamble and resolution adopted by the Board of Public Improvements at meeting of October 31, 1900, approving said map, and a copy of a communication received from the Corporation Counsel under date of March 25, 1901, as to the procedure to be taken before requesting him to institute proceedings for the acquisition of the lands, which procedure includes the approval of the map by your Board. Attached to the map will also be found a tabular statement of the assessed valuations of each parcel of land to be taken, with the names of the owners, the names of owners on the assessment roll, and description of the property.

"The early and favorable action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in this matter is desired."

The land shown on the map submitted shows thirty-three (33) separate parcels lying contiguous to the line of the conduit lands, the title to which it is necessary to acquire for the laying of additional pipes and for pipes already laid on private property.

Most, if not all, of this property was within the lines of the conduit, as originally laid out by the former City of Brooklyn, and for some of the parcels, contracts for the purchase were made by the former Commissioner of City Works of the said city. These contracts were not carried out in some instances, I am informed, by the failure of the owners to give good title, and in other cases for lack of sufficient money.

The property is assessed, as shown in the statement accompanying the map, in the sum of \$28,715.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of January 18, 1901 (Minutes, page 53), authorized a bond issue under the provisions of section 11 of title XV. of chapter 583 of the Laws of 1888, and section 170 of the Greater New York Charter,

Sir—William H. Kipp, Chief Clerk, Police Department, in communication dated May 8, 1901, transmits the following request of the Police Commissioner:

"That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be respectfully requested to authorize the Comptroller, subject to concurrence by the Municipal Assembly, to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York in the amount of \$25,000—the proceeds whereof shall be applied to installing a police signal system for the Police Department of The City of New York in the Nineteenth Precinct."

In reply I would report that it is the desire of the Police Commissioner to install a modern police signal system in the Nineteenth Precinct.

In the Borough of Manhattan there is no police signal system; in the suburban portions of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, Borough of the Bronx, there are about thirty (30) signal boxes, which have been in operation for the past twenty years; they are crude and do not answer the requirements of the service at the present time. Of the thirty-one precincts in the Borough of Brooklyn, seventeen precincts have a signal and telephone system; the others, boroughs of Queens and Richmond, have nothing of this kind.

The proposed signal system consists of the erection of a station, or signal box, in each of the posts of the Nineteenth Precinct, and connecting the same with the station-house. By means of signals and telephones, the officer in command at the station-house and the patrolman on post will have direct communication with each other.

Under the present system an officer, when he makes an arrest, has to take his prisoner to the station-house, and in the meantime his post is without police protection; with a signal system, he can call for assistance, ambulance, etc., and still be on his post.

The installation of such a system will make the police force more efficient, and I think it would be well to try it in one precinct first, in order to determine the practicability of the system installed, so that in the future, if other precincts are to have a signal system, the city may profit by any defects that may be developed in the working of the system put in, this the Nineteenth Precinct.

The estimate, \$25,000, for establishing a signal system in the Nineteenth Precinct is based upon an estimate of cost of installing a standard system.

If the Board of Estimate and Apportionment can, pursuant to any section of the Greater New York Charter, authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$25,000, for the installation of a police signal system for the Police Department of The City of New York in the Nineteenth Precinct, I would advise that same be allowed, for I am heartily in favor of a signal system for the Police Department.

In the Departmental Estimate for 1888 the Police Department asked for \$250,000 for a police signal system, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriated \$100,000; of this amount \$66,666.66 was paid to the Police Department, but was never used for the purpose designated.

On October 16, 1888, at the request of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, this money, \$66,666.66, was returned to the Comptroller and deposited in the City Treasury, and by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on December 30, 1893, the total amount \$100,000, was transferred to the general fund, and made applicable to reduction of taxes for 1894.

The Commissioner does not mention any section of the Charter under which such a bond issue can properly be authorized. It appears to me that the improvement is altogether maintenance and repair work, whereas section 48 of the Charter, the only section under which the issue could be authorized, only provides for construction work.

The application of the Commissioner is entirely too vague. For the expenditure of so large an amount as \$15,000, plans, specifications and estimates should be submitted, in order that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may form a definite idea of what is to be done.

I think it is of extremely doubtful propriety to fit up this large eight-story brick hotel building, for the purpose of providing "restaurant or hotel accommodations" to the pleasure traffic over the Boulevard Lafayette; certainly, at this time, when there is so great a demand for funds for more important purposes.

**MUNICIPAL ASSEMBLY.****PUBLIC NOTICE.**

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO THE WEST TENTH STREET CONNECTING RAILWAY COMPANY THE RIGHT OR FRANCHISE TO CONSTRUCT AND OPERATE A STREET SURFACE RAILROAD IN, UPON AND ALONG CERTAIN STREETS, AVENUES, PARKWAYS AND HIGHWAYS IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Be It Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

WHEREAS, THE WEST TENTH STREET Connecting Railway Company has duly presented to the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, by presenting and filing with each house thereof, its application, in writing, for a grant of the franchise or right to use the streets, avenues, parkways and highways in The City of New York hereinafter mentioned, for the construction, maintenance and operation of a single-track street surface railroad in or upon the surface of the same; and

Whereas, The said Municipal Assembly, by resolution adopted March 20, 1900, approved by his Honor the Mayor of said city on March 28, 1900, gave public notice of such application, and that at the Councilmanic Chamber, in the City Hall, in The City of New York, on the 10th day of April, 1900, at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon, such application of said railway company would be first considered and a public hearing had thereon, which notice was published daily for at least fifteen (15) days successively prior to the hearing, in two daily papers published in The City of New York, viz., in the "New York Press" and in the "New York Journal and Advertiser," which papers were first designated, in writing, by his Honor the Mayor of said city, on March 28, 1900; and

Whereas, After public notice given as aforesaid and at a public hearing duly held in pursuance of such notice, whereas all persons so desiring were given an opportunity to be heard and were heard, such application was first considered by the Railroad Committee of both houses of said Municipal Assembly;

Section 1. The Municipal Assembly of The City of New York hereby grants to the West Tenth Street Connecting Railway Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and franchise to use the streets, avenues, parkways and highways of the said city, and to construct, maintain and operate a single-track street surface railroad in and upon the following streets, avenues, parkways and highways, viz.: Commencing at the intersection of Sixth avenue and West Tenth street, in The City of New York, running southwesterly with single track through, upon and along West Tenth street to the intersection of said West Tenth street with Greenwich avenue, all in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York.

Sec. 2. The grant of said franchise or right to use said streets, avenues, parkways and highways is made subject to the following conditions:

First.—That the said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate its said railway shall be held and enjoyed by said railway company, its leasees or successors, for the term of twenty-five years with the privilege of a renewal of said grant for the further period of twenty-five years upon a fair revaluation of the right, such revaluation to be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railroad by itself, and not to include any value derived from the ownership, control or operation of any other railroad, line or tracks by the grantee, its successors or assigns; provided, however, that the consent of the owners of one-half in value of the property bounded on each street, avenue, parkway and highway shall be first obtained, or in lieu thereof the favorable determination of three Commissioners, approved by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, that such railroad should be constructed and operated.

Second.—Upon the termination of the said franchise or right, whether original or renewed, there shall be a fair valuation of the plant and property of the grantee in the streets, avenues, parkways and highways aforesaid, with its appurtenances; and the said plant and property shall be and become the property of the City on the termination of the grant on paying the grantee such valuation. Such payment shall be at a fair valuation of the said plant and property as property, excluding any value derived from the franchise.

Third.—The mode of determining the valuations and revaluations herein provided for shall be as follows: One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railroad company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder; the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the valuations and revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least sixty days prior to the expiration of the grant, or of the renewal thereof, and their reports shall be filed with the Controller of the City not more than thirty days thereafter. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators; they may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigation without the presence of either party; they shall have the right to examine the books of the railroad company. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties.

Fourth.—The said West Tenth Street Connecting Railway Company shall, for and during the first five years after the commencement of the operation of any portion of its railroad, annually, on November 1, pay into the treasury of the City, to the credit of the Sinking Fund thereof, three per cent. of its gross receipts for and during the year ending September 30 next preceding; and after the expiration of such five years make a like annual payment into the treasury of the City, to the credit of the same fund, of five per cent. of its gross receipts, as required by section 95 of the Railroad Law, but such percentage of gross receipts shall not be less than one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150) annually for the first five years and not less than three hundred dollars (\$300) annually thereafter.

That but one fare shall be exacted for passage over the railroad constructed under this grant and over the lines of any railroad system or systems operated in connection therewith, and that the gross receipts from joint tickets shall be divided in the proportion that the length of said railroad operated hereunder shall bear to the entire length of the railroad system or systems which shall be operated in connection therewith, and of the railroad to be constructed hereunder.

Wherever and whenever this connecting railway shall make it possible for the cars of a non-percentage paying line to operate upon the tracks of a percentage paying line, the former line shall keep a separate and accurate account of all fares collected from passengers who enter said cars upon the non-percentage lines, and account to the City for them the same as if they had been collected on the percentage line, and to pay the same percentage thereon as is now provided by law to be paid by the company upon whose route they operate.

Fifth.—The said railroad may be operated by under-

ground electrical power substantially similar to the system of underground electrical traction now in use on the railroads in Second, Sixth, Eighth, Lenox and Madison avenues in this city, and by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power, which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners and consented to by the owners of property, in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law.

Sixth.—The said railroad shall be constructed and maintained subject to the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Highways and the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies of The City of New York, in all matters with respect to which said Commissioners are respectively invested with the power of regulation and control by the Charter of said city; and the consent of the City, as owner of property bounded on West Tenth street and on Christopher street, is hereby given to the operation of the railroads now or hereafter constructed on said streets by the forms of motive power provided in section fifth.

Sec. 3. The said grant is also upon the further conditions, namely:

First.—The said railroad shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction, and the railroad and property of said company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the full term of this grant.

Second.—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railroad shall be five cents; and said company shall not charge any passenger more than said sum for one continuous ride from any point on its road, or any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control, to any point thereon or any connecting branch thereof within the limits of The City of New York. The cars on said railroad shall be run as often as the public convenience may require.

Third.—The said railroad company shall apply to each car a proper fender and wheel-guard conformably to such laws and ordinances as may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Fourth.—All cars of said railroad company shall be heated during cold weather, conformably to such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and each car shall be well lighted either by the Pintsch gas system, or by electricity, or by some system of lighting equally efficient.

Fifth.—In case of any violation or breach of or failure to comply with any of the provisions of this section, this grant may be forfeited by suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the said railroad company.

Sec. 4. This grant is also upon the further and expressed condition that the provisions of article IV. of the Railroad Law applicable thereto be complied with.

Sec. 5. The said company shall at all times keep the street between its tracks and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails upon either side thereof free and clear from ice and snow.

Sec. 6. The said railroad company, so long as it shall continue to use any of its tracks upon said streets, avenues or public places, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of such streets, avenues and public places between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe.

Sec. 7. This grant shall not become operative unless, within ten days after the approval thereof by the Mayor of said City, or the final passage thereof succeeding the return with the disapproval thereof, or subsequent to the taking effect of said grant by reason of the failure of said officer to return the same with his disapproval, the said railroad company shall duly execute under its corporate seal an instrument in writing, wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to pay the compensation and to conform to, abide by and perform all the conditions and requirements in this ordinance fixed and contained, and within the said period file the said instrument in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York.

The Comptroller presented the following report and accompanying resolution relative to the redemption of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, maturing July 1, 1901:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

ORIGINALLY—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1890, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-reduction purposes of section 20 of article VIII of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurred capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be able to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.
