COMMUNICATIONS.

The President pro tem. laid before the Board the following:

LAW DEPARTMENT—OFFICE OF THE
COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION,
NEW YORK, November 17, 1874.

General JOSEPH C. PINCKNEY:

SIR—I have received the following resolution: "Whereas, In a recent decision made by the Court of Appeals, it was held that no claim was a legal charge against the county, unless the same should have been properly audited and allowed by the Board of Supervisors. There being now a large number of claims for labor, materials, etc., supplied to the county prior to the passage of the 'Consolidation Act' remaining unpaid, it is necessary that some action should be taken in order that the said claims should be properly settled; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That the Legal Adviser of this Board be and he is hereby requested to furnish, at his earliest convenience, an opinion as to the powers and duties of the Board in auditing claims against the county incurred prior or subsequent to the passage of the act consolidating the City and County of New York.

I presume the decision referred to in the above resolution was in the case of *The People*, on the relation of *James Ryan vs. Andrew H. Green*, Comptroller of the City of New York. The Honorable the Board of Supervisors is, however, entirely mistaken as to the tenor of that decision.

Mr. Ryan commenced proceedings in the Court of Common Pleas, in August, 1873, against the Comptroller, to compel payment of salary claimed by him as Deputy Clerk of the Court of Special Sessions for the period from February 1, 1873, to May 31, 1873. In December, 1873, the Special Term of the Court of Common Pleas issued a writ of peremptory mandamus requiring the Comptroller to pay the claim. An appeal was taken by me to the General Term of the Court of Common Pleas, and such appeal was argued in March, 1874. On the 4th of May, 1874, the General Term affirmed the decision of the Special Term. An appeal was thereupon taken by me to the Court of Appeals, which last appeal was argued on the 10th day of June, 1874. The act to consolidate the governments of the City and County of New York was passed April 30, 1874; but, although the argument in the Court of Appeals was some time subsequent, the effect of this statute upon the payment of county claims was not discussed by counsel upon the argument, nor considered by the Court. The principal questions in the case were, whether Mr. Ryan could hold the offices of Deputy Clerk of the Court of Special Sessions and of Member of the Assembly at the same time; and whether the Court of Common Pleas had jurisdiction over mandamus proceedings. The point was also raised, on behalf of the Comptroller, that the Court of Common Pleas had erred in granting the writ, because Mr. Ryan's claim had not been audited by the Board of Supervisors, nor had the voucher for the claim been audited by the Auditor in the Finance Department. The only question, however, before the Court was, as to how the law stood at the time of the decision by the Special Term of the Court of Common Pleas in December, 1873. The point was not whether a county claim could be paid in June, 1874, without an audit of the Board of Supervisors, but whether, in December, 1873, the Court could order such a claim to be paid without an audit of the Board of Supervisors. On this question there was hardly any room for discussion. It had been well settled law for many years that the Comptroller could not be compelled by the courts to pay a

county claim until such claim had been audited by the Board of Supervisors; and the Court of Appeals, in the *Outwater* case, argued in the early part of this year, had decided that, in addition to the audit of the Board of Supervisors, there must also be an audit of the voucher for the claim by the Auditor in the Finance Department. The counsel for Mr. Ryan did endeavor to establish the doctrine that the salaries of county officers, fixed by law, could be paid without an audit by the Board of Supervisors; but this doctrine was not sustained by the Court of Appeals. In the decision of the Court of Appeals, the effect of the "Consolidation Act" upon the payment of county claims is not discussed. The only allusion to the act is in a single sentence, in which the Court says, that, prior to the passage of the "Consolidation Act," the Court could not compel the Comptroller to pay a county claim until the same had been audited by the Board of Supervisors; thus intimating, so far as any indication of the opinion of the Court was given, that since the passage of the "Consolidation Act" no such audit was necessary.

In this connection I would respectfully refer the Honorable the Board of Supervisors to an opinion given, at the request of the Board, in May last, by the Honorable John K. Porter and John H. Strahan, Esq., which opinion was published in the *CITY RECORD* of May 26. It will be seen by an examination of that opinion that the ground was distinctly taken by Judge Porter and Mr. Strahan, that, after the passage of the "Consolidation Act," the Board of Supervisors had no jurisdiction to audit claims against the county, whether the same were incurred before or after the enactment of that law. To that opinion I gave my written concurrence, which was also published in the *CITY RECORD* of the date above mentioned.

There is nothing whatever in the decision in the *Ryan* case which creates any doubt in my mind as to the correctness of the views expressed by Judge Porter and Mr. Strahan, and concurred in by me, nor do I see any reason to doubt that such views were entirely correct.

I must, therefore, advise the Honorable the Board of Supervisors that, in my opinion, the Board has now no jurisdiction to audit claims against the county, whether incurred before or after the passage of the "Consolidation Act," and that actions to recover such claims can now be maintained against the City of New York without such audit.

REPORT:

That, upon inquiry, your Committee learn that application has been made by Colonel Burnett, both to the Mayor and the Commissioner of Public Works, for permission to deposit the painting referred to in the Governor's Room, and has been referred, in a letter from the Commissioner, herewith accompanying, to the Common Council, who alone have power to grant the request.

Your Committee also have learned that the painting represents the presentation of medals to the members of the First Regiment New York Volunteers by the Mayor of this City, on behalf of its Government and people, upon the return of the regiment after victorious campaign in Mexico, in July, 1848, and also represents the delivery to the City authorities, by Colonel W. B. Burnett, of the war-worn colors, the gift of the Corporation of the City, presented in 1846, previous to the departure for Mexico, and now deposited in the Governor's Room, in the City Hall.

The historical interest attached to the painting, its merit as a work of art, and its intimate associations with the colors of the regiment, seem to render it desirable that it should also be deposited in the same place.

Your Committee, therefore, respectfully offer for your adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby given to the owner of the painting representing the presentation of medals to the First Regiment of New York Volunteers, for the war in Mexico, upon their return to this city and the delivery of the colors presented by the Corporation to the City authorities, or his representative, Colonel Ward B. Burnett, to deposit the same in the Governor's Room in the City Hall, and the Commissioner of Public Works is hereby authorized and directed to receive the painting, on behalf of the City, and assign it a conspicuous and appropriate position in the Governor's Room.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 14, 1874:

The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,858, as follows, viz.: 12 public buildings, 1,007 tenement houses, 153 private dwellings, 164 other dwellings, 3 markets, 29 manufacturing and workshops, 16 stores, 48 stables, 1 lake, 37 slaughter-houses, 3 public sewers and drains, 2 dumping-grounds, 14 fat-rendering establishments, 3 manure-dumps, 2 gut-cleaning establishments, 29 sunken and vacant lots, 1 coal yard, 53 yards, courts, and areas, 33 cellars and basements, 68 waste-pipes and drains, 81 privies and water-closets, 33 street-gutters and sidewalks, 7 dangerous stairways, 1 cistern and cesspool, 1 dangerous chimney, 15 other nuisances, together with 42 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 576.

During the past week 71 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 89 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 83 houses, 83 privy sinks, clothing, bedding, etc.

29 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

72 permits were granted to Scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported during the week ending November 14, 1874: Typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 15; scarlet fever, 33; measles, 7; diphtheria, 130; small-pox, 53; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 4.

256 loads of night-soil were removed by the Night Scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food: Calves (bob), 8 carcasses; calves (case), 1 carcass; sheep, 3 carcasses; hogs, 31 carcasses; beef, 64 pounds; poultry, 830 pounds; and fish, 1,995 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending November 7, 1874, there were issued from this Bureau 535 burial

permits for city deaths, 22 for bodies *in transitu*, and 41 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 535 deaths, 166 marriages, 523 births, 41 still-births, 22 applications for transit permits, and 56 returns from Coroners. There were 19 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths; and 1 transcript of marriage record, and 20 of death were issued from this Bureau; 4 cases of death were referred to the Coroners.

During the week ending November 14, 1874, there were issued from this Bureau 543 burial permits for city deaths, 27 for bodies *in transitu*, and 45 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 543 deaths, 216 marriages, 510 births, 45 still-births, 27 applications for transit permits, and 48 returns from Coroners. There were 19 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths, and 3 transcripts of birth record, 2 of marriage, and 16 of death, were issued from this Bureau.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

In the week that ended on Saturday, 14th instant, there were 543 deaths reported in this city, against the 535 which were verified in the previous week. There was some decrease of infant mortality, and a decrease in deaths by diarrhoeal diseases, while there was an increase from membranous croup, pneumonia, and bronchitis, amounting to 22 in a total of 90 deaths.

There were 66 deaths from diphtheria during the week, and 20 more during the 15th and 16th instants. This increase of diphtheria is following the courses that were noticed a year ago, and for the past few weeks this disease has become even more prevalent in numerous towns beyond this city than it ever has been here.

The death-rate in this city was equal to 26.75 annually in the first week of November. The rate in London for the week ending October 24 was equal to 20 per 1,000, and in twenty-one cities of Great Britain it averaged 23 per 1,000, yearly rate. Paris reported the same death-rate as London, while nearly all the large German cities report a death-rate higher than that of New York. A large percentage of infant population gives a high death-rate in the great cities that report such rates. The City of New York has a larger percentage of infant population than any one of the New England States, the last census showing that 118 in every 1,000 of the city population are under five years of age, and other evidence proving that there are 34,000 births in this city yearly.
