observations made on January 25 and 26, 1910, as to the increase which should be made in the number of cars operated on the local and express tracks and as to the car requirements to maintain a headway of a minute and a half. Mr. Hedley, Vice-President and General Manager of the company, testified for the Commission as to the local and express service operated in the subway, the feasibility of operating express trains on a minute and a half headway, the failure to increase service by about twenty-five per cent, due chiefly to the lack of cars which the company in its acceptance of the Commission's Order in Case No. 1074 of May 11, 1909, for increased service had estimated could be supplied in sufficient number by October, 1909, the time when these cars would be ready, and the disposal of, and progress on, contracts made by the company for 250 additional subway cars. G. H. Campbell, Vice-President of the Staten Island Railway Company, testified as to the company's understanding and general practice with regard to the lease and as to the physical conditions of the shelter for train passengers. Sawyer, recalled, testified as to his estimates of the cost for reconstructing the company's cars in order properly to adjust wheelguards thereon. E. G. Whereas, Elizabeth J. Tracy, formerly a Teacher in Public School 83, Borough of Manhattan, was suspended on January 25, 1910, on charges of neglect of duty based on her long-continued absence from school; and

Whereas, Evidence has been submitted to the Committee on Elementary Schools that the death of the said Elizabeth J. Tracy occurred on April 8, 1909; therefore be it Resolved, that all proceedings in the above-mentioned matter be, and they are hereby, dismissed.

Whereas, Helen C. Murphy, a Teacher in Public School 140, Borough of Brooklyn, was absent from October 21 to November 19, 1909, on account of quarantine by the Department of Health; and

Whereas, Under Section 44 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education, only ten days of this absence can be excused; therefore be it

Resolved, that so much of the absence of the above-mentioned Teacher from October 21 to November 19, 1909, as is in excess of the ten days allowed under Section 44 of the By-Laws, be, and it hereby is, excused with pay, and that any provisions of the By-Laws inconsistent herewith be, and they hereby are, suspended for the purpose of this resolution.

Whereas, it is absolutely necessary to employ as Janitor of said school a person living on Barren Island; therefore be it

Resolved, that the Municipal Civil Service Commission be, and it is hereby, requested to take the necessary steps to have the position of Janitor of Public School 120, Borough of Brooklyn, included in the non-competitive class.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
