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### BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

Report for the Quarter Ending December 31, 1904.

New York, January 1, 1905.

Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor:
Sir—The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals have the honor of presenting the following report for the three months ending December 31, 1904:

The Department as A Whole.

The position of Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals rendered vacant by the resignation of Dr. William Mabon on April 13, 1904, has not yet been filled. The Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities has been requested to permit the transfer of Dr. John J. Fitzgerald to this position from his present one of Superintendent of the Kings County Hospital, but has not yet replied. In the meantime Mr. Michael J. Rickard, the Assistant Superintendent, has been Acting Superintendent, and because of his increased duties, owing to the absence of a Superintendent and to the growth of the hospital service, the Board of Estimate has been requested to increase his salary from \$2,000 to \$3,500 per annum. He has also been authorized to employ some one temporarily as an assistant. some one temporarily as an assistant.

New Positions.

Owing to the amount of building in progress on the new hospitals, all needing constant supervision, the position of General Inspector of Construction has been created at a salary of \$2,000 per annum. This has been approved by the City authorities, and public notice has been given of an open competitive examination to be held on January 5, 1905. Dr. Charles Norris, who was appointed Director of the Pathological Laboratories on July 27, entered upon the duties of his position on October 1.

Previous to this quarter the physicians in charge of the Psychopathic Wards at Bellevue Hospital were entitled Resident and Assistant Resident Physicians. But as they are solely occupied with "the reception, medical examination, and temporary care of persons alleged to be insane," the titles of Resident Alienist and Assistant Resident Alienist seem to be much more appropriate, and the Board of Estimate has therefore been asked to change these titles accordingly. It has approved of the change, which is now under consideration by the Board of Aldermen. This Board is also considering a request for the creation of the grades of male and female stenographers, at \$900 and \$720 per annum, respectively. \$720 per annum, respectively.

Apothecary Department.

The Supervising Apothecary of the Department, Mr. Martin O'Connor, was taken ill with appendicitis on the 1st day of October, and on operating it was discovered that he had suppurative peritonitis and that there was very little chance for his life. He died on October 4. The Trustees learned of his death with regret and have recorded in their minutes their appreciation of his faithful services. On November 4 Mr. Walter P. Stowe was promoted from the position of Apothecary at Bellevue Hospital to the position of Supervising Apothecary, left vacant by Mr. O'Connor's death.

Miscellaneous.

The question of the advisability of installing vacuum sweeping systems in the new hospitals of the Department has been under investigation. This system of cleaning seems to have some advantages for hospital use, and the matter has therefore been referred to a committee of the Trustees for further information.

Since the appropriation for salaries for the year 1905 is insufficient for the payment of employees at the present rates, a reduction of the wages of Hospital Helpers has had to be effected, to the very great regret of the Trustees. On the recommendation of the Acting Superintendent, this has been done in the following manner: Helpers paid \$40 per month or less are to be paid the first month from \$10 to \$25 less than the present rate, according to the class of their position and the opportunity for improvement. Each succeeding month their wages are to be raised, if their work is satisfactory, until they receive the regular rate.

Owing to the lack of proper accommodations in the Morgue for the making of the autopsies, it has been decided to purchase five additional tables of suitable size, the cost not to exceed \$150.

BELLEVUE HOSPITAL.

The number of admissions to the hospital—6,810—shows a slight decrease from the number for the last quarter of 1903, which was 6,863. Of those discharged, the number improved is 2,915, as compared with 2,481 for 1903, but the number well is only 1,297, as compared with 1,869, and the number of unimproved is 461, as compared with 203. The number of deaths is slightly smaller.

New Buildings.

To relieve the crowded condition of the hospital and to do away with the transferring of convalescents before they are in a proper condition to be removed, it is proposed to build four additional pavilions on the space between the main building and the river. It seemed best that these should be portable buildings because of the prospect of the construction of the new hospital in the near future, and because this kind of building could be erected much more quickly than any other. The Ducker Company alone being able to supply the desired form, the award for this work will be given to them without public letting, in accordance with a resolution of the Board of Aldermen, approved by the Mayor, on the 20th of December. This will save the delay of advertising for bids. The Ducker Company has, in fact, already begun work on the foundations of the buildings.

Appointments and Changes in the Medical Staff.

Dr. Alexander Lambert and Dr. William F. Fluhrer were appointed members of the Conference Committee for the Fourth Division of Bellevue Hospital on

October 13.

Dr. Cyrus J. Strong has been promoted from the position of Assistant Attending Physician to that of Attending Physician on the Fourth Division of the Hospital. Dr. Edward Sternberger has been appointed to the place left vacant by Dr. Strong's

Dr. Edwin Beer has been appointed Assistant Physician to Out-Patients. Dr. Charles Norris, the Director of the Pathological Laboratories, was on December 2 given a seat in the Medical Board, without the privilege of a vote.

Pscychopathic Wards.

On October 7 Dr. M. S. Gregory was promoted from the position of Assistant Resident Physician in the Psychopathic Wards to that of Resident Physician, rendered vacant by the resignation of Dr. Flavius Packer on September 30. Dr. Gregory has been in great need of assistants. The service of these wards has continued to be heavy, and it has not been practicable to appoint any one regularly as his assistant since the Civil Service eligible list of Resident Physicians is the only one available from which to make an appointment, and the examination for this position does not deal particularly with the technical knowledge necessary for the examination and care of the insane. Former appointments were made by the transfer of the appointee from the State Civil Service to the Municipal Civil Service, but the Municipal Civil Service Commission has refused to make any further appointments in this way. The Commission has been requested, therefore, to authorize the change of title of Resident Physician to Alienist, and to hold an examination for the latter position. This it has resolved to do as soon as possible. In the meantime Dr. C. H. Holmes, who was temporarily appointed by the Trustees on October 3, 1904, to assist Dr. Gregory, has successfully passed a non-competitive examination for the position of Alienist and will assist Dr. Gregory until an eligible list for the position is established by the Municipal Civil Service Commission. Civil Service Commission.

The purchase of a better grade of clothing for the patients in the Psychopathic Wards has been approved.

Miscellaneous.

A male graduate nurse has been assigned to the reception office to assist in the reception and examination of the patients. The nurse is of great assistance to the doctor examining the patients and in preserving order in the office.

The Police Commissioner has been requested to assign police matrons to the women's alcoholic ward in place of the patrolmen now on duty there, and to assign the patrolmen thus released, to duty in the reception office. The matrons are better able to control the patients in these wards, and a patrolman can often be of service in the reception office or on the grounds.

The extension of the bulkhead on the river front, to provide additional space for the site of the new Bellevue is being carried on by the Department of Docks and Ferries. The new bulkhead has been completed and the work of filling in the extension has been begun.

Owing to the large and increasing number of Jewish patients in the hospitals of the Department, Rev. Abram Blum, who served without remuneration as Jewish Chaplain for nearly a year until October 28, was then appointed Chaplain, with a salary of \$450 per annum, in order that he might be able to devote his time more entirely to the hospital work.

The purchase of overcoats and shoes for the out-patients in the tuberculosis tent has been approved.

The pathological laboratory and the examining room for the tuberculosis clinic have been completed. Ward 34 is being enlarged by cutting down some partitions, and the plumbing in this ward is being thoroughly renovated. The tents on the hospital grounds have been covered with wooden roofs and these have been found much more satisfactory than the canvas ones. An investigation is being made with a view to installing a new X-ray apparatus, as the present one is not adequate for some of the finer work for which it is needed.

GOUVERNEUR HOSPITAL.

The number of admissions for this quarter shows an increase over the number for last year, being 966, as compared with 939. The total number treated is 1,057, as compared with 1,022. The hospital has been taxed to its utmost to accommodate so

It is expected that in the course of a year the construction of the new wing will be far enough advanced to relieve somewhat the present crowded condition of the hospital. The exterior brick work has already been practically completed and the fire-proof partitions are being put up in the interior. The roof has been tiled and the slating begun. The plumbing is well started and other interior work, such as building the elevator shaft and the heating and ventilating ducts, is begun. This wing, when complete, will increase not only the capacity of the hospital, but also the efficiency of the service, for the present quarters are inadequate in many respects. Work on the new morgue and on the stables has also been started. In the old wing a boiler pit has been completed and three new boilers are nearly ready for use. The heating and ventilating ducts are completed to the fifth floor in this part of the building. ducts are completed to the fifth floor in this part of the building.

Medical Appointments.

The following appointments have been made to the Out-Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital:

Miscellaneous.

The question of the advisability of extending the ambulance district of the hospital to include the Fifth Precinct is being considered, but it does not seem practicable to do this until the new wing has been completed. The architect has recommended the installation of a vacuum sweeping system, and the advantages of such a system are being investigated by a Committee of the Trustees.

HARLEM HOSPITAL.

About one-half of the construction of the new hospital is finished. The exterior of the building is nearing completion and the interior will soon be begun. Very little can be done at present on account of the cold weather.

Appointments.

The Conference Committee of the Trustees has been relieved of its duties as regards appointments at Harlem Hospital by the appointment of Mr. Robbins and Mr. Tack, who will serve as a Conference Committee for Harlem and Fordham Hospitals.

The following appointments have been made to the Out-Patient Department of Harlem Hospital:

Dr. Oswald T. Dinnick has been appointed Interne to the Hospital.
Dr. Henry Krauskopf, the House Surgeon, contracted diphtheria in November and was removed to the Minturn Hospital. He recovered and returned to his duties about the first of December.

#### FORDHAM HOSPITAL.

The census for this quarter shows an increased service, the numbers for 1904 being 279, as compared with 219 for 1903.

#### The New Hospital.

The construction of the new Fordham Hospital is progressing very satisfactorily. All the excavation has been completed and the water mains and drains are laid. The foundations of the main building are finished and preparation is being made to lay the bases for the columns. The brick work of the ambulance station has been topped to the roof and the roof is being put on. The nurses' home is almost ready to be roofed, and the laundry building has been built up to the first story.

Mr. Robbins and Mr. Tack, the new Conference Committee on appointments for Harlem, will also serve as a Conference Committee for Fordham. No new appointments have been made either to the Medical Board or to the House Staff.

A tent cottage has been erected on the hospital grounds to relieve the over-crowding in the main buildings.

On the recommendation of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board, the Trustees have authorized the purchase of a vehicle to convey the members of the Visiting Staff and the clergymen whose duties call them to the hospital to and from the station at Fordham Heights.

There is at this time no fireproofed wood which is fireproof. It is impossible to obtain at this time a sufficient quantity of fireproofed wood to furnish trim and floors for the proposed building.

It is an impossibility to fireproof all the woodwork in the present building to which the proposed building is to be an annex.

The floors of all halls, public and private, and the basement floor entire are composed of fireproof materials throughout.

The law regulating the height of buildings not absolutely fireproof throughout is a fire protective measure. I submit that as the number of floors regulates the number of tenants, the total height of the building is of less importance than the number of floors. number of floors.

number of floors.

To offset the objection to the height of the building the owners have left uncovered above the second floor level 285 square feet of lot area more than the law demands for a 12-story building. This extra amount would entitle the owners to a thirteenth story over the entire building, and I respectfully submit that this fact should have weight in favor of this application.

If this building had been built so that the total height, including the pent-house, was 150 feet instead of 162 feet as at present, and your Honorable Board had granted a permit for a pent-house over one-half the lot area covered, the owners could have covered 8.153 square feet on each of the 11 floors, or 89,683 square feet, plue 4,076 square feet in pent-house, 93,759 square feet in all. In this building the owners have covered only 7,870 square feet on each of 11 floors, or 86,570 square feet, a difference of over 7,000 square feet of rentable space, or about 8 per cent. When this is taken into consideration, together with the additional cost of the building, it is clear that the owners would be heavily penalized for providing the occupants of the building with proper light and air unless your Honorable Board approves of this application; in which case the penalty is reduced to about 4 per cent. on the total investment, in addition to the increased cost of the construction by reason of the extra height of the stories.

3. The two auditoriums are separated by a fourteen-foot court upon which open fire-escapes and exits which are largely in excess of the legal requirements. This court connects directly with a court in the rear by a fourteen-foot passage, so that the movement of escaping crowds is all in one direction.

4. Only one auditorium has a stage for theatrical productions, the other auditorium, being merely a music hall for concerts, has a fixed stage, no scenery and no mechanical devices.

5. The scene dock and the property room are especially isolated from the stage

5. The scene dock and the property room are especially isolated from the stage and from the rest of the building by masonry walls, and are further protected by sliding steel shutters.

6. The building is to be absolutely fireproof throughout and in all particulars

conform liberally with the requirements of the law.

These plans have been approved after extraordinary and minute consideration and study by Professor Laird, University of Pennsylvania; Mr. John Carrere of Carrere & Hastings, and Mr. William Meade of McKim, Meade and White, as being safe and within the spirit of the theatre law. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the coath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
