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### POLICE DEPARTMENT.

#### REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 1906.

Police Department of The City of New York,

His Honor the Mayor, City Hall, New York:

Sir—Pursuant to section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, I have the honor to submit the following report for the quarter ending September 30, 1906:

On September 30 the total force was 8,795, including 68 Matrons. In addition there were on probation 41 Patrolmen, 1 Doorman and 1 Matron.

The effective force on September 30 was 8,246, 373 being absent on leave, 173 sick and 3 suspended.

During the last quarter the losses in the various grades were as follows:

Retired—Captain, 9 Sergeants, 1 Detective Sergeant, 3 Roundsmen, 57 Patrolmen and 1 Assistant Superintendent of Telegraph; total, 72.

Died—1 Sergeant, 1 Detective Sergeant, 11 Patrolmen and 1 Doorman; total, 14.

Resigned—13 Patrolmen; total, 13.

Dismissed—1 Roundsman and 15 Patrolmen; total, 16.

In the estimate presented by me to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for 1907, I have not made any provision for the salary of an Assistant Superintendent of Telegraph, there being no present necessity for filling this position, made vacant by retirement of the former incumbent.

Since my last report a new arrangement for the care of lost children has been effected, which does away with the bringing of these children to headquarters after 9 p. m. They are now being turned over to the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children direct. This does away with the care and feeding of lost children at Police Headquarters.

Police line passes no longer permit the holders to pass through the fire lines, an understanding having been reached with the Fire Department whereby citizens must have a pass issued by that Department in order to gain admission within the fire lines.

Since the last quarterly report the police have been called upon to perform arduous and difficult work in connection with the Brooklyn Rapid Transit—second fare riots—and I am pleased to state that the officers and men of the force did their duty well.

Within the past few weeks all details made necessary by the summer season have been withdrawn and these men returned to duty in the various precincts where they were needed.

Numerous complaints having been brought to my attention of the similarity between the shields worn by Special Policemen and those worn by members of the force, a change has been made in the Special Patrolman's shield, and these new shields are now being issued. There can be no possible reason in the future for confounding these Special Officers with members of the uniformed force.

The finger print system for the identification of criminals has been introduced into the Department. This is the system devised by Sir Edward Henry, the head of the London police, and now in use in most of the large cities and penal institutions of this country, and which has recently been adopted by the Army and Navy.

A system of accountability for property has been introduced into the Department, whereby all property issued to the precincts is received for by the precinct commanders, who are held accountable for it until properly relieved. Under this system it is possible to immediately determine by inspection of the records the amount of property of any given kind in the Department and its location at any time.

A system of accountability for horseshoeing and veterinary service has been introduced. Under this system, by inspection of the records it can be determined when and how often a horse has been shod or attended by a veterinary and the amount due

to any horseshoer or veterinary at any given time. Under the previous system it was impossible to determine the amount of outstanding indebtedness, reliance being placed entirely upon the veterinary's and horseshoer's bills, which were submitted often many months after the services were performed. A similar system of accounts with all dealers with which the Department transacts business is also kept.

Traffic is now regulated at intersections by two men instead of by four. The two men hold up the north and south bound traffic, respectively, while the east and west proceed. When it is desired to hold up east and west bound traffic, in order that the north and south bound may proceed, the men move diagonally to the east and west crossings and do so at these points. Traffic is now stopped back of the crosswalks, so that pedestrians may use them.

The following schedules give for the quarter ending September 30, 1906, the statistics which it has been customary to report, in accordance with section 1544, chapter 466, Laws of 1901:

#### Sick Time.

The time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received during the quarter, and a brief summary of the work of the surgeons of the Department, will be found in the schedule annexed marked "A."

#### Arrests.

The statistics regarding arrests are given in the schedule annexed marked "B."

#### Lost Children.

The number of lost children received by the Department and disposed of are given in the schedule annexed marked "C."

#### House of Detention.

The particulars regarding witnesses confined in the House of Detention are given in the schedule annexed marked "D."

#### Disposition of Property Coming Into the Hands of Police.

Figures showing the value of lost or stolen property recovered and returned to owners, transactions of the Property Clerk's office, etc., will be found in the schedule annexed marked "E."

#### Sanitary Company.

The transactions of the Sanitary Company (Steam Boiler Squad) for the quarter will be found in the schedule annexed marked "F."

#### Discipline.

The annexed schedule marked "G" gives in brief a record of the disciplinary transactions concerning members of the force for the quarter.

#### Licenses.

The number and character of licenses and masquerade ball permits issued during the quarter, the fees received and the number of applications for licenses denied will be found in the schedule annexed marked "H."

#### Detective Bureau.

The work accomplished during the quarter by the Detective Bureau is shown in the schedule annexed marked "I."

#### Deaths.

The names of the members of the force who died during the quarter, with the date of death, the rank of each, and the command to which he was attached at the time of death, are in schedule marked "J."

DEAR SIR—You wrote me on September 10, on behalf of your Bureau of Real Estate, relative to the use by this Department of a plot of land 100 by 120 feet, adjoining on the east a plot now leased by The City of New York, fronting on Gowanus Canal, and you ask for information relative to the circumstances under which this office began the tenancy of this plot.

We have under construction in this borough a sanitary flushing tunnel for the purification of the Gowanus Canal. This work was very much delayed because the plan provided for an extension of the tunnel through land at the canal head occupied as a storage yard by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. That Department desired very much to co-operate with this Department, but was unable to find other storage space for the material it had at this point. The matter was turned over to Consulting Engineer Creuzbaur, who made an arrangement with the Deputy Commissioner of Water Supply to provide him with storage space at the expense of this office. The plot 100 by 120 feet to which you refer was then, under an agreement made by Mr. Allen and Mr. Creuzbaur, to be taken by the City for a site for the new Municipal Repair Plant, and Mr. Creuzbaur directed the removal of the material of the Water Supply Department temporarily to that plot of land. This Department has, therefore, been an occupant of that land since June 15.

This, I imagine, gives all the information requested in your letter of September 10.

SIR—Honorable Bird S. Coler, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, in a communication addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, requests that a lease be entered into of a plot of land consisting of four lots and having a frontage of 100 feet on Seventh street basin of the Gowanus Canal, which property adjoins the land now leased and used by the City, and upon which it is proposed to establish an asphalt plant. This property lies on the northerly side of the basin, the easterly boundary line being 346 feet 7 inches from the westerly side of Second avenue. The lots have a depth approximately of 120 feet.

I have had an examination made of the property which adjoins a parcel of land now leased by the City, size 120 by 150 feet, the lease of which will expire on November 1, 1906, a report having been made under date recommending that the lease be renewed for the purposes of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for a period of five years from the date of expiration.

The rental asked for the plot of land, size 100 by 120 feet, on the northerly side of the Seventh street basin of \$80 per month is in my opinion, while full value, not excessive.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a lease of the four lots having a frontage of 100 feet on the Seventh street basin of the Gowanus Canal, with a depth of 120 feet, 346 feet 7 inches from the westerly side of Second avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for a period from the date of occupation to November 1, 1911, which will be the date of expiration of the lease of the adjoining property if the same is renewed in accordance with the recommendation heretofore referred to, at an annual rental of \$900, payable quarterly, the City to pay for the taxes and water against the premises. Lessor, Brooklyn Improvement Company.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City, from the Brooklyn Improvement Company, of the four lots having a frontage of 100 feet on Seventh street basin of the Gowanus Canal, with a depth of 120 feet, 346 feet 7 inches from the westerly side of Second avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, for a period from the date of occupation to November 1, 1911, at an annual rental of nine hundred and sixty dollars (\$900), payable quarterly; the City to pay for taxes and water against the premises; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

Lessor, Brooklyn Improvement Company.

SIR—The lease of the premises No. 46 Jackson avenue, First Ward, Long Island City, occupied by the First District Municipal Court, will expire on October 15, 1906, and the lessor of the premises, Mrs. Mary L. Dennler, has refused to renew the lease unless she receives an increased rental. The matter was taken up with Hon. Thomas C. Kadien, Justice of the First District Municipal Court, in order to ascertain whether the present quarters are satisfactory. He strongly condemns the same, stating that the premises are not adaptable for court purposes and that they are unsanitary.

Investigation of the neighborhood discloses that there is a floor in the building known as St. Mary's Lyceum, located at Fifth street, between Jackson avenue and Vernon avenue, which could be made adaptable for court purposes, and the presiding Justice states that it seems to him that the east side of said building will be sufficiently large enough for court purposes and that it is a new building, sanitary in every respect, with excellent light on the east side and conveniently situated.

The price originally asked by the owner was \$1,500 per annum, and after negotiation he has reduced it to \$1,000 per annum, which price in my opinion, while full value, is not excessive.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a lease of the easterly side of the first floor of the premises known as the St. Mary's Lyceum, situated on Fifth street, between Jackson and Vernon avenues, Long Island City, Borough of Queens, for a period of two years from October 15, 1906, at an annual rental of \$1,000, payable monthly; the owner to pay water tax and to furnish light; the City to furnish heat and janitor service. Lessor, John McGuire.

I would further recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to the provisions of section 205 of the Revised Charter, designate the easterly side of the first floor of the St. Mary's Lyceum for the use of the First District Municipal Court of The City of New York, Borough of Queens, on and after October 15, 1906.

"The City of New York, October 4, 1906.

"The Hon. GEORGE B. McLELLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Armory Board: "Dear Sir—A meeting of the Committees on Armories was held this day, at the office of President McGowan, at 12 o'clock, m.

"Present—The President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

"The Committee beg to report in relation to the matters referred to it, as follows:

"First—That they have examined the correspondence from John Kennedy & Son, contractors, and Pilcher, Thomas & Tachau, architects, relative to the completion of Squadron "C" armory within the time prescribed by the contract and specifications.

"They report progress on the same, and recommend that the matter be taken up on the final certificate of the completion of the building.

"The Committee recommend the purchase of two additional meters for Squadron "C" armory, to comply with the provisions of the Water Department, and that an order be issued to the contractor to supply the same, as an extra, as prescribed by the architects.

"Second—The Committee considered the correspondence relative to arc lights in the Sixty-ninth Regiment armory, and state that they instructed the Secretary to request the Bureau of Gas and Electricity to execute a contract with the Edison Company for lighting the armory of that organization. The necessity for haste in this matter being that the Regiment desired to enter the building on the 13th inst., and that the Edison Company, who proposed to furnish these arc lamps, without additional cost, do not care to do so until the contract for lighting the building was executed.

"Third—The correspondence relative to the leasing of new quarters for the Second Battalion Naval Militia was considered. The Battalion was ordered to vacate its old quarters on the first of October, and the proposition presented to the Armory Board at its last meeting, to lease another place, was referred to this Committee. The new landlord has allowed the Battalion access to the proposed quarters, with the expectation that the proper resolution for renting the same will be passed, and this Committee recommends such action.

"Fourth—The communication from M. E. Miles, and others, relative to the destruction of the vines on the walls of the Thirteenth Regiment armory was then considered, and the Secretary was directed to acknowledge the communication, and communicate the facts in the case.

"Fifth—The communication from Parfitt Brothers, architects for the extension to the Thirteenth Regiment armory, requesting permission to substitute 12-inch stair strings for 13-inch, was considered, and the Committee recommend that the contract be so amended, without additional cost.

"The Committee respectfully submits the necessary resolutions to carry out the above provisions.

"Sixth—The Committee discussed the propriety of increasing the salaries of L. V. Meehan, Wireman, from \$1,200 to \$1,500, and of Robert Telfer, Assistant Clerk of the Works, from \$1,800 to \$2,000, and recommend such increases.

Resolved, That paragraph 7, page 14 (Iron and Steel Work), of the contract with Guidone & Galardi, contractors for the erection and completion of the extension to the Thirteenth Regiment armory, in the Borough of Brooklyn, be amended so as to substitute 12-inch stair strings for 13-inch; this change to be made without additional cost to the City.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Resolved, That the salary of Lawrence V. Meehan, Wireman, be fixed at \$1,500 per annum; that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to approve the same, and the Board of Aldermen to concur therein.

(The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen stated that they would vote Aye, but reserved the right to vote No when the matter was brought before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, should they see fit to do so.)

The resolution was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Resolved, That the salary of Robert Telfer, assistant clerk of the works, be fixed at two thousand dollars (\$2,000) per annum; that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to approve the same, and the Board of Aldermen and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to concur therein.

(The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen stated that they would vote Aye, but reserved the right to vote No when the matter was brought before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, should they see fit to do so.)

The resolution was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

An application was received for the final payment to the James D. Murphy Company, contractors for the erection of the Sixty-ninth Regiment armory, and the acceptance of the building. The following certificates were received: From the Inspector, the Architects, the Colonel commanding the regiment; the Consolidated Gas Company; the Superintendent of Buildings, Borough of Manhattan, as to gas pipes; Police Department, as to boilers; and the Board of Fire Underwriters, as to electrical equipment.

The report of the Inspector stated that the work was completed in accordance with the contract and specifications, with the exception of the installation of the marble tablet, and some minor items, which would cost less than a thousand dollars to complete.

Brigadier General Smith offered the following:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the contract with the James D. Murphy Company, for the erection and completion of the new armory for the Sixty-ninth Regiment, N. G., N. Y., in the Borough of Manhattan, dated January 26, 1904, and running 350 working days, be and is hereby extended to October 8, 1906.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Brigadier General Smith offered the following:

Resolved, That the Armory Board does hereby accept the Sixty-ninth Regiment armory from the contractors, as completed, with the reservation named in this resolution; that the Comptroller be authorized to pay to the James D. Murphy Company, contractors, the sum of ninety-three thousand and ninety-one dollars and twenty-four cents (\$93,091.24), for the execution of their contract for the erection of the Sixty-ninth Regiment armory, in the Borough of Manhattan, being a payment in full, with a reservation therefrom of one thousand dollars, until the marble tablet, etc., are properly installed; and a further reservation of two thousand dollars, as provided in the contract under paragraph "Z," for one year from the date of the issuance of the final certificate, as a guarantee for the perfect working and efficiency of the steam heating apparatus; that the roofs of the building shall be made tight, and any defects which may appear in the entire work.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary presented a tabulation of the bids received at this meeting, and stated that the bid of John Wanamaker, for Item No. 1, furniture to be installed in Squadron "C" armory, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for \$12,913, was the lowest and that the bid was formal.

The President of the Board of Aldermen offered the following:

That the same be submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their concurrence, and to the Comptroller for his approval of the same, and when so approved the Chairman of this Board be authorized to execute the contract on behalf of the Board; that all the other bids be rejected and the deposits received with the bids be forwarded to the Comptroller with the request that he return the amounts received from the unsuccessful bidders.

The Secretary further stated that the bid of the American Seating Company on Item No. 4, gallery chairs, etc., to be installed in Squadron "C" armory, Borough of Brooklyn, for \$3,674, was the lowest and was formal.

No. 47. No. 56. Eighty-second Street.—To open Eighty-second street, between the Shore road and Fourth avenue.

No. 57. Harway Avenue.—To amend resolution of May 2, 1906, initiating proceedings to set curb on concrete and lay cement sidewalks on Harway avenue, from Bay Forty-eighth street to West Eighteenth street, and on West Eighteenth street, from Harway avenue to the bridge, by excluding from the provisions thereof the laying of cement sidewalks.

No. 58. Avenue S.—To open Avenue S, from Stillwell avenue to Gravesend avenue, except the land owned by the New York and Sea Beach Railroad.

No. 61. New Utrecht Avenue.—To pave with asphalt on concrete foundation New Utrecht avenue, from Thirty-eighth street and Ninth avenue to Eighty-first street, where not already paved.

No. 62. Fifty-seventh Street.—To regulate, grade, set curb on concrete and lay cement sidewalks on Fifty-seventh street, between Fourteenth and Fifteenth avenues.

No. 63. Eighty-seventh Street.—To regulate, grade, set curb on concrete, set brick gutter and lay cement sidewalks on Eighty-seventh street, between Third and Narrows avenues.

No. 64. Bay Ridge Parkway.—To regulate, grade, set curb on concrete and lay cement sidewalks on Bay Ridge parkway, from a point about 400 feet east of Fort Hamilton avenue to Bay parkway, or Twenty-second avenue.

No. 65. Seventy-fifth Street.—To lay crosswalks on the north side of Seventy-fifth street, across Second avenue.
