

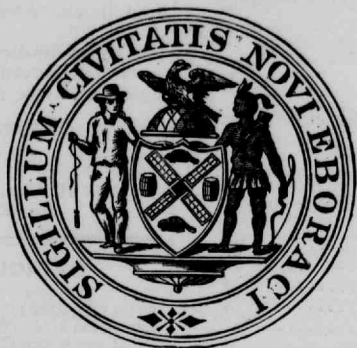

OFFICE OF SUPERINTENDENT, No. 2 FOURTH AVENUE,
NEW YORK, April 20, 1880.

At a meeting of the Board of Examiners, held pursuant to call of the Superintendent of Buildings, at the office of the Department of Buildings, No. 2 Fourth Avenue, on Tuesday, 20th of April, 1880, at 3 o'clock P. M.

There being present Edwin Dobbs, John Banta, James McLean, Henry Dudley, and Superintendent Henry J. Dudley. Superintendent Henry J. Dudley presiding.

The Chairman submitted for the action of the Board the hereinafter named petitions and applications, to wit, the following having been laid over for further reconsideration and information from last meeting:

Petition of William Jose, for permission to erect a grain storage house on premises east side of Tenth avenue, 75 feet north of Forty-third street, walls to be constructed of the thickness as per Plans and Specifications for New Building No. 237, filed March 26, 1880.

Moved that the petitioner be allowed to withdraw his application, the same being according to law. Approved unanimously.

Petition of William Jose, for permission to alter by raising the malt house and kilns on premises on northeast corner of Tenth avenue and Forty-third street, as per Plans and Specifications for Alteration No. 348, filed March 26, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Petition of Joseph Murray, to build the bearing wall of building on southwest corner First avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-first street, 12 inches thick from top of first story, as per Plans and Specifications for New Building No. 258, filed April 2, 1880.

Moved that so much of the petition be approved as will permit the construction of the bearing wall on the street 12 inches thick above the top of third story floor beams. Unanimous.

Also the following new petitions:

Petition of W. J. & A. M. Parsons for permission to build on lots southwest corner of Sixty-fifth street and Fourth avenue, the bearing wall of building on line of Fourth avenue, 12 inches thick to the under side of second story beams as per Plans and Specifications for New Building No. 214, filed March 17, 1880.

Moved that so much of the petition be approved, as will permit the construction of the bearing wall on the avenue, 12 inches from top of third story floor-beams. Unanimous.

Petition of Arthur Gilman for permission to alter the building No. 118 Madison avenue, northwest corner Thirtieth street, into a first-class apartment house, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 363, filed March 29, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Petition of Evesall Brothers for permission to erect on rear of building No. 237 Fifth avenue, a work-room 10 feet high, 35 x 15, the walls to be 12 inches thick for foundation, and 8 inches thick above, with 12-inch piers 12 inches wide, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 297, filed March 15, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Petition of John Brandt, for Jacob Wicks, for permission to erect the bearing wall of building southeast corner of Second avenue and Eighty-first street, 12 inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications No. 274, filed April 6, 1880.

Moved that so much of the petition be approved as will permit the construction of the bearing wall on avenue, 12 inches thick above the top of third story floor beams. Unanimous.

Petition of Charles E. Larned for permission to raise building No. 42 John street, one story, and the walls to be 12 inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 355, filed March 29, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Application of Josiah Macy's Sons for permission to erect a frame freight-shed wholly covered excepting the roof, with corrugated iron on Pier 45, East river, between Rutgers and Jefferson streets, as per Special Application No. 200, filed April 9, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Petition of Isaac E. Wright, per J. H. Valentine, architect, for permission to build the bearing wall of building on the southeast corner of Madison avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street 12 inches thick from top of basement, as per Plans and Specifications for New Building No. 299, filed April 10, 1880.

Moved that so much of the petition be approved as will permit the construction of the bearing wall on avenue, 12 inches thick above the top of second story floor beams. Unanimous.

Petition of John McIntyre for Thomas Thacher, for permission to erect a building on lot No. 38 White street, and to use the west wall of No. 40 White street, the said wall being 68 feet deep by 68 feet high, 20 inches thick in basement, and 16 inches from first story, and for permission to line said wall 8 inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications for New Building No. 266, filed April 5, 1880.

Moved that the petition be approved, provided the wall is lined from basement to top of first story floor beams, 12 inches in thickness. Unanimous.

Petition of John Brandt, for Joseph Hillenbrand, for permission to raise the westerly wall of centre portion of building on the north side of Fifty-first street, about 200 feet west of Second avenue, 8 inches in thickness to height of 8 feet 6 inches, as per Plan and Specification for Alterations No. 444, filed April 12, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Petition of J. H. Valentine for permission to line up the westerly wall of building on the south side of One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, 110 feet east of Madison avenue, 8 inches thick, to be used as a party wall, as per Plans and Specifications for New Building No. 312, filed April 15, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Petition of Stephen H. Mapes for permission to erect a two story brick extension, 24 feet high, 7 feet 3 inches by 8 feet on rear of building No. 69 East Fifty-third street, with first story wall 12 inches thick and 8 inches above, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 476, filed April 16, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Petition of John C. Burne, for permission to build the bearing wall of building on northeast corner of One Hundred and Third street and Lexington avenue, 12 inches in thickness, as per Plans and Specifications for New Building No. 71, filed January 29, 1880.

Moved to be reconsidered, and so much of the petition be approved as will permit the construction of the bearing wall on line of street 12 inches thick above the top of third story floor beams. Unanimous.

Petition of John M. Dodd, Jr., for permission to alter the buildings Nos. 85 and 87 Front street, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 394, filed April 3, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Petition of B. W. Warner, for permission to line up the easterly wall of No. 37 and party wall between Nos. 37 and 39 West Fourteenth street, with brick work 8 inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications No. 313, filed April 15, 1880.

Approved, provided the walls are lined 12 inches to top of first story floor beams and 8 inches above. Approved unanimously.

Petition of J. H. Burton, for permission to alter building No. 1 West Thirty-eighth street, by widening and raising it with a mansard roof, to correspond with houses adjoining, the party wall to be 12 inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 438, filed April 10, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Petition of Charles Sturtz Kober, for permission to raise the extension at No. 324 East Sixteenth

street, from basement and one story to the height of basement and two stories, with walls 8 inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications No. 458, filed April 14, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Petition of F. W. Saltzieder, for permission to erect a one-story building 25 by 23 on south side of Twenty-ninth street, 63 feet east of Sixth avenue, with 8-inch walls, as per Plans and Specifications for New Building No. 314, filed April 16, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Petition of James F. Woodhouse, for permission to raise the building on rear of lot No. 132 West Fifteenth street, which is 25 feet deep, one additional story with walls 8 inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications No. 460 for Alterations, filed April 14, 1880. Disapproved unanimously.

Petition of Roby Cole, for permission to build a one story extension 8 x 14 to building No. 26 East Forty-sixth street, to be used as a butler's pantry, the walls to be 8 inches thick above foundation, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 426, filed April 8, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Petition of Mrs. Annie Fettretch, for permission to build four brown stone houses on south side of One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, 275 feet east of Seventh avenue, the use of wall adjoining easterly line having been refused, permission is asked to build a wall adjoining said wall 8 inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications for New Building No. 297, filed April 10, 1880. Approved, on condition that the said wall be anchored to the adjoining wall every 30 inches. Unanimous.

Petition of Wm. A. Winter, for permission to erect three one story buildings on Third avenue, southeast corner of Sixty-fourth street, 25 feet wide, 30 feet deep, and 12 feet high, with 8 inch walls, as per Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 308, filed April 13, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Petition of T. P. Rogers & Son, for permission to alter the rear part of building No. 370 and 372 Washington street, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 299, filed March 15, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Petition of Gambrill & Ficken, for permission to alter the premises No. 12 West Thirty-seventh street, by raising the building one story by a Mansard roof from 47 feet to 54 feet in height, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 413, filed April 6, 1880. Disapproved unanimously.

Petition of Gambrill & Ficken for permission to alter the premises No. 108 West Thirty-fourth street, by raising the building one story by a mansard roof, from 51 feet 9 inches in height to 60 feet 9 inches in height, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 414, filed April 6, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Petition of Stephen D. Hatch, for Mr. Holmes, for permission to erect an extension on rear of building No. 46 West Fiftieth street, for butler's pantry, bath room, etc., to be two stories high and basement, 15 feet 6 inches deep, 9 feet rear, 9 feet front, and walls to be 12 and 8 inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 510, filed April 20, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Petition of N. Y. Chemical Works, for permission to erect an office at 526 West Sixteenth street, 17 feet front and rear, 9 feet deep, one story high, walls 8 inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications for New Building No. 295, filed April 9, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Petition of J. B. Snook, for permission to erect a building on rear of 211 West Eighteenth street, 25 feet front and rear, 13 feet 6 inches deep, and one story high, walls 8 inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications for New Building No. 261, filed April 2, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Petition of James Burkett, for permission to alter building No. 427 Sixth avenue, corner of Twenty-sixth street, to build an extension 19 feet front and rear, 25 feet deep, one story high, walls 8 inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 371, filed March 30, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Petition of F. G. Richardson, for permission to alter building No. 107 John street, to build an extension 20 feet front, 5 feet rear, 30 feet deep, one story high, walls 8 inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 370, filed March 30, 1880. Approved unanimously.

Petition of Thomas S. Goodwin, in behalf of B. T. Babbitt, for permission to build an additional story on two buildings No. 78 and 84 Washington street, now seven stories high, with wall 32 inches thick in basement (driven piles underneath), 24 inches thick through to first and second stories, and 16 inches thick thence to top, the walls of said additional story to be 16 inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 240, filed March 5, 1880.

Moved that former action of Board be reconsidered and petition be approved. Unanimous.

The minutes of the meeting having been read and approved as recorded, the Board adjourned subject to call of Superintendent of Buildings.

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1880.

CHAPTER 132.

AN ACT to alter and define the limits and boundaries of the first and third judicial districts of the city of New York, and to provide for the election of justices therein.

Passed April 19, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The first judicial district of the city of New York, now composed of the first, second, third, and fifth wards thereof, shall, on and after the first day of January, eighteen hundred and eighty-two, be constituted and composed of the first, second, third, fifth, and eighth wards of said city. The third judicial district of the city of New York, now composed of the eighth, ninth, and fifteenth wards thereof, shall, on and after the first day of January, eighteen hundred and eighty-two, be constituted and composed of the ninth and fifteenth wards of said city.

Sec. 2. On and after the first day of January, eighteen hundred and eighty-two, the jurisdiction of the district court, in the city of New York, for the first judicial district, shall extend over the first, second, third, fifth, and eighth wards of said city, hereby constituted the said first judicial district; and on and after the said first day of January, eighteen hundred and eighty-two, the jurisdiction of the district court, in the city of New York, for the third judicial district, shall extend over the ninth and fifteenth wards of said city, hereby constituted the said third judicial district.

Sec. 3. At the general state election to be held in the city of New York, in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-one, justices shall be elected in and for the said first and third judicial districts, as the same are hereby constituted, in the same manner as the law now directs, the justices of district courts in said city to be elected, who shall hold office for the term of six years from the first day of January, eighteen hundred and eighty-two.

Sec. 4. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed. But nothing in this act contained shall affect any action pending in either of said district courts on said first day of January, eighteen hundred and eighty-two, but such actions shall proceed to judgment and execution as effectually as if this act had not been passed.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the city of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the comptroller of the city of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 122.

AN ACT to amend section six of title four, chapter two, article one, part four of the Revised Statutes.

Passed April 15, 1880.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section six of chapter two, article one, part four of the Revised Statutes is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 6. On receiving such list the county clerk shall write the names of the persons contained therein, with their additions and places of residence, on separate pieces of paper, and shall roll up or fold such pieces of paper, each in the same manner as near as may be, so that the name written therein shall not be visible, and shall deposit such pieces of paper in a sufficient box from which they shall be drawn as hereinafter provided. If, from any cause, such box or the pieces of paper containing the names of jurors so deposited therein shall be lost or destroyed the county clerk, in whose office such loss or destruction shall happen, shall forthwith provide a new box and again write the names of the persons contained in the list, so filed in his office, on separate pieces of paper and roll up or fold the same in the same manner as hereinbefore directed, and deposit the same in the box so provided by him.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
