Examiner Byrne, to whom was referred the complaint of the South Brooklyn Shipwrights' Benevolent Association, alleging the employment of Dockbuilders in the capacity of Ship Carpenters in the Department of Docks and Ferries, reported that he had conducted an investigation and found that a number of Dock Builders were employed by the Department in the construction of scows.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to call the attention of the Department of Docks and Ferries to the provisions of the Rules with reference to the employment of persons in duties appropriate to their respective titles.

Examiner Byrne, to whom was referred a letter of the Board of City Magistrates, Second Division, dated June 10, with reference to the employment of Michael De Simone as an Interpreter, presented a report showing that he had found, after investigation, that Mr. De Simone was employed as Landing Agent by "La Veloce Navigazione Italiana a Vapore," and that such duties required his attendance at Ellis Island from 10.30 o'clock until 12 o'clock in the morning of nearly every day.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to inform the Board of City Magistrates that the pay-roll of Mr. De Simone could not be passed.

It appearing from the certificates of Physicians furnished that in each case the person granted a leave of absence was suffering from illness. On motion, the action of the Department was approved.

A letter was presented from the Board of City Magistrates, First Division, requesting that an examination be held "for promotion of those in the lower grades of the City Magistrates' Courts of the First Division, to the position of Police Clerk's Assistant."

On motion, the request was denied, the position of Assistant Clerk in the City Magistrates' Court being included in Part I. of the Competitive Class.

A letter was presented from the Board of Education requesting that an examination be held for Women Attendance Officers who understand the Italian language and are familiar with the different dialects, especially the Sicilian dialect.

On motion, the request was granted, and the Secretary was instructed to proceed with the examination.

A letter was presented from the Acting Superintendent of Bellevue Hospital requesting that a list be certified him containing the names of persons who can speak the Scandinavian languages (Swedish and Norwegian), the Slavonic (Polish and Bohemian), the Yiddish, Hungarian and Italian.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to request the Superintendent to endeavor to procure a suitable person from the existing eligible list for Interpreter.

A letter was presented from the President of the Borough of Queens requesting that examinations be held for Topographical Draughtsman, Transitman and Computer and Assistant Engineer.

On motion, the request was granted and the Secretary was instructed to proceed with the examinations.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Bridges requesting that an eligible list be certified from which appointment could be made to the position of Mechanic's Helper (Photographer).

On motion, the request was denied and the Secretary was instructed to certify from the eligible list for the position of Photographer.

A letter was presented from the Department of Bridges announcing that leave of absence for two months, without pay, had been granted to Martin Fadenhile, Laborer. It appearing from the certificate of a physician that Mr. Fadenhile was ill, on motion, the action was approved.

A letter was presented from the Department of Bridges announcing the appointment of Joseph Killoran as an Inspector of Masonry (caisson work), under the provisions of Rule 12, paragraph 4, the eligible list having been exhausted.

On motion, the appointment was approved.

A letter was presented from the Police Department, communicating an amended record sheet in the case of John J. Magner, candidate for promotion to Roundsman.

On motion, the matter was referred to Examiner Byrne for investigation.

The Secretary stated that he had communicated with the Department of Parks, Brooklyn, with reference to the complaint of the National Association of Amalgamated Painters, etc., and had called the attention of the Department to the provisions of the rules requiring that employees be assigned to perform duties appropriate to their titles. He presented a letter from the Commissioner of Parks, dated June 27, stating that he had ordered the Superintendent to employ all men classed as Laborers or Special Laborers on strictly laboring work.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to send a copy of the letter to the association making the complaint.

A letter was presented from the Board of City Magistrates, Second Division, requesting the Commission to consent to the transfer of Clarence J. Tobin, Stenographer, from the office of the Commission to the City Magistrates' Courts.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Commission hereby consents to the transfer of Clarence J. Tobin, Stenographer, from the office of the Municipal Civil Service Commission to the Board of City Magistrates, Second Division, in accordance with the provisions of Rule XIV., and that the Secretary be instructed to issue the certificate of such transfer.

A letter was presented from the Corporation Counsel, dated June 23, replying to a letter of the Commission, dated May 26, requesting information as to whether the reinstatement of John A. Jennings, Clerk in the Department of Health, might be authorized, Mr. Jennings having retired on pension, in accordance with the provisions of section 1323A of the Charter, on February 3, 1904. The letter recited part of the third paragraph of Civil Service Rule XIII., in reference to reinstatements, and concluded as follows:

"While in this particular instance the services of Mr. Jennings to the Department may be exceedingly valuable, on account of his twenty years' service, applications of this nature should not be encouraged. Mr. Jennings was retired on his voluntary application and was awarded and paid a pension. His connection with the Department ceased. He now asks to be reinstated. The rule cited is probably broad enough to cover his case, and his reinstatement may be authorized on condition that he resign from the pension fund and release it from any further obligation to him until he is again placed upon it."

The reinstatement of Mr. Jennings having been authorized on June 8, 1904, on motion, the letter was ordered filed.

A letter was presented from the Corporation Counsel, replying to a letter from the Commission, dated June 16, requesting information as to whether the provisions of Civil Service Rule IX., paragraph 5, with reference to the reception of appeals, could be applied to persons who competed in the examinations held prior to December 4, 1903, the date upon which the said rule was adopted. The letter contained the following paragraph:

"In my opinion the rule should be enforced, not only as regards persons examined since December 4, 1903, but as to all persons who have been examined prior to that time. The meaning of the rule is perfectly plain, and there is no objection, but, on the contrary, much reason for its being carried out in compliance with its plain terms. I have to advise you, therefore, that by adoption of the rule in question on December 4, 1903, the right of all persons who had been examined and notified of their rating and their relative standing prior to such date, to appeal, expired fifteen days after December 4, 1903."

On motion, the letter was ordered filed.

A letter was presented from the Corporation Counsel, in reply to a letter of the Commission, dated April 4, requesting information as to whether the practice prevailing in some departments of procuring the services of telephone operators through contract with the Telephone Company, rather than from the eligible list of the Commission, was legal. The letter contained the following paragraph:

"I would suggest that you write a circular letter to the various departments employing these operators, and direct their attention to the fact that it is their duty to obtain their telephonic services, so far as it can be done satisfactorily, from the operators furnished from the Civil Service list."

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to comply with the suggestion of the Corporation Counsel, as set forth above.

A letter was presented from the Corporation Counsel, replying to a letter of the Commission, dated May 10, calling his attention to a complaint of Mr. George McFadden, protesting against the employment to serve legal papers for the Law Department of persons not certified from the Civil Service list. The letter stated that

it had been found the City's interests were much promoted by the employment in such cases of persons having special qualifications, and that there could be no objection to the continuance of the practice in such special cases.

On motion, the letter was ordered filed.

A letter was presented from the Corporation Counsel, in reply to a letter of the Commission, dated April 22, requesting information as to whether the reinstatement of John McCarthy, as a Driver in the Department of Street Cleaning, could be approved, Mr. McCarthy having been dismissed on charges on September 16, 1902. The Corporation Counsel advised the Commission that such reinstatement would have to be made within one year, under the provisions of the rules.

On motion, the letter was ordered filed, and the Secretary was instructed to communicate a copy thereof to the Department of Street Cleaning.

A letter was presented from the Department of Street Cleaning, requesting that the name "Francesco Policastro," now appearing on the records, be changed to "Mattia Policastro."

On motion, the matter was referred to Examiner Byrne.

A letter was presented from the Fire Department, communicating an amended record in the case of James J. Convey, candidate for promotion to the rank of Foreman.

On motion, the matter was referred to the Committee on Appeals.

A letter was presented from the Department of Docks and Ferries, requesting authority to reassign to duty Giovanni Chiesa, a Laborer who has not been in the service since May, 1902, he having been ill since that time.

On motion, the request was denied.

A letter was presented from the Department of Bridges, announcing that leave of absence without pay had been granted A. G. Williams, Riveter, for six weeks, commencing June 20, and transmitting the statement of a physician showing that Mr. Williams is ill.

On motion, the action of the Department was recognized.

A letter was presented from the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices, Manhattan, requesting that the names of Mary Rodgers and Annie McCormack be placed on the preferred list for Attendant. The Secretary stated that these persons had been employed as Attendants, but that when it became necessary to lay them off for lack of work, through a clerical error the Commission was not notified of that fact, and that therefore their names were not placed on the preferred list.

On motion, the request was granted.

A letter was presented from the Mayor, communicating copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen April 13, and approved by the Mayor April 19, creating the position of Inspector of Weights and Measures in the Mayor's Bureau of Weights and Measures, at a salary of \$2,500 per annum.

On motion, the letter was ordered filed.

A letter was presented from Albert Wagner with reference to the certification of his name for the position of Automobile Engineman in the Department of Street Cleaning.

On motion, the matter was referred to Examiner Byrne for investigation.

On motion, the request of Hyman Morgenbesser that his name be restored to the eligible list for Laboratory Assistant was granted, he having made affidavit that he declined the position offered him in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity on account of location, and that offered him in the Department of Health on account of the insufficiency of salary offered.

On motion, the request of Alexander Nagy that his name be restored to the eligible list for Transitman was denied.

On motion, the request of Leo Lebowich that his name be restored to the eligible list for temporary Clerk was denied.

The Secretary presented an affidavit of John V. Allen, candidate for the position of Court Attendant, to the effect that he had removed from the Borough of Manhattan to the Borough of Brooklyn, and requesting that this change of address be noted on the eligible list.

On motion, the request was granted.

On motion, the request of Michael Keating that his name be restored to the eligible list for Attendance Officer was granted, he having made an affidavit that he was never offered employment in the Department of Education.

On motion, the request of Louis F. Burchard that his name be restored to the eligible list for Inspector of Tenements was denied.

A letter was presented from Edmund B. Powers requesting that his name be placed on the preferred list for Temporary Clerk.

On motion, the matter was referred to the President and the Secretary.

A letter was presented from James F. Rorke, M. D., requesting that he be permitted to compete in the examination for Inspector of Licenses, his application not having been recorded within the time fixed for the receipt of such applications. It appearing to the satisfaction of the Commission that the failure to record the application was due to an official error on the part of the Commission.

On motion, the request was granted.

A letter was presented from Richard J. Donovan, requesting a special examination for Messenger. With the request was an affidavit setting forth the fact that Mr. Donovan was in court under subpoena on the day of the regular examination.

On motion, the request was granted.

A letter was presented from Charles Wessel, requesting that his application for Inspector of Licenses, containing a misstatement in answer to Question 10, be accepted. With the request was an affidavit signed by Mr. Wessel setting forth that the misstatement had been made through inadvertence.

On motion, the request was granted.

A letter was presented from Thomas F. Kelly, Jr., requesting that his application for Fireman, containing a misstatement in answer to Question 12, be accepted. With the request was an affidavit signed by Mr. Kelly, setting forth that the misstatement had been made through inadvertence.

On motion, the request was granted.

A letter was presented from Etta V. Fitzpatrick, requesting that her application for the position of Inspector of Licenses, presented through the mail after the date upon which the receipt of such application closed, be accepted. With the request was an affidavit of W. J. Fitzpatrick that he mailed the application in The City of New York on June 16.

On motion, the request was granted.

On motion, the request of Joseph G. Fogarty for a special examination for Messenger was denied for lack of power.

## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

### TRANSACTIONS OF THE

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES DURING THE WEEK ENDING MAY 26, 1904.

Actions Taken May 26, Unless Otherwise Noted.

The following permits were granted:

May 21. Joseph P. Sibree—

To use and occupy a space 45 by 60 feet, with privilege of maintaining a house thereon, at Broad Channel, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens, compensation to be at the rate of \$20 for the year, payable in advance to the Cashier, the privilege to continue until April 30, 1905, unless sooner revoked.

May 21. Christian Hoobs—

To use and occupy a space 100 by 100 feet, with privilege of maintaining house thereon, at Broad Channel, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens, compensation to be at the rate of \$75 for the year, payable in advance to the Cashier, the privilege to continue until April 30, 1905, unless sooner revoked.

May 21. I. H. Rosenfeld—

To construct a bridge or board walk, extending from the existing board walk at the foot of Remington avenue, Arverne, Borough of Queens, to the Casino of the Arverne Hotel, in accordance with plans submitted as amended, the structure to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Commissioner.

## May 21. Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company—

To open granite pavement in front of the Recreation Pier at the foot of East Third street to permit the building of an electric light subsidiary connection to said pier, the pavement to be relaid at the cost and expense of the permittee, by this Department.

## May 21. Empire City Subway Company, Limited—

To construct electric light subsidiary connections at the approaches to Piers 19 and 20, East river.

## May 21. Hoboken Ferry Company—

To Repair from time to time as may be required, the ferry premises at the foot of Barclay, Christopher and West Fourteenth streets, North river, within existing lines, the permit to terminate December 31, 1904, unless sooner revoked.

## May 23. New York City Railway Company—

To open asphalt pavement foot of Chambers street, North river, for the purpose of repairing service pipe thereat, the Uvalde Asphalt Paving Company having agreed to relay the pavement distributed, the cost of supervision to be collected from said company.

## May 23. Church E. Gates &amp; Co.—

To repair the platform extending for a distance of 310 feet along the front of their property on the easterly side of the Harlem river, near the foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, Borough of The Bronx, the work to be kept within existing lines.

## May 23. Dennis H. Kennedy—

To use and occupy 125 feet of the southerly side of outer end of Pier foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-third street, North river, with privilege of erecting and maintaining an ice bridge, scales and tally house thereat, compensation to be at the rate of \$900 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Cashier, to continue until April 30, 1905, unless sooner revoked, the structures to be erected in accordance with plans to be first submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

## May 23. H. Koehler &amp; Co.—

To extend their suction pipe for a distance of 275 feet under the pier now being constructed at the foot of Thirtieth street, East river, subject to the terms and conditions contained in the permit for the maintenance of the pipe through the bulkhead thereat, the contractor engaged in work of building the pier having consented to said extension work.

## May 23. Nathan Straus—

To dispense pasteurized and raw milk during the summer season of 1904 from the recreation piers at the foot of East Third, East Twenty-fourth and East One Hundred and Twelfth streets, at the foot of Barrow and at the foot of West Fifth streets, compensation to be at the rate of \$1 for each pier for the season, payable in advance to the Cashier.

## May 23. William Berger—

To use and occupy space 25 by 40 feet, with privilege of maintaining a house thereon, at Broad channel, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens, compensation to be at the rate of \$12 for the year, payable in advance to the Cashier, the privilege to continue until April 30, 1905, unless sooner revoked.

## May 24. Charles Reinig—
