Pursuant to the authority vested in me by law, I, Robert A. Van Wyck, Mayor of The City
of New York, do hereby call a Special Joint Meeting of the Council and the Board of

the Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, }
NEW YORK, October 31, 1901. }

To the General Assembly of The City of New York :

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held October 30,
1901, the following resolution was unanimously adopted :

"Resolved, That the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and hereby is
directed to transmit the Budget for the year 1902 to the Municipal Assembly within ten days, as
provided by section 226 of the Greater New York Charter."

In pursuance of said resolution, I hereby respectfully transmit the Budget for the year 1902,
as adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 30, 1901.

BUDGET FOR 1902.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter,
the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by the affirmative vote of all the members thereof,
makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and two,
being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public busi-
ness of said city for the said year, including State taxes; and, secondly, the amounts estimated to
be required to pay the charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Rich-
mond for the said year; amounting in the aggregate to the sum of ninety-seven million nine
hundred and seventy-four thousand five hundred and forty-one dollars and eighty-three cents
(\$97,974,541.83).

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be kept as to show the receipts of and disbursements from public moneys separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep an exact record, to be corrected from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."
3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioners of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn recommending that proceedings be initiated to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by placing Avenue M thereon, between Flatbush avenue and Flatlands avenue, I have to state as follows:

Avenue M is laid out westerly of Flatlands avenue and easterly of Flatbush avenue, and in order to connect both sections the avenue has to be cut through one block, as suggested by the Local Board.

In laying down the lines on the map I find, however, that it would be better to start with Avenue M at Kimball street, which will bring Avenue M nearer to a straight line than if it were laid out between Flatbush avenue and Flatlands avenue only.

An additional improvement of the westerly part of Avenue M would be if the southern line of Avenue M, west of Kimball street, were prolonged easterly, thereby cutting off the sharp corner at Flatbush avenue and Coleman street.

I submit herewith a map entitled "Map or Plan showing the locating and laying out of Avenue M, between Kimball street and Flatbush avenue, in the Thirty-second Ward, Borough of Brooklyn," which shows the above-described alterations, and recommend that the same be referred to the Local Board for approval.

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn recommending that proceedings be initiated to close Avenue V, between Ocean parkway and the westerly line of the easterly Village road, and to so change the southerly and northerly lines of said avenue so that the southerly line shall commence at a point on the westerly line of the Ocean parkway distant southerly 435 feet from the intersection of the present southerly line of Avenue V with the Ocean parkway, thence said southerly line to run in a straight line to a point on the Village road that is distant at right angles to the west line of West street 208½ feet westerly thereof and said point is also distant northerly at right angles from the southerly line of the present Avenue V 43 feet; and the northerly line of the proposed Avenue V is to be parallel with and distant northerly 60 feet from the proposed change of the southerly line of said Avenue V, in the Borough of Brooklyn, I have to state as follows:

This resolution of the Local Board of the Fifth District intends to close Avenue V, from the Ocean parkway to Gravesend Village, and to lay out in its stead the existing Gravesend Neck road, from a point in the western line of Ocean parkway about midway between Avenue V and Avenue W to Gravesend village at about the same place where Avenue V touches it.

The closing of that portion of Avenue V would shut off a direct continuation of Avenue V from the Ocean parkway to the old Village of Gravesend, which Avenue V is laid out easterly of Ocean parkway as far as Flatbush avenue; the closing would make blocks from 700 to 1,200 feet long between Avenue U and the proposed new line of Avenue V or Gravesend Neck road.

The retaining of the present line of Avenue V seems to benefit property, and certain properties have been laid out with frontage on Avenue V.

I do not see any advantage in closing up Avenue V, and recommend therefore that no action be taken in regard to closing, but will suggest that Gravesend Neck road be placed on the official map, from Ocean parkway to Avenue V, provided the Local Board of the Fifth District approves of it.

I return the papers, and submit a sketch, in order to elucidate the subject.

DEAR SIR—With letters of September 3 and 27th ultimo, from the Secretary of your Board, were transmitted to me for attention and report communications addressed to the Board by the President of the Borough of Queens, embodying resolutions of the Local Board of Improvements for that borough, calling for the laying of water-mains by the Citizens' Water Supply Company in Palmetto street, between Prospect avenue and Fresh Pond road, and by the Queens County Water Supply Company to lay mains in Forest avenue, between Bayview and Bayswater avenues.

From report which I now have from the Chief Engineer of this Department, I find that these water-mains are necessary. I therefore recommend the adoption of resolutions by your Board authorizing the issuance of permits for the same. For about 150 feet east and west of Clinton avenue the plan showed earth excavation, but it was all filled in with very large stone which required a great amount of blasting and sledgeing to remove them. DEAR SIR—In reply to your communication of September 27, 1901, transmitting copy of report of Louis A. Risse, Chief Topographical Engineer, on the proposed change of plan of the Arrietta Street Sewers, Borough of Richmond, in order that the same may correspond to the present street grade, after a thorough examination of the subject matter so referred it appears that provision is made in article 189 of the contract for such change of plans and specifications "as may be agreed upon in writing between the parties to the contract, in a manner not materially affecting the substance thereof nor increasing the price to be paid, in order to carry out and complete more fully and perfectly the work agreed to be done and performed."

Any such change therefore must be consented to by a contractor and all work done must be according to the prices agreed upon in the contract.

It appears that the original plan has been carried out on this portion of the sewer to within 210 feet of the bulkhead-line, and that foundation has been laid for 130 feet more, making the sewer constructed and partially constructed to a point 80 feet from the bulkhead-line.

There is no power under the contract to change the form of construction as suggested by Chief Engineer Risse, abandoning considerable portion of the work already done and calling for a different class of work, probably costing a greater amount of money.

The purpose can be accomplished, however, by reducing the size of the sewer from the point where it has been finished to a 5-foot circle for 150 feet from that point to the bulkhead-line, and 60 feet, using the form of sewer called for under the dock.

This will give about a foot of covering over the same on the present grades of the street.

The capacity of the 6-foot circle, called for in the contract, is largely in excess of the present needs of the district, so that the reduction to the 5-foot circle will not affect the usefulness of the sewer.

It is believed to be competent for the Board of Public Improvements to pass a resolution providing for this change under article 189 of the contract, and that same can be carried out under the present prices, being assumed that the contractor would give his consent to the same.

I return tracing referred to in the report of the Chief Topographical Engineer.
